It's been a while but the original retail facility in Paulding, before True Value, was opened in 1971 as a NAPA auto parts store. In 1995 it was acquired by Tony Burkley and True Value was added in 1999 serving Paulding as the local hardware store. Tony's father, Marion (Bonita) Burkley, started the business all those years ago and Tony has been working full or part-time in the family business over the past 40 years.

Tony gave the history of the store, "My father had been

in the automotive business since the 1950s first repairing them, then opening an auto parts store in Payne in the middle 1960s."

A couple of years later they opened the store in Paulding, the first site being behind the drive-thru on North Williams St. The second move was next to the old theater. The current store was built in 1978 and three additions have been made to the building since that time.







When I was a youngster my mother often read the Ten Commandments to me, emphasizing how these truths are all tied together. For example, "stealing" may also infringe upon the Commandments' teaching to "tell the truth" and to "not covet something that is not mine." In other words, the breaking of one commandment may well lead to breaking several others, something we see in the illustration below.

In the fall of 2012, Bismark Mensah, a recent immigrant to the U.S. from Ghana, was working part-time job as a "courtesy associate" at a Wal-Mart near Seattle, Washington. As he collected shopping carts, Bismark often found personal items that customers had left behind-keys, credit cards, wallets. But on an October afternoon he spotted an item that really grabbed his attention. It was a white envelope with a clear window in the middle that was bulging with cash. Lots of cash-like \$20,000 in cash! Mr. Mensah could have used some of that cash. He came to the U.S. to study business administration so he could return to Ghana and help his mom expand her five small seamstress shops. And by making \$9.05 per hour at Wal-Mart it will take him a long time to fulfill that dream. But Mensah says he never considered keeping the money. "My conscience wouldn't allow it," he said. "I couldn't even drive home if I did that." So, instead, he ran after the husband and wife who had left the cash. As it turns out, they

Justin Bute, senior at Antwerp, was looking for scholarships for college. He happened to find one that could help not only himself but his community too. The "Peanut Butter Slam Jam" Scholarship allows applicants to have an entry into a drawing for up to \$4,000 in education money. For every 10 jars collected, another entry is put in for the applicant.

Justin appreciates all the help that he received from the Antwerp Local School and his family and friends who

were going to use the money for a down payment on a house. Mensah said, "She was like, 'Wow!' Tears are coming out. She took some money and tried to reward me. I said, 'No, no. I'm all right."

Mensah received Wal-Mart's "Integrity in Action Award" and a promotion. Now he works full time for \$9.19 an hour—with benefits. But for Mensah the real rewards are more internal. He contributed for this act. Justin said, "I was able to collect 50 jars of Peanut Butter and Jelly." The food was all going to the Antwerp Food Pantry which is sponsored by the community and the Ministerial Association.

After the explosion at the West, TX fertilizer plant, the women of FireWives.com felt compelled to help. Within a few hours, a Teespring tshirt campaign was created to benefit the West, Texas Volunteer Fire Department and raised \$1,500 in 24 hours (\$4,522.59 has been raised so far in this campaign). The group of over 200 wives and girlfriends of firefighters from around the country leveraged their networks within the fire community. Including, local firefighter wife, Heather Williams, who's husband is a volunteer firefighter with the New Haven/Adams Township Fire Department.

We're a pretty informal group of women, who found each other based on similar circumstances," said Williams. "When the tragedy in West, TX occurred it struck a nerve with our group.' The group was moved to action and a t-shirt fundraiser was born. A committee was formed, and a Teespring page was accepting orders within 24 hours of the decision to start a fundraiser. Teespring is a crowd funded site offering screen printed t-shirts and other products, an ordering system, and shipping functionality. The goods can be sold at a higher cost for fundraising efforts. In addition to the t-shirt, a hoodie sweatshirt is also offered with a Maltese cross on the front with a heart in the center and the saying "Keep Calm and be FireWife Strong" on the back.

