TWO COOL GREEN PLACES TO VISIT AT FARM SCIENCE REVIEW



LONDON, Ohio — Farm Science Review, the major agricultural trade show set for Sept. 18-20 in London, will share what's new with trees, fish, wildlife, pastures, ponds and gardening, too.

How-to talks scheduled for the Review's Gwynne Conservation Area and Utzinger Memorial Garden will cover a gamut of green things, from backyard gardening to home landscaping, managing woods to grazing grass, bringing in birds to planting for bees.

You'll find flower gardens, prairie plantings and experts on hand who can answer your questions.

Together, the Gwynne and Utzinger sites "help provide a well-rounded experience" at Farm Science Review, said Nick Zachrich, who manages the event.

Learning more about natural resources, land management and horticulture, Zachrich said, "are important to a large segment of our visitors."

All the activities in both areas are included with admission to the Review, which is being sponsored by the College of Food, Agricultural, and Environmental Sciences (CFAES) at The Ohio State University.

Organizers are expecting about 120,000 people over the three days of the event.

London is about 30 miles west of Columbus.

Gwynne Conservation

The Review's Gwynne Conservation Area is home to nearly 70 acres of ponds, woods, prairies and a stream. Called the Gwynne for short, it's a perfect setting for more than 50 talks and demonstrations on conservation, grouped into five topics and locations:

Cabin: Twelve indoor talks in the Gwynne's rustic cabin will cover topics such as producing maple syrup, growing plants for polliharvest your timber, turning your yard into an edible landscape and managing edge habitats for wildlife.

Wildlife and aquatics: Sixteen sessions will feature, among other things, bats, native bees, attracting birds, keeping out deer, aerating ponds, chronic wasting disease in deer and preventing harmful algal blooms in ponds. There also will be a demonstration of electrofishing in nearby Deer Creek, a technique that scientists use to sample the fish that live in a lake or stream. The fish, briefly stunned, are netted, counted, measured and safely released. A similar demonstration at last year's Review netted smallmouth bass, sunfish and

Forages and grazing: Ten talks will look at topics related to raising farm animals on pasture, including summer grazing, year-round grazing, grazing cover crops, warm-season grasses and prairie grasses' benefits for livestock and quail.

Woodland: Mushrooms, tree identification, trees and taxes, and the future of elm and ash trees will be among nine talks in the Gwynne's Woodland Amphitheatre. Nearby, you can visit pollinator plots, several hardwood plantings and a planting of native pawpaw fruit

Chainsaw demonstrations will show safety, sharpening, maintenance and cutting techniques.

Also in the Gwynne, visitors can check out demonstrations of the National Archery in the Schools Program from 10 a.m. to 1 p.m. daily; and high school students can see demonstrations by CFAES's Department of Agricultural Communication, Education, and Leadership beginning every half hour from 10:00 a.m. to 2:30 p.m. daily.

Utzinger Memorial Gar-

There's a green oasis on the Review's main grounds, and it's called the Utzinger Memorial Garden. Located near Friday Avenue and Market Street, it grows flowers, vegetables, fruit trees and more, and offers tips and ideas for doing just that.

This year, organizers have added gourds, sunflowers, dwarf fruit trees, a lavender bed, a patio, a shade bed and root vegetables growing in raised beds, which are designed to be accessible to gardeners with disabilities.

Master Garden Volunteers trained by CFAES's Ohio State University Extension outreach arm will be available throughout the garden to answer questions.

Members of the West Central Ohio Beekeepers Association will be in the garden, too, giving tips on how to get started in beekeeping and showing the basic equipment needed.

There will be "Gardening Through the Lifespan" signs throughout the garden, put there by specialists with OSU Extension's AgrAbility program, sharing tips for gardening with disabilities, limited mobility, arthritis, or simple aches and pains.

Each day, a series of talks will be held in the garden's

Tuesday: You can hear about, among other things, gardening in small spaces, easy ways to monitor your garden soil, coping with pests such as ticks and mosquitoes, and the "Gardening Through the Lifespan" pro-

Wednesday: Talks are scheduled on topics including backyard fruit, lawn care basics, beekeeping basics, "wonderful weeds" and 'dazzling dahlias."

