

## BIG 4<sup>th</sup> QUARTER DRIVE SEALS WIN FOR BULLDOGS

New year. New season. Almost – but not quite – the same old deja view for the New Haven Bulldogs.

Twelve months after dropping a stem-to-stern 40-point hammering on the Heritage Patriots, the Patriots hung tough until the clock ran dry this time around. But in the end, on a sweat-blurred Friday night, the Bulldogs finally saw their way clear, scoring two touchdowns in a

meat-grinding third quarter and then saving the day with a crucial late drive to stomp off with a 31-21 victory.

“We had our chances to put them away – we had more than our chances to put them away – but we just didn’t get it done,” New Haven coach Jim Rowland said. “To their credit, they played hard, but we made a season’s worth of mistakes in one game.

“You know, it’s only Week 1, so we’ve got a lot of room to improve. But at least we

got out with the ‘W.’”

The Bulldogs led by 16 with a quarter to play, but a 9-yard run by Heritage quarterback Brandon Dosen and Jailon Parrish’s 42-yard interception return for a touchdown in the first three minutes of the fourth quarter turned it back into a game again.

Enter sophomore back Nishawn Jones and the Bulldogs’ running game.

Jones, who gashed the Patriots for 187 yards on 30 carries, finished off a 16-play, 75-yard drive by circling right end for 4 yards on fourth down with 1:49 to play for the touchdown that put it away. The Bulldogs threw one pass on the drive, which chewed up nearly seven minutes and ripped the momentum back from the Patriots.

“We just had to dig deep and play with our hearts,” quarterback Vance Shearer said. “Play New Haven football. That’s what we did on that last drive.”

To Rowland’s relief and satisfaction.

“Yeah, I don’t know how long that drive was, but it was an awfully long drive,” he said. “The kids stuck with it. We obviously got in a run situation; we were trying to run some time off the clock. They knew we were running, but we were able to get in the end zone, and that speaks volumes about our offensive line and running backs.

“We challenged our kids at halftime. We felt like we were in better condition and

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## SECRETARY OF STATE HUSTED ANNOUNCES DETAILS FOR 2014 STATE- WIDE ABSENTEE BALLOT MAILING

As part of an ongoing mission to ensure it is both easy to vote and hard to cheat in Ohio, Secretary of State Jon Husted today announced that absentee ballot applications for November's General Election will be mailed later this month to Ohio voters and start arriving in mailboxes around Labor Day.

By simply completing the required information and returning the application to their county board of elections, voters can have their ballots mailed to them, giving them up to four weeks to cast a ballot without ever leaving home.

Aside from states that vote exclusively by mail, Ohio goes to greater lengths to make it as easy and fair for all voters to cast ballots by mail prior to Election Day than any other state.

"Many of our surrounding states give voters one day

- Election Day - to vote. This fall, from the comfort of their own homes, every Ohioan will have 24 hours a day, seven days a week to cast their ballot," Secretary Husted said. "Our successful vote-by-mail program represents one of the many ways we have made it easy to vote and hard to cheat in Ohio."

This year's statewide mailing marks only the second time since Ohio's no-fault absentee voting law was adopted in 2006 that all eligible voters with a current address will receive an application to vote by mail. The first mailing, also conducted during Secretary Husted's administration, was sent out prior to the 2012 Presidential Election. That year, a record-setting 1.87 million voters (1.26 million by mail, 600,500 in person) ultimately cast a ballot prior to Election Day, representing one out of three ballots cast in Ohio that year.

In past elections, only a few boards of elections sent absentee ballot applications to voters in their counties. This led to a disparity in access and opportunity from county to county, which Secretary Husted has worked to address whether the voter chooses to vote early by mail or in person.

"Our commitment to treating all voters fair and equally, regardless of where a person lives in the state, gives every Ohioan the same access to the ballot," Secretary Husted said. "The statewide mailing will also help reduce the chance of long lines at the polls on Election Day."

