EAST ALLEN COUNTY SCHOOLS RECEIVES REBATE CHECK FROM PAULDING PUTNAM



Paulding Putnam provided a rebate check in the amount of \$15,000 to East Allen County Schools. The rebate is provided by Paulding Putnam through Buckeye Power to encourage customers to upgrade their facilities to be more energy efficient. The rebate will pay \$1 per watt for each watt that is reduced (max rebate is \$15,000). The old Heritage Jr. Sr. High School stadium lights used 108,000 watts and the new stadium lights use 48,000 watts.

Along with using less power, the new stadium lights can be controlled individually, and provide far better lighting than the original lights. Being able to control the lights gives the school the ability to light the areas that are necessary. This allows the playing field to be brighter

than the bleacher area during the game. Then after the game the field area is darkened somewhat and the bleacher/ sidewalk area is illuminated for a safer exit.

HICKS LEADS WARRIORS TO **CLASS 2A FINAL** FOUR

Amarion Hicks ran for 234 yards and 3 touchdowns to lead the Woodlan Warriors to a 40-26 win over North Newton Friday night in IH-SAA Regional action.

The victory sends the Warriors to the semi-state where Woodlan will visit Eastbrook for the right to play in the state championship on November 25 at Lucas Oil Stadium. The Warriors and Panthers will square off at 7:00 p.m. on Friday, November 17.

Justin Durkes added 78 yards on the ground for Woodlan (11-2) while Isaac Meyer added 40 yards on 8 carries.

Hicks had touchdown runs of 65, 47 and 51 yards for the Warriors while Durkes scored on carries of 18 and 31 yards. Meyer also had a 1-yard plunge for a score that started the scoring for Woodlan.

The Warriors led 14-0 after 1 quarter before posting a 27-18 halftime advantage. Woodlan took a 33-18 lead into the fourth quarter.

TICK-BORNE LYME DIS-EASE CASES IN OHIO RISE

Protect yourself, your family, and your pets from tick bites during hunting season

The weather is turning colder, and it's hunting season in Ohio. The Ohio Department of Health and the Ohio Department of Natural Resources are reminding Ohioans that ticks are still active. People need to take precautions to prevent tick bites which can carry diseases such as Lyme disease.

The Ohio Department of Health is reporting 241 cases of Lyme disease in 60 counties so far in 2017. Cases of Lyme disease have steadily increased in Ohio during the past 5 years with 93 cases in 2013, 119 cases in 2014, 154 cases in 2015 and 160 cases in 2016. The increase in cases coincides with the increase of blacklegged ticks in Ohio.

Lyme disease is a bacterial disease transmitted to humans via the bite of an infected deer tick. Symptoms can include a flu-like illness, muscle pain, and headache; a bull's-eye shaped rash is often also seen at the site of the bite as well.

"Lyme disease is still very important to think about, even in cold weather," said Ohio Department of Health Medical Director Dr. Clint Koenig. "You still need to take precautions like wearing bug repellent to make sure you are protected while out-

side enjoying the fall season." Fall hunting season has Department of Natural Resources is reminding sportsmen and sportswomen that hunting brings you in close contact with ticks and their habitats, so it is important to take the proper precautions to reduce your chances of being bitten.

Here are some tips on how to avoid tick bites before and after you hunt:

• When possible, walk in the center of trails and paths to avoid brushing up against ticks.

• Apply bug repellent to everyone in your party, including pets.

• Tuck your pants into your boots or socks and tuck your shirt into your pants to prevent ticks from crawling inside clothing.

• Shower immediately after returning from the outdoors to remove unattached ticks

 Check dogs for ticks after returning from tick habitats.

• Remove any attached tick immediately by grasping it with tweezers, as close to the skin as possible, and pulling it straight out. Do not twist or jerk.

There are currently no vaccines to prevent tickborne diseases. If detected at an early stage, Lyme disease can be treated successfully with appropriate antibiotic therapy.

