PAULDING COUNTY FIRE DEPARTMENTS RECEIVE \$300,000+ GRANT

The Paulding County Fire Departments with the Paulding County Emergency Management Agency recently announced receiving a grant from the Ohio State Fire Marshall for new MARCS radios (Multi-Agency Radio Communication System).

The MARCS radios enable the counties to talk directly to the state or to anywhere else in the state either with shared groups or other means. This advanced system of communication is much stronger than the VHF bands and communication is much greater between the groups and can be programmed to communicate with other

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counties and departments nearby.

The grant request was written by EMA Director Ed Bohn with the help of the fire chiefs from the various townships and villages and it was submitted on November 13th.

The State Fire Marshal is Jeff Hussey and it came up on Thursday, March 1st to present the check to the county to be used for the new MARCS radio equipment. They were glad to receive the check and they asked Jeff about the advantages and integration of the 883.

Sheriff Landers spoke up that the Paulding County Sheriff's Office was also get-

ting new MARCS radios after it applied for grants and they 883 VHF will still be working for the foreseeable future alongside MARCS.

There is a \$20 per year fee for each radio to county and local authorities. The state has supplemented the fees to bring the cost down to \$10. This fee helps to manage and maintain the radios towers and maintenance that the counties cannot always afford. The grants should cover the fees each year so it will end up costing the emergency agencies nothing.

Sitter is an instructional program that teaches girls and boys how to handle emergencies when caring for young children. Classes incorporate basic first aid skills, CPR, how to change diapers, how to screen babysitting jobs to decide which ones to accept and which ones to decline and how and when to talk to a 9-1-1 dispatcher.

The classes are taught by Lutheran Children's Hospital staff and prepare babysitters to confidently handle normal situations and crises. The training also dives into how to be safe with social media (Continued on Page 11)

USDA INVESTS IN E-CON-NECTIVITY TO RESTORE RURAL PROSPERITY BY PROVIDING TRAINING AND HEALTH CARE SERVICES

Assistant to the Secretary for Rural Development Anne Hazlett announced that USDA is investing in e-connectivity which will provide virtual access to job training, educational, and health care opportunities for rural communities.

"Under Secretary Perdue's leadership, USDA is committed to being a strong partner in creating rural prosperity," Hazlett said. "Connecting rural Americans to quality education and health care

services is an innovative and important tool in our efforts to facilitate economic growth, job creation and quality of life in rural America."

USDA is awarding 72.

USDA is awarding 72 grants totaling \$23.6 million through the Distance Learning and Telemedicine (DLT) Grant Program. This program invests in equipment that uses broadband to help rural communities connect to educational and health care services. These vital services are part of the foundation of a high quality of life and enable communities to overcome the effects of remoteness and low population density by connecting them to the rest of the world through high-speed internet.

The grants are supporting projects based in Alaska, Alabama, Arizona, California, Colorado, Georgia, Illinois, Indiana, Kentucky, Louisiana, Maine, Michigan, Minnesota, Mississippi, Missouri, Nebraska, New Mexico, New York, North Carolina, Oklahoma, South Carolina, South Dakota, Tennessee, Texas, Vermont, Virginia, Washington, and West Virginia.

Several recipients will use the grants to help address two of the nation's most urgent needs: opioid abuse treatment and mental health counseling. USDA recognizes that modernizing healthcare access for such recovery resources is vital to addressing rural prosperity.

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Lincoln Community Hospital and Nursing Home is

receiving a \$265,622 grant to establish a telemedicine network between hospitals and clinics in Colorado serving more than 20,000 residents in Adams, Cheyenne, Kit Carson, Lincoln and Phillips counties. Improved medical services include behavioral health, post-operative care and care management for chronic conditions. Mobile clinics will provide medical services at patients' homes and will provide access to specialty care and tele-stroke services. Additionally, the telemedicine connections will help emergency departments at Lincoln Memorial Hospital's behavioral health providers assess behavioral health issues more rapidly and move patients in crisis out of the departments and into more appropriate care settings.

