BANKS PRAISES PAS-SAGE OF 2019 NATIONAL DEFENSE AUTHORIZATION ACT

Congressman Jim Banks (IN-03), a member of the House Armed Services Committee and a core member of the Fiscal Year 2019 National Defense Authorization Act (NDAA) conference committee, praised the bill's passage by the House of Representatives.

"With strong bipartisan support, Congress continued to make tremendous progress to provide the resources and authorities necessary to rebuild our military," said Banks. "In order to ad tress today's challenges and tomorrow's uncertainties, we must have the most lethal joint force with cutting-edge capabilities so that no potential adversary would even consider challenging us. The 2018 Harlan Days commenced this past weekend to much fanfare as the Parade culminated the weekend on Saturday, August 4th. Many floats,

Harris, a manufacturer of components used in military weather satellites, employs 551 employees across Indiana and 530 employees in the Third District.

Indiana National Guard: The bill includes language that requires the Army to do an annual report on equipment modernization and fielding parity between the active component and the

1 IN 3 OLDER OHIOANS FALL EACH YEAR; PHAR-MACY REVIEWS, LOCAL SUPPORT CAN REDUCE THE RISK

On Tuesday, Aug. 7, Walgreens drug stores throughout Ohio, in collaboration with the Ohio Department of Aging and Ohio Association of Area Agencies on Aging, will help educate older customers about how to reduce their risk of injury from falls.

In addition to encouraging individuals to talk to pharmacy staff about fall injury prevention, Walgreens stores will have informational materials available, including a CDC checklist that can help the user measure their fall risk. The tool asks questions such as whether they have fallen in the past year or take medications that make them feel light-headed or drowsy.

Pharmacy staff will also have information about local aging services and support available through the Ohio's 12 area agencies on aging.

"Older adult falls are an epidemic in Ohio," said Beverley L. Laubert, director of the Ohio Department of Aging. "We are proud to foster local relationships that will connect elders to services and supports that can help them remain independent and engaged in their communities."

'As we age, many of the medicines we take to stay healthy may increase our risk of falling," said Alexandra Broadus, Walgreens regional health care director for the region including Ohio. "Pharmacy staff are uniquely positioned to identify some of the key risk factors for falls, and thanks to our collaboration with the Department of Aging and Ohio's 12 area agencies on aging, our staff will be able to link individuals to other available assistance."

SUMMER, DEHYDRATIONS & FALL SPORTS

The summer has passed its hump and is entering the dog days of summer, with lots of sunshine and heavy humidity. This always coincides with opening of high school fall sports practice which is happening now for the various sports in the area — golf, tennis, volleyball, cross country and football to name a few. Sports conditioning + hot weather = dehydration. The intense training high school athletes undergo this time of year makes them at-risk for conditions like dehydration, heat exhaustion and even raises risks of concussion when injured.

Dehydration can be identified by the following symptoms: thirst, less urination, dry skin, fatigue, light-headedness, dizziness, confusion, dry mouth and mucous membranes, and increased heart rate and breathing. A major concern with student athletes training outdoors in the sun is the depletion of important body salts like sodium and potassium. This is usually why Gatorade and other such drinks is requested to be stocked at practices and games.

Dehydration has been named as the cause of several sports related injuries such as sprained and strained ligaments and tendons, fractures, heat exhaustion, and concussions.

It is important for athletes and coaches that they remember these guidelines to avoid dehydration during sports season:

Drink before you go outdoors to exercise, drink during exercise, and drink again after exercise with Gatorade and fruit.

John Hopkins Medicine recommends for athletes to acclimate their bodies to the temperature outside gradually to decrease the likelihood of a heat-related illness or injury. Take it slowly the first few days of practice with shorter duration, with interim breaks in heat exposure. This is especially important for athletes who are overweight as their bodies have more mass to contend with, making their hearts work harder.

Coaches and parents – think about this:

That practice went just aw-

sweating. Slow down, take a break and chug some Gatorade. Eat a banana too, good fats, good sugars.

Keeping our high school athletes healthy and safe from illness and injury should be the number one priority among coaches and parents overseeing these athletes. By educating them and keeping them aware of their body processes is a way to be proactive in preventing injuries due to dehydration that could inhibit them from seasonal play.

He completed a general surgery internship at the University of Toledo Medical Center (former Medical College of Ohio) where he recently completed a Urology Residency. He is a member of the American Urological Association and recently sat for the American Board of Urology examination.

