On an otherwise sleepy evening in Payne, Ohio, the American Legion on Main Street was hopping on Saturday night, June 29, 2013 as residents of both Indiana and Ohio came out to show their support of six year old Chase Holt. Chase , was recently diagnosed with

Neurofibromatosis Type 2 and underwent surgery at Dayton Children's Hospital to remove two large tumors that were compressing his spinal cord; there are many other tumors throughout Chase's body, and have left him with partial paralysis of his left arm. There is no cure

Of special concern is Chase's optical and auditory nerves, because tumor growth on either of these nerves could lead to hearing and/or vision loss.

No matter what the future may hold for both Chase Holt and New Haven's Bassault, on Saturday, June 29th I think it was made quite clear that both have the love, support, and backing of family, friends, and the community.

## 24/49 COMMERCIAL DE-**VELOPMENT COMMITTEES**

The four committees involved in the development and promotion of the 24/49 commercial area met Thursday, June 26, 2013 at village hall to be updated on the sale of the Community Improvement Corporation's farm ground and to report on their individual committee accomplishments. Ray Delong opened the

meeting by thanking the committee members for attending and ask that Randy Derck, President of the Antwerp CIC give an update on the sale. President Derck stated that the farm ground sold for \$6,950.00 an acre and after all expenses from the auction and pay off of the farm loan, the CIC would realize approximately \$265,000.00. The CIC would make available \$200,000 of this total to go towards the new access road currently being planned off of S. Erie.

Village Administrator Sara Keeran and CIC member, explained to the committee members that the village felt that a road providing access to the commercial acreage needed to be installed at this time in order to attract new business into the area. The CIC in cooperation with the village would install a new roadway and storm drainage and would provide a new access to the Antwerp Community Church and eliminate the driveway the church now has off of S. Erie Street. Should the new Dollar General want access from this new roadway, one could be provided to their business. The Village has authorized preliminary engineering to be designed in order to arrive at project costs for this

#### PATIENTS DIRECT ACCESS TO PHYSICAL THERAPISTS

Effective July 1, 2013, patients now have direct access to physical therapists. Direct access allows patients to receive evaluation and treatment by a physical therapist

without a physician referral. Indiana is the final state to pass this law. The new bill permits patients to be evaluated and treated for 24 calendar days without a referral from a physician or other provider. Referrals will still be needed for spinal manipulation and sharp debridement.

After 24 days, a physician referral will need to be obtained to continue treat-



Sometimes life lessons come hard and are never learned, something we see exemplified in the historical story I've referenced in this week's news article. In the spring of 1867,

George Custer and his regiment were on a scouting expedition on the plains of Kansas. Suddenly Custer's English greyhounds, his constant companions, began to chase some antelope over a distant hill. In spite of himself, Custer could not resist joining the chase. It was not long before the general, his horse, and his pack of dogs had left his regiment far be-

He quickly forgot his men and his mission when he crested the first hill and saw his first buffalo: an enormous, shaggy bull. He put the spurs to his horse's sides and began the chase. As the horse gained on the massive buffalo, Custer yelled with excitement. An avid hunter, he had to bring this trophy home. He drew his pearlhandled pistol. But as he came alongside the thundering beast and shoved the barrel into its thick shaggy side, Custer paused. Feeling the ground shake, hearing the ragged breathing of both animals side by side, he pulled the pistol back, to "prolong the enjoyment of the chase."

After several minutes, Custer decided it was time for the kill. Again, He shoved the pistol into the side of the buffalo. But, as if sensing Custer's intentions, the buffalo abruptly turned toward the horse. The horse veered away from the buffalo's horns, and when Custer tried to grab the reins with both hands, his finger accidentally fired a bullet into his own horse's head, killing it instantly. Custer was thrown to the ground and then struggled quickly to his feet to face the animal that had been his prey only seconds before. Instead of charging, the buffalo stared at the strange, foolish man and walked off.

Horseless and alone, Custer began the long, dangerous walk back to his regiment. In less than a decade, this same recklessness and arrogance would lead the General and his men to their death on a flat-topped hill next to a river called the Little Bighorn.