Thursday: You can learn, for example, how to attract hummingbirds and butterflies to your yard and how to use small trees and shrubs in your landscape.

risk of a life-altering fall, the department's STEADY U Ohio initiative aims to have at least 4,000 Ohioans take a one-mile walk to raise awareness and promote education about falls prevention. "Aging and fall preven-

This is the fourth year for "10 Million Steps." Last year, 53 community partners hosted 57 walking groups or events in which 4,935 individuals of all ages walked more than 22,000 miles. In addition, individuals around the state contributed by walking and posting selfies to social media with the hashtags #PreventFalls and #10MStepsOH.

Facts about falls in Ohio: One in three Ohioans over age 60 will fall this year, yet fewer than half will talk to their doctors about their risk or history of falls.

Falls are the number one cause of injuries leading to ER visits, hospitalizations and deaths for older Ohio-

While older Ohioans make up approximately 16 percent of our state's population, they account for more than 85 percent of fatal falls.

The total estimated annual medical cost of falls is \$1.1 billion in Ohio. Add costs related to work loss and the total climbs to \$1.9 billion annually, or \$5.2 million each day.

The causes of falls vary, but risk factors include lower body weakness, use of multiple medications, reduced vision, chronic conditions and unsafe homes.



The emphasis on baptism in John's preaching and the great numbers he baptized caused him to be called "John the Baptist." [Some translations say "John the Baptizer."] There are three prominent men in the New Testament who are named John. This one is called "the Baptist" because so many came to him to be baptized. Christ's public ministry began soon after he was baptized by John. We will see that in the ministry of Jesus an even greater emphasis is given to baptism.)

CELEBRATING OHIO WILDLIFE: PRAIRIE VOLE

The time has come for another trek into the wonderful world of the wildlife of Ohio. So far, we have learned about a vast array of wildlife that call Ohio home but there are many more for us to learn about. In the last installment, we went to the birds and covered the ruby-throated hummingbird. For this column, we will come back to ground level for our feature animal, which is the prairie vole. Where does this animal live? What do they eat? Who are their predators? Let us answer all of those questions and more as we learn about the

The prairie vole is closely related to the mouse and rat as members of the rodent family. It is a short and stocky rodent with a small body, short tail, and short legs. Fur on this animal is a combination of a gray-brown with some black mixed in. According to Northern State University (NSU), the sides of the vole's body are lighter in appearance with a yellow to grayish white stomach and that their fur color is the same in either the winter or summer. On average, this animal will range in size from 5-6.75 inches and come in at a weight of around 2 ounces, according to NSU. In Ohio, prairie voles are

found in many locations. According to the Ohio Department of Natural Resources (ODNR), this species is quite common in prairies, fencerows, along with old cemeteries. In these areas, it is common for them to construct burrows below ground along with runways above ground, per ODNR. These burrows are used for several purposes such as homes, predator protection according to NSU. Common items of the prairie vole's diet include grasses, flowering plants, roots, seeds, fruit, and tree bark. NSU writes that this species of vole obtain their food by gnawing and biting at the roots and stems of the plant and store this food in their underground burrows. It is early in the winter and late in the spring that the prairie vole will strip the bark off young trees and ornamentals.

The male and female prairie vole will share their underground burrow, often lined with grass. ODNR writes that the average size for a litter of voles is in the range of three to four that are commonly born between May and October, but that they will still breed well throughout the remainder of the year.

The young are born hairless, but the fur will come back in following a time span of about three weeks at which time they will also experience rapid growth as well, according to Northern State University. fact that prairie voles face a high chance of mortality from a variety of different reasons. NSU writes that it is not uncommon for this species to experience mortality due to parasites, predators, humans, along with times of limited vegetation growth. Predators include animals such as coyotes, hawks, snakes, foxes, along with domesticated animals.

