

BRANDEN LEE POWELL CONTINUES TO ELUDE LAW ENFORCEMENT



As of 1:30 p.m. Sunday, August 6, 2017, the search continues for escaped Paulding County Inmate Branden Lee Powell, age 32, an Antwerp, Ohio resident.

Agents from the FBI, US Marshals and the Ohio State Highway Patrol are currently assisting local authorities with this search. The US Marshals have offered a \$2,000 reward for information leading to the apprehension of Powell. The current search involves canvassing the area, speaking with residents in the area and following any leads

 These alphabet boards use a planchette, which is a smaller piece on casters which moves by spirit power, pointing out letters and making words.

This is an occult, demonic practice. It is real, wicked, harmful and an abomination which should be avoided at all costs. "There shall not be found among you any one that maketh his son or his daughter to pass through the

fire, or that useth divination, or an observer of times, or an enchanter, or a witch, Or a charmer, or a consulter with familiar spirits, or a wizard, or a necromancer. For all that do these things are an abomination unto the LORD; and because of these abominations the LORD thy God doth drive them out from before thee." (Deuteronomy 18:10-12) "Neither give place to the devil." (Ephesians 4:27)

sin and all who do evil. They will throw them into the fiery furnace, where there will be weeping and gnashing of teeth. Then the righteous will shine like the sun in the kingdom of their Father. He who has ears, let him hear." Matthew 13:37-43 (NIV).

When I was young, in the days of pull-behind combines, it seemed like a miracle to me to see the combine going through the field mowing down the stalks of grain and as it did separating the good grain from the weed seeds and chaff. The chaff was thrown back into the field and the weed seed was deposited in a separate little bin apart from the good grain. At the end of the day the good grain would have been put into the granary and the weed seeds would go into a burn barrel. In that way the good grain would be saved and the weed seed would be burnt and destroyed yet every year there seemed to be ample weed seed to be disposed of and burnt. In the natural world the weed seeds are deposited into the field by natural means. The wind, animals, and birds would have all had a part in distributing the weed seeds.

In our scripture today, Jesus says that the one who sows the good seed is the Son of Man, the field is the world, the good seed are the sons and daughters of the kingdom, and the weed seed is the sons and daughters of the evil one. The good and evil grow together until the harvest at the end of the age. At that time the evil will be separated and burnt but the good will be saved and be in heaven in the kingdom of their Father.

Jesus begins by informing his followers of the very real dangers that exist in the world. The farmer does everything right: he plants good seeds and faithfully tends his fields. Despite his diligence, an enemy appears and spreads weeds throughout the crop. The story reminds us that despite our good intentions and best efforts, there can be setbacks and obstacles that threaten to ruin even the best plan.

Jesus states clearly that

had a dream to create the facility into an assistant living residence, the new gym was then used for storage. After awhile the ACFCC (Antwerp Community Fellowship Care Campus) was formed. Brenda Copsey belonged to this group. Knowing that the new 24 would soon be built and would bypass the smaller communities, Brenda wanted

to do something to bring the communities together and there was no better way than to provide a facility where people would come together in the name of sports. So with Tim's connections, a lot of hard work and dedication the MAC Arena was born.

The MAC Arena was established in 2011 with no water, no restrooms, few lights, no heat and a filthy floor, but the first basketball league had a total of 55 boy and girl players. Since then the two court gym offers volleyball and basketball for ages K-adult plus K&S Tumblefit provides gymnastics and cheerleading events. Coming soon to the MAC Arena is Pickleball. (Pickleball is now played at the tennis courts on Tuesdays at 6:00 p.m., weather permitting). The community has been very supportive of the facility through their ads in the gym. Tim and Brenda have enlisted the help of Chad Hormann who oversees the basketball leagues while Tim and Brenda organize the events and do scheduling. The MAC Arena can be rented out for your special events.

Tim and Brenda have always been very involved in the community. They were born in the area (they call themselves 'lifers') and both graduated from Antwerp High School. They have five children and three grandchildren. Brenda drove school bus, helped in the classrooms and in the cafeteria. She now works at Sauders in Grabill. Tim has been assistant coach for Junior High and High School Varsity Basketball and he announced games for the High School football team. He has worked at Paragon for 31 years. Tim and Brenda are also very involved at Mount Calvary Lutheran Church.

Tim and Brenda stated that they could not have done what they did with the MAC gym if not for the help and support of their parents, Joe and Sue Meyer, and Larry and Joyce Copsey, and friends Keith and Joyce West.

Tim and Brenda, kudos go out to you for your love and dedication to the Antwerp Community and Paulding County. Part of your legacy will be the MAC Arena and what you have done for the Antwerp Community. This definitely will be a part of Antwerp History.

coming into the office. There are no road closures at this time.

"Our team of local, state and federal agencies continues to follow tips coming into my office," said Sheriff Jason K. Landers. "We are working around the clock to apprehend Mr. Powell. I cannot express enough gratitude to all of the folks that have reached out with support in various ways."