Secretary Husted wants to make sure all Ohio voters have adequate time to cast and return their ballots, and to give boards of elections as much lead time as possible to process absentee ballot applications prior to the start of the absentee voting period. To that end, the statewide mailing will go out in two installments:

- The first, which will go out to more than six million people, will cover active voters, as well as any voter who cast a ballot in the 2010 or 2012 statewide elections, even if they haven't participated since. The voter must have had a current address on file with the board of elections as of August 1<sup>st</sup> of this year.

- The second mailing will be sent in early October to include those who register to vote or update their voting information after August 1<sup>st</sup>.

"We encourage any voter who has moved since the last time they voted to update their voter registration using the convenient online change of address system at [www.MyOhioVote.com](http://www.MyOhioVote.com)," Secretary Husted said. "This will ensure they can take advantage of this year's vote-by-mail program."

For security reasons, applications will be personalized to each registered voter at the voting address they have on

file. Voters must complete the forms by providing valid identification (either their driver's license number or the last four digits of their Social Security number or by returning a copy of a qualifying form of identification), their date of birth and signature before returning the ballot request form to their county board of elections in the return envelope provided.

To vote by mail, voters must complete and mail or drop off their applications to their local boards of elections no later than noon on Saturday, November 1, 2014. The application provided in the mailing may also be dropped off at

the voter's board of elections to vote early in person from the start of absentee voting through the Monday before the election. If they change their mind and go to the polls after having requested an absentee ballot, they will have to vote provisionally.

The estimated cost for the mailing is \$1 million and will be paid for using funds provided for through the Help America Vote Act (HAVA). In 2012, the total cost for the statewide mailing was \$1.4 million.

The Patriots finally scored with 57 seconds left in the half. After managing just one first down and 16 yards in the game's first 21-plus minutes, they finally stirred to life, going 65 yards in six plays with Austin Conrad getting the last 28 on a catch-and-run. With 57 seconds showing.

When Justyn Hart plowed in for the two-point conversion, it was a 10-8 game at the break.

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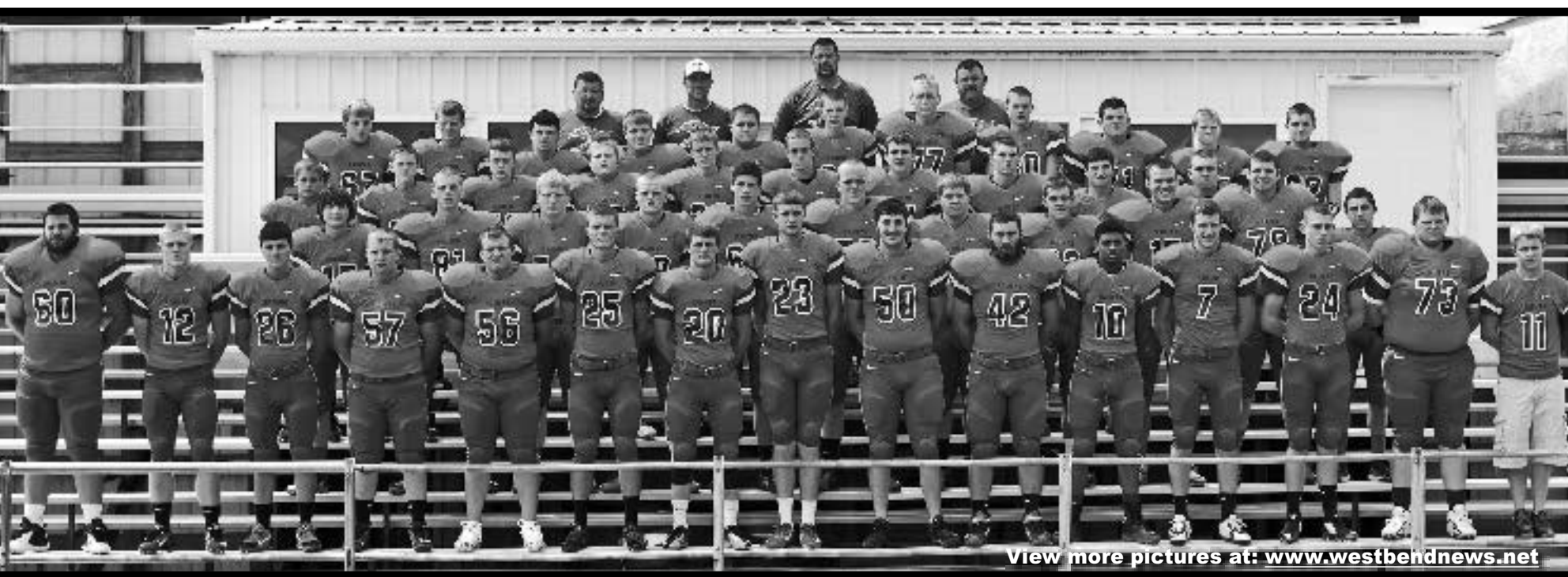