Does my pride get in the way of God's work in my life? Regarding the impact of pride in our lives the scriptures tells us... Psalm 10:4 (NIV), "In his pride the wicked does not seek him; in all his thoughts there is no room for God.



# **2013 SUMMARY OF NEW**

#### By: IN State Sen. Dennis Kruse (R-Auburn)

In our recent legislative session, the Indiana General Assembly passed 293 bills that became laws. I wanted to inform you about some new laws that will go into effect on

This session featured several bills focused on better protecting our children, including:

- HEA 1001 and HEA 1006 - Will help the Indiana Department of Child Services hire more caseworkers and hotline staff, and allow judges to contact local DCS workers directly to report potential cases of abuse or neglect.
- SEA 509 Fixed a potential loophole in our human trafficking law to protect children up to age 18.

Indiana's deep commitment to those who have served in our armed forces was reinforced with the following new laws:

- SEA 115 Creates the "combat to college" program, which will provide veterans attending state colleges and universities with centralized services specific to their needs.
- SEA 177 Allows for veterans returning from duty out of state or overseas to qualify for in-state tuition at Indiana's public colleges and universities.
- SEA 564 Expands state contracting opportunities for veteran-owned businesses.
- SEA 290 Gives those who have been medically trained in the military an easier transition into emergency medical professions after they return to civilian life.

Other new laws addressing a variety of issues include:

- HEA 1151 Creates the blue alert program to inform the public when a law enforcement officer is hurt, killed or missing in the line of duty.
- SB 559 Prevents the use of welfare debit cards at adult

- sales of medicines containing ephedrine, a major meth ingredient, by allowing ephedrine/pseudoephedrine to be sold only at pharmacies or retailers participating in the national ephedrine sales tracking database.
- HEA 1381 Helps regulate "cherry-picking" (selective student admittance)

by requiring public school corporations to set capacity limits on transfer students. With some exceptions for expelled and suspended students, a school corporation may not deny a request for transfer for any reason other than capacity.

#### **EX-ALLEN COUNTY POLICE OFFICER PUBLISHES BOOK**

Tom Gratz is a 1961 graduate of New Haven High School and lived at the edge of New Haven. He was on the Allen County Sheriff's Department for 31 years, retiring in 2003. He patrolled northeastern Allen County, Woodburn and New Haven. His involvement in the community was coaching Little League Baseball and girl's softball when his children were growing up in New Haven. He was a member of the New Haven Jaycees and member of the Marine Corps League in New Haven. He was chairman of the New Haven Canal Days 5K-10K run for 18 years.

The last 14 years of his law enforcement career was in the Criminal Investigation Division of the Allen County Sheriff's Department. Tom's partner and he, in the Criminal Investigation Division, investigated a large burglary ring operating out of Fort Wayne. They were going all over the state of Indiana stealing safes out of gas stations and equipment out of lawn and garden stores. They did numerous burglaries (58 in 6 months) in Fort Wayne, Allen County and other counties. This investigation lasted six months and Tom decided to write a true crime novel about this case. The name of the book is *Har*ley CI.

A little about *Harley CI*: After retiring in 2003 from the Allen County Sheriff's Department, Lt. Tom Gratz, a native of New Haven, had a tale to tell. Harley C.I.: A De*tective Story* is the result.

In the early 1990's, Gratz, and his longtime partner in the department's Criminal Investigation Division investigated and brought to justice one of the most prolific burglary rings the state of Indiana had ever seen. In a span of just a few months, the Wells Street Gang, as they

were known, stole tens of thousands of dollars in cash and merchandise and caused nearly as much damage to property.

The burglars, led by a Fort Wayne man, were experts at stealing safes from gas stations and convenience stores; cutting them apart and looting them, then dumping them along the back roads and byways of counties across the state. Gratz and his team were at their wits' end in the case when a tattooed, smooth-talking excon named Scott Bell, a.k.a. "Harley," offered them his services as a confidential informant (C.I.).

