#### ONTARIO FISHING COM-PANY FINED \$5,000 FOR ILLEGALLY FISHING IN OHIO

Pisces Fisheries Inc. of Wheatley, Ontario, was fined \$5,000 for fishing illegally in Ohio waters, according to the Ohio Department of Natural Resources (ODNR). Pisces Fisheries was sentenced by the Ottawa County Municipal Court in Port Clinton on Dec. 21, 2012, by Magistrate Louis P. Wargo III.

"This was a great multiagency response," said Gino Barna, ODNR Division of Wildlife law supervisor for the Lake Erie Law Enforcement Unit. "Gill nets have not been a major issue on Lake Erie in recent years because of the cooperation with other agencies. Because of this support network, incidents like this do not go undetected, and Ohio's resources are better protected."

The charges were the result of the Adco II, a gill net tug owned by Pisces Fisher-

# RABBIT DAMAGE TO TREES AND SHRUBS

The eastern cottontail rabbit can be responsible for a considerable amount of damage no matter the season. In the spring they are feasting on greening vegetation such as clover, herbs, and flowering plants. Once fall and winter arrive, rabbits turn their attention to woody plants for sustenance. They will eat the bark, buds, stems, and tender twigs of a variety of shrubs, vines, and young trees.

When the ground is covered with snow for long periods, rabbit damage to trees and shrubs can be severe. Young plants can be clipped off at snow height and larger trees and shrubs may be completely girdled which can kill plants.

Rabbits have a preference for trees with "sweet," thin bark, such as fruit trees and maples, but will try almost any tree in a severe winter, or if populations are high. Other signs include tracks and small, round, pea-sized droppings.

The best practice to protect trees and shrubs is a rabbit exclusion fence or cyl-

inder. Fences can be placed around patches of plants that need to be protected. The fence should be made of 1 inch galvanized steel mesh or hardware cloth 18 to 24 inches high. The stakes don't need to be permanently set, but the mesh should reach the ground or be buried a few inches to prevent the rabbits from digging underneath.

A similar structure

placed in a cylinder form around the base can help to protect individual trees. There should be adequate space on the inside of the cylinder to allow for stakes and to prevent rabbits from reaching through to the tree. There are pre-made plastic tree cylinders that can be used on seedlings. Be careful when using these in the winter, as the cold can make the plastic brittle.

Taste deterrents, such as soap, and hot chili spray, can also be used as a short-term solution during the winter months. Follow all label instructions before using.

Hunting and trapping rabbits can help to reduce the population. Make sure that local firearm laws allow hunting and that shooting is safe. Trapping is the best way to remove rabbits in towns and cities. Daily trap checks are essential for effective control. Check traps daily to replenish bait or remove the catch. Move traps to another location if they fail to make a catch within a week.

In some cases, careful landscaping can reduce the number of rabbits in an area. Removing as much cover as possible, such as trimming shrubs up from the ground and removing woodpiles, reduces hiding spaces.

We seem to be returning

In Liberia, tribalism exists in its ancient form. There are many different groups of people, and these groups generally separate themselves from one another. They go to church with people from the same tribe. They do business with people from the same tribe. They spend time with people from the same tribe. All the while, those from other tribes are outsiders in every situation.

Welcome to the new American tribalism. We aren't much better than the primitive tribalism of Liberia. We aren't segregated by a common heritage, but by where we get our news, the internet sites we visit or don't visit, the views that we hold, and our approach to the government. To see the new American tribalism illustrated, go to any controversial article on the internet, scroll down to the comments, and see people treat those who disagree with them like they are idiots, illintentioned, or uneducated.

This new tribalism is not for us. It will not create a better world. We have to learn to disagree and still love the people we disagree with, not call each other bad names or think ill of one another. The other day I got into a conversation where we wouldn't find common agreement. I said, "As long as we don't denigrate the people that hold the opposing views, I am fine with that. We can denigrate opposing views, but not the people." Surprisingly, it was amicably received.