The question that appears on the mind of many is how to manage voles and the burrows that they can make in our yards. Many folks see the vole as an unwelcome pest to their lawn, garden, and farm fields. Some methods that have been developed can be used to help manage the prairie vole. Northern State University writes that electric repeller devices have been developed to fend off the voles. Some homeowners also use decoys of some of the prairie vole's natural predators such as the snake, hawk, or owl to further scare this animal as

Have you seen a prairie vole before? Keep an eye out for this animal as well as many of the other amazing species that call our great state of Ohio home. Be sure to stay tuned for further additions to our Ohio Wildlife series as there is many natural wonders to explore about Paulding County and Ohio. Ohio EPA's state revolving fund (SRF) loans are provided to communities to build and upgrade wastewater and drinking water infrastructure, upgrade home sewage treatment systems, better manage storm water, address combined sewer overflows and implement other water quality-related projects. Financial assistance helps support planning, design and construction activities and enhances the technical, managerial and financial capacity of these systems. WPCLF loans also make possible the restoration and protection of some of Ohio's highest quality water bodies through the fund's Water Resource Resto-

ration Sponsor Program. Ohio's SRF loan programs are partially supported by annual federal capitalization grants and have grown substantially over time because of the revolving nature of the loan issuance and payments back into the fund. The SRF programs are managed by Ohio EPA's Division of Environmental and Financial Assistance, with assistance from the Ohio Water Development Authority. Ohio EPA is responsible for program devel-

CHOW LINE: BACK-TO-SCHOOL? FOOD SAFETY TIPS FOR PACKED LUNCHES



to school next week, and this year they are packing their lunch for the first time. Any tips on what I need to do to make sure their packed lunch is safe and healthy? Wow - is it that time of

year already?

If your child wants to bring a packed lunch to school, there are several ways to make sure their lunch is both healthy and safe from pathogens that could cause a foodborne illness.

This is an important distinction to make, as children are among the most vulnerable to food poisoning. That's partly due to the fact that their immune systems are not as effective at fighting off bacteria and viruses compared to those of adults, according to the U.S. Food and Drug Administration.

When packing a lunch for your child to take to school, it's important to remember that cold foods need to stay cold and hot foods need to stay hot, to avoid the development of harmful bacteria that could cause a foodborne

In order to make sure your child's perishable foods

the U.S. Department of Agriculture advises that you pack two cold sources that will keep the contents out of the Danger Zone, which is when a food's temperature reaches between 40 to 140 degrees Fahrenheit, at which bacteria grows most rapidly.

Frozen water bottles or frozen juice boxes can count as a cold source, as well as a freezer pack that you stick in their lunch box. Lunches that contain perishable food items like luncheon meats, eggs, cheese, or yogurt should be kept cold in this manner.

If you plan to send soup, stew or chili for your child's lunch, you will need to use an insulated container. Before adding in the hot item, you can fill the container with boiling water, let it stand for a few minutes, empty it and then add the hot food, advises the USDA. Also, tell your child to keep the lid on the container closed until lunchtime to help prevent bacterial contamination and

Other safe lunch-packing tips from USDA and FDA include:

If you pack your child's lunch the night before, leave it in the refrigerator overnight. The meal will stay cold longer because everything will be refrigerator temperature when it is placed in the lunchbox.

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Clean the insulated box or bag with hot soapy water after each use, and don't reuse paper bags. If possible, your child's

refrigerator or cooler with ice upon arrival at school. Leave the lid of the lunchbox or bag open in the fridge so that cold air can better circulate and keep the food cold. While it's best if your children wash their hands before eating lunch, that doesn't al-

ways happen at school right

before lunchtime. So make

lunch should be stored in a

sure you pack disposable wipes for your children to wipe their hands before and after eating lunch. After lunch, make sure your children discard any leftover food, used food packaging, and paper bags. Don't reuse the packaging because it could contaminate

other food and cause foodborne illness. Remember, healthy include lunches whole grains, fruits, vegetables, lean proteins and low-fat dairy products. If preparing sandwiches, opt for whole grain bread and add veggies for toppings. Additionally, you can make sandwiches fun for your children by cutting them into shapes using a cookie cutter.

