ing manuals, complete with drawings.

Back in the day, Monaghan was actually known for being ahead of his time. When he had collected enough coaching films to fill a small library, he started making his own by splicing together a series of photos. And when the first motion picture cameras became available, he was sure to use them in all sorts of innovative ways.

But Friday, Monaghan will likely coach his final Northeast Hoosier Conference championships as a head coach. He is retiring as a social studies teacher and has asked the administration to look for a head boy's track



held since 1972.

Asked if he is retiring from coaching, Monaghan will only say that he needs time this a summer to step back and enjoy some time off. He may be back with the Bulldogs next season as an assistant or even volunteer. It's almost impossible to imagine New Haven track and field without Monaghan. Then again, we won't have to: four of his assistant coaches as well as head girls coach Larry Stemmler, all ran track for Monaghan at New Haven over the years. And they all plan to be back.

'Coach is the symbol of New Haven, both in school and in athletics," said one of those assistants, Jim Fitzgerald (1980 grad). "His influence is everywhere in this community with the students he's taught and coached over the years. Even the track is named for him."

Stemmler, a 1992 graduate, says it was Monaghan's teaching and coaching style that drew him to the profession

"I saw the difference he made in people and how he cared, even for the kids like me who were not all-stars," Stemmler said. "I even started coaching for Pat while I was in college (1994)."

Stemmler said it was Monaghan's dedication that stands out the most.

"He was watching film long before any other high school coach was doing it," Stemmler said. "He wanted to do everything he could to help his athletes get better. And the harder they would work, the harder he would work."

Monaghan said he had to work hard because he didn't have a track background and always felt like he was trying to catch up. Growing up in Iowa he was a wrestler and went on to compete at St. Ambrose University. After a twoyear stint in the Peace Corps in Venezuela, he applied for teaching and wrestling coaching jobs all over the Midwest. In 1966 he landed at Village Woods Junior High and after one year he moved over to New Haven Junior High.

At both schools, he started wrestling programs, but New Haven's high school wrestling coach was rather young, so Monaghan joined the track and field coaching staff. He coached the sprinters and hurdlers. When he became head coach a few years later, there was no one to coach the throwers, so he became a student of the shot put and discus events. The result: New Haven once had a 20-year streak of sending at least one

thrower to the state meet "I learned pretty early that technique could make a big difference in this sport,' Monaghan said. "So we studied (film) of the very best and broke down film of our own athletes."

FitzgeraldsaysMonaghan's reputation back then was different than it is today.

"I know a few guys around town who ran for Pat in his first few years," Fitzgerald said. "They say he was a big, tough, intimidating coach. When he gave you a command, you jumped."

Monaghan didn't perceive himself in that way but does admit that people tell him he's changed over the years.

"I'm sure I was more intense, but I was just trying to challenge kids," Monaghan said. "Whether it was out on the track or in history class, I was excited about the subject and I think the kids recognized that."

SUPPORTING OUR VETER-ANS

A dedication to serve our country is engrained in our Hoosier roots. During the Civil War, 75 percent of eligible men from Indiana fought for the Union army-second to only Delaware in per-capita enlistment.

Along with Indiana's commitment to serve comes a resolve to honor and assist those who protect our freedom in the military. It's no secret that returning to civilian life brings about challenges for many veterans. That's why the General Assembly enacted legislation this session to remove some of the roadblocks veterans face.

One bill requires Indiana's public colleges and universities to provide administrative and educational assistance to veterans. This includes having a centralized location for admission and financial aid services, fitness accommodations for disabled veterans, academic guidance, counseling services and job-search assistance.

Once these veterans are accepted to college, our public universities will now automatically grant them instate tuition through Senate Enrolled Act 177. Military service often requires those serving to leave the state for an extended period, in many cases losing their in-state eligibility. Honorably discharged veterans will now be eligible for this lower tuition level rate, regardless of whether they are from Indiana or have lived here long enough to meet the school's residency requirements.

The state is also looking to support veterans seeking veteran-owned businesses. The Indiana Economic Development Corporation will assist these businesses in qualifying for state contracts.