Maybe the demonization of people entrenched in opposing views is all an overreaction to the pseudo-tolerance that is preached from all of the popular modern-day prophets on the television, the internet, or the radio. The same prophets who will demonize those that don't agree with them in the name of their "tolerance." But underlying that pseudo-tolerance is really a hatred for anyone that disagrees. We must not participate in rhetoric that destroys others. Instead, we should strive to love everyone, even when we disagree. During this period where we struggled to never disagree with one another as we became inundated with new ideas, our society appears to have forgotten how to participate in civil disagreements, how to love while still being We should never participate in the rhetoric of demonization or the isolation of the new tribalism; especially those of us who claim to fol-

How can we be the salt of the earth if we separate ourselves from the world? Our saltiness would be of no use. What good would it do if we are the light of the world, yet we just congregate with other light and never go into the darkness? Our lights would be pointless. Light was made to displace the darkness. Our salt would be useless. Salt was made to preserve. Yet salt and light cannot do their intended tasks if they separate themselves from those who are dif-

The other day I left an organization that I have been a part of for eight years. I felt that the conflict going on wasn't worth my mental time and emotional energy. But in leaving, I also disqualified myself from bringing any change to the group. The reason I bring this up is to illustrate the principle that we cannot be the salt of the earth and the light of the world if we remove ourselves from the world. Once we have removed ourselves, we have lost our opportunity to bring about

The Apostle Paul wrote, "For as many of you as were baptized into Christ have put on Christ. There is neither Jew nor Greek, there is neither slave nor free, there is no male and female, for you are all one in Christ Jesus," (Galatians 3:27-28 ESV).

This is the way that it is supposed to be among believers in Jesus. It's God's ideal. In Christ, there is neither liberal or conservative, there is neither Buckeye or Wolverine, there is no male and female, educated or stupid, rich or poor, for we are all one in Jesus our Lord. We are all one. Despite our disagreements and differences, those in Jesus

Mix that idea with the teaching that we are to bring heaven to earth as much as is possible, a prayer that we pray every time we recite the Lord's Prayer, and we see that the world is to be different than this course of hatred that it is currently steaming down. God has a different plan for

It's our opportunity as Christians to be used by God to bring this plan into reality. This cannot be achieved if we just conform to the new tribalism of the world. We must intermingle. We must develop relationships. We must never demonize. We will disagree, but we must behave differently when we do. We must be salt to prevent spoiling. We must be light to push back the

They are fools because they are enjoying all the sensual pleasures of this world without knowing where it all leads. Atop the mast hangs a bunch of dangling carrots and a man is climbing up to reach them. Yet above the carrots we find a small but significant detail: a human skull. This is the thirteenth head in the painting, unlucky in every imaginable way. The idea is that these twelve fools, who think all is perfect, are sailing right to their demise. The only pilot on board, the only figure leading the way, is death.

We find ourselves living in a culture of pleasure seeking pain avoiding men, women and young people. We're looking for the newest high, or the next party too often giving little if any thought to our mortality and especially

our eternal destination. Solomon had it right when he said... Proverbs 16:25 (NIV), "There is a way that seems right to a man, but in the end it leads to death."



#### **HEAD OF EACS TO RESIGN IN JUNE 2014**

County Superintendent Schools Karyle Green announced Tuesday she will resign her post when her contract expires June 30, 2014.

Green passed out a letter to each board member, including three newly elected members attending their first meeting, stating that she will not seek an extension of her contract. She will remain superintendent until her contract expires but reserves the right to leave before that time, under conditions stipulated in her contract, she

Green is up for an evaluation this month, which the board planned to schedule before the end of the month.

The board approved the resignation in a 6-1 vote. Board member Terry Jo Lightfoot had to leave early and wasn't present for the

The move is a shift from a letter Green sent the board several months ago outlining her achievements in her three years as superinten-

But Green has also applied for other superintendent jobs around the country. Most recently, she was one of three finalists to lead Harrison School District Two in Colorado Springs, CO, before withdrawing from consideration in November.