I grew up as a child with my family never having gone to church. I remember my mother having a huge "family Bible" on a coffee table and her efforts to give me and my siblings what little spiritual education we would ever know by her reading to us from the Ten Commandments. Through those precious times of her reading I became aware that I was a sinner, hopelessly lost and wondering if I would ever taste the love and forgiveness of God. There may be someone reading this today who is like I was, needing to taste the love and forgiveness of God, read on and may you come to taste of His love and know Him.

Regarding our gift for taste, I read the following article in preachingtoday.com last week...

If you're like most Westerners, you take chocolate for granted. While always a treat, the delicious brown gold is everywhere, relatively cheap and ready to give you a sugar buzz. It's easy to assume that's the case everywhere—particularly for the workers who grow the cocoa beans. After all, if you lived in a place where chocolate "grew on trees," wouldn't you be sick of the flavor? But that's not the case.

The journey from cocoa pod to Wonka-style chocolate bars is a very long one, and the product is unrecognizable to the workers who harvest the raw materials for chocolate. But a recent viral video shows cocoa farmers in Africa tasting chocolate for the first time. They weren't even sure what their hard-earned crops were even being made into. The look on their faces—pleasure and surprise and "this is so yummy"—is priceless as they taste the fruit of their labor. It's a (ahem) sweet illustration of how we can be so close to something wonderful—like the gospel—han-

dling it all the time, but never tasting or benefiting from its end result—salvation, spiritual health, and joy. We can produce without tasting, or feed others without being nourished ourselves.

With respect to tasting the work of God in us, King David wrote, Psalm 34:8 (NIV), "Taste and see that the LORD is good; blessed is the man who takes refuge in him."

## WATERFOWL HUNTING DATES APPROVED BY OHIO WILDLIFE COUNCIL

Ohio's waterfowl hunting zones were simplified for waterfowl hunters after the 2014-2015 season dates and bag limits were approved by the Ohio Wildlife Council on Wednesday, August 20.

The South Zone, North Zone and Lake Erie Marsh Zone remain the same for waterfowl hunting, but the Lake Erie Goose Zone that previously covered much of northeast Ohio was removed. Also new this year, the canvasback daily bag limit was reduced to one.

Opening day for duck and goose hunting is Saturday, October 18, in the Lake Erie Marsh Zone and Saturday, October 25, in the North and South zones. See the 2014-2015 Waterfowl Hunting Seasons for more waterfowl hunting information, including zone maps.

Hunters 15 years of age and younger will have the opportunity to enjoy a statewide special youth waterfowl season October 4-5. Bag limits established during the regular season apply. Ohio is divided into three zones for duck, coot and merganser hunting. The seasons are split in each zone during the following dates:

- Duck hunting season in the Lake Erie Marsh Zone is October 18 - November 2 and November 15 - December 28.

- Duck hunting season in the North Zone is October 25 - November 9 and November 22 - January 4, 2015.

- Duck hunting season in the South Zone is October 25 - November 9 and December 13 - January 25, 2015.

The daily bag limit for ducks is six, which may not include more than four mallards (no more than one may be female), three wood ducks, one black duck, two redheads, three scaup, one canvasback, two pintails and one mottled duck. The daily bag limit for mergansers is five, of which no more than two may be hooded mergansers. The daily bag limit for coots is 15. Possession limits after the second day are three times the daily bag limit.

