Her fiance is a graduate of Antwerp High School, and a pending graduate of Marion Tech. He is employed

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

### SUMMER WASTEWATER **DISCOUNT IN NEW HAVEN**

Customers typically use the most water during the summer months; therefore, all residential customers are automatically put on a discounted wastewater rate for the summer. This discount allows customers to use more water while paying less wastewater. Each customer's discount is unique to their own usage average for the previous months of

December, January, February and March. This average becomes the wastewater cap for any water used over and above their average during the summer discount timeframe which runs from (May 10, 2014 - September 7, 2014). Ex: Customer "A" has an average of 5,000 gallons of water from December through March. June's water usage is 8,500 gallons but they are only charged for 5,000 gallons of wastewater. 



We would like to clarify a few issues and share facts about the upcoming library levy on May 6:

• This levy is a RENEWAL of an existing library levy that is set to expire on December 31,

• This levy is for a FIVE-YEAR period and, if approved, will run from January 1, 2015-December 31, 2019.

• There is NO INCREASE for this levy and NO NEW TAXES.

• The library levy makes up over 50% of the library revenue

• If the levy fails to pass, the library will receive zero funds from the wind farms.

• The 2014 State of Ohio Public Library Fund (PLF) is expected to be another 4% lower than 2013. With inflation at 4%, it is an expected net 8% decrease.

• The Paulding County Carnegie Library is NOT funded by the county budget.

· Eighty percent of Paulding County Residents have library cards.

• A taxpayer with a home valued at \$100,000 is now paying less than 21 cents a day for the library. This will remain the same. Again, NO NEW TAX.

• In 2013 over 8,600 people attended programs sponsored by our libraries. Of that number, over 6,700 were children.

• In 2013, over 102,000 visits to our libraries, and over 162,000 items were borrowed.

• The library provides great value. Patrons, who visit their public library regularly save hundreds of dollars a year by not having to purchase books, subscribe to magazines, purchase music CDs or rent movies.

• If persons cannot make it to the library, they can still borrow eBooks and access informative and educational eResources online via the library's webpage from the comfort of their home.

• The library cannot, by law, charge for books. The library is known as a "Free Public Library" and provides resources for every man, woman and child in the county. The library serves 100% of the population.

• The library system provides superior library service to all citizens of Paulding County through the main historic Carnegie library located in the village of Paulding; through branch libraries in the villages of Antwerp, Oakwith 20 employees requiring taxes to operate with a budget of \$1,300,000.00.

I encourage property owners to investigate just where their hard earned taxes are being spent. It is available at the courthouse in the library's annual appropriations ledger and is of public knowledge. Once you view some of the line items, I guarantee you will be outraged.

I will give a quick summary. Since there is so much chaos at the library, our director deems it necessary to have an assistant director. Property owners are also footing the bill for four managers, nine clerks, fiscal officer, bus driver, two heads of services, and would you believe a "childrens storyteller". Salaries for this group approach \$580,000!

Here are some more notso-fun-facts. Travel expenses: \$14,000. Insurance Benefits: \$140,000. Furniture: \$38,000.

With five schools and four towns offering libraries for 19,000 men, women, and children, I would say we have plenty of libraries and no need for a bus to travel the roads offering a mobile library at a \$75,000 yearly clip.

Allow me to introduce the elephant in the room. With Netflix, Kindles, home internet, and home magazine/ paper deliveries, I feel the library has fallen victim to progress. I can appreciate the individuals that utilize what the library offers, but please not on my dime. If you like what is offered at the library, you should be more than happy to pay for it. It should not require taxes to operate.

Let's return the hard earned tax dollars of property owners back to those who busted their hump for years to acquire property. Let's stop putting the burden of "freebies" on those individuals who are on fixed incomes. Let's place that financial burden on the people who want these extras by charging fees for using the library's books, movies, and internet.

I am inviting all property owners to join me at the polls in May. It's time to remove the crutch of tax dollars. It's time for the chick to fly on its own. It's time to vote "no" on library taxes.