Upon receiving the letter, the board turned its discussion to concern over appointments, hires and decisions Green will make in her remaining time as superintendent.

"This puts more responsibility on the board," board member Stephen Terry said. "Things have changed radically, and the board will step up accordingly."

Board member Bill Hartman reminded members that Green is still employed as the superintendent, with all the duties that come with

Green said her job is to bring the best information to the board.

"I don't make decisions. make recommendations based on direction from the board," she said.

New member Arden Hoffman encouraged the board not to overreact, and he was the only member to address Green directly, wishing her luck in the future.

'She's giving us a yearand-a-half notice. I don't think we need to overreact," he said.

Green came to the district in July 2009 after serving in a number of administrative positions, including assistant superintendent, in South Bend Community Schools. She replaced former superintendent Kay Novotony.

Before Green's arrival, the EACS board approved a three-year contract with a salary of \$140,000 her first year, \$143,500 her second year and \$147,805 her third. She also receives \$900 a month for car allowance and payments into a retirement account that equals 2 percent of her monthly salary. Since the beginning of

her tenure, Green has been an agent for change in the district, recommending a redesign plan in 2010 that kept five high schools, created an early-college magnet program at the former Harding High School, and closed and consolidated elementary

The plan was to address declining enrollment and decreasing revenue. The board gave a nod of

approval to Green's work

when it granted Green a twoyear extension in 2011, but at that time the board declined to give Green a raise because of the district's financial "She's done one thing that previous

superintendents wanted to do but couldn't get it done, and that's to consolidate schools," Board President Neil Reynolds said. Green said it's difficult for someone to remain in a

### **MUZZLELOADER DEER HUNTERS HARVEST MORE** THAN 21,000 DEER DUR-**ING 2013 SEASON**

Successfulhunterschecked 21,555 white-tailed deer during the 2013 muzzleloader season, according to the Ohio Department of Natural Resources (ODNR). Muzzleloader season concluded on Tuesday, January 8.

The 2013 harvest total represents a 12 percent increase over the 2012 season, when hunters checked19,251 deer. The muzzleloader harvest was 17,375 deer in 2011.

Counties reporting the highest number of deer checked during the 2013 muzzleloader season include: Guernsey (821), Coshocton (813), Tuscarawas (784), Muskingum (751), Belmont (739), Carroll (683), Harrison (677), Licking (675), Jefferson (619) and Knox (520).

Deer-archery season remains open through Sunday, February 3. More information provided by ODNR Division of Wildlife about Ohio deer hunting can be found in the 2012-2013 Hunting and Trapping Regulations or at wildohio.com. Hunters can also share photos by clicking on the Photo Gallery tab on-

Hunters are encouraged to donate any extra venison to organizations assisting Ohioans in need. The ODNR Division of Wildlife is collaborating with Farmers and Hunters Feeding the Hungry (FHFH) to help pay for the processing of donated venison. This is the first Firefighter of the Year award for Smith.



## OLD DAN & I CHAPTER 21: BACK TO AACHEN

The weather bureau said that the weather up north has cleared out, so Gen. Norman said, "We will leave tomorrow in a.m. to go north to Aachen."

We still have our auxiliary on as we didn't dump them on the POLSTI raid.

This is Monday after Thanksgiving in 1944. It has been nice weather every day here in the Spaghetti Airbase in Rome, but we must go back north to Aachen.

We covered the 1,200 miles with out any trouble of any kind. We left Rome at 10:00 a.m. and we arrived here at 4:00 p.m. Gen. Norm flew the C-47 as usual and we flew escort.