Southern Tier Health Care Systems, Inc. in Olean, N.Y., is receiving a \$132,899 grant to deploy telecommunications equipment to help train and certify emergency responders dealing with opioid overdoses. Southern Tier will connect to four end-user sites in Salamanca, Cuba, Franklin and Gerry. The project will support education for emergency response personnel at the Allegany Indian Reservation Volunteer Fire Department and at community service agencies in Allegany, Cattaraugus and Chautauqua

In April 2017, President Donald J. Trump established the Interagency Task Force on Agriculture and Rural Prosperity to identify legislative, regulatory and policy changes that could promote agriculture and prosperity in rural communities. As Secretary of Agriculture, Sonny Perdue was selected to serve as chairman of the Task Force, which includes more than 22 federal agencies as well as local leaders, executive departments, and offices. Over the course of six months, Secretary Perdue travelled to 30 states to listen to the voice of rural America

and gather recommendations from citizens, farmers, and business leaders throughout the country. He held countless meetings with partner Federal agencies, and consulted with industry experts.

In January 2018, Secretary Perdue presented the Task Force's findings to President Trump, which included 31 recommendations to align the federal government with state, local and tribal governments to take advantage of opportunities that exist in rural America. NSCC ANNOUNCES COM-PREHENSIVE CASE MAN-AGEMENT AND EMPLOY-MENT PROGRAM (CCMEP) WITH JOB AND FAMILY **SERVICES**

Northwest State Community College is pleased to announce a new partnership with Wood County (OH) Job and Family Services (JFS) on a Comprehensive Case Management and Employment Program (CCMEP). The program, targeting area youth ages 14-24 who are below the poverty level, is designed to provide the necessary rehabilitation, supportive services, training and education to enable those individuals to enter the workforce and obtain living wage jobs (\$15-\$17 per hour.) The partnership also includes participation from Auglaize, Defiance, Henry, Paulding and Wil-

liams counties.

As part of the partnership, Northwest State will hire two full-time employees - one focusing on employer and job placement, the other focusing primarily on recruiting program participants, employer recruitment and on-the-job training program management. Both employees would focus on identifying participants and placing them in NSCC programs. JFS will provide the funding for all associated costs of the employees, including equipment, supplies and travel costs. JFS may fund tuition and training fees for participants to take the NSCC programs, and may also fund customized curriculum development that employers request for program participants. 'Northwest State is ex-

cited about this partnership because it strengthens our ongoing efforts to bridge the skills gap in our region, and provide more opportunities to a still-underserved population," said Todd Hernandez, Vice President of Innovation for Northwest State. "No single entity or institution will be able to address the skills gap in our region, but this partnership is another example of how the different agencies in our region are finding ways to work together to strengthen northwest Ohio," Hernandez



LATTA QUESTIONS DEA ABOUT EFFORTS TO CURB OPIOID EPIDEMIC AT E&C **COMMITTEE HEARING**

At an Energy and Commerce Subcommittee on Health hearing, Congressman Bob Latta (R-Bowling Green) questioned an official from the Drug Enforcement Agency (DEA) about law enforcement efforts to combat the opioid epidemic and coordination between the agency and the Department of Health and Human Services (HHS). The hearing, entitled

"Combatting the Opioid Cri-

sis: Helping Communities Balance Enforcement and Patient Safety," focused on finding solutions to the epidemic that is prevalent in communities across the country. The hearing kicks off a push by the Energy and Commerce Committee to pass legislation addressing the opioid crisis in the coming months. Latta has introduced the INFO Act, legislation that would improve the collection and availability of data relating to opioids.

'The opioid epidemic has hit Ohio hard and overdoses across the state continue to rise," said Latta. "Finding solutions needs to be a priority here in Congress, and that's why it's so important that the Energy and Commerce Committee is beginning a fullcourt press to get legislation to the President's desk to curb the abuse of opioids, treat those that are addicted to drugs, and hold accountable those that bring illicit drugs into our communities. Today, we heard valuable testimony that will be essential as we try to improve coordination between federal agencies, state and local governments, law enforcement, health care pro-

fessionals, and advocates." Latta led off his questions to DEA Deputy Assistant Attorney Susan Gibson from the agency's Diversion Control Division by asking about DEA's coordination with HHS and followed up by asking about what DEA is doing to stop the importation of fentanyl.