Ohio is also divided into three zones for goose and brant hunting. The seasons are split in each zone during the following dates:

- Goose hunting in the Lake Erie Marsh Zone is October 18 - November 2, November 15 - December 28 and January 14-31, 2015.

- Goose hunting in the North Zone is October 25 - November 9, November 22 - January 4, 2015 and January 14-31, 2015.

- Goose hunting in the South Zone is October 25 - November 9 and December 11 - January 31, 2015.

The daily bag limit for Canada geese is three. Light geese (snows, Ross's and blues) have a daily bag limit

of 10, white-fronted geese have a daily bag limit of one and brant have a daily bag limit of one. The possession limit for brant and geese is three times the daily bag limit after the second day.

Harvest Information Program (HIP) certification is required of all waterfowl hunters prior to hunting. Migratory game bird hunters must call 877-HIPOHIO (447-6446) and answer a few survey questions to complete the HIP certification requirement. Once the survey has been completed, hunters will be provided a certification number to write on their Ohio hunting license.

Waterfowl hunters age 18 and older must also purchase an Ohio Wetlands Habitat Stamp, available at any hunting license agent or wildohio.gov. In addition, all waterfowl hunters age 16 and older must possess a signed federal duck stamp, which can be purchased at duckstamp.com, usps.com and most post offices.

Copies of this season's waterfowl hunting regulations, which include maps of the zones, are available at wildohio.gov or available at all license agent outlets by late September.

Trappers will place completed registration cards in a drum, names will be drawn, and the first drawn will receive first choice. Successful applicants must be present when drawn to be eligible. Each applicant must show a valid 2014-2015 hunting license and fur taker permit to register.

After the parade, the festivities at the park got under way with the Community Band playing the National Anthem. Antwerp's Mayor, His Honor, Tom VanVlerah, gave the welcome address.

The Antwerp Chamber of Commerce posthumously presented the award "The Friends of the Chamber" to Fred Kammeyer. This award was given to his daughter, Sue Fowler and granddaughter, Allyson Weichart. The "Gem of the Year" award was presented to Antwerp's, Doug Bragg. Both of these people certainly deserve these awards as they have both worked hard for the betterment of the village. Before the day was over I sat and conversed with both of these families.

The little Dance Dolls were very entertaining and the area was full of proud parents and grandparents. There was activities going on all the time. Another group of dancers, called the Alley Cats were very good also. Their ages ranged from 65 to 92 to 94. They were very nimble for their ages.

The village employees had the park in beautiful shape. It looked like it had been manicured.

The winner of the 50/50 drawing was Elaine Pendergrast. Angela Walz won first place in the library pie baking contest, a Peanut Butter Buckeye Pie. Emily Tempel won the second place with a Peanut Butter Cream Pie. I was lucky enough to get a piece of that second one.

The weather was excellent and it was nice to be outdoors.

There were food tents all over the area along with the car cruise-in and the sidewalk artists. The Maumee Express had a full load on each trip as it went past all the displays and lots of vendors with their arts and crafts.

Denny and Karl Ann Lee took me from the U.M. church to the park on their golf cart and then back on the return trip. Every few moments they would come

and ask me about my needs. I really thank them for all their help and concern. In the old west they would say, "I'm obliged".

As I sat there under that big oak with all those branches that reach up to the heavens, my mind drifted back to our forefathers and the fact that we had that beautiful area as a park. If you will let me, I will tell you what I remember, what I've read and what I've heard about our park.

In 1886, Frank Long was the mayor and he appointed P.P. Doering, Henry Harris and Jacob Saylor to meet with the Honorable Judge O.S. Latty to buy that grove of trees east of Antwerp. That purchase must have taken place, but not everyone was happy about it. A lot of the village residents wanted to see that acreage as an annex to the cemetery because they already had folks buried over there. As I understand it almost came to blows and fisticuffs with the crowd, the counsel and the mayor stood forth and declared it would be Antwerp's Riverside Park. Those men should be commended and thanked for their farsightedness to save that grove of trees for years to come, so far nearly 130 years. But those trees were already standing when General Anthony Wayne plodded by with his troops from Ft. Wayne to Ft. Mies and Toledo on the old 24.