As far as sides are concerned, prepare snack-sized bags of fruits and veggies in advance and let your children choose which ones they want in their lunch that day. Whole fruit such as apples, peaches, pears, bananas and tangerines are also good choices.

Central Ohio - Wildlife District One

On a day in July, State Wildlife Officers Josh Shields, assigned to Union County, and Adam Smith, assigned to Logan County, contacted 16 anglers at Indian Lake using their patrol boat. Four summonses were issued to anglers for fishing without licenses and fishing with more than two rods per person. The violations resulted in a total of \$720 in fines and court costs

paid by the anglers. During the 2018 spring turkey season, State Wildlife Officer Josh Elster, assigned to Pickaway County, was dispatched to Deer Creek Wildlife Area regarding the theft of a pair of chest waders. Officer Elster arrived on scene and spoke with the victim who stated they used the waders to cross the creek to turkey hunt. After changing out of them, the victim placed them under a fallen tree and left them there while hunting. Upon returning to get the waders, the victim realized they were gone. The victim walked up to closest parking lot and could see the waders through the back glass of a vehicle along with an empty gun case. Using the information from the vehicle's registration, Officer Elster was able to locate a telephone number for an individual matching the vehicle's registration. Officer Elster contacted the individual and asked them to meet him at the parking lot. Once the individual arrived at the parking lot, Officer Elster asked them about the waders. The individual stated they picked up the waders thinking they had been left there as trash. Officer Elster advised the individual the waders belonged to someone and who discovered them in the suspect's vehicle. The waders were returned to their owner and the individual who found them was advised to contact an officer in the

The citizen provided a license plate and a good vehicle description to Investigator Good. That evening, the man and his son came in from their second fishing trip and Investigator Good contacted the men. After questioning them about the days catch, both men admitted that they had each caught their limit of walleye in the morning then gone back out in the afternoon, catching a second limit of walleye. Both men were issued summonses and each man paid over \$500 in fines, court costs, and restitution. Both men also had their fishing license suspended for one Northeast Ohio - Wildlife

District Three State Wildlife Officer

Jason Warren, assigned to Ashtabula County, received a complaint alleging that an individual shot at a deer with a shotgun from inside his residence during the closed season. Aided by snow cover on the ground, the investigation revealed that the man had shot at the deer but missed. Officer Warren charged the subject with hunting deer in the closed season and ordered him to appear in court. He pleaded guilty in the Ashtabula County Municipal Court, was convicted, and fined \$295.

On occasion, offenders fail to appear in court and those cases become bench warrants. Recently, State Wildlife Officer Tom Frank, assigned to Mahoning County, was comparing information listed on each summons with the Ohio Bureau of Motor vehicle records. One individual who had failed to appear in the Struthers Municipal Court for a fishing violation had obtained a new drivers' license which provided a different home address in Trumbull County. Officer Frank arrived at the residence, observed the man enter the house, and knocked on the door. The individual answered the door and was arrested for the fishing violation which had occurred five years earlier. The man spent several days in jail until his court appearance. He was convicted and paid

fines and court costs of \$148. Southeast Ohio - Wildlife

District Four State Wildlife Officer Eric Lane, assigned to Perry County, received information from a landowner stating that someone had harvested a deer on his property during deer season without permission. With the information provided by the landowner, Officer Lane was able to contact the suspect. During the interview, Officer Lane was able to determine that a buck had been harvested in the area. Officer Lane seized the buck as evidence and issued a summons for giving false information to check in a deer. The individual paid fines and court costs, and the deer was forfeited to the ODNR Division of Wildlife.