Latte's introduction of the INFO Act continues his work on an issue that has greatly impacted Ohio. In 2016, Ohio had a 32 percent increase in deaths from the previous year with 4,050 losing their life from unintentional drug overdose. Initial statistics

DAYTON DUNBAR RE-MOVED FROM OHSAA BOYS BASKETBALL TOURNAMENT

Dayton Dunbar High School was removed from the Ohio High School Athletic Association boys basketball tournament Wednesday after the OHSAA confirmed Dunbar used an ineligible player in a tournament game. By rule, Dunbar will be replaced on the bracket by the most recent team it defeated in the tournament, which is Dayton Thurgood Marshall High School. The ineligibility stems

from a bench-clearing fight on January 10 during a regular-season game between Dunbar and Thurgood Marshall. Seven Dunbar players left the bench during the altercation, but the school failed to suspend the players for two games, which is mandated by national rule. The OHSAA made seven documented attempts to communicate with the school regarding the mandated suspensions. However, the suspensions were not served, resulting in forfeiture and removal from the tournament when one of the ineligible players participated in a tournament game.

Thurgood Marshall players also left the bench during the January 10 fight, but the school properly suspended those players in consultation with school administrators and the district athletic administrator.

"We never want to remove a team from the tournament, but the school's inability to follow proper procedure and communicate is disturbing," said Dr. Dan Ross, OHSAA Executive Director. "Sitting out two games for fighting, or leaving the bench during a fight, is a rule that all our coaches and schools know. It's a rule that we communicate many times each season. We are disappointed that the school could not follow through with our repeated attempts to bring a resolution to this matter in the last seven weeks."

Dunbar is therefore publicly reprimanded for lack of administrative responsibility and institutional control for failure to properly respond to this issue. Because this occurred while Dayton Public Schools, including Dunbar, are already serving penalties for a previous incident from October 2016, the OHSAA will meet soon with school and district administrators to discuss the matter further.







low-up investigations after the deer gun season. Officer Teders discovered an abnormal tagging history for a hunter from Pennsylvania. During the investigation, it was determined that the hunter was leasing property during peak rut and hunting without a non-resident hunting license and a deer permit. The investigation uncovered that this hunt-

er had been hunting the last

two years without the proper

permits and tags. The hunt-

er would only purchase the

tags after harvesting a deer.

Multiple charges were filed

in Licking County Municipal

Court, which included hunting without a hunting license, hunting without a deer permit, and providing false data to game check. The hunter returned to Licking County and was arraigned by Judge Higgins. The hunter was found guilty and was ordered to serve 10 days in jail and had a 3-year hunting license revocation. He was ordered to pay \$1,317 in fines and court costs and forfeited two antlered deer skulls. In addition to the hunting license suspension, the hunter's name was entered into the Wildlife Violator Compact. Each state in the compact will then review the charges and could possibly revoke his hunting

privileges within their state. Northwest Ohio - Wildlife District Two

In August of 2017, Lake Erie Investigator Kevin Good and State Wildlife Officer Nathan Kaufmann, assigned to Huron County, were working on Lake Erie. Wildlife Communication Specialist Meredith Gilbert was also on board that day learning about sport

The officers advised him that he was in Ohio, and he needed to have an Ohio fishing license. He responded by shouting to the officers, "how am I supposed to know I'm in Ohio?" The officers informed him that the channel marker he was casting near was clearly in Ohio. The angler's boat was also equipped with two large GPS chart plotters that showed their location. season, State Wildlife Officer Eric VonAlmen, assigned to Wood County, observed two men hunting at Metzger Marsh Wildlife Area. Both men shot at a pair of large ducks that were not teal, killing one of the birds. Officer VonAlmen contacted the hunters in the marsh and determined that the duck that had been shot was a mallard. The officer also discovered a pied billed grebe in their boat, which the hunters had harvested earlier that morning. Both of the birds were seized as evidence and each hunter received a summons in Oregon Municipal Court. They each paid \$142 in fines and court costs.