Unemployment remains stubbornly high across the country. For post-9/11 veterans, the unemployment rate is even higher. We as a state owe it to our veterans to help them succeed in civilian life. I believe the bills passed by the General Assembly this year are a step in the right direction. What do you think?



Becky O'Connell has been given a unique unofficial title—"The Baby Whisperer." Officially, the 65-year-old widow is a temporary foster care worker. According to a 2013 article in the Chicago Tribune, "She keeps baby clothes arranged by size in the guest room. The hand-knit caps are stacked on a table near the door. And the white wicker bassinet is always within reach." Becky O'Connell is prepared because at any moment of the day or night she could receive a call from a social worker who needs to place an infant in her care. Some of the children have been abandoned. Others have been abused. All of them are desperate for love, for touch, and for attention. So far Ms. O'Connell has taken in 77 infants, or about seven babies per year that stay from one night to four months.

The road to this unique call wasn't easy. In 1999 her youngest son, Ian, was killed in a car accident. "For years and years after (his death), I couldn't concentrate," she says. "I looked and acted like a normal person, but you don't feel like a normal person." A few years later, as she was just beginning to regain her balance, she read an ad from a local adoption agency. They needed someone to be a temporary foster parent for newborns. To O'Connell, who had always loved babies, it sounded like a dream job.

If she has a secret, she says, it is simply giving each child her undivided attention. She adds, "People think that babies bring a lot of disorder and confusion to a household," she says. "But I'm here to tell you it's not the babies who are disordered and confused. It's the adults." O'Connell simply says, "My job is to fall in love with these babies." O'Connell's passion to love these abandoned, abused babies brings to mind the words of Jesus... "Love your enemies and to love one another." Who has God called you to love? UPON THIS ROCK – MAT-THEW 16:13-18

The question that Jesus asked His disciples, "Who do men say that I am?" And His disciples said, "John the Baptist, Elijah, Jeremiah one of the prophets." And Jesus asked again to His disciples, "Who do you say that I am?" And Peter stood and said, 'Thou art Christ, the Son of the living God." And Jesus replied, "Blessed art thou Simon Bar-Jona, for flesh and blood has not revealed this to you, but my Father in heaven." What was revealed to Peter, could not have been done through man's wisdom, and knowledge, it was through the divine revelation of the Holy Spirit. Christ in return said, "And thou art Peter." Since Peter confessed

who Christ was, Christ in return confessed Peter as one of His disciples. "And thou art Peter, and upon this rock I will build my church." The question is who was this rock that Jesus was talking about? There are two words that stand out. Peter and rock. We know that Peter was named Cephas, which means, a stone. The word Peter comes from the Greek word, "Petros" - a stone that is broken off from the mother stone. The word rock on the other hand comes from the Greek "Petra" – a solid unmovable rock. Jesus was telling Peter, 'Upon this very rock (Christ) which you confessed, I will build my church." In I Corinthians 10:4, "And did all drink the same spiritual drink: and they drank of that spiritual Rock that followed them: and that Rock was Christ." He did not say, "Upon thee Peter I will build my church." Peter was only a pillar; he was not the foundation that many believe he is.

God's church cannot be built upon human precepts and tradition, but only through divine truth can the church be established. Ephesians 2:20, "And are built upon the foundation of the apostles and prophets, Jesus Christ himself being the chief corner stone." 
Daryl was employed by Hartzog Lumber for 14 years and has installed for Lowe's since 2001.

BLUE CAST SPRINGS DISCUSSED AT PAULDING **COUNTY CHAPTER OF OHIO GENEALOGICAL SOCIETY** MEETING

The P.C.C.O.G.S. meeting was held April 10, 2013. After welcoming about 25 members and guests, we were reminded of our Wednesday June 12th 6:00 p.m. "potluck style" picnic and Riverside Cemetery walk in Antwerp's Veterans Riverside Park. The evening program consisted of ACRES Land Trust representative, Jill (Rood) Nolls, who explained who they are, what they do & where they are located. At this time, their only preserve in Ohio is Flat Rock in Paulding County. Recently ACRES reached another milestone: preserving their 5000th acre of land. The acquisition of the 87-acre Blue Cast Springs Nature Preserve in Northwest Allen County, Indiana increased its holdings to 5046 acres.

