The storm cost was over half million dollars to the sales lot and vehicles. Rick Greear, manager of Paulding Integrity, got the plans



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
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

CHP INTRODUCING NEW COMPANION PROGRAM

Community Health Professionals, Inc. is piloting a new, nonmedical senior companion service this month, called Hometown Helpers.

The companionship program offers caregivers who will spend time with seniors, providing socialization and assistance with living tasks like grocery shopping, errands, playing games, reading, transportation to appointments, eating a meal together, feeding a pet and more.
"Whether you live across

the country or across the street from your aging family members, it helps to know they have someone nearby who can check in and spend time with them," said Brent Tow, CHP President/CEO. "We hope to provide piece of mind for family members knowing they have a friendly companion who visits their loved one regularly." Tow says a companionship

aide can keep help loved one stay socially engaged at home, and also continuing to visit friends, family, and other social events. Services will be billed on

an hourly basis at an affordable rate well below other's, Tow says, with a two-hour minimum. "We believe that we are the

most affordable, local companion service available," he

The new service may also provide high school and college students an opportunity to work in their community. CHP will be hiring people, age 16 and older with a driver license and reliable vehicle at \$8.50 an hour. Hours will be part-time and flexible. An option to fulfill volunteer hour requirement is also available.

The Hicksville Village Players and The Kiwanis Club of Hicksville recently came together to discuss what the two organizations could do to help save the historic Huber Opera House and Civic Center located in downtown Hicksville. The two-story brick building dates back to 1882 when it was built, and opened as The Huber Opera House in As with many historic

buildings, The Huber Opera House has served multiple uses over time. For many years it was operated as the Mackey's Brick Hotel. The Opera House was later converted into a movie theater in the 1930's. The Huber Theater closed in the 1970's. Since that time, the building has been renovated, and is now known as The Huber Opera House and Civic Center.

"While the bones of the 132-year-old building are solid, a structure this old requires a dedicated team of community volunteers, carpenters, brick masons, and other skilled laborers, as well as cash donations to keep the landmark up to its historic luster," said Bob Breidenbaugh, president of the Huber Opera House and Civic Center Board of Directors. "We're always working to improve the building beyond the required upkeep and maintenance."

The Hicksville Village Players, which receives annual funding from the Kiwanis Club of Hicksville, showed its commitment to the Huber Opera House and Civic Center when the theater group's board voted unanimously to forward the annual Kiwanis' donation directly to The Huber Opera House and Civic Center's "building preservation

"It was an easy decision for us to make," said Michael Murphy, president of the Hicksville Village Players Board. "After all, The Huber Opera House is home to our productions, as well as a host of community and civic events. The building belongs to the Hicksville community, and we are committed to enhancing and preserving this historic landmark."

Drawing from the pool of talented actors, production crew, and stage hands, The Hicksville Village Players dedicated funds from its sold-out spring murder-mystery dinner theater production – "A Wedding to Die For." The play by Eileen Moushey was produced by special arrangement with Mysteries by Moushey, Inc. In Japan, they have a practice called kintsugi:

"It's the art of fixing broken pottery with lacquer resin dusted or mixed with powdered gold, silver, or platinum. As a philosophy it

speaks to breakage and repair becoming part of the history of an object, rather than something to disguise."

"It is the embracing of the flawed or imperfect. Japanese culture values marks of wear by the use of an object over time. This can be seen both as a rationale for keeping an object around even after it has broken, and as a justification of kintsugi itself, highlighting the cracks and repairs as simply an event in the life of an object rather than allowing its service to end at the time of its damage or breakage" (excerpts from the wikipedia page on Kintsugi). Your brokenness makes

you uniquely you. Despite the flaws being things that we may wish that never happened, they are what makes us who we are. God is a lot like the Japanese mindset that values an object that is broken and fixed. He loves us despite us being broken. And He fixes

Here's the thing with God's unconditional love. Being loved by God doesn't just apply to me. I'm not super special being the only one that is loved by God. Everyone is loved by God.