I have here some information I would like to share with the taxpayers of Paulding County. The dollar figures I show here were obtained from the Paulding County Auditor and the Paulding County Library. If you doubt any figure shown here you can visit the County Auditor and/or the Paulding County Library for confirmation.

From the Auditor:

Total Appropriations for the Library for 2014 =\$1,346,810.73. Of this total Salaries and Benefits are \$843,400.00. Paulding County had an estimated population in 2012 of 19,125. Van Wert County had an estimated population in 2011 of 28,601. The total salaries and benefits for Van Wert County for 2014 are \$514,000.

From the Fiscal Officer of the Library:

\$186,672.42 equals the total combined compensation (wages plus benefits) for the 2 highest paid positions at the library. I am not going to list all of the positions and the total compensation paid for each but here are a couple more examples: Total compensation (wages plus benefits) for the Storyteller is \$40,700.90. Total compensation (wages plus benefits) for the Bookmobile Manager is \$33,232.66 AND total compensation (wages plus benefits) for the Bookmobile Driver is \$33,232.66.

Now keep in mind that only 6 counties in Ohio out of



the 88 counties have a smaller population than Paulding County (based on 2010 census).

The tax levy, if approved, would cost the property owners of Paulding County \$694,576.94 per year for the next 5 years. If not approved this would still leave the Paulding County Library with \$652,233.10 annually to run the library and the vast majority of this is tax dollars from the State which is our tax dollars also.

I think this is an excellent example of Washington D.C. type of spending taking place right here in Paulding County. All of this money comes from Paulding County taxpayers. Primary elections usually have a low voter turnout compared to General elections. Be sure to vote in the Primary this year or this levy will pass. If this tax levy passes at least the voters can't say that they were not informed. Also, the Paulding library had a carryover at the end of 2013 of \$1,315,158.11. They have a goal of a \$2.6 million reserve. You have a chance on May 6<sup>th</sup> to put a stop to this kind of runaway spending. If you don't take the time to vote don't complain about your tax bill.

I feel a much better use of the 2.17 mill levy would be to use it to reopen our Paulding County Jail and quit paying Putnam County to house our inmates.

### BALLOT BOARD CERTI-FIES FREEDOM TO MARRY AMENDMENT AS SINGLE ISSUE

The Ohio Ballot Board, chaired by Secretary of State Jon Husted, certified that a proposed Freedom to Marry constitutional amendment consists of one issue.

Petitioners will now need to collect 385,247 signatures, which is equal to 10 percent of the total vote cast for governor in 2010. As part of the total number of signatures needed to place the measure on the ballot, petitioners must also have collected signatures from at least 44 of Ohio's 88 counties, and within each of those counties, collect enough signatures equal to five percent of the total vote cast for governor in the most recent gubernatorial election, 2010.

Secretary Husted serves as chair of the Ballot Board and oversees the board's proceedings. Other members of the Ballot Board include: State Senator Bill Coley; State Senator Nina Turner; Mark Griffin; and William N. Morgan. Ballot Board meetings are open to the public.

But more importantly, the bombings literally disrupted lives with the death of loved ones, loss of limbs, post-traumatic stress disorder, and more.

This tragic event made people around the world rally for the 2014 Boston Marathon, making it one of the

most successful and invigorating races that Boston has ever had. The rally provides a great example of how to overcome tragedy. Here are some things we can learn from this year's marathon:

1. Set fear aside. The 2013 tragedy made runners even more determined to qualify for the race and show the world that they are strong. Therefore, the 2014 race had the most registered runners in nearly 20 years. While we face many challenges in life, we cannot let fear dictate how we will live.

2. Lend a hand. The media captured many momentous instances during the race. However, one that really stood out was when four runners who were near the finish line stopped to help a fellow runner. There are times when nothing else matters than to lend a helping hand.