Blue Cast Magnetic Springs & Sanitarium:

"Blue Cast Mineral Water Carbonated and Bottled at

the Springs" Blue Cast Springs, located about two miles Northwest of Woodburn, Indiana, contains deep ravines, over 3,000 feet of Maumee River frontage, active blue heron nests, mature hardwood forests. It is part of the historic Black Swamp wetlands extending from Allen County all the way to Lake Erie.

Did you know the name "Blue Cast" came from the bluish colored mineral spring located near the Maumee River? Evidence showed a unique magnetic force not typical of mineral water. Folks described the drinking water qualities as an invigorating tonic with metabolic properties. Another spring to the South was found to produce sulfur water and mud, which spawned another business, this one to attract people looking for benefits of therapeutic baths. In 1902, Henry Schnelker, New Haven, purchased these 87-acres of land. He built a reservoir holding about 5000 gallons of this now popular beverage, collecting the mineral spring water 24 hours a day. Producing over one-hundred cases a day, Schnelker's blue and yellow label was seen throughout the United States and around the world. Bold letters proclaiming "Blue Cast Mineral Water" surrounded an illustration of the "Fire Proof Sanitarium." Six fluid ounce bottles were described as being "Carbonated and

It is estimated that in the United States an impaired or distracted driver causes a fatal car accident every 30 minutes. The National Highway Safety Transportation Administration (NHSTA) estimates that 40% alcohol-related driving fatalities involve teen drivers; 60% of teen deaths from car accidents involve alcohol. The NHSTA also estimates that on average, eight teenagers in America are killed every day due to alcohol impaired driving.

These statistics indicate that teen drivers are especially vulnerable to making poor decisions behind the wheel, and on May 3, 2013 several New Haven businesses, organizations, and public safety agencies came together to vividly demonstrate for NHHS students the consequences of impaired driving. The New Haven Police Department, the New Haven/Adams Township Fire Department, the Power House Youth Center, New Haven High School, the New Haven/Adams Township Parks Department, Robinson's Wrecker Service and Parkview's Samaritan Air Crew all participated in a mock extraction which was staged in the High School's parking lot.

Junior and Senior students from NHHS and the Power House Youth Center collaborated with public safety officials to stage the event, which included a re-enactment by students involving a major car accident. Two of the students 'died' as a result of the mock accident; one was transported via Parkview's Samaritan helicopter and three others were taken away via a New Haven/ Adams Township ambulance due to their faux traumatic injuries. One of the students was 'arrested' for driving while under the influence of alcohol.

NHHS student Courtney Tracey stated that Friday's demonstration made a lasting impression on her. "I thought the extraction was really realistic," said Tracey. "The actors were really believable, and I think it made a lot of the students think about making responsible choices," she added.

"It was a great demonstration today at New Haven High School concerning impaired driving and the consequences," said New Haven Police Chief Steve Poiry of the mock extraction. "I hope that the students not only got the message that driving

ANTWERP HIGH SCHOOL RANKS IN TOP 100 OHIO HIGH SCHOOLS

Recently, 21,035 U.S. Public high schools were reviewed for the top high schools in the country by U.S. & World Report and 234 Ohio school made the rankings. Several Northwest Ohio public high schools made the top 100. These schools include: Columbus Grove High School (#20), Tinora High School (#29), Archbold (#30), Crestview High School (#59), Kalida High School (#60), Antwerp High School (#68), Hicksville High School (#72), and Ada High School (#95).

Ohio high school students must earn at least 20 credits in various subjects, including economics and financial literacy. In 10th grade, students take the Ohio Graduation Tests, which assess reading, writing, math, science and social studies skills, according to the Ohio Department of Education.

Of the numerous Ohio schools ranked in 2013 among the U.S. News Best High Schools, 19 were awarded gold medals, 106 earned silver medals and 109 received bronze medals. To be eligible for a state ranking, a school must be awarded a national gold or silver medal.

