Marvin was able to open his gun shop with the help of the Ohio Rehabilitation Services Commission. It's a



If you are a golf fanatic, this coming week may very well seem like a dream come

For the first time in history, Sycamore Hills Golf Club in Fort Wayne will host the debut of the Hotel Fitness Championship, the first stop on the inaugural Web.com tour Finals series. The series will bring the top 75 players from the 2013 Web.com Tour money list, as well as the players who finished 126-200 on the 2013 PGA TOUR FedExCup points list to Fort

On the line are 50 highly coveted PGA TOUR cards for the 2013-14 season and \$1 million dollars in prize money. The inaugural champion of the Hotel Fitness Championship will walk away with a purse of \$180,000.

In addition to bringing

some top notch golf to Allen County, the Hotel Fitness Championship is expected to make an economic impact of between \$4 and \$5 million dollars on Fort Wayne and the surrounding area in the coming week. As one might imagine,

in order to pull off an event of this magnitude the Hotel Fitness Championship organizers were in need of some serious help in a variety of areas, from hospitality to score keeping. Nearly 550 volunteers were recruited to assist with the inaugural outing to be held August 26 - September 1, 2013. Local golf club Whispering

Approximately 10 representatives from Whispering Creek will be volunteering as Marshals at the Hotel Fitness Championship next week, including Whispering Creek Pro Shop employee Dan Flint, who will be stationed at Hole #4 during his time at Sycamore Hills.

The personable Flint, who is the proud grandfather of nine, is retired from Lincoln Financial and has worked for Whispering Creek in the Pro Shop for about a year. 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

Dennis said since 2002 there has been a 97% increase in medical insurance and healthcare costs.

Ohio has not included the medicaid expansion yet, even though Gov. Kasich did approve it. The house did not include it in their bill.

ACA is Affordable Care Act (AKA as Obamacare).

The "Metal" Plans are what employers can choose for the employees. Bronze is 60%, Silver is 70%, Gold is 80%, Platinum is 90% with a + or - 2% to be qualified for these standards. It makes it easier to compare between plans offered by different insurance companies

Back to school also means back to practice for thousands of student athletes and coaches. The American Red Cross has training and resources available for people to learn how to treat a variety of emergencies and injuries that may occur throughout the sports season.

"School and neighborhood coaches, athletes and spectators should know how to help prevent and respond to common sports injuries such as strains and sprains, fractures, cuts and concussions," said American Red Cross of Northwest Ohio Regional CEO Tim Yenrick.

Safe Kids Worldwide reports that every 25 seconds a child is hurt playing sports and that more than 1 million emergency room visits are made due to sports injuries each year. Sports injuries account for about 20 percent of all injury-related emergency room visits for young people, according to their study.

Red Cross has developed a number of resources for everyone involved in sports and recreational activities:

- First Aid, Health and Safety for Coaches is an online program for teens and adults who coach at any age level. Developed with the National Federation of State High School Associations, this course covers first aid skills including breathing emergencies and injuries to muscles, bones and joints. Coaches are encouraged to take a CPR/AED course as
- Family First Aid and CPR is an online course for those not required to have OSHAcompliant certification. Participants learn how to treat cardiac, breathing and first aid emergencies until help arrives. Pediatric modules are also available.
- American Red Cross First Aid App is a free app for smart phones and tablets. It gives users instant access to information on how to handle the most common first aid situations, and includes videos and interactive quizzes. The app puts lifesaving information right in people's hands wherever and whenever they need it.

ODOT CONSTRUCTION AND MAINTENANCE PROJECTS WEEK OF AUGUST 26, 2013

Did you know this transportation fact ... ?

The Ohio Department of Transportation District 1 traffic department upgraded 63 intersections last year in our region of the state. The upgrades to "Stop," Stop Ahead" and advanced crossroad warning signs at specified locations were made as part of a systematic safety improvement effort to continue to reduce vehicle

crashes statewide. **Defiance County:**

Ohio 49 from Hicksville to the Williams County line will be reduced to one lane through the work zone for tarring and chipping of the roadway. Work is being performed by the joint forces of the Defiance and Paulding County ODOT maintenance garages.