"Our group really wanted it to be an effort from all fire wives," said Williams. "It has been positively incredible to watch firefighter wives from across the country come together to support this effort." Proceeds will go to the West, Texas Volunteer Fire Department to use at their discretion. The department lost three fire trucks and even more equipment in the blast. "The new equipment purchased may be for the firefighters," said Williams. "But, it's for the wives too. Every hose, every radio, every pair of boots and gloves helps protect someone's husband. The next time the pager goes off in West, it's going to be tough. We hope the new safety equipment will help ease the minds of the firefighter wives, even if it's the tiniest bit." Another way the fundraiser reaches out to the wives of the West, TX fire department is by allowing the public to buy a t-shirt and have it delivered to a West, TX firefighter wife to remind them how strong they are despite the chaos. 



Summer isn't here yet, but it's getting close. And for many people, the arrival of summer means it's time for swimming at the local pool or lake. If you're just a casual swimmer, you probably don't have to adjust your diet before jumping in. But that's not the case with competitive swimmers, who must constantly watch what they eat and drink, particularly in the days and hours preceding their races. While you may not ever have to concern yourself with your 400-meter individual medley "splits," you can learn a lot from swimmers' consumption patterns — particularly if you're an investor.

For starters, to sustain energy and stamina for a relatively long period of time, competitive swimmers need to eat easy-to-diwhole wheat, whole grains, apples and bananas. When you invest, you want to build a portfolio that is capable of "going the distance." Consequently, you need investments that provide carbohydrate-type benefits - in other words, investments with the potential to fuel a long-term investment strategy. Such a strategy usually involves owning a mix of high-quality stocks, bonds, government securities and certificates of deposit (CDs). By owning these vehicles, in proportions appropriate for your risk tolerance and time horizon, you can help yourself make progress toward your financial goals - and lessen the risk of running

out of energy "mid-stream." Of course, competitive swimmers have to be diligent not just in what they do eat but also in what they don't. That's why they avoid sweets, such as sodas and desserts, when it's close to race time. These items do not provide lasting energy — in fact, they actually sap energy once the sugar wears off. As an investor, you, too, need to avoid the temptation of "sweets" in the form of high-yield or "hot" investment vehicles. You may find some of these investments to be alluring, but you will need to carefully weigh the extra risks involved. For many people, these types of investments may not provide the longterm stability needed to help



maintain a healthy, productive investment portfolio.

While what swimmers eat, or don't eat, is important to them, their drinking habits are also crucial. The competitive environment — warm pool water, warm air temperatures and high humidity — can quickly lead to dehydration, so swimmers need to drink sizable amounts of water and sports drinks before and during practice. And you, as an investor, need your own type of liquidity, for at least two reasons. First, you need enough cash or cash equivalents to take advantage of new investment opportunities as they arise; without the ability to add new investments, your portfolio could start to "dehydrate." Second, you need enough liquid investments - specifically, lowrisk vehicles that offer preservation of principal - to create an emergency fund, ideally containing six to 12 months' worth of living expenses. Without such a fund, you may be forced to dip into long-term investments to pay for unexpected costs, such as a major car repair, a new furnace or a large bill from the dentist.

So the next time you see competitive swimmers churning through their lanes, give a thought as to the type of diet that is helping propel them along — and think of the similarities to the type of "fueling" you'll need to keep your investment strategy moving forward.

560 VEHICLES PASS THROUGH OVI CHECKPOINT

The Ohio State Highway Patrol, Bryan Police Department, Williams County Sheriff's Office and the Ohio Investigative Unit conducted a multi-agency OVI Checkpoint from 9:00 p.m. to 12:00 a.m. Saturday morning, April 27th. The checkpoint was held on U.S. Route 127 just south of the State Route 15 split at the north edge of the City of Bryan in Pulaski Township in Williams County.

passed 560 vehicles through the checkpoint with none of the vehicles being diverted to a secondary area. There were no arrests for OVI in the checkpoint zone. In addition to the checkpoint, troopers and area agencies worked saturation patrols in the area. There were no other arrests during the checkpoint timeframe. The Ohio Investigative Unit completed six site checks at establishments with liquor permits and no violations were found. The OVI checkpoint and saturation patrols were funded by fines from impaired drivers and other federal funding. The goal was to make motorists more aware of the impaired driver problem in Ohio, help bring about a reduction in the number of alcohol and drug related crashes and to deter and intercept impaired drivers. Lt. Kevin Thomas, Defiance Post Commander, said "Even with the short delays, officers working the event received a tremendous amount of public support during the checkpoint and wanted to thank the motoring public for helping to make our roadways safer. Even though there were no arrests made, the checkpoint was beneficial for the public awareness and voluntary compliance."