WATCH FOR WILDLIFE AS WEATHER WARMS

As the spring brings the next generation of wildlife, the Ohio Department of Natural Resources (ODNR) advises residents to enjoy Ohio's wildlife from a distance.

This advice extends to young or presumed abandoned wildlife. Young animals are usually not abandoned, and the parents will retrieve them, especially when left alone by humans. A wild animal, even when young, is capable of biting, scratching and transmitting diseases and parasites to humans and pets.

Many wild animals are raised by only one adult and are not tended to during daylight hours. For example, a doe white-tailed deer will hide her fawn from predators alone in a secluded spot, such as a meadow or flower bed. The doe tends to the fawn several times each night. Do not capture and attempt to care for animals. State and federal laws protect and regulate wildlife and endangered species in Ohio. Only persons known as rehabilitators, under special permits issued by the ODNR Division of Wildlife, may possess and care for native wild animals. The ODNR Division of Wildlife and Ohio Wildlife Rehabilitators Association (OWRA) offers the following advice to reduce human interference with wildlife: • Think before you act. Check for nests before mowing, cutting trees or clearing brush. It is best to cut trees and clear brush in the autumn when nesting season is over.

• Leave the animal in the wild. If a person disturbs a nest, he or she should wear gloves and replace the animal and the nest material to the original location or as close as possible. It's a myth that wildlife parents will not tend to their young because of human scent. Wildlife parents are devoted parents, and most birds don't even have a sense of smell.

• Keep pets under control so they do not raid nests and injure wild animals. Keep pets inoculated against parasites and diseases.

It probably doesn't show up on your calendar, but May is Disability Insurance Awareness Month. And you might agree that such a month is useful, when you consider the following:

• Three in 10 workers entering the workforce today will become disabled before retiring, according to the Social Security Administration.

• At age 42, you are four times more likely to become seriously disabled than to die during your working years, according to National Underwriter Life & Health.

• Disability causes nearly 50% of all mortgage foreclosures, according to Health Affairs, a health policy research journal.

Given these statistics, it's not surprising that the Life and Health Insurance Foundation for Education (LIFE) sponsors Disability Insurance Awareness Month to


encourage Americans to address their disability income needs. Here's the bottom line: You can be really good at budgeting your money and you can be a disciplined long-term investor — but unless you've protected at least a reasonable percentage of your income, your whole financial strategy is incomplete. And all your goals, such as a comfortable retirement, could be jeopardized.

Of course, you may not be totally unfamiliar with disability income insurance; if you work for a large employer, a group disability policy may be part of your employee benefits package. If so, you should certainly accept the coverage, which may be offered to you free, or at minimal cost. However, this coverage might be inadequate to replace the income needed to allow your family to maintain its lifestyle without dipping into your investments.

Consequently, you might need to think about purchasing an individual disability insurance policy. Here are some tips:

• Look for a policy that is "non-cancellable" until you reach age 65. When you purchase a non-cancellable policy, your policy premiums can't be changed, provided you pay them on time.

• Pick the right waiting period. Typically, disability insurance policies don't start paying benefits immediately; there's usually a waiting (or "elimination") period ranging from 30 days to two years. Obviously, a shorter waiting period is more desirable, but it's probably also going to be more expensive. You may be able to give yourself the flex-

ibility of choosing the longer waiting period if you have created an emergency fund containing six to 12 months' worth of living expenses, kept in a liquid account that offers significant preservation of principal.

• Avoid overly restrictive policies. You may want to avoid an "accident-only" policy or one with a limited benefit term (five and 10 years are common). These policies may be cheaper, but they don't cover either a disabling illness or the entirety of your working life.

• Consider adding appro-priate "riders." It will likely add to the cost of your policy, but a cost-of-living rider will help protect your future benefits from the effects of inflation. You also might want to add a future income options (FIO) rider, which provides you with the ability to purchase additional coverage in the future with no further medical underwriting.

These suggestions are general in nature. Your financial advisor can help you determine if you need a private disability insurance policy - and, if so, what type of policy is best suited for your needs.

But don't wait too long to take action in this area. You can't predict the future, but you should still prepare for the unexpected.