Using skills he'd honed in drug-trafficking cases, Harley infiltrated the gang and was instrumental in the apprehension of several of its members. But along the way, he scammed the sheriff's department, carried on a love affair with the gang leader's sister, impersonated a preacher to gain confessions from the burglars he'd befriended, landed in the hospital with heart and alcohol problems, feuded with his ex-wife (nearly compromising the investigation in the process), went AWOL with a family from Ohio, and generally caused chaos for Gratz. The C.I.'s unorthodox methods worked, though, culminating in a wild car chase and

the arrest and prosecution of the gang members. Harley C.I.: A Detective

the ballot this fall. Ms. Hill-Peiper pre sented various reports for review. She noted Paulding's library is one of three in the State of Ohio that is a County Library. Ms. Hill-Pieper gave a brief his-tory of the Paulding County Carnegie Library, stating the original funding was secured in 1912 and opening day was in 1916. She also stated Ohio is the number one funded state for public libraries. Levy dollars make up 50% of the Paulding library's current budget. Ms. Hill-Pieper also pointed out that 80% of Paulding Country, population have library conde County's population have library cards. She commented that the continuing levy proposed in 2008 failed; however, the current five-year levy was passed by 23 votes in the 2009 fall election. The library board is requesting approval of a continu-ing levy to ensure future financial stabil-ity. Commissioner Zartman noted that he supports the library levy 100%; however, he does not support a continuing levy. He voiced concerns about accountability issues in the future, if a continuous levy is in place. He also stated he is hesitant to put the voters in a position of paying on an on-going levy, noting there currently is an on-going levy, noting there currently is no other county entity that has a continuing levy. Ms. Hill-Pieper again stated her board members are looking at financial stability for the future of the library. The Prosecuting Attorney explained the process by which a levy can be placed on the ballot. The library is not a taxing author. ballot. The library is not a taxing authority and their levies must flow through the Commissioners' Office, as they are a taxing authority. The Prosecutor explained the Commissioners are the conduit, mov-ing the levy on to the Board of Elections so it can be put on the ballot. He further explained that the Commissioners do not decide the financial necessity or the terms of the levy. There is a gray area in the law in that if the Commissioners vote 'no' on the ballot resolution, the Board of Elections can not put on the levy on the ballot. Ms. Hill-Pieper and Ms. Stahl agreed if the levy failed, it would force the library to cut services and personnel. They were in agreement that the Commissioners need to approve this levy and let the voters decide. No vote was taken and the issue was tabled for future discussion.

Matt Davis, Maumee Valley Planning Organization - Mr. Davis met with the Commissioners to discuss the progress of the Moving Ohio Forward program. He reported there have been three abandoned or blighted residential properties razed so far and there are six more in the process. Mr. Davis noted there are two properties on the original project listing that have been taken care of by the owner of the property. He is very pleased with the work done to date and remarked asbestos is the biggest unknown when it comes to cost of a project. Mr. Davis will contact township trustees to see if they have moved forward in getting owner consent or foreclosures on the properties that still need to be done. He also mentioned the state may have additional grant dollars to award. To submit a property for demolition, owner consent or municipal condemnation action is re-quired. Mr. Davis had a spreadsheet listing the properties recommended, the cost of the work done, the grant amount and

the balance.

#### LATTA: OBAMA PROPOSAL **WILL LIMIT ACCESS TO DEPENDABLE SOURCES OF DOMESTIC ENERGY**

This week, we celebrate Independence Day with fireworks, sparklers, picnics and parades. Amidst the hoopla, though, it's always important to reflect on the many freedoms we enjoy in this country. - Will the Village/Township grant my business any tax abatement for locating in that area?
- What is the noise level limit in that area?
- Will the School work with us?
- · How close is an airport?

You may ask, "What are the answers to each of these questions?" Paulding County Economic Development (PCED) tries as best they can to help each business locate here, but to answer these questions, PCED needs to know:

- How many new jobs will the new business create?