OHIO AMBER ALERT STEERING COMMITTEE SUPPORTS USE OF WIRE-LESS EMERGENCY ALERT

The Ohio AMBER Alert Steering Committee met in regular session on Wednesday, April 24th in Columbus. Robert Hoever, Director of Special Programs for the National Center for Missing and Exploited Children (NCMEC), was on hand to make a presentation concerning the new Wireless Emergency Alert (WEA) Program. The WEA is a new cell phone alerting program coordinated through the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) and the Cellular Telephone Industry Association (CTIA) to alert citizens of Presidential Emergency messages, weather or hazardous material incidents and can be used for AMBER Alerts.

At the meeting, committee members unanimously approved use of the WEA whenever an AMBER Alert is issued in Ohio. This means all citizens with a WEA enabled phone will receive notification of AMBER Alert activations in their vicinity. Members agreed that the WEA alerts should be sent immediately upon activation, even if during the night, as the urgency in finding an abducted child outweighed any potential inconvenience the alert might cause.

Criminals abduct children 24-hours a day, so the alert should go out 24hours a day," said committee member Linda Maloy, whose daughter was abducted prior to the AMBER Alert program existing and who serves as the victim's advocate on the committee. The NCMEC presentation allowed the committee to get fully acquainted with the new system capabilities to make an informed decision as to whether to include it in Ohio's AMBER Alert Plan.

"We want to ensure that this pastime continues as an important family tradition for our children and grandchildren."

At the five designated youth fishing ponds on May 4, ODNR will provide bait and instruction for the young anglers, but participants are encouraged to bring their

own fishing rods and tackle. A limited number of loaner fishing rods will be available at each site.

The following familyfriendly fishing ponds will be stocked throughout the summer to ensure there are always plenty of fish to catch:

 Caesar Creek State Park Pond - 40 miles from Cincinnati;

• Delaware State Park Pond 30 miles from Columbus;

• Maumee Bay State Park Pond – 10 miles from Toledo; and

Sycamore State Park Pond - 15 miles from Dayton.

Family-friendly fishing ponds are open to youths 15 and under. Those 16 and older must fish with a youth age 15 and under. See www2.ohiodnr.gov/youthfishing for more information.

The ODNR Division of Wildlife District Three office in Akron also offers fishing to youths age 15 and under. Go to wildohio.com for more information on the youth-only fishing area.

Ohio's Free Fishing Days are open to all Ohio residents and extends to all of Ohio's public waters, including Lake Erie and the Ohio River. An estimated 1.3 million people fish each year in Ohio, and the ODNR Division of Wildlife stocked 24 million fish in 2012 alone. Some different species of fish Ohioans might hook include steelhead trout, walleye, saugeye, crappie, yellow perch, bass, bluegill and catfish.

The Free Fishing Days weekend offers Ohioans of all ages the chance to experience the fun of fishing. Here are some helpful tips for taking a youngster out for Free Fishing Days.

• Keep the trip simple by considering a child's age and skill level.

• Choose a pond, lake or stream where children will be able to easily catch a few fish.

• A spin-cast reel is usually easy for kids to use. Bring a camera, and keep the trip fun and short.

• Be patient – plan on spending time untangling lines, baiting hooks, landing fish and taking pictures.

Anglers 16 years and older are required to have a valid fishing license to take fish, frogs or turtles from Ohio waters during the rest of the vear.

