IMPROVING THE JUVENILE JUSTICE SYSTEM

The Kruse Report by: IN State Sen. Dennis Kruse (R-Auburn)

It is important that our juvenile justice system in Indiana focus not just on delivering justice to underage individuals, but also improving their lives so that they may become productive, law-abiding citizens in the future.

Currently, there are two wavs a child enters the juvenile justice system. One is by being convicted of a crime and the second is being determined as a child in need of services (CHINS). According to the Indiana Department of Child Services, a CHINS is a juvenile who is physically or mentally impaired due to neglect from their parents or guardian and requires intervention of the justice system in order to ensure the wellbeing of the individual.

Under current law, when a child is considered a criminal they cannot also be considered a CHINS and vice versa. This is too inflexible and does not look out for the child's best interest.

I sponsored, would provide a third path. The bill would create a bridge between the two options so that a juvenile who enters the justice system for criminal reasons can also be a CHINS at the same time.

This would allow the justice system to make calculated and positive steps toward addressing the child's rehabilitation needs. Through HB 1196, a child

would have the opportunity to be assessed by a special team, administered by the court, to see if the child has an underlying problem that may have caused them to commit a crime. For example, a neglected

child may steal food from a grocery store because his or her parents may be drug addicts. Though the child will still be considered a criminal because of the action he or she took, the court could now determine the child is in need of service as well.

The ultimate goal of this bill is to protect the future of young Hoosiers. If we don't tackle the deeper issues of why a juvenile commits a crime, then that same juvenile may become a repeat offender and spend their life in and out of prison.

I believe that this bill will help Indiana become a leader in reforming juvenile justice in the nation by solving issues at their core. Not only will this create a better justice system, it will benefit Hoosier children by helping them get back on the path toward suc-

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

Mike Phillips, founder of a Louisiana high tech company, was challenged in his faith to be transformed from a lukewarm Christian to one 'all in' for Christ. 5), there will be a Sunrise Easter Cantata at 7:00 a.m. The cantata is "There's Room at the Cross." When I think of spring I am reminded of one spring I will never forget. When I was 14 years old, I spent the majority of my 1968 spring in Defiance Hospital, admitted for severe stomach and bowel pain that prevented me from eating and digesting any food. For nearly a month I was hooked up to an IV machine, the only nutrients/food my body was able

After weeks of tests and no answers my doctors scheduled an exploratory surgery, which resulted in their finding a bowel obstruction/lesion that had formed after a previous emergency appendectomy surgery.

After the surgery, I ran a fever and as I came out the anesthesia I remember my Uncle Marvin and Aunt Doris were by my bedside. Very tenderly and lovingly my Aunt Doris applied a cool cloth to my forehead to help

stay the effects of the fever. I will always remember and cherish her care of touch. Regarding the significant ministry of touch, the 19th Century English Poet Samuel Taylor Coleridge described how his own son, then three years old, awoke one night and called to his mother...

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"Touch me, only touch me with your finger," the young boy pleaded. The child's mother was astonished.

"Why?" she asked. "I'm not here," the boy

cried. "Touch me, Mother, so I may be here." Do you know of some-

one who needs God's Touch? There's something about the ministry of touch that transcends pain and suffering. Jesus understood the great ministry of touch as He reached out to a crying leper, Mark 1:40-42 (NLT), "A man with leprosy came and knelt in front of Jesus, begging to be healed. 'If you are willing, you can heal me and make me clean,' he said. Moved with compassion, Jesus reached out and touched him. 'I am willing,' he said. 'Be healed!' Instantly, the leprosy disappeared, and the man was healed."

Whether we need the touch of another or we need to give a touch of healing and love, God desires His fallen creation to know of the touch of Jesus, a touch that is characterized by courage and compassion.

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

THE LOBO TANK BUSTERS

We didn't fly at all yesterday as it rained all day and the wind gusts were up to 53mph. It was just a miserable day. So, we sat around in the barracks and got caught up on our writing letters home. We put down the side curtains on our Jeep and drove it to the mess hall for our meals. The crewmen took the truck.

I guess the Col. got cabin fever as he and his driver came over in the afternoon and we played a number of games of Euchre. Of course, he had set out some plans for tomorrow's flights. He stated, "The Caen area, that is in the English Sector, and Montgomery has tried a number of times to take and capture Caen, but it is too well defended. The Germans will not give it up and the allies cannot move very far until Caen is in our hands!"