The ground crew serviced our planes right away, but they took off our napalm tanks and our extra gas tanks. Gen. Norm hasn't mentioned any far away missions yet. Sgt. Jenkins, jumped into our truck and took us to Chow. After supper we came back to our billet area and Gen. Norm said "Fellows, here is the big picture... Back in 1942 when the Americans invaded North Africa to help the English fight Rommel, some of the French people were against the Allies. But when the invasion started most of the French didn't want to fight the Allies, so in a couple of days, they surrendered and helped the Allies.

"Part of the deal was, any and all of French armament in the Mediterranean area went to the Allies. There was a huge French Cruiser there, and the Germans were not going to let that ship go to the enemy.

"The Krauts sent over one bomber with a large bomb, when dropped trailed a wire back to the bomber and they guided that bomb right into that cruiser. That bomb exploded in the ships magazine and it was blown to pieces, along with about 900 sailers. That was the first guided bomb used by

"Now they have a lot of them. For instance all of the V-1 and V-2 bombs all have an electric guidance system. With the help of the French underground we think we know where most of those guidance systems are made. That will be our next mission. Needless to say it is another hush, hush job.

'We have been told that this factory is in the city of Worms and is camouflaged as a grove of trees.

"Well, fellows, we have been told to blow that place to kingdom come. I think we will do it in two raids, like we did at Arnun, Denmark. Now these plans are just temporary. I think we will send the three P-51's over first. Blue Jay one will carry the 44 mm cannon and the other two planes will have those new cameras mounted in the wings. "If we can, we will make

two passes to be sure where that building that makes the guidance systems is really located. Our first trip, we will not carry the napalm or the extra gas tanks. "Anyway fellows, we will

meet here at 7:00 a.m. and Sgt. Jenkins will take us to breakfast, then back here to work. See you at 7:00 a.m."

After breakfast the Gen. said, "Fellows, I have been researching the town of Worms and it sits on the Rhine down by Heidelberg and the Frankfort triangle. It dates back to 356 BC.

'Fellows, that tower will be loaded with anti-aircraft stuff and you can be sure the Luftwaffe will be guarding it also. I hope you can cover this place with your cameras. But I imagine the air will be full of everything. Ground crews, be sure all of these guns work okay.

'We have set the course at 95 degrees going over and we will follow the Rhine River coming back. We will leave here at 11:15 a.m. and be over the target area at

"We hit the target and Dan used his 40 mm cannon on some buildings that were camouflaged like trees. Dan fired all his ammo. There are know gas tanks here and not much of any buildings. All must be hidden very well."

"We turned around and came back over the area. Both of the other planes with the cameras made a second pass and then we set our course for Aachen and started home. All is okay."

#### **SAM RIVERS INDIAN AGENCY CHAPTER 48**

We planted our garden on Tuesday and then we loaded the wagons for the trip to the Calamus River Village. We all went to the village: Callie, the twins, Yellow Tulip, all the boys, and I. All the work at the agency is done, just waiting for the garden to grow. It was a fine day to travel.

Lots of warm sunshine. One of the boys rode in the second wagon. That was Ned and he talked the whole distance. They didn't expect us, so we ate supper by ourselves. We still have some of last year's vegetables so we had deer meat vegetable soup. Then we talked around the fire until way late. The two gardeners and farmer set off by themselves and had made plans to plow up the garden area tomorrow morning.

The natives (mostly anyhow) use and understand the English calendar and our time system. Some of the old timers still use the method of the moon. This is the middle of April 1858.

I haven't written for a few days. We planted all the garden and the corn and timothy for the horses. As usual when the planting was done the native squaws fixed a fancy meal for everyone. All these five years, they have gotten some big pots and pans and culinary utensils, these belong to the whole tribe.

They had two pots of stew and some potatoes also. But they popped some corn in one big container, over the fire and shook it often and then when it was hot, they poured in hot honey and a little salt and we ate that as long as it lasted. Then we all had to go down to the stream and wash the honey from our fingers. But that corn was very good.

I told the folks that we would rest tomorrow and leave for the Loup River Village the next day.