NSCC CONTINUES RAPIDS GRANT EFFORT IN REGION, PROMOTING WORKFORCE DEVELOPMENT

Northwest State Community College continues its work in partnership with six other regional educational partners through the Northwest Ohio Educational Partners Consortium, receiving a new grant in the amount of \$82,562. The grant, from the Ohio Board of Regents **Regionally Aligned Priorities** in Delivering Skills Program (RAPIDS), was established to provide workforce development efforts for the region. This new grant is a continuation of a multi-phase project supported by the Department of Higher Education, with a 2014 Biennium allocation of \$2 million.

Utilizing current and previous funding, the grant partners continually develop training programs which include equipment that is portable and can be brought to various sites throughout the region for workforce training. The training supports manufacturing plants, food-pro-

cessing plants, refineries, power plants, water treatment facilities and more. The training involves Mechatronics, Process Control, and IT/ Cyber Security.

"The RAPIDS program was the catalyst for our regional educational partners to come together for the first time as a unified educational body and create a consortium," stated Todd Hernandez, Vice President for Innovation at Northwest State. The Northwest Ohio Regional Training Hub (NORTH) program made some key determinations through internal research and inventory, as well as conversations with key employers and decision-makers throughout the region. "Given our manufacturing strengths and the new advanced manufacturing technologies, we are confident that the NORTH program concept will effectively address the pressing workforce development needs in Northwest Ohio," concluded Hernandez.

The initial RAPIDS Grant provided funding to develop training materials and purchase equipment that is housed in two training trailers, to be used as portable classrooms that can move to various sites as needed. The trailers are housed at University of Toledo Scott Park Campus when not in use.

The RAPIDS grant is a combined effort between the University of Toledo, Bowling Green State University, Penta Career Center (Rossford), Terra State Community College (Fremont), Rhodes State College (Lima), Owens Community College (Perrysburg) and Northwest State Community College (Archbold).

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

LATTA INTRODUCES THE **INFO ACT TO COMBAT OPIOID CRISIS**

Congressman Bob Latta (R-Bowling Green) has introduced the Indexing Narcotics, Fentanyl, and Opioids (INFO) Act to improve and make available important data on the opioid crisis and the effect of federal efforts to combat the epidemic. The INFO Act would establish a public electronic database that would compile information on federal efforts to stop the opioid crisis. The information would be used to help federal, state, and local officials develop the most effective strategies to prevent addiction, treat those hat are addicted, and keep prescription drugs from falling into the wrong hands. The INFO Act would also track federal funding being used to combat the epidemic. "Communities in Ohio and around the nation continue to suffer from the rise of opioid abuse and addiction," said Latta. "While the magnitude of this crisis is evident in the number of opioid-related deaths, we're still lacking basic information on the effectiveness of federal programs and other efforts. In order to develop the best plans to attack this problem, we need the best information. The INFO Act would improve data collection relating to addiction, prescription guidelines, treatment, pain management, patterns of abuse, and other



FORMER FISCAL OFFICER RESPONSIBLE FOR \$8K IN FEDERAL PENALTIES

A former fiscal officer of the Village of New Madison (Darke County) stuck taxpayers with more than \$8,000 in federal penalties that resulted from her sluggishness.

An audit released by Auditor of State Dave Yost shows that Wanda Lacey was consistently late in remitting federal, state and school district income taxes, and filing quarterly tax reports during 2013 and 2014.

Although Lacey properly withheld the required taxes, she delayed paying federal withholdings for the second half of 2013 and all of 2014 until July 2015. By the end of 2014, the amount owed to the IRS had ballooned to \$23,894 for back taxes, in addition to \$8,166 in penalties and interest.

"This innovative partnership highlights Citi's commitment to sustainable growth and to consequences of her negligence," Auditor Yost said. "She could have avoided these penalties by simply doing her job."

At the same time, the village sat on \$3,362 in state and school district income taxes that Lacey withheld but failed to pay to the Ohio Department of Taxation.

Auditors issued an \$8,166 finding for recovery against Lacey and her bonding company for the federal penalties and referred the state matters to the Ohio Department of Taxation.

