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
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OBITUARIES



HOUSE RECOGNIZES 70TH ANNIVERSARY OF D-DAY IN

Co-Chairmen of the Congressional French Caucus, Congressman Bob Latta (R-OH), Congressman John Campbell (R-CA), Congressman Michael Michaud (D-ME) and Congressman Adam Schiff (D-CA), released the following statement applauding the U.S. House of Representatives' passage of S. Res. 421, a resolution recognizing the 70th Anniversary of D-Day. The resolution was introduced as an amendment to H.R. 4435, the National Defense Authorization Act (NDAA), which the House passed on May 22nd.

"We are pleased the House has passed this resolution honoring the sacrifices of our World War II veterans, who participated in the largest amphibian assault the world has ever seen. We owe an enormous debt of gratitude to the 'greatest generation,' and this resolution rightfully recognizes their efforts to free the world from Nazi and Facist regimes and restore liberty. In passing this resolution, we will ensure the history of these events and the freedoms that resulted are passed on for generations to come."

On June 6, 1944, the Allied Forces landed on the beaches of Normandy, France, beginning the opening phase of Operation Overlord in an effort to break the Nazi stronghold on Western Europe. In that first day alone, approximately 10,000 Allied soldiers were wounded or killed, including 6,000 Americans.

OHIO HUNTERS CHECK **MORE THAN 16,500 WILD TURKEYS DURING SPRING SEASON**

16,556 wild turkeys during the combined 2014 wild turkey hunting season and youth wild turkey hunting season,

Ohio hunters checked

April 19 – May 18. The top 10 counties for the wild turkey harvest were Ashtabula (615), Tuscarawas (493), Coshocton (484), Guernsey (466), Muskingum (453), Belmont (444), Monroe (424), Trumbull (417), Knox (415) and Meigs (397).

Wild turkey hunters checked 18,391 birds in 2013.

Hunters checked 8,074 birds during the first full week of the 2014 wild turkey season. Young hunters checked 1,480 birds during the 2014 youth season.

Ohio's 2014 spring wild turkey season was open April 21 through May 18. Youth season was April 19-20. Find more information about wild turkey hunting at wildohio.

Wild turkeys were extirpated in Ohio by 1904 and were reintroduced in the 1950s by the Ohio Department of Natural Resources (ODNR) Division of Wildlife. Ohio's first modern day wild turkey season opened in 1966 in nine counties, and hunters checked 12 birds. The wild turkey harvest topped 1,000 for the first time in 1984. Spring turkey hunting opened statewide in 2000, and Ohio hunters checked more than 20,000 wild turkeys for the first time that year.

LATTA DEMANDS ANSWERS FROM VA SECRETARY SHINSEKI

In light of recent revelations regarding the Department of Veterans Affairs' (VA) mishandling of veterans' care, Congressman Bob Latta (R-OH) sent a letter to VA Secretary Eric Shinseki regarding the need to ensure timely and quality care for our nation's heroes. The letter stresses that this is especially important as the number of troops returning from overseas missions increases and veterans from previous wars continue to age, requiring greater care. It also requests that the VA explain why it does not permit more non-VA care if it is unable to care for our veterans in a timely manner. Finally, it asks the VA to provide its plans to ensure our veterans are properly cared for going forward, so these delays do not continue.

"The tragic situation at the Phoenix VA is both appalling and saddening," said Latta. "Coupled with reports I am personally hearing from veterans, their family members and doctors about the constant wait times many veterans face, these stories are even more concerning. We must do everything in our power to ensure our nation's heroes receive the care they have earned in service to our country. When it comes to our veterans' lives, we don't have time for delays; we only have time for action. Through this letter, I am demanding an explanation from the VA and holding this Administration accountable to all Americans, especially our veterans."

"The NDAA provides a strong national defense and security and honors the service of our men and women in uniform, veterans and their families - all while maintaining fiscal responsibility."

LATTA: WHEN IT COMES TO VETERANS' LIVES. WE **DON'T HAVE TIME FOR** PATIENCE

Congressman Bob Latta (R-OH) released the following statement after voting in favor of H.R. 4031, The Department of Veterans Affairs (VA) Management Accountability Act, bipartisan legislation that would give the VA Secretary the authority to remove Senior Executive Service employees who are not performing to the standards expected when

serving our veterans. "We have a responsibility to uphold our promise to the men and women who have so bravely served this country," said Latta. "Our veterans put their lives on the line to protect the freedoms and values we hold dear, and we have a duty to ensure they receive quality and timely care. Today, President Obama suggested that Congress exercise patience when it comes to handling the VA's mismanagement of our veterans' care, which has sadly led to multiple deaths. However, when it involves protecting our veterans' lives and preventing future deaths, we don't have time for patience, Mr. President, we only have time for immediate action.