Some bladder conditions may benefit from implanting an electronic device called a bladder stimulator that is like a pacemaker for the bladder.

Other conditions may require surgical intervention. Due to advances in techniques and equipment many of those procedures can be performed as Minimally Invasive Surgery (MIS). Using endoscopes and lasers the surgeon is able to operate through a natural opening resulting in less discomfort and blood loss. Dr. Murtagh is also trained in robotic surgery that can be performed at another facility.

Dr. Murtagh also has physicians to provide services in his absence. Drs. Buck, Khan, and Mostafa are urologists associated with Dr. Murtagh through their group practice the ROMIUS Institute of Northwest Ohio. Persons wishing to make an appointment at the urology clinic may call 419.399.1136.





First, the money: in the 2017-2018 election cycle alone Latta has taken a whopping \$102,250 from telecom companies (source: https://www.opensecrets. org/members-of-congress/ industries?cid=N00012233&cycle=2018&type=C). With that much money at stake, who do you think Latta really represents? Corporations or their customers? His anti-customer attitudes are furthermore revealed in his shameful attacks on net neutrality. Net neutrality is, simply put, the idea that telecom companies cannot dictate how you use the internet. Without net neutrality, your internet provider could slow down your connection if, for example, it thinks you are watching too much Netflix. And this is especially bad for rural customers, who often have only one internet provider and cannot switch if it starts throttling Netflix. Does the electric company shut off the electricity if it thinks you are watching too much TV with it? Why should we allow internet providers to do the same? And why does Latta oppose such common sense, pro-consumer measures like net neutrality? Maybe the \$102,250 has something to do with it.

Those uninvited summer guests that ate much more than expected are on their way out.

It's not unusual to spot Japanese beetles in June and July, but the number of them was much higher this summer with outbreaks in Cincinnati, Dayton and Columbus as well as in northeast Ohio, said Joe Boggs, an entomologist with Ohio State University Extension. OSU Extension is the outreach arm of the College of Food, Agricultural, and Environmental Sciences (CFAES) at The Ohio State University.

Though Japanese beetles typically thrive on the leaves of linden trees, grape vines and roses, this summer, they branched out, devouring other plants in Ohio including scotch pine and jewelweed.

"Sometimes during outbreaks, they'll feed on strange things," Boggs said.

First introduced into the United States in 1916, Japanese beetles seem to have had a resurgence in Ohio during the last three summers, he said. But the populations still do not come close to what Ohio experienced in the 1960s and 1970s, Boggs said.

"Then there were so many beetles, it drove people out of parks."

At that time, Japanese beetles had no natural enemies. Since then diseases as well as predators, including parasitoid wasps, have caught up with them and helped curb the number of the pests.

After flying to a plant, Japanese beetles send out pheromones, chemicals that once released into the environment, trigger other Japanese beetles to respond to the apparent message of: Free Food.

Then they'll swarm a plant, munching until the leaves appear skeletonized.

"They're almost like toddlers," said Andy Michel, an entomology associate professor in CFAES. "On any giv-

en day, you don't know what they're going to like to eat." One woman who visited

a Dayton suburb and later contacted Michel, observed how virtually all of the linden trees in the area were reduced to lacey leaves and referred to it as a "plague."

With their iridescent copper bodies and green heads, Japanese beetles can be easy to spot, but hard to get rid of.

Flicking them away with your fingers doesn't always work because they generally return. About the only way to keep them off plants without using pesticides, is to pull them and dunk them into a container of soapy water, Michel said.

In a field of crops, Japanese beetles most often gravitate to the edges. They don't generally do enough damage to reduce the yield on soybeans and corn, he said.

On a soybean plant, even if they remove the leaves at the top, as long as sun can filter down to the lower leaves, the plant can still perform photosynthesis and remain healthy. For commercial soybean growers, a pesticide isn't necessary unless about 30 percent of each leaf is gone on the majority of the plant before it has flowered or 20 percent after it has flowered, Michel said.

A pesticide may also be necessary on corn plants if the beetles eat the silk of corn, leaving less than a half inch, or if the beetles are numerous and feeding while fewer than half of the corn plants have been pollinated, he said.

Whatever damage they may have done, Japanese beetle populations are significantly decreasing now as they tend to do in late July and August.

"So if we have good growing conditions and the plant can put on new growth, you might save yourself a spray," Michel said.

