1. Sharpen your mower blades. Do this at least once a

3. Never cut off more than one-third of the grass height. Cutting off more than a third creates a physiological shock that can make it more susceptible to disease. Frequent mowing with a regular mower or using a mulching mower will avoid the necessity of bagging your lawn clippings; however, you may catch the clippings if you prefer. The important thing is not to let the grass get so high that mowing removes more than





The Equine team will compete in the State Finals at Columbus on April 26th to determine the final placings. It has been a very long time since Paulding has had an equine team advance to State Finals. The poultry team has to evaluate hanging carcasses, ready to cook carcasses, parts, 2 different sets of live birds, eggs, bone-in products, and bone out products as well as take a general poultry knowledge test. The carcasses were scored and graded, the live birds were a set of broilers and a set of past production hens, the eggs were candled or checked on the inside and also checked for outside physical problems on the shell, and the bone in and bone out products were checked for defects, like coating voids and foreign material.

The equine team had to judge a confirmation class and performance class, identify tack, plants/forage, and parasites as well as take a general equine test. In the confirmation class, the members had to evaluate what breed of horse it was and what type

of class it was while in the performance class, they had to grade their performance. The members had to identify what the tack equipment was and what it was used for, what kind of plant, typically hay it was, and what kind of parasite it was, and what it was going to do to the horse.

The milk quality team had to drink milk to test for the defects, like if the cow that produced this milk had eaten wild onions. They also had to eat cheese and tell what kind it was, had to tell if a something was a dairy or non-diary product, and do a CMT test. CMT test stands for California mastitis test, which is used to count the somatic cells of the milk. The wildlife team had took a test over pest control and general wildlife questions. They also had to identify wildlife specimens as well as pest control equip-

Alverde Johnson told me that building was built for his mother in 1900 named after a restaurant in New York.

Yager's Lunch - This business had its start with the completion of the brisk business block of 1903. It was opened by Martha McCann and she sold it to Matt Wallace and he ran it until his death. Then Joe and Hattie Yager ran it for many years until after WWII.

In the 1950's that building became a doctor's office, Dr. Lynch, and he was there for a few years and then he moved to New York.

It has seen a number of businesses over the years. For a few years the VFW held their meetings on the second floor, then they built their own big building.

That is the right half of this photo, those two windows and a door in the white paint. That building between the white wall and the white "S" in the brick, in the 1930's and 40's was a bakery by Harry Wolf. It has been remodeled a number of times.





#### **MCCOLLEY OPPOSES GAS TAX HIKE**

State Senator Rob Mc-Colley (R-Napoleon) voted against Ohio's transportation budget bill, citing deep concerns with the motor fuel tax increase provisions, and their effects on Ohio residents and businesses.

The bill would increase the motor fuel tax by 10.5 cents per gallon beginning this July, and would also increase the state tax on diesel by 19 cents, bringing the total rates to 38.5 cents per gallon and 47 cents per gallon, respectively.

"I have been very consistent in my view that any tax

increases must be offset by tax cuts, so that Ohioans do not pay any more for essential government services," said McColley. "Largely, the people of the 1st Senate district agree, and I promised those constituents that I would only support a gas tax increase if there were offsetting tax cuts. I believe in the importance of doing what we told our constituents we would do, which is why I voted 'no' on the transportation budget."







With winter now in the rearview mirror the time has come to prepare our lawns for the spring and summer seasons. It's time to once again mow the yard, fertilize it, revamp the landscaping, among many other things but have you ever considered on caring for your lawn in an environmentally friendly way that will benefit you and nature? Many of the methods described in this week's column are relatively easy to implement not taking too much time on your part. We will also look at things to consider following winter.

More than likely, there are many yard cleanup tasks that you already do each season. Make sure to trim any branches on your trees and shrubs that died off over the winter months to allow the plant to have space to new growth to take place. Do the same with your perennial plants that have any dieback throughout the winter and be sure to take care of those annual flowers by pulling them up. If you have a compost pile, that would be a great place for those old annual plant species! While the month may have already passed, Landscape Contractor with This Old House Roger Cook says that March is always the prime time to take an inventory of your home lawn to see if the time has come to make room in crowded flower beds or if you have some open spots that could be filled with transplants. This Old House pro-

vides some things to make sure are included on your spring-cleaning checklist. First is trimming back any decayed branches from the winter months. According to This Old House, be sure to trim back the dead limbs and branches to the point you reach a live stem and that you should use hand pruners instead of electric trimmers as this will allow for sunlight and oxygen to reach through to the center of the shrub allowing it to adequately grow. It is also advised to trim the evergreen trees you have to the direction you wish for it

Another consideration to make is cleaning up debris

from around your landscaping. Make sure to rake out any leaves or other plant debris that may be lining your landscaping bed. Leaving this type of material in your landscaping and even your garden will provide the right conditions for many diseases to crop up that could prove damaging or fatal to the plants you are trying to take care of. Roger Cook says to remove any mulch from the previous year, given temperatures have warmed up enough that frost is not an issue, and put in a new layer once you are done with your new spring planting.

'Green Landscaping" a try. What is this you ask? According to Better Homes & Gardens (BHG), this concept otherwise known as eco-landscaping is a technique that is used to "design, create, and maintain your landscape to save time, money, and energy". This technique also seeks to provide habitat for wildlife while leading to less pollution of the air, soil, and water. One thing that BHG recommends is to think native when choosing your plant species because they are already adjusted to the climatic conditions of the regional area and to stay local when buying species because even if a species is from the United States it does not automatically mean that it will grow in your area.