Northeast Ohio - Wildlife District Three

While patrolling along the banks of the Ohio River, State Wildlife Officer Craig Porter, assigned to Jefferson County, and State Wildlife Officer Nick Turner, assigned to Harrison County, observed numerous individuals fishing. Officer Porter contacted a group and noticed that one of the men appeared very nervous. The man stated that he had left his fishing license at home. After obtaining his driver's license, Officer Porter quickly realized that he was the brother of an individual who recently had his residence searched by the ODNR Division of Wildlife. Officer Porter met with Officer Turner and advised him of the situation. It was also relayed from dispatch that the man did not possess a valid fishing license and had an active warrant out of Jefferson County. He was arrested and escorted back to Officer Porter's patrol vehicle. The subject was issued a summons for fishing without a license and transported to the Jefferson County Iail He was later convicted in court of fishing without a license and ordered to pay \$200 in fines and court

State Wildlife Officer Jesse Janosik, assigned to Columbiana County, received a call from a landowner who had observed lights in a field late at night, and had found entrails from a deer the following day. Officer Janosik arrived on scene and located vehicle tracks leading in the field. As he was leaving the area, he noticed a vehicle in a neighboring driveway with what appeared to be deer blood on the rear bumper. Officer Janosik contacted the homeowner and through the investigation determined that the landowner's friend had illegally shot a 20-point

costs.

permit and attempted to game check it in as a landowner harvest. A few weeks later during the deer gun season, Officer Janosik was called to the same area about an individual who had shot across the roadway. When he arrived, he found a dead Cooper's hawk. The results of the investigation revealed that the homeowner with the truck in the driveway Officer Janosik had contact several weeks earlier had killed the bird. Both men were eventually charged with multiple wildlife offenses and ordered to appear in the Columbiana County Municipal Court. The individual who attempted to cover up his friend's illegal harvest and shot the Cooper's hawk was convicted and ordered to pay \$370 in fines and court costs. The man who illegally harvested the white-tailed deer was convicted and ordered to pay \$685 in fines and court costs. In addition, his hunting privileges were revoked, and he was placed on probation for 1 year. The white-tailed deer was forfeited to the ODNR Division of Wildlife.

Southeast Ohio - Wildlife District Four In December 2016, State

Wildlife Officer Brad St. Clair,

assigned to Noble County, investigated a violation involving an individual hunting without permission and shooting a deer from a public roadway. Eyewitnesses provided valuable information about the incident and the identity of the individual. The individual had left the scene and went to his residence in Licking County. Officer St. Clair forwarded the information about the incident to State Wildlife Officers Patrick Muldovan, assigned to Licking County, and Tony Zerkle, assigned to Fairfield County, who contacted the individual at his residence. The individual was issued multiple citations for the violations, and the deer he unlawfully harvested was seized as evidence. The individual later failed to appear in the Noble County Court and a warrant was issued for his arrest. In October 2017, the individual was stopped in Licking County for a traffic violation and was arrested for the warrant. Following his arrest, the individual was transported to Noble County where he appeared in front of the judge. He was found guilty of the wildlife violations and was ordered to pay \$592 in fines and in court costs. In addition, his hunting license was suspended for one year. The individual was given credit for the three days served in iail. The deer was forfeited to the ODNR Division of Wildlife.

Wildlife Investigator Heath Horn was contacted about an abandoned safe that a Division of Wildlife employee had found on Kinnikinnick Wildlife Area in Ross County. Investigator Horn arrived on site and observed a small safe with a bent key in it. He contacted the Ross County Sheriff's Office to have their K9 unit respond. Upon arriving, the handler worked the K9 in the area to be sure the item was safe to open. Once the scene was clear, the safe was opened. There was nothing in the safe, but the K9 handler agreed that it was a good idea to use caution with this item. The Ross County