In 1936 Mayor C.A. Bissell and the counsel purchased that land between the park and the river called, The Island, that also was owned by Judge Latty. Sometime shortly after that, Judge Latty's daughter donated that land between U.S. 24 and the Wabash Railroad to the Antwerp Park Department. The small plot where the Park Station (Youth Center) is was already sold to Warren Sessler, Antwerp's Texaco Dealer. See ya!

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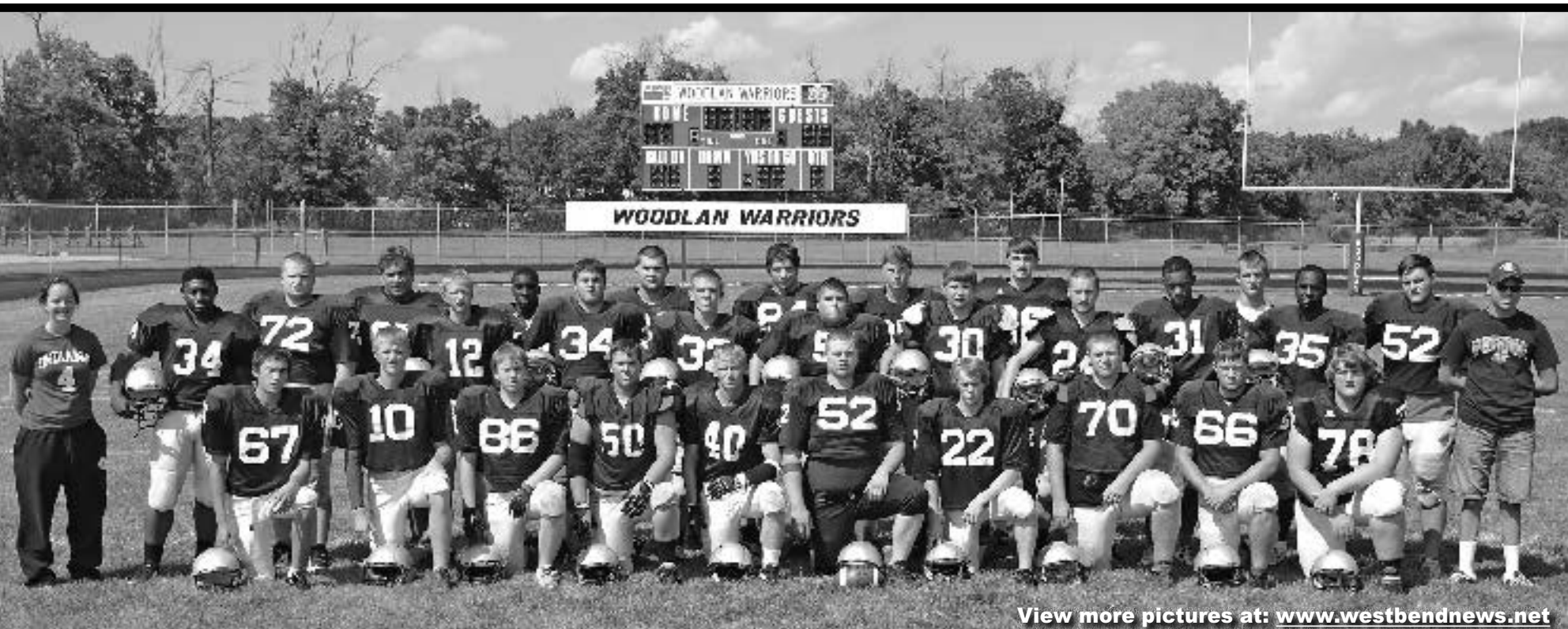

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## MACRONUTRIENTS: THREE KEY ELEMENTS TO HEALTHY EATING

Countless diets have tried to upset the dietary balance in order to achieve weight loss. Certain diets suggest lowering carbohydrates to unhealthy levels. Others claim you should significantly reduce fat intake. Still others promote the elimination of an entire food group. A multitude of diets exist for you to try. Such a wide variety of diets makes it hard to know what the appropriate percentage of carbohydrates, protein, and fat intake should be.