3. Move forward. Tragedies happen. If we let them alter our lives, then we lose out on so many opportunities. If Boston cancelled its marathon, the loss would be felt around the world. Instead, we have to learn from tragedies, build from them, and move on.

4. Be a team player. Citizens from around the world showed major support for the Boston Marathon. While each year a tremendous amount of volunteers and staff help make the marathon a reality, more and new safety measures and other strategies had to be formulated to ensure a safe, yet fun event. Many events in our lives could not happen without support from others.

5. Be heard. According to spectators and runners of the 2014 Boston Marathon, this year marked one of the loudest and most supportive crowds in its history. Runners drew strength from the cheers and presence of the spectators. In the event of a tragedy, we should make our voices heard.

While overcoming a tragedy is not easy, Boston has proved that it can be done with lots of determination and support.

Did you ever stop and think about the wildlife in our area? I mean, really give it some thought? Did you ever sort of add up the species, forms and types that are native and maybe that are not native?

Let me explain a little bit on the native part as I see it: back in the 1800s this area had every wild animal that roamed the Midwest. With the settling of Ohio, some of the wildlife was forced to move to the north or the west.

White tail deer, the wild turkey, coyote and fox are back to stay, they are part of nature again.

We have about three species of squirrels, coon, rabbit, pheasants, ducks, geese, groundhog, muskrat, fox, skunk, mink and weasel. I have not seen a badger for the last 50 years, but other people have. Some people consider the turtle dove as a game bird, I don't.

I'm not going to delve into our bird friends, as I don't know much about them. I love to see and hear them. I don't see well enough anymore to distinguish them. The eagles are back to northwest Ohio and I'm tempted to say they're commonplace. Our eagles down by the Maumee are raising a couple of chicks again this year.

This winter a lot of people saw the big snow owls. They are native to the Arctic Circle. But I think they came this far south because of the weather and food supply. We will be able to tell later if they are already gone. I don't think they will stay here, but if you do see a snowy owl, please let me know.

This winter, I saw six big white swans out on Snook's Bottom. A fellow told me a little later that he's seen a group of 40 of big white swans. Time will tell about those birds also as to whether they will stay here or not.

A few days ago I was talking with Jordan Cline, they live in the old Lucas brothers place, close to the river. I told him that about 50 years ago, I saw a badger along his road. He told me there was still one around that road yet. He also said he had lived in that area for over six years and he saw a beaver once down at the river. I tell you there is so much of nature for us to see if you look in earnest when you do look. Cork Hughes reminded me about the tree frogs, lizards and salamanders and even the non poisonous snakes. He also knows about the beavers in the Maumee. I tell you friends, you too will be amazed at the wildlife that we have. If you would just take the time to see it and talk about it. See ya!

### **PROVIDING A SAFE HAVEN**

### Casey's Comments by: IN State Rep. Casey Cox, House District 85

Fear can have a way of causing otherwise rational people to do the unthinkable. Sometimes the actions of someone who is afraid can have tragic or even life-threatening consequences. One of the worst examples is when parents of newborns find themselves in a desperate and hopeless situation; they panic and then opt to abandon their infant child.

This tragedy hit close to home last July when a woman from Granger was arrested for abandoning her baby in a dumpster. She was charged with neglect of a dependent, which is a Class A felony. Whatever the mother's reasoning, it was clear that she did not want to raise the child.

Fortunately for folks faced with this predicament, Indiana has what is known as a "Safe Haven Law" which allows a person to give up an infant anonymously without fear of arrest or prosecution. Unfortunately, too many people may be unaware of this faultless, life-

saving alternative to neglectful abandonment.

Indiana law provides that adults may give up custody of an infant less than 30 days old to a hospital emergency room, police station or fire station within the state, so long as there are not any signs of intentional abuse on the baby. The person leaving the child will not be required to provide any information. While any knowledge related to the medical history of the baby or the parents would be helpful, it is not required by law. After the baby is medically examined, he or she will be taken into custody by the Indiana Department of Child Services, through Child Protective Services. From there, the baby will be placed with a caregiver.