Ohio residents born on or before December 31, 1937, can obtain a free fishing license at any license vendor or online at wildohio.com. Residents age 66 and older who were born on or after January 1, 1938, are eligible for a senior fishing license. A one-day fishing license is also available. Fishing licenses are available at participating agents and wildohio.com. The Sport Fish Restoration (SFR) is a partnership between federal and state government, industry and anglers/boaters. ۰W When anglers purchase rods, Η reels, fishing tackle, fish finders and motor boat fuel, they pay an excise tax. The federal • C government collects these taxes, and the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service administers and disburses these funds to state fish and wildlife agencies. These funds are used to acquire habitat, produce and stock fish, conduct research and surveys, provide aquatic education and acquire and develop boat accesses.

be qualified electors in the counties for which they serve. The Secretary of State makes appointments to boards of elections based on the recommendations of the executive committees of the respective county political parties.

Linda Weidenhamer was recommended by the Paulding County Democratic Executive Committee.

WHEN TO START TREATING **POND PLANT PROBLEMS?**

Source: Ohio Pond News As winter fades into spring, the question most often asked is when to begin treatment of submerged aquatic plants. Pond owners need to be commended for being proactive in their management of aquatic plants; but applying aquatic herbicides too early can potentially be wasting money. On top of that, pond owners may have to re-treat to attain the level of control they desire. Let's discuss timing those spring applications of aquatic herbicides for maximum submerged aquatic plant efficacy.

First and foremost, pond owners need to consider wise not to treat submerged aquatic plants until water temperatures exceed 60 F and we know those temperatures will persist for several days.

In cold water, plants tend to slow down metabolically and this can impact uptake of the product. If cold water persists, product decay might occur prior to the application achieving the desired results. We also have some submerged aquatic plants that are late germinators and an early application may allow them to still become a nuisance later

Are there exceptions to the rule? Yes, there are two invasive submerged plant species from Eurasia, Curly-leaf pondweed and Eurasian watermilfoil, which are susceptible to aquatic herbicides in early spring. These two submerged plant species actively grow in colder water, particularly as water temperatures rise thru the 50's. If you own a pond with either of these species, you might want to consider early season applications to control these species. This often requires early-season treatments several years in a row, but success can be attained.

Also, please note that contact aquatic herbicides work more quickly than systemic herbicides and tend to work better in colder water. The pond owner might consider using a contact herbicide when water temperatures are around 60 F and saving systemic herbicides for use as water temperatures approach 70 F.

Always read and follow instructions on the herbicide label.

their pond uses and determine what level of control is desired. Aquatic vegetation can provide some tangible benefits in some cases. Ponds managed for fish and wildlife need some submerged aquatic plants as they provide valuable nursery areas, protection from predators, and food resources. People who have ponds used primarily for swimming or watering nursery stock tend to prefer less plants to avoid fouling swimmers feet or clogging pumps. How early is too early? It is generally recommended that aquatic herbicides not be applied until plants are growing vigorously but not yet reached high levels of biomass. Generally, this means holding off those applications until mid-May. Specifically, it is often

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"FORGIVE. BUT NEVER FORGET." LAST KNOWN **HOLOCAUST SURVIVOR IN INDIANA TO SPEAK IN** PAULDING

"Where is the God of Corrie Ten Boom? I do not want that God." These were the thoughts of a young teenager during a time in our world's history that many would choose to want to forget. As part of the Centennial Celebration series, the Paulding County Carnegie Library presents an evening with William "Bill" Meyer, the last known Holocaust survivor in the state of Indiana. This special event will be held on Thursday, May 16th at 6:00 p.m. at the Extension Building on Fairgrounds Road.

Bill Meyer, as a young boy, was inspired by his neighbor, Corrie Ten Boom, a devout Christian. Ten Boom taught Meyer that Jews, too, were God's children and needed protection from the evil Germans. Meyer began delivering food ration cards, ID's, false passports and other items to Jews hiding all over the area. The blonde, blueeved boy was rarely questioned as he rode his bicycle throughout the countryside.

After one of these trips he returned to find the Gestapo at Ten Boom's store and found her arrested. He was also turned in by a traitor and eventually spent time in a concentration camp. His family was executed as retribution for his crime.