Southwest Ohio - Wildlife District Five

Buck Creek in the city of Springfield, State Wildlife Officer Byron Rice, assigned to Clark County, observed two individuals along the creek

who appeared to be fishing. As he drove past their location, Officer Rice could see that one man was fishing but the other wasn't. He also noticed two fishing poles in the water and decided to drive to the other side of the creek to observe the men a little while longer. Shortly after he had left the area, Officer Rice observed both men beginning to fish. He went back to their location and contacted them to check for valid fishing licenses. Only one of the men had a license. The other man received a citation for not having a valid fishing license. He was later found guilty in the Clark County Municipal Court and fined \$150.

U.S. POULTRY GAINS NEW MARKET ACCESS IN MO-ROCCO

U.S. Trade Representative Robert Lighthizer and U.S. Secretary of Agriculture Sonny Perdue announced that the government of Morocco has agreed to allow commercial imports of U.S. poultry meat and products into Morocco for the first time.

"The Trump Administration continues to prioritize the opening of new markets for U.S. agricultural products. This new access to the Moroccan market is an important step in ensuring that American farmers and ranchers can continue to expand their exports," said Ambassador Lighthizer. "I welcome Morocco's agreement to allow imports of U.S. poultry meat and products and the economic opportunities that will be afforded to U.S. pro-

"Opening new markets for American poultry and other agricultural products is a top priority. I am convinced that when the Moroccan people get a taste of U.S. poultry, they're going to want more of it," said Secretary Perdue. "The products that will be imported into Morocco are safe, wholesome, and very delicious. This is also a good harbinger of the kind of relationship that can be developed. We hope there are other things we can cooperate on as USDA works to expand markets around the globe."

The United States is the world's second largest poultry exporter, with global sales of poultry meat and products of \$4.3 billion last year. In May 2018, U.S. exports of agricultural products exceeded \$12 billion (latest data available). Initial estimates indicate that Morocco would be a \$10 million market, with additional growth over time. Morocco had prohibited imports of U.S. poultry. Officials from the Office of the U.S. Trade Representative and the U.S. Department of Agriculture worked with the Moroccan government to provide assurances on the safety of U.S.

USDA INVESTS \$345.5 MILLION IN RURAL ELEC-TRIC INFRASTRUCTURE TO **IMPROVE SERVICE FOR MORE THAN 1 MILLION RESIDENTIAL AND COM-MERCIAL CONSUMERS IN 14 STATES**

Agriculture Secretary Sonny Perdue announced that the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) is investing \$345.5 million in 20 infrastructure projects (PDF, 121 KB) to improve rural electric service in 14 states.

"Delivering reliable and affordable electricity to power rural America will help lay the groundwork for increased rural prosperity and economic opportunity," Secretary Perdue said. "USDA is partnering with rural electric utilities and cooperatives so they can continue to invest in infrastructure improvements to provide electric power to those who live and work in rural areas."

USDA is making the investments through the Electric Infrastructure Loan Program. This program helps finance generation, transmission and distribution projects; system improvements; and energy conservation projects in communities with 10,000 or fewer residents.

The loans include \$7.9 million for smart grid technology. This includes computer applications, two-way communications, geospatial information systems and other tools to increase the reliability and efficiency of electric power systems. Below are a few examples of the projects USDA is funding:

In Colorado, the San Isabel Electric Association is receiving a \$15.8 million loan to build 63 miles of line and improve 143 miles to serve



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consumers in Huerfano, Las Animas, Pueblo, Custer, Otero and Costilla counties. The loan includes \$752,021 for smart grid projects.

Minnesota's Goodhue County Electric Cooperative Association will use a \$7.75 million loan to construct 28 miles of line and improve 72 miles. The loan includes \$315,000 for smart grid projects. Goodhue's service territory is predominantly agricultural. Most non-farm employment is associated with agricultural and food processing activities.

In Georgia, Amicalola Electric Membership Corporation will use a \$61.2 million loan to build 302 miles of line and improve 110 miles. The loan includes \$64,000 for smart grid projects. Agriculture and tourism are the major industries in Amicalola's service territory.