While unpleasant to consider, there are instances when mothers and fathers, for their own reasons, do not want to raise their child and opt to abandon the child. It is not my intention to pass judgment on those individuals, as I have never walked a day in their shoes. However, as a conservative, I believe that all life is precious, all life is sacred and all life has potential.

From that lens, I cannot overstate the value and importance of the Safe Haven program. Indiana's Safe Haven law allows unwanting parents the opportunity to give their baby a life and a future with a new family. Innocent and defenseless newborns should never fall victim to any negative circumstances associated with their birth. Abandonment of a child should never be the answer, especially when our state law provides an anonymous and consequence-free alternative.

I am committed to finding ways to review and strengthen Indiana's Save Haven law. I believe that our state should do everything possible to provide adults in these unfortunate circumstances with an avenue that supports life and gives their child a future.



He has done time trials where he traced humans over a half mile distance in 13 minutes. Every human is constantly giving off scents, called rafts, that fall off the skin and is similar to a fingerprint, each one is different. In some instances his master can tell him to attack and Jano won't let go until he is called off by the voice he knows.

A dog like Jano is expected to be very useful for 7-10 years before he would need to be retired. What happens then? Usually he is purchased by his master from the county. We'll have to wait and see on that one. Jano is just a young pup and he'll continue to be useful for many years to come.







This tournament is the largest one-day tournament in the world and this year alone had 2490 registered participants from all over the United States. In order to participate in this tournament you must place at a qualifying tournament earlier in the season.

To get a win at this level is a big accomplishment for any wrestler let alone a 1st year participant. You didn't see it on your calendar, but Tax Freedom Day fell on April 21 this year. So, why not mark the occasion by beginning to look for ways to become a "tax-smart" investor?

Tax Freedom Day, calculated annually by the Tax Foundation, is the day on which Americans have earned enough money to pay this year's federal, state and local taxes. Of course, Tax Freedom Day is something of a fiction, because most people pay their taxes throughout the year, via their paychecks. Furthermore, as famed Supreme Court Justice Oliver Wendell Holmes, Jr., said: "Taxes are what we pay for civilized society." When you pay taxes, you help fund public education, the police, the fire department, food inspection, college scholarships and many other elements of society. Nonetheless, you may want to use the concept of Tax Freedom Day to find ways to reduce the taxes associated with your investments.


Here are some suggestions:

• Boost your 401(k) contributions. Your 401(k) contributions are typically made with pre-tax dollars, so the more you put in, the lower your taxable income. (Some employers allow a "Roth" option, under which you can make post-tax contributions.) In 2014, you can put in up to \$17,500 to a 401(k) or similar plan, such as a 403(b) or 457(b), and if vou are 50 or older, you can contribute an additional \$5,500.

• Fully fund your IRA. No matter which type of IRA you have — traditional or Roth - you will gain some valuable tax benefits. With a Roth IRA, your contributions are not deductible, but your earnings can grow tax free, provided you don't start taking withdrawals until you are 59-1/2 and you've had your IRA for at least five years. If you own a traditional IRA, your earnings can grow tax-deferred, and your contributions may be deductible, depending on your income level. So, similar to a 401(k), the more you put in to your traditional IRA, the lower your taxable income may be. In 2014, you can contribute up to \$5,500 to an IRA, or \$6,500 if you are 50 or older.

• Contribute to a college savings plan. Many college savings plans offer some type of tax advantage. For example, if you contribute to a 529 plan, your earnings can grow tax free, provided all withdrawals are only used to help pay qualified higher education expenses. (529 plan distributions not used for qualified expenses may be subject to federal and state income tax and a 10% IRS penalty.) Furthermore, your 529 plan contributions may be deductible from your state taxes.

