PAULDING COUNTY HOS-PITAL RAPID MOLECULAR TESTING

Paulding County Hospital has announced they have started offering the rapid, point-of-care molecular Influenza A & B Virus, Streptococcus A, and Respiratory Syncytial Virus (RSV) tests at their medical centers in Antwerp, Oakwood, Paulding, and Payne as well as at hospital's clinical Laboratory.

The test is significantly faster than other molecular methods and more accurate than conventional rapid testing giving the healthcare provider the confidence to make effective patient management decisions sooner. Molecular amplification on the device replicates the organism's RNA and increases the likelihood of detection over conventional rapid immunoassay diagnostic testing.

The Centers for Disease Control (CDC) state that rapid immunoassay diagnostic tests have limited sensitivity to detect influenza viral infection and negative test results should be interpreted with caution given the potential for false negative results. Molecular assays, are more sensitive and specific than other influenza diagnostic methods, with a low likelihood of false positive or false negative results.

ACCOMPLISHED ADMIN-ISTRATOR, NOTRE DAME GRAD AUTRY CHOSEN AS NEW LUTHERAN HOSPITAL CEO

Paula Autry has been chosen to guide Lutheran Hospital into the future as its new chief executive officer. She has 30 years of experience in the field of healthcare. SPECIAL TRAPPING DRAWING TO BE HELD AT KILLDEER PLAINS WILD-LIFE AREA

A one-time drawing will be held Wednesday, October 18, 2017 at 6:30 p.m. for trapping in the wildlife refuge on the Killdeer Plains Wildlife Area, according to the Ohio Department of Natural Resources (ODNR).

The drawing will be held at the Killdeer Plains Check Station, located at 19100 C.H. 115, Harpster, OH 43323 (1-1/2 miles south of State Route 294 in Wyandot County).

All participants must register before 6:25 p.m. and must show a valid 2017-2018 Ohio Fur Taker Permit. Anyone interested in registering should plan on being at the Killdeer Plains Check station by 6 p.m.

Registration forms will be completed by the trapper and placed in a drum. As these forms are drawn, that trapper must select a unit to trap. There are nine available units in the refuge. A letter permit will be mailed to the participant, and further instructions will be given by the area supervisor.



The workers who were hired about the eleventh hour came and each received a denarius. So when those came





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workers got. What's the point of putting in a full day's work when others get the same amount for doing much less?

The workers in Jesus' parable represent the good, religious people who have tried all their lives to be faithful to the God of Israel. They've tried to obey the law of Moses and to do their duty. And Jesus comes along welcoming crooked tax collectors and prostitutes and saying that they can get into the kingdom of heaven after lives of ignoring God's commandments.

If Jesus had just been telling a story about workers in a vineyard, the ones who had worked all day would be right. In ordinary business dealings, the owner would be unfair and the workers would have a right to complain. But the owner of the vineyard is God. And in that vineyard, in that kingdom, things are very different than in our earthly economies.

All of those who have come to faith, early or late, are saints, God's holy ones. This doesn't necessarily mean that in the fullness of the kingdom of heaven all the saints will be identical. In a passage in one of his letters, Paul seems to suggest that all whose lives are based on Jesus Christ will be saved, but that after the resurrection they may receive different rewards depending on how well their lives have been lived. God's love for all persons is really good news. It means that all of us get much more than we deserve. Those who respond faithfully to the gospel enter the kingdom of heaven free, and can work to share the message of God's free salvation with others.

We are back to the agency now. A lot of the garden vegetables are ready, because this is the last week of July in 1859.

Rooster, the runner, takes over the cooking chores when he is here. He spent all morning out in the garden getting some fresh vegetables for our big cookout later this afternoon. We had fresh vegetable soup with buffalo meat and fried deer meat. We had biscuits and honey with mulberries and honey for dessert.

There were the four soldiers, Callie and I plus the twins and Yellow Tulip. We sat around the fire and talked. The ladies put the twins to bed and we talked for a couple of hours after that.

We rested all day as there isn't much to do right now. Slim has been bringing in the wood preparing for winter, but he even took today off, and sat in the shade with us.

We played ball with the twins and even went fishing down by the bridge in Rattle Snake Creek.

The wheat is ready to be cut now and Gen Kearney, Billy Metzger and about 10 soldiers arrived this afternoon to cut and thrash the wheat.

They had brought a number of harvesting cradles and some flails and tarps to catch the wheat. The soldiers made a swath across the wheat field with the cradles and left the straw lay on the ground. Then they gathered up the straw and made a large pile under the shade tree. They had a beater, something like a carpet beater. They beat the straw and that removes the chaff from the berry. That all falls down on to the tarp and then we separate the wheat from the chaff. Then it is dried in the sun for a little while and then they start making wheat flour.

They take a flat stone and lay some wheat kernels on the stone and then take another stone and grind it in to a powder like substance. All this flour is put into clean dry buffalo entrails. They will stay

dry until needed. It took all day to make the flour, put it away and store it.

They used grease from bear, deer, buffalo, and small animals. As well as maple syrup, honey, parts of roots and tree bark in their cooking.

Rooster is their cook because the Mess Sgt. didn't come along on this trip. He stayed at the fort. We have deer ribs off the spit, fried deer meat on the griddle, boiled potatoes, quartered and hot deer poured all over them.