"The payment of penalties and late charges is not considered to serve a proper public purpose and would have been avoided had the funds been remitted as required by law," auditors wrote.

(OCSWA) are promoting Winter Safety Awareness Week, November 12-18. During this week, Gov. Kasich encourages homes and businesses to update their safety plans, replenish supplies in their emergency kits, and prepare themselves, their vehicles and property for winter-related incidents.

"Winter Safety Awareness Week is the perfect time to start preparing your homes and vehicles for winter," said Ohio EMA Executive Director Sima Merick. "Because of the warmer weather we had last winter, parts of Ohio experienced thunderstorms, damaging winds and flooding. And just Sunday, Ohio experienced severe thunderstorms, tornadoes and flash flooding. So, regardless of the season, it's best for Ohioans to be prepared for all severe weather."

OCSWA recommends the following winter preparedness tips:

Prepare your home for winter. Remove and cut away low-hanging and dead tree branches. Strong winds, ice and snow can cause tree limbs to break and could cause damage to your home. Have your gutters cleaned. Snow and ice can build up quickly if clogged with debris.

Practice fire safety and prevention. With winter months and the holiday season, people are indoors more, and cook, decorate and entertain more - which unfortunately, can lead to more home fires. The best protection is to have working smoke detectors in the home. Test your smoke detectors monthly. Conduct fire drills. Change the batteries in you smoke and carbon monoxide detectors twice a year - when you change your clocks, change your batteries. Have auxiliary heaters, furnaces and fireplaces checked or serviced before using. Cooking-related fires are the number one cause of home fires. Never leave cooking food unattended. Keep towels, potholders, paper away from the stove's heat sources. Prepare winter emergency supplies kits for the home and vehicle. Check the expiration dates on nonperishable food items, bottled water/beverages and medications. Winter emergency kits should include flashlights, extra batteries, blankets, coats, hats, gloves, a battery-operated radio/ Weather Radio, first aid kit, cell phone and charger, and enough nonperishable food and water (one gallon per

person, per day) to sustain every household member for several days. Have stored food, bottled water and supplies for your pets, as well.


Check on your neighbors. Comprehensive preparedness requires whole communities to participate in a "Neighbors Helping Neighbors" approach. If severe weather is forcasted or has just occurred, or if your neighborhood has an extended power outage, check on your neighbors and family members - especially those who are older or have functional needs - to ensure that they are okay and that they have the resources to stay safe and warm. Your communication plan might include exchanging phone numbers to call during times of need.

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

ODOT SNOW-FIGHTING FLEET READY FOR WINTER

Each of the Ohio Department of Transportation's 1,629 trucks is receiving a 150-point check as part of the department's annual county-by-county operational readiness inspections. This allows ODOT's 262 mechanics to ensure snow-fighting equipment is in top shape before the snow begins to fall.

'It is our intention to be the standard of excellence for winter maintenance. Removing snow and ice from our roads and highways is extremely important and our most visible function," said ODOT Director Jerry Wray. "The men and women of ODOT take great pride in making sure our roads are clear for safe travel."

ODOT measures the success of snow removal by looking at the percent of priority routes that recovered speeds within two hours of a snow event. Last winter, our crews met this goal 98 percent of the time.

Last year, ODOT's snow plow trucks were driven 6,860,696 miles plowing and pretreating roadways. That's like 275 trips around the Earth. Crews used 600,451 tons of salt and 12,056,596 gallons of liquid deicers to treat 43,479 lane miles of roadway.

While we work hard to clear snow and ice, we need your help as well. ODOT plows were struck 35 times in 2016. Please be sure to give our drivers plenty of room to work. Plow trucks typically drive much slower than other traffic, so be extra alert when driving near them.

You can monitor real-time traffic conditions, more than 600 live traffic cameras, and get customized traffic alerts with ODOT's free mobile app -OHGO. The app is available on the App Store and Google Play.