 Avoid excessive buying and selling. If you are constantly buying and selling investments, you may find it "taxing," because shortterm gains (gains on assets owned for less than one year) will be taxed at your ordinary income tax rate, which could be as high as 39.6% (and you may also be subject to a 3.8% Medicare surtax). However, if you hold your investments longer than a year before selling them, you'll pay the more favorable long-term capital gains rate, which will likely



be 15% or 20%, depending on your income, though you might still be assessed the Medicare surtax.

Tax Freedom Day is here, and then it's gone. But by taking the steps described above, you may be able to brighten your tax picture for years to come.

### **ELECTION ADVISORY FROM OHIO SECRETARY OF STATE JON HUSTED**

Secretary of State Jon Husted announced that as of Friday, April 18, 2014, 73,207 Ohioans have already voted absentee and 155,093 ballots have been requested since the start of early voting in the 2014 Primary Election as reported by county boards of elections. Absentee voting for military and overseas voters began on Saturday, March 22, 2014, and on Tuesday, April 1, 2014, for all other voters.

### What's on the Ballot

Ohioans will vote on primary races for a number of statewide and local candimust complete, sign and seal their voted ballots, taking care to provide the required information, including proper identification. Voted ballots must be postmarked the day before Election Day and received no later than the 10th day after the election (May 16, 2014). Absentee ballots may also be delivered in person to boards of elections no later than the close of the polls on Election Day. They may not be returned at Election Day polling locations.

Voters wanting to cast an absentee ballot by mail have until Saturday, May $3^{\rm rd}$  at noon to request an absentee ballot by contacting their county board of elections for more information, or by downloading an absentee ballot request form at MyOhioVote.com.

In-Person Absentee Voting

To ensure all Ohio voters have the same amount of time to vote in person early, Secretary Husted issued Directive 2014-06, establishing uniform hours statewide to ensure all voters have fair and equal access to the ballot during 2014 elections.

### **Election Day Voting**

Polls are open 6:30 a.m. to 7:30 p.m. on Election Day. Voters choosing to head to the polls on Election Day need to remember to bring the proper form of ID and know their polling place and precinct. Voters can check their polling place and precinct and get other important voting information by visiting www. MyOhioVote.com.

Ohio Farm Service Agency (FSA) Executive Director, Steven Maurer, announced today that orchardists and nursery tree growers who experienced losses from natural disasters that occurred on or after October 1, 2011, can sign up for the Tree Assistance Program (TAP) beginning Tuesday, April 15, 2014. TAP was authorized by the Agricultural Act of 2014 as a permanent disaster program.

"Ohio has been hit hard this past winter with record low temperatures and with spring finally here, orchard and vineyard producers will begin to see the extent of damage," said Maurer.

TAP provides financial assistance to qualifying fruit and nursery tree growers to replant or rehabilitate eligible trees, bushes and vines damaged by natural disasters.

"President Obama and Secretary Vilsack made it a priority to begin enrollment for these programs as quickly as possible upon the enactment of the 2014 Farm Bill," said Maurer. Eligible tree types include trees, bushes or vines that produce an annual crop for commercial purposes. Nursery trees include ornamental, fruit, nut and Christmas trees that are produced for commercial sale. Trees used for pulp or timber are ineligible.

To qualify for TAP, fruit growers must suffer a qualifying tree, bush or vine loss in excess of 15 percent mortality from an eligible natural disaster. The eligible trees, bushes or vines must have been owned when the natural disaster occurred; however, eligible growers are not required to own the land on which the eligible trees, bushes and vines were planted.

If the TAP application is approved, the eligible trees, bushes and vines must be replaced within 12 months from the date the application is approved. The cumulative total quantity of acres planted to trees, bushes or vines for which a producer can receive

TAP payments, cannot exceed 500 acres annually.

If physical evidence of the lost trees, bushes, or vines no longer exists, the owner must provide documentation to determine the eligible trees, bushes, or vines existed and were lost on each stand because of the approved disaster condition.