Well today, Hunter, Farmer, and Slim took three of the natives down by the river and showed them how to fire a 45-70 riffle so these boys could hunt the deer, bear, and buffalo for their winter meat. We might not always be able to do the chore.

Later this afternoon Gen. Kearney, the Mess sgt., and Lt. Morgan from the post engineers, along with sixteen soldiers in their wagon arrived. It seemed that nearly everyone knew each other except maybe some of he soldiers. Well, Gen. Kearney brought along enough blankets for one each for all the natives at the Loup River Village. He told me that was all he had and he probably won't get any more.

Again he mentioned about the situation between the north and the south. He is very worried that it will explode into armed conflict. He said, any and all supplies have been curtailed. We will help the natives all we can this trip because we might not come back this way.

Then we arrived at the Loup River Village, Lt. Morgan of the post engineers, looked the situation over and said we will build them a bridge. So Gen. Kearny, Lt. Morgan, and the tribes chief and shaman, and I looked the area over for the best place to build a bridge over the Loup River. There are a lot of trees

along the river up and down

both sides. The Lt. started the soldiers to cutting and trimming the logs right away. They used both teams to drag the huge logs to the area. The big ones will be used as beams.

Lt. Morgan said, "This is a big job. We will have to make that a two span bridge pillar in the middle of the river. I hope the weather stays nice for us. We will put in some long days so we can get done and go back to the fort."

Well, all the gardening is done and the crops are looking good. Broken Lance the chief and Pale Moon, the Shaman have all the natives help where they can. Usually they help lift the beams—some of them are a big load. Just tell the natives what to do and they will do it.

## **ODNR OPENS REGISTRA-TION FOR OHIO'S NATIONAL ARCHERY IN THE SCHOOLS PROGRAM STATE TOURNA-**

The Ohio Department of Natural Resources (ODNR) will host its seventh annual Ohio National Archery in the Schools Program (NASP) State Tournament on Friday, March 1, 2013 in Columbus. Sign-ups for the event opened on Thursday, January 3, 2013 and more than 1,000 students were registered for the event in less than three hours.

NASP is a school curriculum currently taught in 620 Ohio schools, making Ohio the third largest NASP program in the United States. Instruction takes place during physical education classes for a two-week period and is designed to teach international target archery skills to students in grades 4-12.

"ODNR hosts one of the largest archery tournaments in the world right here in Ohio," said ODNR Director James Zehringer. "The NASP program not only teaches students archery safety, but it has a lasting positive effect on their confidence, concentration and self-esteem. We hope archery can become a lifelong activity for many of our students.'

During the 2011-2012 academic year, more than 40,000 Ohio students participated in NASP as part of their physical education curriculum. The Ohio NASP State Tournament has openings for 1,344 student archers statewide to compete in this competition, and the tournament is for schools that are certified and participate in the program.

The tournament is presented in conjunction with the 2013 Arnold Sports Festival and will be held at Veterans Memorial, North Hall, located at 300 West Broad St., Columbus, Ohio 43215.

Students with high-ranking scores may be eligible for scholarships available through Hocking College in Nelsonville. Individual archers and teams may also qualify for the NASP National Championship, which will be held May 10-11, 2013 at the Kentucky Exposition Center in Louisville, KY.

Last year, Ohio resident Tyler Finley, a ninth grader at Maysville High School, located in Zanesville, participated in the 2012 NASP National Championship and won overall male archer.

The Ohio NASP State Tournament will be held from 9:00 a.m. - 9:00 p.m. on Friday, March 1, 2013. Schools interested in learning more about NASP may contact Matt Neumeier, shooting sports coordinator for the ODNR Division of Wildlife, at 614-265-6334 or at Matt.Neumeier@dnr.state. oh.us. For more information, visit: bit.ly/WgOtqQ.

Ohio was the 10th state to participate in NASP. The ODNR Division of Wildlife introduced NASP in 2004 with 12 pilot schools. Statewide expansion of the program began in January 2005, and 2005-2006 was the program's first full academic year. Growth in NASP has continued across the state, and more than half of Ohio's 88 counties currently have at least one school participating in NASP. Last year, more than 1,300 students participated in the 2012 Ohio NASP State

Tournament.