Mr. Meyer, a dedicated Christian, has only within the past fifteen years shared his horrific story. He told Dr. James Dobson, in a 2011 radio interview, "I did not tell my family until recently. Even my wife did not know the details. But today, people do not believe the camps existed, and it makes me angry." Meyer shares that he can tell the words of what happened, but you cannot convey the hunger and the pain of the beatings. "I have researched Bill Meyer's story," states Susan Pieper, library director. "It is heart-wrenching and a powerful testimony to the strength of Corrie Ten Boom and her mission to aid Jewish families. Mr. Meyers was an accomplice in her plan - although motivated by milk and cookies when he began at age nine. Meyer, now in his 80s, differs from Holocaust survivor Inge Aubacher, whom the library hosted a few years ago because he was not Jewish. He was from a Christian family, but his father was a Nazi and he was raised to hate the Jews.' Do not be the person that uses a minor excuse to miss this major event. It will be life changing. All survivors of the

Holocaust worldwide will be gone within a few short years. Due to the graphic nature of the speaker's experience, this event is not recommended for children under the age of twelve. There will be an opportunity to greet Mr. Meyer at the end of the program.

Representative State Tony Burkley (R-Payne) has announced that the Ohio House of Representatives has passed a comprehensive state operating budget that provides crucial assistance to schools and community programs, while at the same time reducing the burden on Ohio's taxpayers.

In addition to providing Ohioans with a \$1.5 billion state income tax cut over the next two years, Amended Substitute House Bill 59 also ensures that none of Ohio's school districts will receive less state aid than they did in FY 2013, increases funding for special education, mental health services and addiction services, and takes significant steps to make higher education more affordable.

"I commend the work of the House Finance and Appropriations Committee to craft a budget that promotes economic growth and shows strong support for our schools," Rep. Burkley said.

During Thursday's voting session, the House adopted an amendment to Am. Sub. H.B. 59 that aims to transform Medicaid and Ohio's health care delivery system. The amendment will require the director of the Governor's Office of Health Transformation and the director of Medicaid to submit to the General Assembly a proposal to reform Medicaid.

Specifically, the goals of the amendment include:

• Focusing on moving certain individuals off Medicaid and onto an employersponsored health insurance or the health insurance marketplace

• Implementing strategies to lower Medicaid caseloads by offering workforce readiness, educational services and wellness services

 Seeking to lower the net state and federal costs for the Medicaid program and reduce the number of individuals who enroll in Medicaid over time

Am. Sub. H.B. 59 will now move to the Ohio Senate for further consideration.

State Sen. Dennis Kruse (R- Auburn) lauded April 27th's passage of a new state budget that provides hundreds of millions of dollars in tax relief to Hoosier families. The two-year fiscal plan includes a 5 percent individual income tax cut phased in from 2015 to 2017 and provides increased funding for roads, child protection. K-12 and higher education. "As the chairman of the Senate Education Committee, I'm pleased to support our new state budget that makes the largest education investment in state history," Kruse said. "College students will have greater access to financial aid and universities will have more funding. I'm pleased to support this budget because of its emphasis on the importance of education for a thriving Indiana." Highlights of the honestly balanced budget include: • Tax Relief and Job Creation:

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-Eliminates state inheritance tax, retroactively effective to January 1, 2013

-Includes funding for vocational education and workforce development initiatives

• Education:

-Increases K-12 funding by \$333 million over the biennium (2 percent increase in FY 2014 and 1 percent increase in FY 2015)

-Increases university funding by more than \$100 million per year

-Increases student aid by \$75 million over the biennium

• Roads:

-Increases road and infrastructure funding by \$200 million per year and sets aside another \$400 million over the biennium for future transportation needs • Child Protection:

-Increases funding for DCS by \$35 million per year

-Provides \$10 million per year for school resource officers (contained in SB 1) • Health Care:

-Transfers \$250 million in FY 2014 to the Medicaid Contingency and Reserve Account

• Paying Taxpayer-Funded Debt:

-100 percent of excess surplus in FY 2013 goes to Pension Stabilization Fund

-Pays back \$91 million in charter school loan

-Provides \$215 million cash funding for university capital projects

• SEA 465 – Indiana Works Councils

• SB 189 - Performance Qualified Schools

• SB 1005 - Remediation

 SB 388 – Absenteeism; school improvement plans

• HB 1314 - Proprietary education

The Senate is now adjourned "sine die"- which signifies the end of the 2013 Indiana General Assembly.

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