Ohio 2 from Ohio 249 to the Williams County line will be reduced to one lane through the work zone for tarring and chipping of the roadway. Work is being performed by the joint forces of the Defiance and Paulding County ODOT maintenance garages.

Ohio 15 from the city of Defiance to the Williams County line restricted to one lane through the work zone intermittently for pavement repair and resurfacing. Work is being performed by Gerken Paving, Inc., Napoleon.

Paulding County:

U.S. 127 from County Road 424 to the north corporation line of the village of Paulding will be reduced to one lane through the work zone for tarring and chipping of the center of the roadway. Work is being performed by

Paulding County ODOT. Ohio 111 in the village of Paulding west of U.S. 127

for sanitary and storm sewer installation. Traffic detoured onto Ohio 49, U.S. 24 and U.S. 127 back to Ohio 111. Work is being performed by Underground Utilities Inc., Monro-Ohio 637 from Ohio 613

to Ohio pavement repair and resurfacing is complete.

Ohio 111 from Ohio 637 to the Defiance County line pavement repair and resurfacing is complete.

Putnam County:

Ohio 15 between Township 15C and 16C will be restricted through the work zone for shoulder work. Work is being performed by the Putnam County ODOT maintenance

Van Wert County:

Ohio 49 inside the corporation limits of the village of Convoy will be restricted to one lane through the work zone for pavement repair and resurfacing. The project is anticipated to begin August 22. Work is being performed by Shelly Company, Findlay.

Ohio 66 north of its intersection with U.S. 30 will close August 26 for two days for a culvert replacement. Traffic will be detoured onto U.S. 224 to U.S. 127, to U.S. 30 back to Ohio 66. Work is being performed by the Van Wert County ODÓT maintenance garage.

Ohio 117 near its intersection with Ohio 116 will close September 3 for two days for a culvert replacement. Traffic will be detoured onto Ohio 116 to Ohio 81, to Ohio 66, back to Ohio 117. Work is being performed by the Van Wert County ODOT maintenance garage.

U.S. 127 three miles south of Van Wert closed August 13 for 45 days for bridge repair. Traffic is detoured to Ohio 709 to Ohio 118 back to U.S. 127. Work is being performed by Brumbaugh Construction, Arcanam.

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THE BEAUTY OF A LOVED ONE DYING

I was in Liberia when I heard the news that my Uncle Glen had died. Halfway around the world, my heart filled with sadness as I heard the words over the phone. In the midst of some of the greatest poverty in the world, my heart was stilled by the lost of a beloved uncle and friend. Going to his funeral would be one of the first things that I would do when I returned.

The funeral was a bittersweet experience. My uncle had been suffering with cancer, and I felt relief at his passing. His pain was over, yet he would be greatly missed. He was the sort of Uncle who always made me feel welcomed and special at his house when I would stop by, which I didn't do nearly as much as I should have done.

As I sat there with my own children, wife, parents, and other relatives, holding my little one-year old, I could see those sitting up in the front. His sons. His daughter. 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

This is particularly noteworthy because students who qualify for the federal free or reduced lunch program pay no out of pocket costs per credit hour earned, while traditionally enrolled students pay just a fraction of expected costs for EACS staff taught courses.

Principal Hicks credited EAU's early success to the dedication and cooperation of the students, staff, parents, and administrators at the school who have come together to create this unique, one of a kind opportunity for students in Northeast Indiana. "We have a very large group of students who think EAU is the best and are absolutely loving it here," said Hicks in an interview in 2012. "Our PTO is very active. It's hard to get high school parents involved, but our EAU parents have really stepped it up. Our staff has put in major amounts of extra time into the program, and I think all of this really shines thru in the successful start EAU has

enjoyed," added Hicks. On Tuesday evening, parents and students were presented with an informative PowerPoint presentation about EAU and then had the opportunity to tour the school and enjoy refreshments in the Lobby. 

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
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

OHIO WILDLIFE COUNCIL APPROVES WATERFOWL HUNTING SEASON DATES

The 2013-14 waterfowl hunting season dates were approved by the Ohio Wildlife Council at its regularly scheduled meeting on Wednesday, August 21, according to the Ohio Department of Natural Resources (ODNR).