In a matter of minutes, one rainstorm can undo thousands of years of hard work of building a fertile soil surface and carry it away. What are we talking about? Soil erosion of course! Soil is a precious natural resource that we rely upon every single day to grow the products we use such as our food, fiber, and fuels. This natural resource provides the water and nutrients that are needed to have a productive crop but is a resource that can be lost very easily through the process or erosion. Through this article, we will cover what soil erosion is, how it is caused, types of erosion, and very importantly, how we all can work to prevent soil erosion.

One thing that is easy to observe with the earth's surface is that it is always undergoing change from a variety of forces such as weathering, erosion, deposition, earthquakes, and many more. These processes are either constructive in that they are building up the surface of the earth while others are destructive as they are tearing down at the surface of the earth. When we are talking about soil erosion, from our observations we know this is certainly a destructive force.

What is erosion and how does it get started? Before we can talk about erosion, it bears importance to discuss the process, which precedes erosion known as weathering. Put simply, weathering is the process that involves breaking down rocks and minerals on the earth's surface

through agents such as water, ice, acids, salt, and temperature changes. With exposure to these forces, several things are changed about the rocks and minerals such as the color, texture, and composition of the rocks. Weathering breaks down and loosens the surface minerals of the rocks so that agents of erosion can come in and transport this sediment away to a new loca-

Weathering is the process that is involved with the formation of our soils. Over time, rocks are exposed to the elements where they are broken down until they reach the smallest particle of rock possible, soil. This is a process that does indeed take time that is anywhere in the range of 500-1,000 years depending on specific environmental conditions at the site. With the surface minerals loosened by weathering, now we move to erosion. Erosion is the transporter that carries away the weathered sediment primarily by wind or water. Both natural means and those with human influences cause erosion.

When heavy rains come in a short amount of time, there is a large amount of water moving and trying to get away. As the water is moving, it is going to transport just about anything that comes in its path, especially loose soil particles that easily detach and go with the water if there is no vegetative cover in the field to anchor the soil in place. Drought is also a natural cause of erosion as it creates a dry soil that is very light and easily transported

by any act of wind thus creating dust storms. Over time, the common practice was to conduct a deep plowing of the soil each year to prepare the soil for planting. This deep plowing left the soil exposed to drying out by means of the sun and thus allowing wind erosion to take place.

Erosion also takes place with a lack of vegetative cover in both wooded areas and agricultural fields. The roots of the plant serve several functions such as taking in water and nutrients for the plant but also to anchor the plant in place. Not only is the plant firmly anchored in place by the roots, but the soil is as well which keeps it in place and not carried away by means of wind or water.

Several methods can be utilized by everyone to keep erosion at a minimum given the amount of time it takes to build the soil surface. One strategy is the installation of windbreaks, which are simply a line of trees that are planted on a property in a location where the prevailing wind comes from. The idea with this practice is to slow the wind down as it will hit the trees, go up and over the trees, all while being slowed down in the process thus helping to keep wind erosion to a minimum. Specifically for homeowners, you can place mulch around the landscaping at your home, which will create a barrier between the soil surface and any wind that could carry soil away.

Cover crops is the most common strategy that many have heard about as a method to help with erosion. Cover crops do just as the term implies, they cover the ground when a cash crop such as corn or soybeans is not in the field. The roots of these plants help to anchor the soil in place and if you plant legumes such as clovers or peas, you get some nitrogen as an added bonus. Other plants such as radishes have deep taproots, which help to break up hard layers in the soil and allow for better air and water movement.

Together, we all can do our part to protect our valuable natural resources, especially our soil. If you have a question on how you can prevent erosion on your land, contact the Paulding Soil & Water Conservation District and see how we can help you out!

Starting in 1981, he has overseen the gate sales making sure that the money from tickets sold was accounted for and secure.


"He is continually evaluating the ticket sales process and recommending practices and procedures to help make the admissions process run more efficiently," Zachrich said.

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Situated along the southern banks of the Maumee River, New Rochester was founded in 1835 and named the first county seat, and remained so until the year of 1840. The former roadside rest area is well known for being a significant historical remnant of Paulding County.

In 2008, the former U.S. 24 became county Road 424 when U.S. 24 was relocated and expanded to a four-lane highway. This project was known to many as the Fort to Port project, which realigned U.S. 24 from Fort Wayne, Indiana, to Toledo.