This is the heart of the gospel message. God loves you despite you being broken. He knew you would be broken and He still paid the price for you to be right with God. Yet He did the same for your neighbor. And He wants you to love your neighbor despite them being broken just like He loves you despite your brokenness. He knew we would all be unfaithful, yet He still came down to earth to show us how to live. This wasn't because of our greatness; this was because of His great love. This is the message we need to share with the world through both our words and action, all

I find myself playing out of tune with God at times. I get distracted. Lose focus. Start worrying about things of this world rather than things of God, yet I am called, as are all of us, to be primarily spreaders of the love of God to others. That is our primary occupation whether we receive a paycheck through any other full-time occupation. 

ANS' EXPERIENCES WITH CHAIRMAN MILLER, RANK-**ING MEMBER MICHAUD**

Following Tuesday's veterans town hall meetings in Perrysburg, Findlay and Defiance, Congressman Bob Latta (R-OH) sent a letter to House Veteran's Affairs Committee Chairman Jeff Miller (R-FL) and Ranking Member Michael Michaud (D-ME), sharing the issues Northwest Ohio veterans have had when navigating the Department of Veterans Affairs (VA).

"After hearing from Ohio's Fifth Congressional District veterans and reading the OIG preliminary report, it is evident that the issues within the VA are systemic," said Latta. "The VA's actions are horrific and those responsible must be held accountable. While Secretary Shinseki's resignation is a good first step, it will not solve the problems that clearly permeate the VA. As a Nation, we owe our veterans the highest quality care, and it is incumbent on the President, as this is his Department, to take responsibility for the actions that have occurred and hold those accountable.

"The care of our veterans is neither partisan nor political. Both Republicans and Democrats have attempted to get answers from the VA through numerous Congressional hearings, at which the Department has not been forthright and at times even misleading in its answers. Therefore, while we will continue to conduct rigorous oversight over the VA, it must also be truthful about the conditions at the Department, so we can implement needed reforms to eliminate this unacceptable culture of

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
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
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A DREAM THAT CAME TRUE

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

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


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
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WAYNE TRACE WINS REGIONAL CHAMPIONSHIP – NOW IN FINAL FOUR



In many areas of your life, you're probably aware that it's useful to keep emotions out of your decision-making — and that's certainly the case with investing. However, it can be difficult to keep your feelings from influencing your investment decisions. But you may find it easier to invest with your head, rather than your heart, if you know a little something about two different cycles: the market cycle and your emotional cycle.

Let's start with the market cycle. If you've been investing for a while, you're aware (probably highly aware) that the financial markets are rarely static — they are always moving up and down, at least in the short term. (Over the very long term, a period of many decades, the markets have trended up.) But these short-term movements, while perhaps appearing as "zigs" and "zags" on a daily basis, actually form a pattern, or a cycle, that can last for months or years. These cycles are known as bull (up) or bear (down) markets. Going back to the Great Depression, the average bear market has lasted 21 months, while the average bull market has extended for 57 months, according to research from Standard and Poor's Index Services.

These market cycles greatly influence investors' attitudes and behavior. In fact, they lead to the formation of investors' emotional cycles. During feel optimism, excitement and even euphoria. But once a bull ket begins, investors start getting nervous. And the longer and deeper the bear market, the greater the depth of emotion felt by investors. These emotions can begin as anxiety and then progress to denial, fear, desperation and panic.

Furthermore, market cycles and emotional cycles don't really align. For example, investors may well experience euphoria when the market has reached its high point and a bear market has just begun. For a while, then, these investors, fueled by their euphoric feelings over the big gains they've achieved, may continue pouring money into the market, even as it's declining. This type of behavior, though, is probably better suited for when the market is already at a low, when investors' dollars will buy more shares. Conversely, investors may reach the peak of their fearfulness at the end of a bear market, just when things are about to turn around. At this point, their fear may hold them back from investing - even though, with prices low, it can be a good time to invest. Clearly, basing investment decisions on emotions can lead to poor choices.

