The Lady Golden Bears travelled down to the Archer court for "Rally for Remembrance". The Bryan girls have also been great about the support and they are usually the team that Antwerp works with on the fundraiser events.

Altogether, \$974.20 was raised to bring awareness to infant loss. One of our own has been personally effected. Megan Koppenhoffer married Jarod Martenies, both graduates of Antwerp, and



together they were ready to deliver their first child last year. At 40 weeks, baby Harper was ready to meet her parents when suddenly and without any warning she died. The family was devastated and without answers. Megan said they never found the reason because the test revealed no problems. The community was there to support her and Jarod.

It's been six years since Megan played on the volleyball team as a senior for the Archers. Amy Hammer just began her career as coach at the same time. She also knew that the team is so good at supporting important things and they talked about changing the support this year to something new-Tiny Purposes.

The organization of Tiny Purposes' goal is to bring awareness to something that is somewhat taboo to talk about-infant death. Reality shows it does happen and it shouldn't be ignored. They bring realization, comfort, healing and encouragement to families who have experi-

### PAULDING COUNTY HOSPI-TAL HELPS WITH HEALTH-CARE EXCHANGE OPEN ENROLLMENT

The open enrollment period for the Healthcare Marketplace health insurance coverage for 2016 is November 1, 2015 through January 31, 2016. This coverage is available through the Affordable Care Act.

You must be enrolled in health insurance coverage by January 31, 2016. If you don't have coverage in 2016, you'll pay the higher of these two amounts:

• 2.5% of your yearly household income

• \$695 per person (\$347.50 per child under 18)

Some people may qualify for an exemption from this fee. Persons missing the deadline may not be able to purchase Marketplace coverage for 2016 until the next open enrollment period for the following year.

If you are currently enrolled in a 2015 plan, your benefit year ends on December 31, 2015. Even if you like your current plan, the recommendation is to go online and check the options. You will want to confirm that your plan is not changing or perhaps you will find a plan that is more affordable or has benefits that you like better.

To help with these and other insurance issues, Paulding County Hospital is designated as a Certified Application Counselor. PCH can assist you regarding questions about your health care insurance options and navigating the Health Insurance Marketplace. We can even help you learn how to enroll. ### 57 ORGANIZATIONS, 4,400+ OHIOANS HELP EX-CEED "10 MILLION STEPS TO PREVENT FALLS"

To mark National Falls Prevention Awareness Day on Sept. 23, and to raise awareness of the epidemic of falls among older Ohioans, the STEADY U Ohio initiative asked community organizations and individuals around the state to help take "10 Million Steps to Prevent Falls" throughout September. Communities responded, with 57 different organizations sponsoring 57 community events. Statewide, more than 4,400 Ohioans walked approximately 5,300 miles. At an average of 2,500 steps per mile, that's more than 13.2 million steps taken in the name of falls prevention.

older adults," said Bonnie K. Burman, director of the Ohio Department of Aging, which operates the STEADY U Ohio initiative. "We want everyone to know that, while older adults are disproportionately affected by falls, falls are not a normal part of aging and most falls can be prevented."

STEADY U Ohio recruited community organizations around the state to organize local walking events. Events ranged from four or five participants to more than 1,200. Host organizations included local offices on aging, senior centers, health departments, nursing homes and assisted living facilities, hospitals, fitness centers and more. Some organizations partnered together, while others hosted multiple events. Several existing senior-focused events, including the Cleveland Senior Walk and the Toledo Senior Safari, were modified to have a falls prevention focus to participate.

Individuals were also encouraged to walk on their own and post a selfie of their efforts to social media using the hashtags #PreventFalls and #10MStepsOH. walk to walk on their behalf. She also challenged Ohioans to count time spent walking their dogs toward the effort, citing that pets are often a contributor to falls around the home.

"One in three older Ohioans will fall this year. For many of them, that fall can be life-altering. We want everyone to recognize that each of us has a role to play in putting an end to the epidemic of falls. As the old song says: 'United We Stand, Divided We Fall!" Director Burman added.

Facts about falls and older Ohioans:

• An older Ohioan falls every two minutes. Every five minutes, someone is injured in a fall.

• The number of fatal falls among older Ohioans has increased more than 167 percent since 2000.

• Older adults comprise 14 percent of our population, but account for 83 percent of fatal falls.

• The total cost of falls (medical costs, work loss) is estimated at \$1.8 million every day.

es, a teen driver was at-fault 73 percent of the time. These crashes resulted in 282 fatalities and 41,311 injuries.

While crash causes may vary, speed-related factors contributed to a majority (59 percent) of the crashes caused by teens. Another 20 percent of crashes were brought about by failure to yield, running a red light or running a stop

sign. "Teen drivers need to realize that poor decisions while driving now can stay with them for the rest of their lives," said Lt. Timothy Grigsby, Van Wert Post Commander. "That is why responsibility, awareness and safety are so important for our youngest drivers."

While education and awareness are extremely important, the Patrol also aims to change driver behavior through traffic enforcement.

Teen drivers are encouraged to plan ahead when traveling in order to eliminate rushing from one location to another. They are also reminded that safety belts save lives and they should encourage everyone in their vehicle to buckle up, every time.






### **CITY BEGINS ANNUAL** LEAF COLLECTION IN NEW HAVEN