## **OHIO SECRETARY OF STATE HUSTED RELEASES ABSEN-TEE & PROVISIONAL BAL-LOT REPORTS FOR 2012** PRESIDENTIAL ELECTION

Ohio Secretary of State Jon Husted today released reports for absentee and provisional ballots cast in the 2012 Presidential Election. These reports show that a record number of absentee ballots, 1.86 million, were cast and counted, and a higher percentage of provisional ballots were counted than in prior presidential elections.

"Efforts to expand voting opportunities and implement policies that ensure more ballots are counted have worked," Secretary Husted stated. During the 2012 Presiden-

tial Election, more than 1.26 million voters cast an absentee ballot by mail, while more than 600,000 cast an absentee ballot in person – more than 1.86 million overall. In 2008, the total number of absentee ballots cast, both by mail and in person, was roughly 1.74 million. The increase in absentee voting is a result of two key policy changes implemented for the first time by Secretary Husted: 1.) All properly registered voters received an absentee ballot application in the mail; and 2.) Uniform days and hours for in-person absentee voting were established statewide increasing the number of voting hours available to most voters.

Secretary Husted's office also issued a report on provisional ballots for the 2012 Presidential Election. Of the 208,087 provisional ballots cast this past election, 173,765 (83.5 percent) were counted, up from 166,870 (80 percent) in 2008. Of the 34,322 provisional ballots rejected this year, the vast majority, 20,119 (58.6 percent), were not eligible to be counted because the person was not registered to vote in Ohio. Nearly 40,000 provisional ballots were rejected in 2008.

Thanks to improvements we made to Ohio's provisional ballot process and our election system overall, more provisional ballots were counted this year," Secretary Husted said.

To improve Ohio's provisional ballot process, Secretary Husted worked with local elections officials and key interest groups to simplify and streamline the provisional ballot envelope. In January 2012, the Secretary of State's office rolled out a new provisional ballot envelope that asked voters to provide only what it is required under law - printed name, form of identification and signature.

Additionally, Secretary Husted worked to improve the information contained in Ohio's statewide voter database ahead of the election, which county boards of elections use to verify the identity of a voter and ensure that all eligible votes are counted. Specifically, more than 160,000 deceased voters were verified and removed, more than 300,000 duplicate registrations were cleared and the information contained in the database was bolstered through partnerships with agencies such as the Ohio Bureau of Motor Vehicles.

"The 2012 Presidential Election ran smoothly and I thank Ohio's elections officials for their hard work and dedication," Secretary Husted

## **NEW HAVEN CITY COUNCIL MET TO DISCUSS REZON-**

The New Haven City Council took the next step in preparing the property at Minnich Road and US 930 for a new tenant. The council passed the first reading of changing the zoning designation from C-1 to I-1(P) for approximately 34 acres that will be the site for a transfer package facility that has not yet revealed its name. Construction is expected to be completed by the end of 2013 and the facility to be operational by early 2014. Anticipated employment is forecast to be around 160.

Final approval for the rezoning should occur at the next council meeting. Introduction of the construction and legal staff for the project were introduced. Much of the construction work is planned to be performed by local contractors.

Other council business included the introduction of an ordinance that will regulate the use and placement of portable storage containers in residential neighborhoods. The proposed ordinance will limit the number of containers, the size of them, and the period of time they may remain on a lot. Now. therefore the Board of County County roads, orieges, and curvers. Now, therefore the Board of County Commissioners does hereby authorize Travis McGarvey, Paulding County Engineer, to proceed by force account for the maintenance, repair and improve-ment of county roads, culverts and bridges for the year 2013; and the Board of County Commissioners does hereby authorize the County Engineer to close necessary roads, bridges and culverts for the performance of said force account work pursuant to the Ohio Revised Code, Section 5543.19.