So don't get caught up in this pattern. Instead, strive to follow a disciplined approach to investing. Build an investment portfolio that reflects your objectives, risk tolerance and time horizon, and seek to hold appropriate investments for the long term. Of course, you may well need to make adjustments along the way, but do it for the right reasons - such as a change in your goals or in the investments themselves — rather than as a reaction to the current market cycle.

Our emotions are powerful, and their power can increase when applied to such a meaningful aspect of our life as our finances. But if you can detach yourself, as much as possible, from the emotional cycle of investing, you can avoid considerable angst - while helping clear the path to pursue your goals.

BUDGET: CITY COUNCIL DEBATES EXTRA CHECK VS. RAISE

No votes were taken or decisions made, but New Haven City Council members were presented with some basic financial information to begin thinking about the budgeting process for 2015.

Since the city's 92 employees are paid on a biweekly basis and next year will be 27 pay periods instead of the normal 26, the council could consider forgoing an annual raise and instead give the employees the extra paycheck, said Greg Guerrettaz, the city's financial consultant.

The extra checks for 92 employees would cost the city about \$152,000 plus benefits, approximately the equivalent of a 3.8 percent raise, Guerrettaz said.

"Then in 2016, when there will again be 26 pay periods, the city could offer a 3.5 percent raise," he said.

Guerrettaz has been advising the city for about eight years, putting together a yearly analysis, which Mayor Ter-

ry McDonald called "a careful and good plan to avoid the risk of laying off people in the future while continuing to be prudent and work as a team." The plan would allow the

city to hire an additional police officer in 2015 and a paramedic in 2016, despite the fact that the city continues to lose revenue because of property tax cuts, McDonald said.

McDonald also asked council members to consider including the employment of a part-time human resources employee or consultant during the budget process, which begins in a few weeks.

"With the constant changes in law, especially the Family Medical Leave Act and Americans with Disabilities Act, we dare not miss anything," McDonald said.

"Nobody here is qualified to deal with these complicated questions," he said.

Based on employee suggestions, McDonald would like to allow employees to use family sick days out of their accrued sick days and asked the council to consider pooling all vacations and holidays and earned days off into paid-time-off days, allowing employees to better use and





USDA ANNOUNCES CHANGES TO FRUIT, VEGETABLE & WILD RICE PLANTING RULES

USDA's Farm Service Agency (FSA) has announced fruit, vegetable and wild rice provisions that affect producers who intend to participate in certain programs authorized by the Agricultural Act of 2014.

'Similar to previous programs that we've administered, planting fruits, vegetables or wild rice on base acres on a farm can result in a payment reduction for program participants," said Steven Maurer, State Executive Director for the Ohio

Producers who intend to participate in the Agriculture Risk Coverage (ARC) or Price Loss Coverage (PLC) programs are subject to an acre-for-acre payment reduction when fruits and nuts, vegetables or wild rice are planted on the payment acres of a farm. Payment reductions do not apply to mung beans, dry peas, lentils or chickpeas. Planting fruits, vegetables or wild rice on acres that are not considered payment acres will not result in a payment reduction. Farms that are eligible to participate in ARC/PLC but are not enrolled for a particular year may plant unlimited fruits, vegetables and wild rice for that year but will not receive ARC/PLC payments for that year. Eligibility for succeeding years is not affected.

Planting and harvesting fruits, vegetables and wild rice on ARC/PLC acreage is subject to the acre-for-acre payment reduction when those crops are planted on either more than 15 percent of the base acres of a farm enrolled in ARC using the county coverage or PLC, or more than 35 percent of the base acres of a farm enrolled in ARC using the individual

Fruits, vegetables and wild rice that are planted in a double-cropping practice will not cause a payment reduction if the farm is in a double-cropping region as designated by the USDA's Commodity Credit Corpo-