"The President stated he has been aware of the problems within the VA for years. Yet, he has chosen not to hold his agency accountable. Therefore, today, my House colleagues and I are taking the immediate action needed to hold the VA accountable to all Americans, especially our

The legislation aims to hold the VA and its employees accountable and ensure appropriate and timely care for our veterans, especially in light of recent reports that intentional delays in VA care have resulted in multiple deaths.

The roadeo is a friendly competition which pits equipment operators against one another to test their skill in maneuvering equipment through a series of obstacles intended to mimic situations they encounter on the job. Participants are also required to find deliberately-placed mechanical bugs on equipment as part of the pre-trip inspection portion of the competition.

The top-two finishers in the district competition will go on to compete against their coworkers in the statewide competition which will be held in Columbus in September.

LATTA SUPPORTS WRRDA CONFERENCE REPORT

Congressman Bob Latta (R-OH) today voted in favor of the Conference Agreement for H.R. 3080, the Water Resources Reform and Development Act of 2014 (WRRDA). The bill authorizes the key missions of the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers (Corps), including the development, maintenance and support of the Nation's economically vital waterway infrastructure, promotes effective and targeted flood protection, and provides fundamental reforms to the Corps' planning process.

"The Water Resources Reform and Development Act of 2014 will help strengthen and maintain our Nation's ports, inland waterways and other water resources infrastructure, promoting America's competitiveness, prosperity and economic growth," said Latta. "This is all done with no earmarks, while establishing a new, transparent process for Corps' projects with strong Congressional oversight."

Especially important to current projects in Northwest Ohio, such as the Blanchard River Flood Risk Management Project, the bill increases flexibility for non-federal interests in regard to Corps' projects. In particular, it enables non-federal interests to contribute their own funds to expedite authorized studies and move projects forward. The bill also expands the ability of non-federal interests to contribute funds to expedite the evaluation and processing of permits. It consolidates or eliminates duplicative or unnecessary studies and requires concurrent reviews by the Corps. In addition, the bill establishes a new, transparent process to review and prioritize water resources development activity with strong Congressional oversight.

"I am pleased to support this Conference Report for WRRDA today," added Latta. "This bill will provide much needed reforms for the Corps and will specifically streamline and improve the steps

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






FOOTBALL POINT DIF-FERENTIAL RULE AMONG OHSAA SPORT REGULATION CHANGES FOR 2014-15

For years, high school football games in Ohio could be shortened by mutual agreement of both head coaches. That will change this fall with the adoption of a football point differential rule as part of the 2014-15 sport regulations approved by the Ohio High regulations approved by the Ohio High School Athletic Association Board of Directors last week at its May board

meeting.

The point differential regulation, which is already used in many states, is permitted by state adoption according to the National Federation of State High School Associations (NFHS). The proposal was recommended to the board by the OHSAA staff after more than a year of consultation with the Ohio High School Football Coaches Association. Unlike changes to the bylaws and constitution, which require bylaws and constitution, which requires a vote of the membership, changes to sport-specific regulations and the general sports regulations need only ap-

proval from the board of directors.

"First and foremost, this was proposed out of concern for player safety," posed out of concern for player safety, Beau Rugg, the OHSAA's assistant commissioner in charge of football, wrestling and all officiating, said. "Lopsided games aren't good for any-body. The risk of injury goes up and it can be a tense situation for coaches and players." The length of games is also a players. The length of games is also a topic of conversation at the national level. This is just the right thing to do."

The football point differential reg-ulation reads as follows: After the first half, any time the score differential reaches 30 points or more for 11- man football, the followmore for 11- man football, the follow-ing changes, and only these changes, will be made regarding rules deter-mining when the clock will be stopped. The clock will be stopped when: 1) An official's time-out is called either for an injured player or follow-

BURKLEY ANNOUNCES THE PASSAGE OF HOUSE BILL 198 TO IMPROVE FINANC-ING OF CERTAIN INFRA-STRUCTURE PROJECTS

The Ohio House of Representatives passed House Bill 198, jointly sponsored by State Representatives Tony Burkley (R-Payne) and Jim Butler (R-Oakwood), legislation that changes how local infrastructure projects are funded by providing property owners with the option of not having their property included as part of a Tax Increment Financing (TIF) incentive district.

Tax Increment Financing allows local governments to sell bonds, borrowing against increased property tax revenues in the future in order to fund an infrastructure project that will attract a business or enable the building of new fa-

Under certain circumstances, the bill will allow a property owner to exclude a piece of land from being included in a TIF incentive district. In order to exempt the land, the owner must submit a written response to the authority proposing the creation of the district, such as a board of county commissioners or board of township trustees.