USDA is announcing investments today in rural communities in California, Colorado, Florida, Georgia, Illinois, Kansas, Minnesota, Missouri, North Dakota, Ohio, Oklahoma, South Carolina, South Dakota and Wis-

In April 2017, President Donald J. Trump established the Interagency Task Force on Agriculture and Rural Prosperity to identify legislative, regulatory and policy changes that could promote agriculture and prosperity in rural communities. In January 2018, Secretary Perdue presented the Task Force's

findings to President Trump. These findings included 31 recommendations to align the federal government with state, local and tribal governments to take advantage of opportunities that exist in rural America. Increasing investments in rural infrastructure is a key recommendation of the task force.

USDA TO REALIGN ERS WITH CHIEF ECONOMIST. **RELOCATE ERS & NIFA OUTSIDE DC**

U.S. Secretary of Agriculture Sonny Perdue today announced further reorganization of the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA), intended to improve customer

service, strengthen offices and programs, and save taxpayer dollars. The Economic Research Service (ERS), currently under USDA's Research, Education, and Economics mission area, will realign once again with the Office of the Chief Economist (OCE) under the Office of the Secretary. Additionally, most employees of ERS and the National Institute of Food and Agriculture (NIFA) will be relocated outside of the National Capital Region. The movement of the employees outside of Washington, DC is expected to be completed by the end

"It's been our goal to make USDA the most effective, efficient, and customer-focused department in the entire federal government," Perdue said. "In our Administration, we have looked critically at the way we do business, with the ultimate goal of ensuring the best service possible for our customers, and for the taxpayers of the United States. In some cases, this has meant realigning some of our offices and functions, or even relocating them, in order to make more logical sense or provide more streamlined and efficient services."

Realigning ERS with

Moving ERS back together with OCE under the Office of the Secretary simply makes sense because the two have similar missions. ERS studies and anticipates trends and emerging issues, while OCE advises the Secretary and Congress on the economic implications of policies and programs. These two agencies were aligned once before, and bringing them back together will enhance the effectiveness of economic analysis at USDA.

Relocating ERS and NIFA outside National Capital Region

New locations have yet to be determined, and it is possible that ERS and NIFA may be co-located when their new homes are found. USDA is undertaking the relocations for three main

To improve USDA's ability to attract and retain highly qualified staff with training and interests in agriculture, many of whom come from land-grant universities. USDA has experienced significant turnover in these positions, and it has been difficult to recruit employees to the Washington, DC area, particularly given the high cost of living and

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To place these important USDA resources closer to many of stakeholders, most of whom live and work far from the Washington, DC

long commutes.

To benefit the American taxpayers. There will be significant savings on employment costs and rent, which will allow more employees to be retained in the long run, even in the face of tightening budgets. No ERS or NIFA employ-

ees will be involuntarily separated. Every employee who wants to continue working will have an opportunity to do so, although that will mean moving to a new location for most. Employees will be offered relocation assistance and will receive the same base pay as before, and the locality pay for the new location. For those who are interested, USDA is seeking approval from the Office of Personnel Management and the Office of Management and Budget for both Voluntary Early Retirement Authority and Voluntary Separation Incentive Payments.

"None of this reflects on the jobs being done by our ERS or NIFA employees, and in fact, I frequently tell my Cabinet colleagues that USDA has the best workforce in the federal government," Perdue said. "These changes are more steps down the path to better service to our customers, and will help us fulfill our informal motto to 'Do right and feed everyone."

Perdue previously announced other significant changes at USDA. In May 2017, USDA created the first-ever Undersecretary for Trade and Foreign Agricultural Affairs and reconstituted and renamed the new Farm Production and Conservation mission area, among other realignments. In addition, in September 2017, Perdue realigned a number of offices to improve customer service and maximize efficiency. Those actions involved innovation, consolidation, and the rearrangement of certain offices into more logical organizational reporting structures.

The Antwerp Police Department has been very active and people have been asking, "What is going on and what are they doing?