The World Health Organization (WHO) has released regardrecommendations ing the use of antibiotics in agriculture. Dr. Chavonda Jacobs-Young, USDA Acting Chief Scientist, today issued the following statement:

"The WHO guidelines are not in alignment with U.S. policy and are not supported by sound science. The recommendations erroneously conflate disease prevention with growth promotion in animals."

"The WHO previously requested that the standards for on-farm antibiotic use in animals be updated through a transparent, consensus, science-based process of CODEX. "Under current Food and Drug Administration (FDA) policy, medically important antibiotics should not be used for growth promotion in animals. In the U.S., the FDA allows for the use of antimicrobial drugs in treating, controlling, and preventing disease in food-producing animals under the professional oversight of licensed veterinarians. While the WHO guidelines acknowledge the role of veterinarians, they would also impose unnecessary and unrealistic constraints on their professional judgement."

Without a doubt, there are some quite amazing animals that call Ohio home but do vou know the native animals of Ohio? There are the obvious species that come to mind, but I am sure there will be some that surprise you. Over a series of articles, I hope to introduce you to some of nature's most magnificent and not so magnificent creatures that call Ohio home. Perhaps you will learn a new fact about an animal you already know or learn about one you didn't even know lived around here.

With each article, there will be two or three animals featured. The first installment will feature the wild turkey with Thanksgiving quickly approaching along with the white-tailed deer.

First, we will feature the wild turkey. According to the Ohio Department of Natural Resources (ODNR), the wild turkey is the largest upland game bird in the state of Ohio standing at four feet tall and weighing up to twenty-four pounds. At the turn of the 20th century, the wild turkey was nearly extinct in the state. ODNR writes that this is attributed to the expansion



of settlement and destruction of their habitat. The wild turkey served as a main food and sport creature for the early Native Americans that settled in Ohio.

Overall, wild turkeys can be identified with an overall dark tint to their feathers with a bronze or green color mixed into their feathers. Adult male turkeys are known as gobblers and can be identified by a reddish head, a tasseled "beard" that hangs from the breast, black tipped feathers, and spurs on the legs according to ODNR. Males will have big and flashy feathers while the females will not. Females are known as hens and can be identified by a blue head, no beard, no spurs, and bufftipped breasts according to ODNR. During the mating season, the courting male will puff himself into a big feathery ball fill the air with their quite loud gobbling along with their showy feathers to attract a female mate.

The wild turkey is an animal that tends to travel in groups. According to Cornell University, a flock, or group of turkeys, will travel together to search the surface for nuts, berries, insects, and snails. Their strong feet are used to

scratch the ground surface to move leaves out of the way as they are searching for food. During the night, turkeys will fly up in their flocks and roost in trees.

That is one fact unique to the wild turkey that it can fly while the domesticated turkey cannot. Another distinguishing characteristic between the wild turkey and the domesticated turkey is the feather color. Unlike wild turkeys, domesticated turkeys that you find on your Thanksgiving table are a pure white color.

Generally, wild turkeys are found in forested areas but it is not uncommon to find them in fence rows and along the edges of fields. According to Cornell University, it is also not uncommon to find them along roads or in backyards that border a wooded area.

White Tailed Deer

Certainly, many of us have encountered a white-tailed deer sometime when driving on area roadways. They have two colors to their fur, it is a reddish-brown color with short hairs in the summer which fades to a grayish- brown color in the winter with heavy and long hairs, according to the Ohio Department of Natural Resources. The deer will generally be found in the forest but can also be found near most farmland and in swamps. If you have a yard that borders a woodland, chances are they frequent your backyard!

The White-Tailed Deer is known as Ohio's only big game animal. It was an important animal for the Native Americans who used the antlers for tools/weapons, the meat for food, and the fur for clothing. Some terminology to know with the deer is that the male is known as a buck, the female is a doe, and the baby deer is known as a fawn. The male is the only member of the white-tailed deer species that will have antlers, which will regrow every year.