The Col. stressed the fact that we should knock out all the tanks and artillery pieces that we can here in the next few days. So, on today's sortie, we flew up and down the front lines area, west of Caen. We caught a couple of Tiger Tanks out in a meadow and we knocked the tracks off and disabled it. Then, we could fly around to the rear and fire into the engine area and start a fire in the hydraulic oil and the hoses.

The foot soldiers have done away with a lot of the hedge-row areas. That was a mean warfare, they could only move a foot at a time. But it all has to be taken because this area is loaded with machine gun nests, and our boys can't move the front very far.

We made two sorties today. I think we totaled up eight tanks, two German-type Jeeps, a few trucks and a big barn that was being used as a warehouse. We also shot up some artillery pieces on the

hillside. That German 88 is a dandy gun and the Krauts can shoot it like a rifle. We used up all of our rockets and ammo and then headed back here to our Lopshire Airbase a little later than usual. We all loaded into our trucks and went to the mess hall.

About all they had left was S.O.S. but they had a lot of it. That is one of my favorite foods, so I helped them put it





STATE WETLANDS HABITAT STAMP REACHES MILE-

In 2015, the Ohio Department of Natural Resources (ODNR) will commemorate the sale of the 1 millionth state wetland habitat stamp by awarding a signed print of this year's winning entry. The stamp and print have been donated by Ducks Unlimited to help celebrate the milestone. Approximately 25,000 Ohio Wetland Habitat Stamps were purchased last year.

Gunner Hilliard's painting of northern shovelers appears on the 2015 Ohio Wetlands Habitat Stamp available now at www.oh.wildlifelicense.com. Proceeds from sales of the stamp help fund vital wetland habitat restoration projects in Ohio. Since 1982, more than \$10.4 million dollars have been raised to help restore and protect 40,000 plus acres of wetlands. Wetland habitats are important for many resident wildlife species, including several that are state-endangered.

For 50 years, the ODNR Division of Wildlife has partnered with Ducks Unlimited to protect and restore critical habitat for migratory birds. In 1965, the ODNR Division of Wildlife became one of the three charter members to donate money through the state grant program. In 1982, the Ohio Wetlands Habitat Stamp was created to help fund the program. These conservation projects are essential to protect migratory bird habitats.

Additionally, the artwork of Sidney, Ohio native wildlife artist Christine Clayton won first place in the 2015 Ohio Wetlands Habitat Stamp Design Competition and Clayton's painting of wood ducks will appear on the Ohio Wetlands Habitat Stamp issued in

At 20 years of age, Clayton is the youngest Ohio winner in the 35-year history of the competition. She has previously placed first in the 2012 Federal Jr. Duck Stamp competition. This year, second place honors in the Ohio competition went to Matt Clayton (Christine's father) for his painting of a bufflehead. The third place entry was by Stephen Hamrick of Minnesota for his painting of a pair of American widgeons.

The competition was held Saturday, February 21, at the Ohio Ducks Unlimited annual banquet in Licking County. The winning entry was selected from a field of 18 original paintings submitted by artists from nine states, including nine entries from Ohio. The







OHIO HOUSE PASSES PRIORITY WATER QUALITY LEGISLATION



The Ohio House of Representatives passed Substitute Senate Bill 1, legislation addressing some of the most important issues pertaining to water quality in Ohio. House and Senate leaders, as well as the bill sponsors, took part in a press conference this morning to discuss components of the legislation, prior to its passage on the House floor. "The amount of time and

attention given to this legislation is a clear indication of just how seriously the General Assembly has taken the issue of protecting Ohio's abundant, yet vulnerable, natural resources," Speaker of the Ohio House Cliff Rosenberger (R-Clarksville) said. "I want to commend the members who worked on this policy, such as Reps. Dave Hall and Jim Buchy, and Chairman Brian Hill and Vice Chairman Tony Burkley. Their knowledge and input were an invaluable asset during the entire process, and I know that the bill we voted out today would not have been nearly as strong without their contributions."

Among other provisions, Substitute Senate Bill 1 encourages establishing best nutrient management practices, such as regulating the application of fertilizer in the western basin of Lake Erie when the ground is frozen or saturated.

"I look forward to continuing the good work of the legislature on this issue with H.B. 101, which will protect the drinking water of Ohioans by developing an early warning system for algal blooms."

In addition, beginning in 2020, the bill prohibits the depositing of dredged materials into the Maumee basin. It also requires certain publicly owned water treatment facilities to monitor the amount of phosphorous in the water and to require some treatment facilities to submit an evaluation of how it might reduce the level of phosphorous.