"My experience in local government and a small business owner allowed me to have unique insight into this legislation, and I was proud to joint sponsor the bill." Rep. Burkley said. "We were able to work closely with all interested parties on this issue, producing legislation that makes sense. I'm glad see that property owners will have a voice regarding TIF financing, Rep." Burkley said.

House Bill 198 will now move to the Senate for further consideration.

CYCLE OF EMOTIONAL INVESTING

In many areas of your life, you're probably aware that it's useful to keep emotions out of your decision-making — and that's certainly the case with investing. However, it can be difficult to keep your feelings from influencing your investment decisions. But you may find it easier to invest with your head, rather than your heart, if you know a little something about two different cycles: the market cycle and your emotional cycle.

Let's start with the market cycle. If you've been investing for a while, you're aware (probably highly aware) that the financial markets are rarely static — they are always moving up and down, at least in the short term. (Over the very long term, a period of many decades, the markets have trended up.) But these short-term movements, while perhaps appearing as "zigs" and "zags" on a daily basis, actually form a pattern, or a cycle, that can last for months or years. These cycles are known as bull (up) or bear (down) markets. Going back to the Great Depression, the average bear market has lasted 21 months, while the average bull market has extended for 57 months, according to research from Standard and Poor's Index Services.

These market cycles greatly influence investors' attitudes and behavior. In fact, they lead to the formation of investors' emotional cycles. During bull markets, invescitement and even euphoria. But once a bull market ends and a bear market begins, investors start getting nervous. And the longer and deeper the bear market, the greater the depth of emotion felt by investors. These emotions can begin as anxiety and then progress to denial, fear, desperation and panic. Furthermore, market

cycles and emotional cycles don't really align. For example, investors may well experience euphoria when the market has reached its high point and a bear market has just begun. For a while, then, these investors, fueled by their euphoric feelings over the big gains they've achieved, may continue pouring money into the market, even as it's declining. This type of behavior, though, is probably better suited for when the market is already at a low, when investors' dollars will buy more shares. Conversely, investors may reach the peak of their fearfulness at the end of a bear market, just when things are about to turn around. At this point, their fear may hold them back from investing - even though, with prices low, it can be a good time to invest. Clearly, basing investment decisions on emotions can lead to poor choices.

So don't get caught up in this pattern. Instead, strive to follow a disciplined approach to investing. Build an investment portfolio that reflects your objectives, risk tolerance and time horizon, and seek to hold appropriate investments for the long term. Of course, you may well need to make adjustments along the way, but do it for the right reasons - such as a change in your goals or in the investments themselves — rather than as a reaction to the current market cycle.

Our emotions are powerful, and their power can increase when applied to such a meaningful aspect of our life as our finances. But if you can detach yourself, as much as possible, from the emotional cycle of investing, you can avoid considerable angst while helping clear the path to pursue your goals.





LATTA SUPPORTS BIPARTI-SAN EFFORTS TO COMBAT HUMAN TRAFFICKING

Congressman Bob Latta (R-OH) voted in favor of five bipartisan pieces of legislation, all of which the Congressman co-sponsored, to combat human sex trafficking in the United States and abroad. Human sex trafficking is a \$9.8 billion illicit industry, and this issue is especially important to Ohio, as more than 1,000 people are victims of sex trafficking in the state each year. In addition, Toledo has some of the highest human trafficking rates in the country.

"Human trafficking is a repugnant, illicit industry that runs contrary to the very principles and freedoms we hold dear," said Latta. "Modern technology has unfortunately facilitated this behavior and is enabling individuals to conduct this repulsive business in the shadows of our communities. Today, the House took important steps to combat this growing epidemic, save lives and give hope to human trafficking victims around the world. However, our work is not complete, and I pledge to continue to work to defend our most vulnerable citizens, so we may put an end to this exploitation and abuse."

H.R. 3530, the Justice for Victims of Trafficking Act, streamlines law enforcement resources to improve criminal prosecution of child abuse, enhances victims' services in instances of sex trafficking, and strengthens our laws to ensure both sellers and buyers engaged in sex trafficking are held accountable for their crimes. H.R. 3610, the Stop Exploitation Through Trafficking Act, provides incentives to states that adopt safe harbor laws that treat trafficked minors as victims. H.R. 4225, the Stop Advertising Victims of Exploitation (SAVE) Act criminalizes those who knowingly advertise for the commercial exploitation of minors and trafficking victims. H.R. 4058, the Preventing Sex Trafficking and Improving Opportunities for Youth in Foster Care Act, takes steps to prevent, identify

and address sex trafficking of youth in foster care by requiring states to provide better reporting on children within the foster care system.



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
