Jenna Gay. He was preceded in death by his parents; wife; and two sisters: Mabel Conklin and Edith Sanders.



I'm glad you allowed one of your readers to vent his feelings about a certain insurance company near Hicksville in what he thought was an illegal practice. He felt that he had been cheated and lied to by the agent and that the company did not stand up for him. It cost the man considerable money and stress to him and his family for his fire

If your readers do not find out about these companies and happenings, then how

can they then protect themselves from the same things happening to themselves? This happens so many times with real estate brokers who are not honest in dealings, lawyers, and other business professionals who end up taking money from the public who "get the short end of the stick" because they do not know who they are dealing with. This is going on right here in Paulding County (check with the BBB). Lawyers who charge way too much for this area are living too high off the hog is just one of my gripes. This is just Paulding County you know. Everyone else is living on minimum wage here or just getting by.

Predatory loans were pressed on students for student loans in the past (they were not told the truth about what they were signing, etc.). Even "Charlie Rose" on TV had a segment on his show not so long ago about how it is still going on.

Some corporate banks are noted for predatory loans. The laws are more strict than they were in 2008. Always check with the Better Business Bureau before signing papers with a bank on a mortgage. Fifth Third Bank in Defiance has had several hundred complaints on their loan practices through the BBB. Poor customer service is a dis-service to the customer and to not be truthful is the worst thing a bank can do to a customer. If a customer asks for more information or time before he or she signs a document, he or she should not be pressured (thus "predatory loans"). All issues should be fully explained as they are asked by the signer and NOT ignored. A lawyer should be present if there is a question.

If you have a problem with a real estate broker, agency, bank or other professional, don't be afraid to complain to the Better Business Bureau if the issue is not resolved. This is the only way the other people will not get ripped off also. The BBB can be found in the phone directory. They keep a record of the dates and the issues not resolved and the particulars of the case. There are a lot of other agencies that are interested in knowing about these cases also. The Attorney General's office can give you addresses of offices that will address these issues. The internet can provide state addresses on many agencies. Don't be a victim!

NEW HAVEN GOLF CART ORDINANCE

The New Haven City Council did not pass an ordinance which would have regulated golf carts on New Haven City Streets.

As a result, it remains illegal to operate a golf cart on City streets here in New Ha-

Indiana Code 9-21-8-57 golf carts and other off road vehicles. A golf cart or off road vehicle may not be operated on a highway except in accordance with:

(1) An ordinance adopted under I.C. 9-21-1-3(a) authorizing the operation of a golf cart or an off road vehicle on the highway; or

(2) I.C. 14-16-1-20 authorizing an off road vehicle to operate on a highway

People who operate a golf cart inside the City of New Haven can be cited under Indiana Code 9-21-8-57 and the golf cart towed away at the owner's expense.

STATE PATROL REMINDS **MOTORISTS TO SLOW DOWN FOR WINTER WEATHER**

Winter Weather driving is here to stay and the Ohio State Highway Patrol's Van Wert Post is asking all motorists to take additional care when driving during this season. During the winter months of December 2012 through March 2013 there were 103 weather related crashes in Van Wert and Paulding Counties. During this time period, there were two deaths in the Van Wert Post area. Statewide there were 42 deaths and 5,523 injuries in 18,779 weather related crashes.

In the event of inclement weather, the Patrol is urging motorists to allow extra time to get to their destination, maintain a safe distance between their vehicle and the traffic ahead, pay close attention to bridges and overpasses – as they are often the first to freeze over - and to drive slowly, as everything including accelerating, turning and braking, take longer on snowcovered roadways.

The factors in most weather related crashes are unsafe speed, following too closely, and failure to control. "During inclement weather drivers should allow more time for themselves to arrive at their destination, increase following distance behind other vehicles, and slow down sooner for turns and stops," said