If anyone has information regarding the location of Powell, please contact the Sheriff's Office immediately. There is also a link on the sheriff's office website to submit an anonymous tip. The anonymous tip is truly anonymous. It is not possible to reply to the tip email. Information can also be emailed to Sheriff Jason K. Landers at jklanders@paulingohsheriff.com.

Powell was booked in the Paulding County Jail July 8th on allegations of Rape. On July 13th he was admitted into the Northwest Ohio Psychiatric Hospital in Toledo, Ohio. Powell overtook the transport deputy on the return trip to the Paulding County Jail on August 4th. While still restrained in a belly belt restraint system and leg shackles, Powell was able to take possession of the deputy's duty weapon prior to the escape.

Powell is considered armed and dangerous.

I had a nice visit the other day with a grandma that I have known since 1960. She told me that she has a grandson in Marion, OH that reads our paper every week, especially Stan Jordan's articles on the area wildlife.

The American Beaver is a lot more common in this area. I mean, in a circle of Antwerp, 25 miles in any direction, I have reports of Delaware Bend over in Defiance County, all the way west to up past Bull Rapids area, and many miles also of the St. Joe River.

Since about 1950, the white tailed deer have migrated from the north and pretty much cover all of Ohio and Indiana. You can say that they have become a problem. The state of Ohio has tried a number of ways to control the deep population, but without much success.

The coyote was introduced now also to help control the deer, but I think we just have more coyotes, but I have not heard of any trouble with the coyote.

The red tail fox is quite common in this area and I think it always has been.

The wild turkey was introduced to this area a few years ago and in certain areas it has done well. Like north of the Maumee River. Down in the Sherwood area a fellow told

me he has more turkeys in his yard than sparrows.

The Bald Eagles are in our area. Fact is, they cover a lot of Indiana and Ohio. There are only two types of eagles: the Bald and the Golden Eagle. I am glad to report that we find a new nest every once in a while. They have long since been taken off the endangered list.

We have a good supply of coon, opossum, rabbits and other smaller animals. We occasionally see a snowy owl. They are not native to this area, but I think the food supply causes them to migrate. I think the wild rabbit feeds a lot of birds and other animals.

We here in the tri-state area are very lucky. We have lots of wild animals and birds and fauna. You just have to slow up a little and see them.

STATE SUPERINTENDENT REDUCES ECOT'S FUNDING FOLLOWING YOST REQUEST

Following a plea from Auditor of State Dave Yost to place a portion of the Electronic Classroom of Tomorrow's (ECOT) funding in escrow, the Ohio Department of Education yesterday reduced by \$12.4 million the amount of student funding it will send to the virtual school.

In response to Yost's July 20 letter, Superintendent Paolo DeMaria said ECOT's funding will be reduced by 12 percent beginning with its August payment, scheduled for Aug. 13. Yost asked DeMaria to withhold "a significant portion" of ECOT's funding after the school submitted a funding request for almost the same number of students for the 2017-18 school year as it did last year - despite telling the Ohio Supreme Court on July 6 that it had suffered "unprecedented enrollment losses."

"This decision by Superintendent DeMaria and the Department is an excellent response to what appears to be an inflated request for student funding," Auditor Yost said. "It's clear the Superintendent shares my concern that any overfunding might be lost if ECOT closes - a prospect that was raised when ECOT's executives said the school was in a 'death spiral.' I applaud this move to protect tax dollars."

ECOT was being funded at the rate of \$103.6 million for claimed enrollment of 14,200 for the 2017-18 school year. A 12 percent reduction in funding totals about \$12.4 million. The Ohio Department of Education determined ECOT could document funding for 6,800 of the 15,000 students it claimed for the 2015 school year. ECOT's full-time equivalency (FTE) review for the 2016 school year has not been released.

ODE has begun clawing back about \$60 million in

funding that ECOT was paid for students who could not be substantiated based on available participation records. Auditor Yost's July 20 letter to DeMaria expressed concern that the state was overpaying ECOT for the upcoming school year, effectively loaning the school money that was being paid back to the Department of Education.

"While I recognize your standard practice is to fund charter schools in advance of the school year commencing, facts unique to ECOT's situation warrant a different approach at this time," Yost wrote in his letter to DeMaria. "It defies logic that there would not have been some out-migration from ECOT to traditional schools or other charters."

INDOT ASKS MOTORISTS TO PREPARE FOR AUGUST 21 SOLAR ECLIPSE

INDIANAPOLIS — Indiana Department of Transportation officials urge motorists to plan for traffic congestion expected to occur in southern Indiana before and after the total solar eclipse on August 21. Approximately 200 million people live within a day's drive of the total eclipse path. Many will be on the road to get a closer view.

INDOT officials offer the following advice:

• **Be prepared for traffic congestion before and after the August 21 eclipse.**

Interstate 69, U.S. 41, and U.S. 231 are expected to experience increased traffic in southbound lanes before the event as caravans of motorists head for Western Kentucky where the moon's full eclipse of the sun can be viewed within a 70-mile-wide swath encompassing Hopkinsville, Paducah, and Madison, KY. After the event, transportation planners anticipate a "mass exodus" from total eclipse regions. Expect heavier than normal northbound traffic on these routes.