'It's always been a historical site for Paulding, and in the last five years, the parks district has been very active, so we got involved in seeing what we could do to get access to the rivers. It really is a beautiful place and we want to restore and maintain its historical beauty," said Linda Hodges, president of the Paulding County Parks Dis-

The Paulding County Parks District is in the process of restoring multiple parks throughout the county in hopes to take full advantage of the two rivers that run through the county: the Maumee River and the Auglaize River. The end goal of these restoration plans is to provide scenic areas for residents and visitors to swim, fish, boat and picnic and to bring back significance to these historical places. 'We have very ambitious plans and we are just getting started," Hodges added. There was no cost to the park district to assume control of the property. ODOT's only requirement was that the parks district is to ensure the site continues to provide a public use and that the environmental resources are protected. We both benefit from this. ODOT no longer has to maintain the site, because it is no longer on our highway system and we are grateful that

ico, New York, Oklahoma, Oregon, Pennsylvania, South Carolina, Vermont, Washington, Wisconsin and West Virginia.

In FY 2018, Congress provided a historic level of funding for water and wastewater infrastructure. The 2018 Omnibus spending bill includes \$5.2 billion for USDA loans and grants, up from \$1.2 billion in FY 2017. The bill also directs Agriculture Secretary Sonny Perdue to make investments in rural communities with the greatest infrastructure needs.

In April 2017, President Donald J. Trump established the Interagency Task Force on Agriculture and Rural Prosperity to identify legislative, regulatory and policy changes that could promote agriculture and prosperity in rural communities. In January 2018, Secretary Perdue presented the Task Force's findings to President Trump. These findings included 31 recommendations to align the federal government with state, local and tribal governments to take advantage of opportunities that exist in rural America. Increasing investments in rural infrastructure is a key recommendation of the task force.

The Ohio Department of Transportation (ODOT) District 1 real estate team partnered with the Paulding County Parks District regarding the transfer of the former roadside rest area located on county Road 424 in New Rochester.

USDA ENCOURAGES RURAL COMMUNITIES, WATER DISTRICTS TO APPLY FOR LOANS TO IMPROVE, RE-**BUILD INFRASTRUCTURE; \$4 BILLION AVAILABLE**

Assistant to the Secretary for Rural Development Anne Hazlett announced a historic commitment by the U.S. Department of Agriculture to upgrade and rebuild rural water infrastructure.

"USDA is committed to eing a strong partner to rural communities in building their futures," Hazlett said. "All people - regardless of their zip code - need modern, reliable infrastructure to thrive, and we have found that when we address this need, many other challenges in rural places become much more manageable." Eligible rural communities and water districts can apply online for funding to maintain, modernize or build water and wastewater systems. They can visit the interactive RD Apply tool, or they can apply through one of USDA Rural Development's state or field offices. USDA is providing the funding through the Water and Waste Disposal Loan

and Grant program. It can be used to finance drinking water, stormwater drainage and waste disposal systems for rural communities with 10,000 or fewer residents. Below are a few examples


of USDA's latest investment (PDF, 162 KB) of \$164 million for 54 projects nationwide:

Wadesboro, N.C., is receiving a \$706,000 loan and an \$815,000 grant to improve its water distribution system. The town will install 7,000 linear feet of eight- and 12-inch PVC and dip water main, and 11 hydrants and service re-connections. The project will benefit the town's 2,012 residential users, 84 commercial users, eight industrial users and five institutional users. Wadesboro, population 5,841, is in Anson County.

The village of Greenview, Ill., is receiving a \$4.9 million loan and a \$3.7 million grant to construct a wastewater collection and treatment facility. The system will collect and convey wastewater via a centralized pumping station. Wastewater will be transferred to a contained mechanical treatment system. Treated wastewater will then be released to Grove Creek. This project will alleviate health hazards due to private septic or aeration systems that discharge effluent into drainage fields, causing raw sewage backups in homes during major rainfalls. The new system will serve the town's 778 residents.

In Baudette, Minn., the Wheelers Point Sanitary District is receiving a \$300,000 loan and a \$638,000 grant to construct a sewer collection system. The District is on the shores of Lake of the Woods and the Rainy River in Lake of the Woods County in northern Minnesota. Homes and businesses in the district have individual septic systems that need to be replaced. If these systems were to fail, the contamination would affect the river and the lake. The state considers this project a priority due to the possibility of environmental contamination. The new system will protect the environment and area waters.

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
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