Examples of documentation can include:

• Receipts for the original purchase of the eligible trees, bushes, or vines where TAP is requested,

 Documentation of labor and equipment used to plant or remove the eligible trees, bushes, or vines that were lost.

• Chemical, fertilizer, or other related receipts to substantiate the existence of the eligible trees, bushes, or vines.

• RMA appraisal worksheet may be used by COC to substantiate applicant's certification of trees lost.



### PAULDING ACADEMIC HALL OF FAME INDUCTEES FIFTH CLASS – 2014

Dr. Diane (DeMuth) Allensworth – Paulding High School Class of 1959

Diane Edith DeMuth Allensworth graduated from Paulding High School with the class of 1959. She graduated from Parkview Methodist School of Nursing in 1962 as a Registered Nurse, and received her Bachelors and Masters Degrees in Health Educa-

tion from Kent State in 1973 and 1975 respectively. She returned to Kent State for her PhD in Curriculum and Instruction in Health Education, graduating in 1983. She started her career as a Registered Nurse and served in the Peace Corps in rural Panama and later as a school nurse for the Paulding County School system. She was an Associate Professor of Health Education at Kent State University, an Executive Director of the American School Health As-



sociation, and also worked for the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) in Atlanta as a Branch Chief of Programs for the Division of Adolescent and School Health. She has traveled frequently throughout the United States and overseas delivering speeches and serving as a primary consultant promoting the coordinated school health model. Internationally, she has worked with public and private health education agencies and organizations in Mexico, Canada, Estonia, France, Taiwan, and Turkey. Her co-edited textbook, Health Promotion & Practice has been adopted by over 40 universities in the U.S. and is also published in Turkish for the Turkish Ministry of Health and will soon be published in Chinese. She has received numerous awards throughout her career. Since retirement, she has worked as a consultant for HealthMPowers, a non-profit organization that promotes the adoption of healthy nutrition and physical activity behaviors in students, their teachers and their families while promoting a quality school health program. Diane and her husband of 52 years, John Allensworth, also a PHS Class of '59 grad, have two children, Elizabeth and Elaine, and three grandchildren, Clate, Emma and Danny. She resides in Snellville, Georgia, near Atlanta.

Michael E. Connor, PhD. - Paulding High School Class of 1960

Michel E. Connor graduated from Paulding High School in 1960. ### FAQ ABOUT BED BUGS

### By: Susan C. Jones, Ph.D., Assistant Professor of Entomology, OSU Extension Specialist, Household & Structural Pests

Bed bugs are parasites that preferentially feed on humans. If people aren't available, they instead will feed on other warm-blooded animals, including birds, rodents, bats, and pets.

In the past decade, bed bugs have begun making a comeback across the United States, although they are not considered to be a major pest. International travel and commerce are thought to facilitate the spread of these insect hitchhikers, because eggs, young, and adult bed bugs are readily transported in luggage, clothing, bedding, and furniture. Bed bugs can infest airplanes, ships, trains, and buses. Bed bugs are most frequently found in dwellings with a high rate of occupant turnover, such as hotels, motels, hostels, dormitories, shelters, apartment complexes, tenements, and prisons. Such infestations usually are not a reflection of poor hygiene or bad housekeeping.

crevices. The body becomes more elongate, swollen, and dark red after a blood meal. Bed bugs have a beaklike piercing-sucking mouthpart system. The adults have small, stubby, nonfunctional wing pads. Newly hatched nymphs are nearly colorless, becoming brownish as they mature. Nymphs have the general appearance of adults. Eggs are white and about <sup>1</sup>/<sub>32</sub> inch long.

LIFE CYCLE

Female bed bugs lay from one to twelve eggs per day, and the eggs are deposited on rough surfaces or in crack and crevices. The eggs are coated with a sticky substance so they adhere to the substrate. Eggs hatch in 6 to 17 days, and nymphs can immediately begin to feed. They require a blood meal in order to molt. Bed bugs reach maturity after five molts. Developmental time (egg to adult) is affected by temperature and takes about 21 days at 86° F to 120 days at 65° F. The nymphal period is greatly prolonged when food is scarce. Nymphs and adults can live for several months without food. The adult's lifespan may encompass 12-18 months. Three or more generations can occur each year.