After supper Rooster showed off his cooking skills. He sliced some new potatoes as thin as possible and dropped them into a bucket of hot grease for a little bit and then fished them out and passed them around on a neat platter after he salted them a little. Everyone liked them, but there was only two or three for each because it had a long time to make them. Rooster called them potato chips. They were a big hit.

The other day, Rooster gathered in a lot of corn and spent a couple of hours getting the corn clean by husking and getting the silk off.

He then took some bear grease and mixed in some honey and stirred it all up and put it on our sweet corn and then sprinkled a little salt on top. The Rooster and his cooking has become quite a hit here.

Gen. Kearney sits in the shade in Callie's rocking chair a lot. He talks about the slavery situation and the condition our country is getting

He appears to have aged a lot lately. This last trip should help him and I hope it does, but he does seem to have put all the world's troubles on his shoulders.

The general rode Roosters' horse back to the fort to find out all the news bulletins concerning the current action of the impending war and will soon be back.



TEEN DRIVERS REMAIN ONE OF OHIO'S MOST AT RISK GROUPS

Motor vehicle crashes are the leading cause of death in teens, more than other types of injury, disease or violence. As National Teen Driving Safety Week is October 21-27, it's the perfect time for teens and their parents to discuss the dangers new drivers face so they can make safe and responsible decisions. Surveys show that teens whose parents set firm rules for driving typically engage in less risky driving behaviors and are involved in fewer crashes.

Young drivers who are 15 to 19-years-old were involved in 15 percent of all traffic crashes in Ohio from 2014 to 2016. An action on the part of the teen driver contributed to more than 72 percent of these crashes. These crashes resulted in 286 fatalities and 41,511



LATTA VOTES FOR PAIN-CAPABLE UNBORN CHILD PROTECTION ACT

Congressman Bob Latta (R-Bowling Green) voted for legislation, H.R. 36, the Pain-Capable Unborn Child Protection Act, which prohibits abortions after 20 weeks. According to substantial medical evidence, an unborn child is capable of experiencing pain 20 weeks after fertilization, if not earlier. The bill passed the U.S. House of Representatives by a vote of 232 to 187. Nearly two-thirds of Americans support legislation to prevent abortions after a baby can feel pain in the womb. The bill also contains Born-Alive Infant Protections, which require medical efforts to be made to save babies that survive abortion attempts.

'Every unborn life is sacred and should be protected," said Latta. "It's even more horrific when babies that are able to feel pain are allowed to be aborted under current law. I stand with the pro-life community in supporting the Pain-Capable Unborn Child Protection Act to protect the most vulnerable in our society."

The Pain-Capable Unborn Child Protection Act is supported by Americans United for Life, Concerned Women for America, the Family Research Council, March for Life, National Right to Life, the Susan B. Anthony List, and the United States Conference of Catholic Bishops.

In his opening statement, Mr. Smith told the committee, "Let me say clearly: As CEO I was ultimately responsible for what happened on my watch. Equifax was entrusted with Americans' private data and we let them down."





PAULDING PUTNAM ELEC-TRIC CO-OP REBUILDS MILLER CITY LINES

One of the constants at Paulding Putnam Electric Co-op (PPEC) is to continue to provide reliable power to its members. In order, to accomplish this, PPEC must prioritize upgrades and maintenance to its infrastructure on a regular basis. This year PPEC has already completed a \$1.2 million upgrade to its Ottoville Substation. "The Ottoville area has seen steady growth over the last several years and this upgrade will extend capacity and assist with new potential growth," stated PPEC Engineering Manager Steve Kahle.

The next big project begins this month (October) and will be the rebuilding of Miller City's electricity infrastructure. This plan includes replacing all poles, conductors, and lines, along with upgrading the street lighting to LED lights. The only exception is the main three phase line along State Route 108 will not be replaced yet, due to some proposed plan-



Miller City's Mayor, Jim Erford stated, "It's nice to have things upgraded, PPEC has always been reliable before, so this will be a welcomed installation and a great benefit for Miller City."

"The goal is to have the construction complete by the beginning of November, but once done, Miller City residents will see improved reliability and service quality. Plus, another noticeable difference will be the updating of all their street lights to LED, "stated Kahle.

"This rebuilding of the electric service system in Miller City will improve service and safety to the local residents. Further, this is part of our mission; to support our communities and provide quality electric service, by completing this major rebuild of our services in Miller City, we are fulfilling our mission," added President and CEO George Carter.

In addition, to replacing dated poles and lines, PPEC has an aggressive tree trimming program, which also aids in making sure the lights stay on. "The main cause of outages for PPEC 10 years ago was tree related. Now our outage figures are some of the lowest in the state. This has everything to do with PPEC making a commitment of reliable service for our members," said Operations Manager, Ted Slusser.

Along, with all these measures PPEC also conducts regular pole testing, to make sure poles withstand weathering. "In 2016, 4375 poles were inspected with close to 200 poles being rejected. "Our crews, along with contractors have replaced almost

all of those rejected poles this year," said Slusser.

"We made great progress in 2017, and hit substantial milestones, but our work is not done here," said President and CEO George Carter. "We are committed to implementing infrastructure upgrades every year which will result in stronger reliability and peace of mind for our members."