MEETING NOTES OF APPOINTMENTS:

Claudia Fickel, County Auditor

Ms. Fickel met briefly with the Commissioners. She welcomed new Commissioner Roy Klopfenstein and new clerk, Cindy Peters. Ms. Fickel reported her office is ready for 2013. She also

her office is ready for 2013. She also noted she put an ad in the newspaper regarding dog tag sales.

Jane Gray, WPAU radio station – Ms. Gray met with the Commissioners for their weekly radio interview. Commissioner Zartman began the interview by talking about the wind farms. He noted Iberdrola has 150 turbines in Phase 1, situated in Paulding and Van Wert Counties. They currently have Wert Counties. They currently have permits from the state for Phase 2 and had been working with landowners on Phase 3. At this point in time, Iberdrola has decided to cancel Phases 2 and 3, stating the feasibility is not there. They are backing off, releasing leases and giv-ing up their permit with the state. All turbines in Phases 2 and 3 were to have been in Paulding County. The other two wind energy companies, EDP Renew-ables and Northwest Ohio Wind Energy, still have plans to grow in Paulding County. Northwest Ohio Wind Energy has partnered with another company has partnered with another company and hopes to begin their project in 2013. He further explained the original "20% green by 2025" was put into play during Governor Strickland's term. Under the current governor, the qualifying projects have changed, allowing 'green' credit for more energy-efficient machinery; thus, dropping the demand for green energy production. Mr. Zartman noted Iberdrola has already invested heavily in Paulding County. He also added Iberdrola and EDP Renewables have both been good stewards of the added Iberdrola and EDP Renewables have both been good stewards of the land. Mr. Zartman then talked about the special funds budget, specifically the OSU Extension Fund. He explained the Commissioners are not mandated to appropriate general fund dollars for the OSU Extension; however, for their 2013 budget, they have appropriated \$40,000.00 (\$15,000.00 in 2012). Mr. Zartman pointed out that even though Zartman pointed out that even though this is a significant increase, it is still not sufficient. The OSU Extension budget runs between \$73,000.00 and \$77,000.00 per year. Mr. Zartman commented the services the OSU Extension offers to Paulding County are invaluable. They offer many great services to all county residents. He also pointed out that the Paulding County OSU Extension is the only non-mandated entity that has been successful in raising community dellars for its operation. community dollars for its operation. Commissioner Klopfenstein noted his long-term involvement in the 4-H program. He commented that many 4-H alumni are very generous in donating to the program. Mr. Klopfenstein views participating in the 4-H program as a valuable tool for our youth, although extra-curricular activities tend to pull

the times and now offers may leader-ship and technical projects as part of their curriculum. Travis McGarvey, County Engineer – Mr. McGarvey met briefly with the Commissioners. He discussed the gas tax revenue, explaining that it is based on how many gallons of gas are purchased and not on the price per gallon. 
#### **OHSAA BOARD OF DIREC-TORS MEETING HIGH-**LIGHTS

The Ohio High School Athletic Association Board of Directors met Thursday in Columbus for its regularly scheduled January meeting. The following are highlights from the meeting. The complete set of meeting minutes

will be posted at OHSAA.org.

• The Board approved a recommendation from the OHSAA staff regarding the seven-division tournament format for the 2013 football state champion-ships. There will be one game Thurs-day night (December 5), three games Friday (December 6) and three games Saturday (December 7). Per the previously approved contract, the 2013 state championships will be held in Canton and Massillon before moving to Ohio Stadium in Columbus in 2014 and 2015.

• The Board approved a recommendation from an OHSAA committee to change the divisional tournament assignment process for cross country so that a school's girls and boys teams will be in the same division. Beginning in fall 2013, the girls and boys enrollments will be added together and divided in half in order to determine the enrollment, number, (and subsequent) enrollment number (and subsequent tournament division) for that school in cross country. Currently, divisional alignment is determined separately for girls and boys, and over 50 schools are affected by having their girls and boys teams in different divisions. Even if they are in the same division, an additional 50-plus schools could have their girls and boys qualify to different regional tournaments (the change would ensure that girls and boys teams that are currently in the same division from the same school would be segued to

are currently in the same division from the same school would be assigned to the same regional site).