Interstate 65 will also see increased traffic going to—and returning from—total eclipse vantage points that begin at Bowling Green, KY and extend beyond Nashville, TN. Again, southbound traffic is expected to rise before the solar eclipse. Northbound lanes will experience congestion after the eclipse.

• **If you want to drive toward the eclipse path for better viewing, allow extra time.**

PATROL OVI CHECKPOINT WAS ON US 127 IN VAN WERT

Van Wert - The Van Wert Post of the Ohio State Highway Patrol, in conjunction with the Van Wert Police Department, announced that an OVI checkpoint was held August 4th, 2017, on US 127, approximately a quarter of a mile south of Fox Road in Van Wert.

We want to drive home a simple point: Don't endanger the lives of our citizens with a reckless and irresponsible decision to drive while impaired."

BOARD OF SCHOOL TRUSTEES RECOGNIZE TECHNOLOGY TEAM



The EACS Board recently recognized the EACS Technology Department. The technology team shut down the entire network: phone systems, computer systems, copier systems, and district Internet for 9 days, from July 2 to the afternoon of July 10 while they moved from Park Hill over

to New Haven Elementary.

A combination of 179 virtual servers and 36 physical servers, totaling 215 servers were systematically shut down, moved, installed, and rebooted, and tested to make sure they were in working order.

The physical move is still going on, as they are still moving tools, people, and equipment over to New Ha-

ven Elementary. In the end, they will have moved their department, and the technology tools of the Department of Student Services, the Department of Special Services, and the Curriculum Department.

They have also purchased, inventoried, asset tagged, and, especially with the help of summer workers, are in the process of casing 4,840 new iPads for the K-6 students. They have wired and bricked all K-6 storage/charging carts/cabinets in all K-6 classrooms, and they are ready and awaiting the arrival of the iPads.

Have you ever been sitting outside on a late summer evening and hear a droning sound coming from a nearby woods? What could it be? What is making that sound? Is it the power lines buzzing and making that sound? Why is it making that sound? Does it mean anything? That sound you hear later in the summer would be the cicada, a small insect with a small and stout body. The cicada is an interesting insect and one that is always able to be heard in the late summer months.

she will slice open inserting around a dozen eggs in just one twig. Patterson Clark writes that the eggs will take about six to ten weeks to hatch at which point the nymphs will fall to the ground, dig their hole in the ground, and feed on the plant root liquids for another 17 years.

After reading all of that you are certainly now wanting to know how that sound comes about that they make. The loud buzzing that you hear sitting out in the afternoon or evening is coming from the male cicada. The male will make the buzzing sound to attract a female for mating. In response, the female will flick her wings as a signal to the male.

How is this sound made you ask? According to National Geographic, the sound made by the males comes from them vibrating the membranes on their abdomens. Not all cicadas will have the same sound to their song and some will have a more pleasing sound that others might. One thing to note is that cicadas will make different sounds for distress than they might for mating although to our ears they might sound the same, according to National Geographic. The sound of the cicada is always heard, but the cicada is rarely seen because most of its time is spent in the canopy of the tree.

So, next time you are sitting on your front porch enjoying nature, take some time to enjoy the sights and sounds around you. You never truly know the hidden secret that can be found outdoors!

According to National Geographic, Cicadas are recognized by their firm bodies, broad head, see through wings with visible membranes, and rather large eyes. In total, there are over 3,000 different species of cicadas that are found throughout the world. The cicada is an interesting species of insects that have a wide variety of different life cycles that can vary quite a lot. Some cicadas have been known to disappear altogether for multiple years at a time only to make a comeback at regular points over the course of time such as the 17-year cicada which is known to come back in 17-year cycles.

National Geographic writes that commonly cicadas follow an annual life cycle because there are at least some adults which come back every year. This cicada is known as the annual cicada. The cicada starts out as an egg which develops into a nymph that enjoys the liquids of plant roots to obtain their nutrition. At this stage, they will spend their time under the ground surface which can last most of their young life before they come above surface upon reaching the adult stage.

Some cicadas follow the

periodical cycle which they will reappear and disappear in a given amount of time. A cicada that follows this life cycle is the 17-year cicada. There are many similarities that exist between the periodical and annual cicada life cycle with a few exceptions. The nymphs will live under the ground for a period of 17 years and consume sap from trees. Once they reach 17 years, the nymphs will tunnel their way to the surface using their front legs which will create a small mound of mud on the ground surface.

According to Patterson Clark of The Washington Post, the cicada nymphs will come out from their tunnels and into any trees that are nearby once an air temperature of 64 degrees is reached. It is also at this point when they will shed their skins. The adult cicada will have orange-ribbed wings along with red eyes which can be quite large. Once these cicadas come out of the ground, the longest you will see them is a span of four to six weeks. Patterson Clark writes that the main goal of the cicadas is to mate and lay their eggs for the next cycle to take place.

The female cicada will put her eggs in tree twigs that