He gave the officers a description of the vehicle, which they located. Officers Keller and Levering spoke with both the driver and front seat passenger. The driver stated that he was only driving the van and not using the spotlight. The passenger stated that he had pointed the red light out of the driver's side window and turned it on to locate white-tailed deer. During their contact with the vehicle's occupants, the officers located a cocked crossbow in the back of the van. No bolt was present in but several bolts had been removed from the quiver and were resting beside the crossbow. The front passenger claimed ownership of the crossbow and said that he had harvested an 11-point buck earlier that morning. He stated that the deer carcass was back at their camp. State Wildlife Officers James Carnes, assigned to Highland County, and Matt Hunt, assigned to Greene County, joined Officers Keller and Levering for the investigation at the hunting camp. Once there, the officers located the skull plate and antlers of the buck that the hunter had harvested earlier that morning. Further investigation by the officers revealed that the deer was not checked in before he began to remove the skin, head, or other parts of the deer After the field investigation, the red tactical light and the crossbow were seized as evidence. The hunter was issued one summons for jack-lighting and one summons for removing the head and skin of a deer before game checking. He appeared in the Adams County Court and was ordered to pay \$1,650 in fines and court costs.

The man admitted that he had killed that buck during the 2016 deer gun season and had not checked it in. He was issued seven summonses, including hunting without a deer permit, hunting without permission, failing to game check a deer (two counts), killing a deer with an illegal hunting implement, and hunting with the aid of a motor vehicle (two counts). The man was found guilty on all charges and was ordered to pay \$2,175 in fines, court costs, and restitution. Lane found spent 20-gauge shells at one spot and spent 12-gauge shells at another. Officer Stewart determined there was only one 20-gauge and only one person using the 12-gauge ammo that matched the spent shells found by Officer Lane. In addition, the 20-gauge was found to be unplugged. The officers cited the two hunters for liter and the hunter with the 20-gauge received an additional citation for the unplugged gun. Each of the two hunters received 20 hours of community service and \$250 in fines for the litter violations. The hunter with the 20-gauge paid in additional \$125 in fines for the unplugged gun.

Southwest Ohio - Wildlife

District Five

State Wildlife Investigator Ryan Garrison received information that an employee at a business in Darke County was illegally selling white-tailed deer meat. Investigators made contact and obtained information that the suspect was also attempting to purchase deer meat from a processor in another state and sell that venison in Ohio. At a later date State Wildlife Officer Timothy Rourke, assigned to Shelby County, interviewed the suspect at his place of employment. The man admitted to selling wild white-tailed deer meat at work for several years and that he profited by \$870 from those sales. He also admitted that he and a co-worker killed two deer that year on a relative's property and they both sold venison from those two deer. The out-of-state processor was identified and it was later revealed that the suspect purchased one hundred sticks of wild white-tailed deer summer sausage from the processor and was in the process of selling that deer meat. Investigators located the summer sausage in the refrigerator at the suspect's place of employment. Investigator Garrison and an officer from the other state's DNR interviewed owners at the out-of-state processor regarding the sale of deer meat to the suspect. The processor admitted to illegally selling left over wild white-tailed deer meat from customers' deer. A total of 11 charges were filed in Darke and Jackson counties. The two suspects were ordered to pay a total of \$2,897.27 in fines, court costs, and restitution. Additionally, each lost their privileges to hunt for three years. A total of 78 sticks of summer sausage were seized in addition to other wild white-tailed deer meat. All evidence was forfeited to the ODNR Division of Wildlife and all meat that had been professionally processed was donated to lo-

HUSTED ANNOUNCES UCC WATCHLIST TO CURB FRAUDULENT BUSINESS FILINGS

Ohio Secretary of State Jon Husted announced the launch of the Uniform Commercial Code (UCC) Watchlist, the latest in an ongoing effort to improve the services offered by the Secretary of State's Office and protect Ohioans from

potential fraudulent filings. The new service is expected to curb instances when fraudulent UCC filings are submitted by disgruntled customers or individuals. These types of filings can negatively impact a person's credit history, personal finances and often require a substantial amount of time and resources to resolve in court. Fraudulent filings can also mischaracterize good-standing companies, putting their assets at risk and pulling their focus and energy away from growing their business.

"We have worked very hard in recent years to bring more accountability and efficiency to the services we provide for Ohio's businesses," Secretary Husted said. "The Watchlist has the potential to put Ohio a step ahead in serving its businesses and curbing fraudulent activity."