For the last couple of weeks the office has responded to numerous calls, but there have been several selected cases out of many to give insight into the workings of the local law enforce-On July 13 there was inci-

dent while patrolling. A suspended driver was stopped on the west edge of the village due to not using a turn signal. A search of the vehicle found drug paraphernalia and meth (methamphetamine). The driver was cooperative and the contents were sent away to BCI&I (Ohio Bureau Of Criminal Investigation) for lab testing. Charges are pending after being cited for driving under suspension. More serious charges could come from the Paulding County Prosecutor's office.

On July 14 a residence was searched and as a result of the search, suspected meth and paraphernalia and prescription pills were located. One of the occupants of the apartment admitted to recently smoking meth. Two Officers followed through on the complaint. The contents were also sent away for testing, and charges are pending.

On July 21 a vehicle was

reported stolen by a resident. The vehicle contained several contractor tools of value. The investigating officer contacted all the nearby police and sheriffs' departments including Allen County, Paulding Sheriff, Payne, and Hicksville. The stolen vehicle was entered into a national database for possible recovery. On August 4th the vehicle was located in Fort Wayne, Indiana by a police officer who reported finding the stolen vehicle. The contents had been removed. The suspect who took the vehicle is facing charges locally. "In my opinion," Chief Clemens stated, "These incidents are drug related." The case is still under investigation and others may face charges.

On August 1 a traffic stop was made on Washington St. near the bank. The driver was cited for driving under suspension. A search of the vehicle found suspected meth and prescription pills, needles and syringes and other drug paraphernalia. The driver was cited in Antwerp Mayor's court for driving under suspension. As the investigation and the suspected drugs are analyzed, continuing charges

On August 5, very early in the morning, a vehicle was stopped on North Main St. The driver was cited for driving while under suspension. He was charged with being in possession of marijuana and drug paraphernalia. He was also arrested on a warrant from Defiance County.

The department averages 120 reports per month and about 25-30 traffic citations

The department helped out in Day in the Park and assisted with traffic control.

Anyone who has questions, concerns or sees criminal activity are encouraged to talk to officers of the department.



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LATTA MEETS WITH SMALL BUSINESS LEADERS IN PERRYSBURG, ARCHBOLD



(R-Bowling Green) met with local small business leaders today at roundtables held in Perrysburg and Archbold. The two roundtables were held with members of the National Federation of Independent Business (NFIB) - the nation's largest small business association. Discussions at the roundtable centered on the recent enactment of the Tax Cuts and Jobs Act, workforce education, and the regulatory environment.

Secretary Agriculture Sonny Perdue announced that the U.S. Department of Agriculture (ÛSDA) is investing \$97 million in 12 projects (PDF, 104 KB) to provide or improve rural broadband service in 11

These investments will expand access to educational,

Approximately 2,700 subscribers will receive improved service as a result of

Osage Innovative Solutions, LLC in Tulsa, Okla., is receiving a \$2.7 million grant to construct a hybrid fiber-to-the-premises and fixed wireless system in an unserved and economically depressed portion of the Osage Nation in Osage County. The company will offer speeds up to 100 megabits per second (Mbps) download and 10 Mbps upload to 139 households and 22 businesses. This project will give customers access to high-quality telecommunications services to improve

Old Business:

Project Updates: Erika Willitzer noted that she would like all representatives to be responsible for submitting where their villages/townships are at when it comes to projects. This will help with creating a more accurate dashboard for metrics. Pres. Dave Burtch suggested board members update current projects they knew about...See the follow-

Antwerp: Sara Keeran reported that they have submitted a grant through ODOT to connect sidewalks to the south end of the village. They are hoping the funding can come through in 2019. She also mentioned that three new businesses have opened in Antwerp – a bowling alley, an ice cream shop, and another retail shop. Also, it was mentioned that the ACDC organization (Antwerp Community Development Corporation) cleaned and just opened a Kayak launching spot along the river.

Oakwood: Jerry Zielke and Dee Dee Miller stated that the Oakwood Development Group plans to raise the building between the bank and townhall into a parking lot. The Oakwood Development Group is funding project.

Paulding Chamber: Executive Director Mikayla Pieper stated that she plans to launch a "YELP" campaign. Yelp shows reviews of local businesses.