State Route 111-6.2 - Viaduct and Widening (PID: 89604 and 92830) - The City of Defiance, in consultation with ODOT, proposes to improve low clearance and safety issues at the CSX Railroad Viaduct on State Route 111 by lowering the roadway from the intersection of Cedar Street to Don Miller Drive. Widening of SR111 from Williams Street to Downs/Deatrick/Clinton Street is also proposed to add a left-turn lane to the center. The project will also include improvements to stormwater drainage and sidewalks. Traffic during this project will be maintained in one lane. The construction for this project is currently scheduled to begin in summer/fall of 2014. **Paulding County**

ing Exempted Village School District, in consultation with ODOT, have proposed a project on various village streets near the Paulding Elementary School and middle school. This project will add new

sidewalks along Water Street from Jackson Street to Baldwin Street, along Emerald Road from Johnson Road to the school, and along North Main Street from Baldwin Street to Miles Street. It will add new sidewalk at missing sections on Caroline Street between Grant Street and Emerald Road and also construct a raised concrete median in the main school driveway. This project will add school zone pavement markings and flashing signs along Water and Caroline Streets and add curb extensions and crosswalk pavement markings at various intersections near the school.

Other work to improve and/or add sidewalks will occur on the school property as well.

Traffic during most of this project will be maintained at all times. Traffic on Water Street may be detoured for a short period. The construction of the project is currently scheduled for spring/summer 2014

MORE TURKEY HUNTERS SUCCESSFUL ON OHIO'S OPENING DAY

For the opening day of Ohio's 2013 spring wild turkey season, hunters harvested 2,762 wild turkeys, according to the Ohio Department of Natural Resources (ODNR). The 2013 opening day total is a 24 percent increase from the 2012 opening day tally when 2,227 turkeys were killed.

This year, Ashtabula County had the most checked wild turkeys of the opening day with 114 turkeys. Ashtabula County also had the largest number of turkeys harvested during the 2012 opening day.

Ohio's spring turkey season began Monday, April 22, and closes Sunday, May 19. The spring turkey season is open statewide except for Lake La Su An Wildlife Area in Williams County. Find more information in the 2012-2013 Ohio Hunting and Trapping Regulations, available where licenses are sold, and at wildohio.com.

The ODNR Division of Wildlife estimates that more than 70,000 people will hunt turkeys during the fourweek season. Legal hunting hours are one-half hour before sunrise until noon from April 22 to May 5. Hunting hours May 6-19 will be onehalf hour before sunrise to sunset. Ohio's wild turkey population was estimated at

180,000 prior to the start of the spring season.

Only bearded wild turkeys may be killed during the spring hunting season. A hunter is required to check their turkey by 11:30 p.m. on the day of harvest. Hunters with the proper permits may kill a limit of two bearded gobblers during the fourweek season, but not more than one wild turkey per day.

A new tagging procedure implemented this year allows hunters to make their own game tag to attach to a wild turkey. Game tags can be made of any material (cardboard, plastic, paper, etc.) as long as it contains the hunter's name, date, time and county of the kill. Go to the Turkey Hunting Resources page at wildohio. com for more information on changes to the game check process.

All hunters must report their turkey harvest using the automated game-check system. Hunters have three options to complete the game-check:

• Online at wildohio.com or ohiogamecheck.com;

• Call 877-TAG-ITOH (877-824-4864); • Any license agent. A list of agents can be found at wil-

dohio.com or by calling 800-WILDLIFE (800-945-3543).

Game-check transactions are available online and by telephone seven days a week, including holidays. Landowners exempt from purchasing a turkey permit, and other people not required to purchase a turkey permit, cannot use the phone-in option.

The ODNR Division of Wildlife will update the total turkey harvest numbers on Monday, April 29, Monday, May 13, and Monday, May 20, at wildohio.com. The turkey harvest numbers will be listed by county as well as statewide.

Ohio's first modern day wild turkey season opened in 1966 in nine counties, and hunters checked 12 birds. The total number of checked turkeys topped 1,000 for the first time in 1984. Turkey hunting opened statewide in 2000.



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