UCC statements are notices filed by creditors to declare an interest in the personal property of debtors. In Ohio, the notices are uploaded to the Secretary of State's website and may be active for a period of five years or longer. Nearly 100 percent of UCC statements are now filed online - improving overall efficiency

PATROL CONTINUES FOCUS ON IMPAIRED DRIVING ARRESTS IN 2018

As part of the Patrol's ongoing effort to contribute to a safer Ohio, troopers are continuing to focus on impaired driving enforcement - and these efforts are paying off. OVI-related crashes accounted for 34 percent of all fatal crashes in Ohio in 2017, a decrease from 2016.

In 2017, there were 14,389 OVI-related crashes on Ohio

roadways, killing 397 people and injuring 8,803 others. During that same period, troopers removed over 27,000 impaired drivers from Ohio roadways.

Of drivers considered at-

fault in OVI-related crashes,

52 percent were between the

were male. Male drivers were

also the recipients of 73 percent of OVI citations written. 'We need motorists to commit to keeping our roads safe by planning ahead, designating a sober driver and insisting that everyone in the vehicle is buckled up," said Lt. Bob Ashenfelter. "You can help by asking friends and

family to do the same." Last year, state troopers from the Defiance Post, arrested 207 impaired drivers in this area.

SPECIAL REPORT DETAILS COSTS, DANGERS OF NON-COMPLIANCE IN OHIO'S MEDICAID PROGRAM

Medicaid providers who are unqualified or lack records to justify payments for services have repaid only a fraction of the tens of millions of dollars they owe to the state, according to a special report released today by Auditor of State Dave Yost.

The report highlights the costs and dangers citizens face when Medicaid providers disregard the regulations put in place to prevent fraud and inadequate care. Legislation introduced in the fall with the support of Auditor Yost aims to curb these risks with tougher safeguards for high-risk providers.

"For too long, dishonest providers have exploited vulnerabilities in the Medicaid program with little consequence," Auditor Yost said. "A stronger system of controls is necessary to protect the program's vital resources and the citizens who need them most."

In the past seven years, the Auditor of State's office has performed compliance examinations of 133 Medicaid providers, flagging \$33.3 million in improper payments and calculating an additional \$2.4 million in interest. The payments typically result from providers charging for care they are not certified to provide or for services that lack supporting documentation.

À recent follow-up analysis of 60 of those providers disclosed that they have repaid only 9.6 percent (\$1.9M) of the \$19.7 million they owe back to the Ohio Department of Medicaid (ODM). Most of the cases for the remaining providers are still pending.

With millions of users and more than 110,000 active providers, Ohio's Medicaid program accounts for the largest share of the state's financial resources with 39.3 percent of all fund appropriations earmarked for Medicaid spending in the 2018-19 biennium. In 2016 alone, ODM paid business and individual care providers \$22.3 billion for their services.

The special report, Ohioans at Risk: Noncompliance in Ohio's Medicaid Program Poses Dangers, Wastes Tax Dollars, is part of Auditor Yost's continued efforts to foster a culture of accountability in state and local government. Those efforts include work on

Senate Bill 218, introduced in October by Sen. Peggy Lehner, to target providers that are at the greatest risk for improper billings.

While transportation and home health providers only make up between 13 and 17 percent of the total providers in the Medicaid program, they account for more than 86 percent (\$28.7 million) of the \$33.3 million in overpayments identified since 2011.

The bill, which awaits its first committee hearing, would require these types of providers to obtain surety bonds that would help the state recover losses caused by fraud and improper payments. Indiana, Texas, Florida and New York use a similar approach.

It also would require them to complete training in billing, records retention and Medicaid compliance before becoming certified to provide Medicaid services. According to the report, both areas of the Medicaid program have shown signs of rapid growth in recent years and have minimum qualification requirements compared to other types of providers.

"Make no mistake, transportation and home health providers deliver critical services that countless Ohioans rely on every single day," Auditor Yost said. "But limited safeguards for these fields have given rise to widespread abuse and improper billing costing tens of millions of dol-