The most important thing to understand is that all three of these macronutrients are necessary for a healthy lifestyle. They provide our bodies with energy that helps us function. The following list describes the necessity for each.

- **Carbohydrates:** Despite their bad reputation, carbs are an essential part of our diet. In fact, carbs should make up between 45% and 65% of our daily calorie intake, according to the USDA. Choose complex carbs (such as fruits, vegetables, and grains) versus simple carbs (such as processed food, candy, and soft drinks). While fruits and vegetables contain some simple carbs, these are naturally occurring and are at low levels. Carbs play a critical role in regulating sugar, providing nutrients, and absorbing calcium. They may also help maintain healthy cholesterol and blood pressure levels.

- **Protein:** According to the USDA, we need between 10% and 35% of our calories from protein. Did you know that protein is present in every cell of our body? Protein helps our body repair itself and grow. It fights infections, transports nutrients, repairs tissue, and much more.

- **Fat:** The USDA recommends that we consume between 20% and 35% of our calories from fat. Fat provides us storage spots for energy. In fact, fat provides twice as much energy as protein and carbs. Since we burn carbs at a fast rate, we have to rely on fat stores for energy. Fat also helps move essential vitamins through our body and regulate body temperature. In addition, it assists with blood clotting, brain development, and inflammation.

Naturally, the percentage of intake may change for specific goals. For instance, if you are gearing up for a marathon, you will want to hit the higher percentage of carbs. However, it's important to incorporate protein and fat as well, so be careful not to go too low on those either. As you can see, all three macronutrients are essential for various reasons. Don't cheat yourself by eliminating

or significantly reducing any of them.

## CARRIER OF LYME DISEASE, BLACKLEGGED TICKS NOW ESTABLISHED IN OHIO: STUDY

They were almost absent from Ohio until 2009. But since then, the number of blacklegged ticks found in Ohio has grown significantly. The bad news: Blacklegged ticks carry Lyme disease.

A new study conducted by Ohio State University and the Ohio Department of Health has found that blacklegged ticks and Lyme disease are now an emerging public health concern in Ohio, as tick populations carrying the disease have become established, particularly in the eastern half of the state.

"Ohio had a low incidence of human Lyme disease, which is largely attributed to the absence of the transmitting vector, the blacklegged deer tick, in the state," said Glen Needham, professor emeritus of entomology in the university's College of Food, Agricultural, and Environmental Sciences and one of the study's authors.

"However, evidence presented in this study suggests that the blacklegged deer tick is becoming established in certain areas of Ohio."

The open-access paper was published June 2014 in the journal *Frontiers in Cellular and Infection Microbiology*.

Ticks are small arachnids that hang out along woodland edges, in woods, tall grass, weeds and underbrush. Like mosquitoes, ticks feed on the blood of birds, reptiles and mammals, including humans and pets. In doing so, ticks can transmit a variety of diseases, such as Rocky Mountain spotted fever and Lyme disease.

Lyme disease causes flu-like symptoms such as fatigue, fever, headache, and muscle and joint aches. It often produces a distinctive large, circular red rash that looks like a bulls-eye. When caught early, the disease can be successfully treated with antibiotics. Though not known to be fatal, the disease can progress to chronic arthritis, neurological symptoms and cardiac problems if left untreated.

Lyme disease is caused by an agent known as *Borrelia burgdorferi*, which is found primarily in the white-footed mouse. Blacklegged ticks (*Ixodes scapularis*) pick up the disease-causing agent from the mice and serve as vectors, or carriers, of Lyme disease.

Most people who get Lyme disease, Needham said, will acquire it from the nymphal, or juvenile, stage of the tick, which is very small – the size of a poppy seed – and is active in spring and summer, particularly in wooded areas. Hunters and meat processors will especially be at risk from adult ticks this fall from September through December.