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#### HITE ANNOUNCES HIS-TORIC TAX CUT, LARGEST INVESTMENT IN PUBLIC EDUCATION IN A DECADE

Senator Cliff Hite (R-Findlay) announced the passage of House Bill 59, the state's two-year operating budget. The bill contains as its cornerstones one of the largest single-year tax cuts in Ohio's history as well as the largest legislative investment in public education in more than 10 years.

said Hite. "I am elated that state spending for education is the highest it has been in over a decade. I believe Ohio is headed in the right direction already and this budget will be a catalyst for increased success." The bill authorizes \$2.7

billion in tax cuts, which includes a 10 percent income tax cut for nearly every Ohioan over the next three years. The bill also delivers much-needed tax relief for Ohio's small businesses through a 50 percent cut on the first \$250,000 of net business income. Small businesses comprise 98 per-

cent of the state's employers and employ approximately 47 percent of all Ohioans.

tering tax relief that is vital in keeping our economy healthy and growing, the bill also works to modernize and streamline the state's outdated and complicated tax code and establish a fairer and more comprehensible system that promotes job growth. To do this, the bill eliminates many exemptions, credits and loopholes. The plan works to shift the state away from its current reliance on income taxes toward a structure that relies more heavily on consumption taxes. The proposal, which

will become law with the Governor's signature, also contains a \$717 million increase in spending on primary and secondary education, the largest legislative investment in public schools in more than a decade. The bill also includes \$250 million for the newly created "Straight-A Fund," which provides grants to promote innovation in our schools and efficiency in district operations and more than \$78 million to support important early childhood education programs.

The higher education plan instituted by House Bill 59 is a model for the nation that focuses on graduation and degree completion, not simply student enrollment. The plan also serves Ohio's rising student population by establishing a 2% cap on tuition increases at all of Ohio's public universities. Over the past 5 years, Ohio has had the second lowest tuition increases for public universities.

Additional Provisions In-

• Local Governments: Distributes an estimated \$27.6 billion in state aid to local governments and school districts over the next two years. 85% of dollars collected by the state are passed along to local schools, governments, and community programs.

• Reforming Workers Compensation: Reduces BWC payments by 2% for private employers and 4% for public employers as responsible management has created stable fund balances. The bureau will also be empowered to reform its payment system to save Ohio employers \$900 million.

• Investing in Our Workforce: Provides \$1 million to train workers in the bioscience manufacturing industry by partnering with community colleges. An additional \$2 million will be appropriated to create training programs that will prepare Ohio workers for growing jobs in the oil & natural gas industry.

Supporting Wellness &

• Drug & Alcohol Treatment: Invests \$100 million in drug and alcohol treatment, and mental health services, including a \$5 million pilot project to deal with convicts' drug addictions after release from prison in an effort to slow recidivism rates and drug use simultaneously.

• Developmentally Disled: Provides \$5.4 million for home healthcare services for developmentally disabled Ohioans.

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#### I RUN THIS TRAIL

Saturday morning dawned bright and beautiful over New Haven's Moser Park on June 29, 2013. Even though it wasn't even 9:00 a.m., the parking lot was lined with cars, and beneath the pavilion walkers and runners milled about, picking out bright yellow "I Run This Trail" t-shirts and newly updated trail maps. Nearby, the bikers stood with their bikes, helmets in hand, preparing for a mid-morning ride on the trails.

Promptly at 9:00 a.m., Superintendent of the New Haven Adams Township Parks and Recreation Department Mike Clendenen welcomed the nearly 100 people in attendance for the first ever "I Run This Trail" event held at Moser Park. "We are here today based on an incident that happened a couple of weeks ago on our trails system," said Clendenen in his opening remarks. "With that being said, our trails systems are safe. We've had a trails system of some form in New Haven for 10 years and this is the first incident we've had. We've heard some things that people weren't sure if they wanted to

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use the trails anymore. I'm here to assure you that they are safe, and the more people that use the trails they safer they are for everyone."

Clendenen said that one of the things the Parks Department wants to encourage everyone to do while using the trails is be aware of their surroundings. With the help of Dawn Ritchie, the City of Fort Wayne's Greenways Manager, the Parks Department installed mileage markers on the trail beginning behind the concession stand at Moser Park and marked in ½ mile increments all the way along New Haven's portion of the trail to downtown Fort Wayne. The Boardwalks and Rest Areas are now also identified by number.

'We want you as you utilize the trails to be aware of your surroundings," said Clendenen. "Keep track of those. These mile markers are much like those on the interstate. You want to know where you are at in the event you have a need for emergency services."