• The Board approved an initial group of four referendum items that will be voted upon by the member schools in May during the annual referendum voting period. The four items, which include one constitution item and three bylaw items, will be posted at OHSAA.org. Of note, one of the bylaw referendum items came through the petition process and proposes separating tition process and proposes separating tournaments for public and non-public

schools.

• Twelve member schools were recently penalized for committing in-fractions of OHSAA bylaws or sports regulations. The list of infractions regulations. The list of infractions and penalties is always included in the meeting minutes posted at OHSAA. org. Media may request the list from Tim Stried, OHSAA Director of Information Services (tstried@ohsaa.org).

• The golf coaches association made a proposal that would permit coaches to

talk with their players on the course at any time except when the player is on the putting surface or in a sand bunker. Currently, coaches are only permitted to talk to their players from the time

they leave the green to the tee box of the next hole. The Board is expected to vote on the proposal at its April meeting.

• The volleyball coaches association made three proposals. First, that the net height for junior high volleyball be rised to the high chool baidst for feat raised to the high school height of 7 feet. 4 and 1/8 inches. (Currently, the junior high net height is 7 feet.) Second, that the number of dates that high schools are permitted to schedule their 22 varsity matches be expanded from 20 dates to 22 dates. And third, that during high to 22 dates. And third, that during high school varsity tri-matches (and other events with more than two teams) the winner can be determined by a best three out of five format by mutual agreement of the competing athletic administrators. (Currently, tri-matches are decided by a best two out of three format.) The Board is expected to vote on the proposal at its April meeting.



In addition to his chairmanship, Senator Hite will also serve as the Vice Chairman of the Senate Committee on Education.





#### **ODNR PROPOSES DATES FOR FALL HUNTING SEASONS TO OHIO** WILDLIFE COUNCIL

On Wednesday, January 9, the Ohio Wildlife Council received potential dates for the upcoming fall hunting seasons, according to the Ohio Department of Natural Resources (ODNR). The ODNR Division of Wildlife biologists proposed that several traditional hunting dates be utilized for 2013-2014.

September 1 is the proposed start date for Ohio's fall squirrel and dove hunting seasons. Upland game hunting seasons for cottontail rabbit, ring-necked pheasant and bobwhite quail are proposed to start November 1, the first Friday in November. Fox, raccoon, skunk, opossum and weasel hunting and trapping are proposed to start November 10.

ODNR Division of Wildlife biologists proposed that cottontail rabbit hunting restrictions be removed in the snowshoe hare protected area in Geauga and Ashtabula counties. Remaining snowshoe hares are still protected as a state-endangered species and it remains illegal to kill them in Ohio.

Proposed open counties for quail hunting include Adams, Athens, Brown, Butler, Clermont, Clinton, Highland, Jackson, Meigs, Montgomery, Pike, Preble, Ross, Scioto, Vinton and Warren.

Youth upland game seasons are proposed statewide for two weekends: October 19-20 and October 26-27.

Proposed 2014 wild turkey season dates are April 21 - May 18, and the proposed 2014 youth wild turkey season is April 19-20.

Proposals concerning Ohio's white-tailed deer and fall wild turkey hunting season will be heard at the next Ohio Wildlife Council meeting on Wednesday, February

6. Open houses will be

of the proposed rules will be held at the ODNR Division of Wildlife's District One office on Thursday, March 7 at 9:00 a.m. The office is located at 1500 Dublin Road, Columbus, Ohio 43215. After considering public input, the Ohio Wildlife Council will vote on the proposed rules and season dates during its April 3 meeting. ODNR ensures a balance