"In my district, we have been tackling the water quality issues in Grand Lake St. Marys for more than five years," said Rep. Jim Buchy (R-Greenville). "The things we learned at Grand Lake St. Marys were considered when crafting Sub Senate Bill 1 and as a result these new practices are science-based and proven to have positive results."

"As a farmer, I was reluctant to support legislation aimed at regulating farmers," said Rep. Brian Hill (R-Zanesville), Chairman of the House Agriculture and Rural Development Committee. "However, now that I have seen the agricultural community step up and work together with the legislature, I am encouraged. I look forward to working with the other parties who will be coming to the table to be part of the solution."

SB 1 incorporates provisions that give farmers an opportunity to come into compliance without being penalized. For small and medium operators who may be in violation of the law, the legislation enables them to apply for a limited exemption and request assistance from their local Soil and Water Conservation District to resolve deficiencies in order to avoid being penalized.

"I am pleased to see this bipartisan effort voted out of the General Assembly," said Rep. Tony Burkley (R-Payne), Vice Chair of the House Agriculture and Rural Development Committee. "I also want to commend the citizens of northwest Ohio, particularly our farmers, who have stepped up and worked with us to produce this first step toward quality water management."

OVER 500 ATTEND PAULDING PUTNAM ELECTRIC CO-OP ANNUAL MEETING



An announcement that distribution rates would not be changing in 2015 was one of many highlights of Paulding Putnam Electric Cooperative's Annual Meeting on Saturday, March 21st. Members also heard updates on the operations of their cooperative and the results of trustee elections. Dr. John Saxton, president of the PPEC Board of Trustees, told cooperative members the board works hard to keep costs as low as possible. "There will be no rate increase for 2015," he said, "but we can't guarantee how long that will last.'

Because more than 90 percent of the electricity PPEC members consume is generated using coal, Saxton said recent proposals from the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency threaten the low-cost coal plants the co-op jointly owns with the other electric cooperatives serving in Ohio. "There is a war on coal, and coal is losing," he said. He encouraged members to join ACRE Co-op Owners for Political Action®, the political action committee for electric cooperative members, to help push "for a reasonable, affordable energy policy for the United States.

CEO/General George Carter echoed Saxton's call. "We have battles going on in both states we serve in and, nationally, we have the EPA, which decided it's going to dictate energy policy." Carter asked the members to help themselves by helping their cooperative. "We can't fight the legislative battles all by ourselves," Carter said. "I can go to Washington to press our points with our elected officials, and that's all fine and well, but hearing from you folks, the folks who actually elect them, makes a bigger impression. "When it comes to really battling on the legislative front — whether it's at the Ohio Statehouse, the Indiana Statehouse or in Washington, D.C. — we need your help."

Carter also discussed Paulding Putnam's decision to serve its Indiana members' power needs through Buckeye Power, which already serves the co-op's Ohio members, and buy out its contract with Wabash Valley Power Association.

"With the opportunity to save the membership \$300,000 to \$500,000 a year, we had to do it," Carter said.

During the treasurer's report, Gary Hayden noted that buying out the contract with Wabash Valley cost PPEC \$1.2 million, but the co-op should recoup that money through savings in less than five years.

In other business, attorney Norman Cook reported on the results of the trustee elections. In District 3, Tim Derck was the only member

to file a petition to run and, by cooperative policy, was automatically returned to the board. Trustee Ken Niese retained his spot representing District 7, and Douglas Fortman won a three-way race to fill the District 8 seat. District 8 had been served for more than 17 years by Gerald Heitmeyer, who retired from the

Several local high school students were also recognized during the meeting.

Megan Niese (Miller City High School) and Maggie Wilson (Antwerp High School) were selected to represent the cooperative on the annual Rural Electric Youth Tour to Washington, D.C. Addison Baumle (Wayne Trace HS) and Brad Becker (Ottawa-Glandorf HS) were named as the first-place winners in the scholarship contest. Makenzie Mansfield (Continental HS) and Logan Roebke (Kalida HS) won second-place scholarships, Erika Meyer (Miller City HS) and Alexander Vail (Antwerp HS) won third-place scholarships, and Courtney Alt (Miller City HS) was named winner of the at-large scholarship. Paulding Putnam Electric Cooperative serves about 13,000 members in Paulding, Putnam, Defiance, Van Wert and Allen counties in Ohio and Adams and Allen counties in Indiana.