We are going to do the north side of River Street. Clear to the very east side, George Pierman had a house and barn. The next house out by the street was Henry Johnson, then came the Methodist Church, then Kenneth Johnson was on the corner. Ed Gordon lived in the big house later occupied by Dr. Bazali. Then Tom Foster's clothing store operated by Howard Thomas. Then the big house of Lottie Pocock, then the Jump family, who moved to Monroeville in 1934. Then on the corner was a gas station operated by Harry Carr and Art Rogers. Across the street, where the WBN is, was a big two-story building, Foster's Clothing Store. It went out of business in 1930. In between the store and the Presbyterian Church was the home of Dr. Merchant, a dentist. Olive lived to be over 104 years old. Then the big house on the corner was the home of the Jeddah Webber family. Across Monroe Street was a big brick home where the Paul Hughes family lived. That was torn down years later and made into a Shell station. Then there was a big house to the west that in the late 1930's was moved to Oakwood, OH. Across Madison Street was the home of Delmar Seslar, then to the

Mr. Babcock (he was a policeman in Fort Wayne). Then we come to the home of Dutch Mickleson, his son, Dave Mickleson helped me with this report. Then the home of Sam Clinton, and then the home of Roy Heminover. Leroy Gaisford lived in the next house, and then there was the home of Joe Lucas. There was a home that was torn down and became the office of Dr. Wiley. E.M. Sunday lived on the road back to Leinard's Trailer Court. Then came the homes of Pete Mumy, Frank Donut and Otto Pagel. The plan Paulding and its group put forth proposed, Beyond the Classroom is designed to provide a continuum of online learning opportunities for students in grades 7-12. lege at the same time. Steve Arnold, Wayne Trace Superintendent, explained their use of the funds, "At Wayne Trace, we intend to add five hundred more computers to our technology department at the JH/ HS building with the goal of moving to the 1:1 program. We will also be able to move our one-year-old mobile computer labs, consisting of about one hundred eighty computers, to our two elementary schools, giving our 4-6 grade students up-to-date equipment for daily use in our classrooms." Steve added, "We have many good things happening at Wayne Trace right now, and being chosen for the Straight A Grant allows us to keep up our positive momentum." The work was not all done by the administration at the school, he went on to include "On behalf of the Wayne Trace Board of Education, we would like to express our gratitude to Mrs. Chris Feichter and the curriculum directors from Crestview, Lincolnview, and Paulding for doing the lion's share of work on the Straight A Grant application. About 45% of Americans usually make New Year's resolutions, according to a survey from the University of Scranton. But the same survey shows that only 8% of us actually keep our resolutions. Perhaps this low success rate isn't such a tragedy when our resolutions involve things like losing a little weight or learning a foreign language. Also, if you haven't taken steps to protect yourself from the considerable costs of long-term care, such as an extended nursing home stay, consult with your

financial professional, who can suggest the appropriate protection or investment vehicles. You may never need such care, but that's a chance you may not want to take and the longer you wait, the more expensive your protection options may become.

· Don't overreact to market volatility. Too many people head to the investment 'sidelines" during market downturns. But if you're not invested, then you miss any potential market gains- and the biggest gains are often realized at the early stages of the rally.

• Focus on the long term. You can probably check your investment balance online, which means you can do it every day, or even several times a day - but should you? If you're following a strategy that's appropriate for your needs, goals, risk tolerance and time horizon, you're already doing what you should be doing in the long run. So there's no need to stress yourself over the short-term movements that show up in your investment statements.

Do whatever you can to turn these New Year's resolutions into realities. Your efforts could pay off well be-

The grants include broadbased plans to increase student access to high-tech manufacturing skills, expand postsecondary class offerings in Appalachia and expand the use of digital technology in classrooms.

"I am extremely proud of our 24 inaugural Straight A Fund winners and the more than 150 entities that partnered on these proposals," said Dr. Richard A. Ross, superintendent of public instruction. "This is a tremendous achievement. These winners rose to the top of a competitive field of applicants seeking \$868 million. There was tremendous competition to receive a Straight A grant."

The approved applications, recommended by the Straight A Fund Governing Board, represent more than 150 individual partner entities that will together share \$88.6 million in funding.

"This first round of Straight A Fund grant opportunities and the others we'll award next year can be the catalyst for change to help improve our schools," Ross added. "What's more, each award-winning project can be a model for other districts to follow. We can spread these fresh ideas to school districts all around the state."

Of the \$100 million awarded this year, legislators earmarked \$11.4 million (HB 59) for projects including Kids Unlimited of Toledo for quality after-school tutoring and mentoring; for Cleveland Municipal School District for the implementation of the Cleveland Plan; and for qualifying districts to improve the efficiency of pupil transporta-

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