For the study, Needham

and colleagues analyzed data from the state health department's tick surveillance program; Ohio's multi-agency surveillance of deer heads for chronic wasting disease; and the results of their 2010 studies of ticks and *B. burgdorferi* prevalence in rural Tiverton Township, Coshocton County, where established populations of blacklegged deer ticks carrying the Lyme disease agent have been identified.

The first blacklegged deer tick confirmed in Ohio was found in 1989. The number of these ticks found annually remained low from 1989 until 2008 and accounted for less than 1 percent of all ticks collected by the state health department's tick surveillance program.

However, things began to change dramatically in 2009, when 15 blacklegged deer ticks were collected, followed by 40 in 2010, 184 in 2011 and 182 in 2012. By 2012, these ticks accounted for almost 25 percent of those received by the state health department. A higher number of ticks was also found on deer heads. For example, in 2011, 1,830 ticks were collected from 96 of 560 deer heads examined. The previous year yielded only 29 ticks from around 200 deer inspected.

Such an increase in the number of blacklegged deer ticks found throughout the state mirrored the confirmed and probable cases of Lyme disease reported to the health department: 43 cases in 2010, 50 in 2011, 67 in 2012 and 93 in 2013.

"Blacklegged deer ticks have now been found in 57 Ohio counties and are likely established in 26 of those counties, mostly east of I-71 where we have deciduous forest," said Needham, who is now studying tick-borne diseases for the U.S. Air Force at Wright-Patterson Air Force Base in Dayton.

In the United States, Lyme disease is endemic (meaning it has become highly prevalent) in two different regions: the Northeastern states and the Upper Midwestern states. Ohio lies between these two areas, which puts the state in the crosshairs of expansion of the disease.

"Given the proximity of Ohio counties with established blacklegged tick populations to highly endemic

Pennsylvania, it is possible that the emergence of this tick vector simply reflects the continuing expansion of the Northeast Lyme disease-endemic region in the U.S.," Needham said.

"Migrating birds, deer and human activity are likely spreading the tick and the disease agent. Moving tick-infested harvested deer to non-infested areas of the state may play a role too, so deer should be examined before moving them. If infested, then take care in processing the animal, and the hide needs to be buried or burned, or salted down if destined for tanning."

Because of these factors, Needham said he expects that the number of blacklegged ticks and the percentage of them infected with *B. burgdorferi* will continue to increase in Ohio.

"It is important that the public and health professionals become aware of the increased risk for contracting Lyme disease in Ohio, and that preventive measures are taken to limit exposure to ticks when going outdoors," he said.

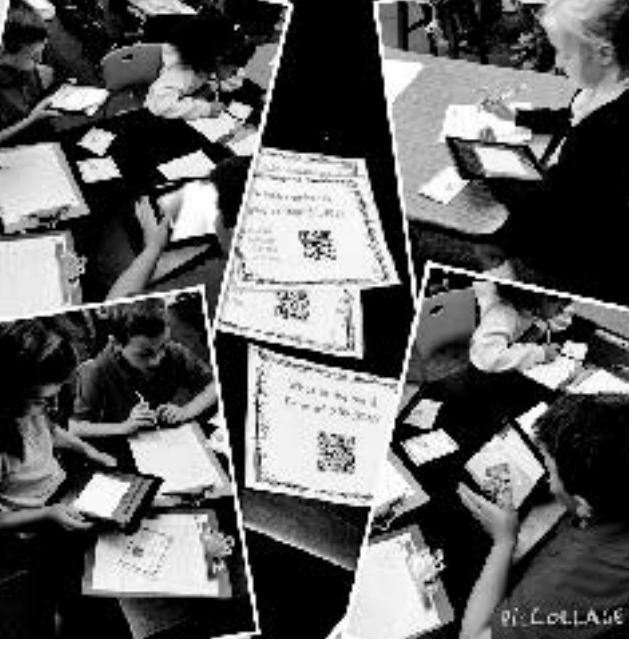

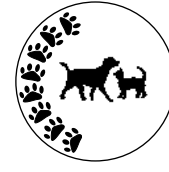