Deer commonly will eat mainly plants and plant parts such as twigs, leaves, and branches but also things such as corn, grass, and alfalfa. According to ODNR, whitetailed deer are commonly active at dawn or dusk which proves to be a hazard for us as humans during their breeding season which takes place in the fall. Mating activities start in mid-October with the bucks on the hunt for does. ODNR reminds us to be on alert from October through December when traveling through areas marked with deer crossing signs.

The deer and the wild turkey are just some of the many amazing animals that we have living around Ohio, but there are so many more! Stay tuned for part two of this series in a few weeks where we will feature the beaver and the fox!

E&C COMMITTEE HOLDS LEGISLATIVE HEARING ON LATTA-AUTHORED DRAFT **TO MODERNIZE ENERGY STAR PROGRAM**

A discussion draft authored by Congressman Bob Latta (R-Bowling Green) to modernize the Energy Star program was one of the main focuses of an Energy and Commerce (E&C) subcommittee hearing. The E&C Subcommittee on Energy hearing examined the effects of that draft legislation, the Energy Star Reform Act, along with one other energy bill. The Energy Star Reform Act incorporates previous legislation by Latta that would protect consumers and strengthen the program, and the draft would also lead to a more open and transparent process for setting standards.

Latta said at the hearing, "The Energy Star program has been a win-win for consumers and manufacturers over the past twenty-five years. This program has proven to be a successful tool in advancing the development and use of energy efficient technologies. It has also promoted economic expansion and job growth for participating manufacturers across the nation, including many in my home state of Ohio.'

He continued, "The Energy Star program is widely recognized by consumers and has seen major investments by the manufacturing community over the past two decades. The updates we are considering today are important for ensuring that this program remains strong."

The Energy Star program, which was created in 1992, is a voluntary program run by the Environmental Protection Agency and the Department of Energy. The program allows manufacturers to obtain ENERGY STAR labeling for products if specific energy saving guidelines are met, benefitting consumers that are looking to purchase energy efficient products.

The Energy Star Reform Act specifically:

Makes the Department of Energy the permanent lead agency of the Energy



EACS' lead among Allen County schools in the inclusion of e-cigarettes/vaping in its smokefree workplace policy as Tobacco Free Allen County staffers researched our county's school corporations' stances on the use of e-cigarettes and vaping devices on school property.

"It was a real pleasure to be able to recognize EACS's leadership in this area and we hope that it will inspire other school corporations to follow suit", said Nancy Cripe, Executive Director.

As a community partner of the Indiana State Department of Health Tobacco Prevention and Cessation Commission, Tobacco Free Allen County works to prevent tobacco use, promote tobacco cessation, and protect non-users from exposure to tobacco toxins in our county, whether it be at work, in public spaces or at school. Part of

the work consists of assisting governing bodies to draft and enact policies to prevent exposure to secondhand e-cigarette chemicals and protect youth from initiation to nicotine addiction through such novel devices.

E-cigarettes/vaping devices have been marketed as both cessation aids and a safe alternative to conventional tobacco cigarettes, with no scientific backing for those claims. The limited research that exists does not justify either. Such marketing messages are not lost on our youth, however, who are drawn in by the "safer" claim; the novelty of the devices; the 7000+ flavorings of the solutions they contain; their "hi-tech" look; their versatile, customizable features; and erroneous reassurances that it's "just water vapor" being emitted.

From 2007 to 2014, rates of e-cigarette use among teens skyrocketed--in stark contrast to steadily declining rates of conventional cigarette use among teens.* According

to the national Youth Tobacco Survey, administered in each state biennially, e-cigarette use tripled among middle and high school students in the two years between 2012 and 2014. While a dip in their use was shown on the 2016 Youth Tobacco Survey**, vaping devices remain the number one tobacco product currently used by teens, nationwide and in Indiana.

Cripe said, "This fact makes EACS' Board's foresight in getting out ahead of this new form of tobacco use especially noteworthy. It is crucial that our young people know that their school community leaders are committed to protecting them from toxic exposures. Of equal importance is for them to know that pro-health behaviors are their community's norm and that the adults charged with overseeing their academic and civic development care to protect them from a lifetime of nicotine addiction".



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