Changes for the upcoming waterfowl seasons include a decrease in the scaup bag limit to three, an increase in the canvasback bag limit to two and the youth waterfowl season will now be October 5-6 statewide. See the 2013-2014 Waterfowl Hunting Seasons for more waterfowl hunting information, including zone maps.

Ohio is divided into three zones for duck, coot and merganser hunting. The seasons are split in each zone during the following dates:

- Duck hunting season in the Lake Erie Marsh Zone is October 12-27 and November 9 – December 22.
- Duck hunting season in the North Zone is October 19 - November 3 and November 30 - January 12, 2014.
- Duck hunting season in the South Zone is October 19 - November 3 and December 14 - January 26, 2014.

The daily bag limit for ducks is six, which may not include more than four mallards (no more than one may be female), three wood ducks, one black duck, two redheads, three scaup, two canvasback. two pintails and one mottled duck. The daily bag limit for mergansers is five, of which no more than two may be hooded mergansers. The daily bag limit for coots is 15. Possession limits after the second day are three times the daily bag limit.

Ohio is also divided into three zones for goose and brant hunting. The seasons are split in each zone during the following dates:

- Goose hunting in the Lake Erie Canada Goose Zone is October 12-27 and November 9 – January 9, 2014.
- Goose hunting in the North Zone is October 19 - November 3 and November 30 - January 30, 2014.

• Goose hunting in the South Zone is October 19 – November 3 and November 30 – January 30, 2014.

The daily bag limit for Canada geese is three. Light geese (snows, Ross's and blues) have a daily bag limit of 10, white-fronted geese have a daily bag limit of one and brant have a daily bag limit of one. The possession limit for brant and geese is three times the daily bag limit after the first day.

Hunters 15 years of age and younger will have the opportunity to enjoy a statewide special youth waterfowl season October 5-6. Bag limits established during the regular season apply.

Licensed falconers can hunt ducks, geese, mergansers and coots statewide from February 8 – March 4, 2014, and in the Lake Erie Marsh, North and South Zones whenever they are open to duck hunting.

Harvest Information Program (HIP) certification is required of all waterfowl hunters prior to hunting. Migratory game bird hunters must call 877-HIPOHIO (447-6446) and answer a few survey questions to complete the HIP certification requirement. Once the survey has been completed, hunters will

be provided a certification number to write on their Ohio hunting license.

Waterfowl hunters age 18 and older must also purchase an Ohio Wetlands Habitat Stamp, available at any hunting license agent or wildohio. com. In addition, all waterfowl hunters age 16 and older must possess a signed federal duck stamp, which can be purchased at most post offices.

Copies of this season's waterfowl hunting regulations, which include maps of the zones, will be available at wildohio.com or available at all license agent outlets by late September.

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

COMMON CORE: IS IT BEST FOR INDIANA STUDENTS?

With school back in session, it's a good time to think about the classroom standards that guide our students' learning year to year. You may have heard of something called Common Core – the national standards Indiana began implementing in its schools in 2011.

Recently, some educators, parents and policy makers have questioned whether these standards are really best for Hoosier students compared with our previous state-created standards. Because of this debate, I thought it would be

Educational standards are important. They are the benchmarks by which we measure achievement, from individual students to entire schools. Standards help us 'set the bar," so we can track student performance and learning.

Prior to Common Core, states created and followed their own academic standards. Then, in 2010, a group of education professionals, researchers and experts in Washington D.C. created the Common Core standards available for adoption in all

These standards were designed to help ensure all students nationwide are prepared for college and the workforce. Common Core would also enable states to measure their educational progress compared with other states.

Indiana along with 44 other states adopted Common Core in place of their state standards shortly after its creation. Since 2011, Indiana has rolled out Common Core in kindergarten and first grade classrooms across the state.

Supporters believed Common Core would lead to a more globally competitive education system. As an added benefit, students moving from one state to another would be assured a streamlined, consistent education.

However, new voices of opposition have taken root surrounding Common Core and its quality compared to localized standards. Because of these concerns, several states - including Indiana have decided to stall implementation.

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