### HABITS

Bed bugs hide during the day in dark, protected sites. They seem to prefer fabric, wood, and paper surfaces. They usually occur in fairly close proximity to the host, although they can travel far distances. Bed bugs initially can be found about tufts, seams, and folds of mattresses, later spreading to crevices in the bedstead. In heavier infestations, they also may occupy hiding places farther from the bed. They may hide in window and door frames, electrical boxes, floor cracks, baseboards, furniture, and under the tack board of wallto-wall carpeting. Bed bugs often crawl upward to hide in pictures, wall hangings, drapery pleats, loosened wallpaper, cracks in plaster, and ceiling moldings.

### **TELL-ŤALE SIĞNS**

A bed bug infestation can be recognized by blood stains from crushed bugs or by rusty (sometimes dark) spots of excrement on sheets and mattresses, bed clothes, and walls. Fecal spots, eggshells, and shed skins may be found in the vicinity of their hiding places. An offensive, sweet, musty odor from their scent glands may be detected when bed bug infestations are severe.

**INSPECTION** A thorough inspection In hotels, apartments, and other multiple-type dwellings, it is advisable to also inspect adjoining units since bed bugs can travel long distances.

### SANITATION

Sanitation measures include frequently vacuuming the mattress and premises, laundering bedding and clothing in hot water, and cleaning and sanitizing dwellings. After vacuuming, immediately place the vacuum cleaner bag in a plastic bag, seal tightly, and discard in a container outdoorsthis prevents captured bed bugs from escaping into the home. A stiff brush can be used to scrub the mattress seams to dislodge bed bugs and eggs. Discarding the mattress is another option, although a new mattress can quickly become infested if bed bugs are still on the premises. Steam cleaning of mattresses generally is not recommended because it is difficult to get rid of excess moisture, which can lead to problems with mold, mildew, house dust mites, etc.

Repair cracks in plaster and glue down loosened wallpaper to eliminate bed bug harborage sites. Remove and destroy wild animal roosts and nests when possible.

### TRAPPING

After the mattress is vacuumed or scrubbed, it can be enclosed in a zippered mattress cover such as that used for house dust mites. Any bed bugs remaining on the mattress will be trapped inside the cover. Leave the cover in place for a year or so since bed bugs can live for a long time without a blood meal.

### INSECTICIDES

Residual insecticides (usually pyrethroids) are applied as spot treatments to cracks and crevices where bed bugs are hiding. Increased penetration of the insecticide into cracks and crevices can be achieved if accumulated dirt and debris are first removed using a vacuum cleaner. Avoid using highly repellent formulations, which cause bed bugs to scatter to many places. Dust formulations may be used to treat wall voids and attics. Repeat insecticide applications if bed bugs are present two weeks after the initial treatment since it is difficult to find all hiding places and hidden eggs may have hatched.

Do not use any insecticide on a mattress unless the product label specifically mentions such use. Note that very few insecticides are labeled for use on mattresses. If using an appropriately labeled insecticide on a mattress, take measures to minimize pesticide exposure to occupants. Apply the insecticide as a light mist to the entire mattress, opening seams, tufts, and folds to allow the chemical to penetrate into these hiding areas. Allow the treated surface to completely dry before use. Do not sleep directly on a treated mattress; be sure bed linens are in place. Do not treat mattresses of infants or ill people. No insecticides are labeled for use on bedding or linens. These items should be dry cleaned or laundered in hot water and dried using the "hot" setting.



The latter sites include window and door frames, floor cracks, carpet tack boards, baseboards, electrical boxes, furniture, pictures, wall hangings, drapery pleats, loosened wallpaper, cracks in plaster, and ceiling moldings. 