Next, Clendenen introduced Dawn Ritchie, who provided information about

the Greenway Ranger program. The Greenway Ranger program currently has 85 rangers who patrol 72 miles of trails in Fort Wayne and New Haven. "These rangers are trained by the Fort Wayne Police Department and the Greenways Department, and are taught what to look for in terms of safety and security issues out there on the trails on a weekly basis from April to October," said Ritchie. "Some of them love their job so much, they do this year round," she added. "I want you to know that

there are trained volunteers out on our trails systems each week, and sometimes daily, and that they are looking for areas that need to be improved, or looking for security or safety issues, and again they have had extensive training thru the police department, and they work hand in hand with the police department," remarked Ritchie.

Superintendent Clendenen next welcomed New Haven Police Officer Darren Peterson advised the attendees at Saturday's events to be prepared to aware of their surroundings and the mile markers when using the trails. He suggested when using ear buds on the trails, taking out your ear buds to greet and acknowledge people as you pass them by on the trail. Officer Peterson also advised trail users to always carry a cell phone in a pocket or bag, to always use the trails with a partner or pet, and to wear brightly colored clothing to enhance visibility.

Bob Nelson and Jodi Leamon, the Parks Department Naturalist, helped to plan the inaugural "I Run This Trail" event. Mayor Terry McDonald and City Councilman Bob Byrd were both on hand for the event in Moser Park, along with James from Summit City Bicycles who was riding the trails ready to help out any bicyclists in need

early Saturday morning. The New Haven Kroger store donated bottled water and fruit for participants, and the Parks Department had t-shirts to give away for all those participating in the event. According to Superinten-

dent Clendenen in his closing remarks, he hopes to plan more events like this one in the future for area residents. Judging by the positive feedback the event received on Facebook and Twitter on Saturday afternoon, all those who participated in the first annual "I Run This Trail" event would like to see that happen as well.

#### **BARN OWLS MAKING A COMEBACK IN OHIO**

Barn owls are making a comeback in Ohio, and more people every year have the pleasure of witnessing these beautiful birds, according to the Ohio Department of Natural Resources (ODNR). The ODNR Division of Wildlife is seeking reports from people who have seen barn owls.

Reporting sightings of barn owls helps ODNR Division of Wildlife biologists estimate how many live in Ohio. This information benefits conservation efforts by tracking where and how the owls live. If people believe a barn owl is living near them, they are encouraged to call the ODNR Division of Wildlife at 800-WILDLIFE (945-3543) or email wildinfo@dnr. state.oh.us. This species is easily iden-

tified by its white, heartshaped face, large black eyes and golden-brown and gray back. Adult barn owls communicate with shrieks and hissing-like calls, and the calls of young barn owls begging their parents for food are often heard on late summer nights. Finding pellets is another indication that barn owls may be living nearby. Pellets are regurgitated bones and fur of their food.

Small rodents living in hayfields and pastures are a barn owl's main food source. A pair of barn owls and their

young can eat more than 1,000 rodents in a year. As their name suggests, these birds find shelter in barns or other dark buildings, like silos. These buildings provide a safe place for them to rest during the day and to raise their young.

The ODNR Division of Wildlife has provided shelter for barn owls since 1988 by placing nest boxes on more than 400 barns. Nest boxes provide an opportunity for them to nest in barns they could not otherwise enter. This program has successfully increased barn owl populations in Ohio. The number of nests has increased from 19 in 1988 to more than 100 in 2012. Biologists believe many nest in areas other than these

The Western Buckeye ESC Governing Board held its regular monthly board meeting at 6:00 p.m. on Wednesday, June 26, 2013 at the Paulding ESC office. Board President Mr. Nick Miller welcomed Board members and school personnel to the meeting

Treasurer Gary Ginter reviewed the current financial reports, investments and the monthly expenditures with the Board. Superintendent Brian Gerber dis-

Having a grasp on the procedures and laws involved in the process of government is truly an invaluable asset for the young and old alike. So how can you or your child get involved in this program? You can start by mentioning your interest to your school administrators or social studies teachers. Your local American Legion or American Legion Auxiliary can also assist you in the application process.

If you've ever spoken to someone who has attended Hoosier Boys' or Girls' State, I have no doubt they gained a new understanding of how our state's democracy runs. Also, the connections that are made between attendees will prove valuable long after the week's program has ended. Even those who have no future political aspirations can obtain powerful insight for their future from Hoosier Boys' and Girls' State.




