

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Weed & Feed Products Now that warmer weather is finally here, the time has come to feed your lawn

er is finally here, the time has come to feed your lawn -- either again or for the first time this season. In this article, I'll give you some information about pesky peren-

mation about pesky perennial weeds, picking a good weed & feed, and application tips to make your chosen product more effective.

Perennial weeds, such as dandelion, plantain and clo-

ver, are present in the lawn all year long. In winter, the plants may wither and disappear, but their root systems are still alive and well. These noxious roots are lurking beneath the surface of your lawn, and waiting for warm spring weather to reappear as eyesores in the lawn. When warm weather (finally) arrives, new leaves begin to grow, and begin their "crowding out" tactics to take over the lawn. Summer annual weeds, such as chickweed, oxalis, spurge and purslane also begin to invade.

Control of these pesky weeds is done by applying a post-emergent weed control. Unlike digging or pulling weeds, weed controls get rid of weeds from the roots to help ensure the weeds cannot grow back from root stubs that may be left in the soil. This is not accomplished overnight. Instead, the weeds slowly disappear over a period of a few weeks as the weed control kills the roots. Weed controls come in both liquid and granular form. Whether liquid or granular, the weed control needs to have an opportunity to adhere to the leaves of the plant in order to be effective because the ingredients enter the weed primarily through the surface of the leaves.

For those who prefer a non-granular, fertilizer free post-emergent control for spot treating small areas, liquid controls provide an ideal option. Some are water-proof in hours. The ready-to-use and concentrate versions are effective for treating a host of broadleaf weeds without harming the lawn. Because the weed control is already in a liquid form, it adheres to the plant and absorbs into the weed more quickly than the granular versions.

The granular forms of the weed controls are typically combined with a grass fertilizer to feed your lawn—hence the name weed

& feed. All granular applications should be made on a damp lawn in order to help the weed control adhere to the weed plant. Application after a light rainfall or early morning dew is ideal. Additionally if it's possible, apply the granular weed & feed to a freshly cut lawn. If within 24 hours of mowing, it will help the granules of nutrients and weed control absorb in the fresh cuts on grass and weeds alike. After application, avoid foot traffic on the lawn and hope the weatherman was right in predicting no rainstorms for 24-48 hours. The heavy rain and foot traffic with the 24-48 hour window could dislodge the granules and make the weed control less effective.

The timing of post-emergent weed control application is important if the lawn is to get the maximum benefit from the product. As a general rule, the application should be made when the weeds are actively growing. Application for the most northern part of the U.S. is recommended in mid- to late-spring. For our area this means an application should be made sometime in late April or early May when air temperatures are between 60-90 degrees F. Another time for applying weed controls is in the early fall. From mid-September

to early October, weeds are actively growing. Weeds are susceptible to the weed controls in the fall because they are naturally translocating nutrients to their roots in preparation for winter dormancy.

Make sure to space out your feedings. You need a period of at least 6 to 8 weeks between feedings. Otherwise you maybe mowing your lawn more than you want to be. If you have broadleaf weeds coming up and you just fed your lawn, use a granular or liquid weed control that doesn't have fertilizer to get rid of those eyesores.

The only times weed controls should not be used is on newly planted grass. Once that new grass has had time to grow and be mowed at least four times (approximately 20+ days), then you can apply a weed control to the newly seeded area. If you've already applied a weed control but need to overseed, it is best to wait one month after your last application. Whether liquid or granular, using a weed control will help ensure your lawn stays weed free in the warmer weather to come!



PEVS 2019 ACADEMIC HALL OF FAME RECIPIENTS



John Mohr - Class of 1958 John graduated Paulding High School as a member of the Class of 1958. In his junior year he was inducted into the first National Honor Society at Paulding High School. John attended Tri State College for one year before transferring into the five-year Electrical Engineering program at The Ohio State University. He received the Bachelor of Electrical Engineering degree in 1963. While a student at Ohio State, John was inducted into two engineering honorary societies: Eta Kappa Nu (Electrical Engineering) and Tau Beta Pi

(Engineering) After graduation, John began his employment at The Magnavox Company's Government and Industrial Division in Fort Wayne, IN. Through a number of early job assignments, John's skills were recognized and he moved into positions with increasing responsibility. One of his many achievements was in 1990 when John was given complete responsibility for the financial management and the technical design team that developed the MXF-420 Multi-band, Multimode SATCOM radio (later nomenclatured the AN/ PSC-5). With no equivalent product to modify, this team, in a period of 13 months and a budget of \$2.5 million, developed a completely new radio and fabricated four (4) bid samples that were delivered to the U.S. Government. This product led to the award of the Enhanced Manpack UHF Terminal (EMUT) contract from CECOM. Over 25000 (including variants) of this radio were delivered to the US Army.

While working on these projects at Magnavox, John continued educational pursuits receiving the MSEE degree from Purdue University in 1967 and the MSBA degree

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from Indiana University in 1977. In 1997 John received a Certificate in Systems Engineering (14.4 credits) from the University of California at Irvine. During his career at Magnavox (later acquired by Raytheon) John was awarded two patents. He also had three technical papers published in national media including "System Approach to the Design of Automatic Gain Control" which he presented at the RF EXPO 1988 in Los Angeles, California. He is a Life Member of the Institute of Electrical and Electronics Engineers and a former member of the Armed Forces Communications and Electronics Association. John retired in 2010 af-

ter 47 years of employment with Raytheon and 2 years of employment with Lockheed Martin. At the time John retired from Raytheon, his job title was Engineer Scientist, the highest technical grade level in the company.

John has always been grateful for the education he received through Paulding Exempted Village Schools, especially in Mathematics, Chemistry and English. This solid background was the foundation upon which he built in his studies at Ohio

John is married to the former Carolyn Miller of Paulding. They have five children (one deceased) and 16 grandchildren. John and Carolyn now reside in Grabill, IN near three of their children.

Martin Baughman Class of 1964

After graduating from high school Dr. Baughman entered the School of Engineering at Ohio Northern University. In 1968 he graduated with Highest Honors and was awarded a Bachelor of Science in Electrical Engineering (BSEE) degree. In 1968 he was awarded a National Science Foundation Traineeship and enrolled in graduate school at the MIT

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Department of Electrical Engineering. In 1970 he graduated with a Master of Science Electrical Engineering (MSEE) degree. That same year he received a Fannie and John Hertz Foundation Fellowship to fund his continuing studies at MIT, whereupon in 1972 he was awarded a Doctor of Philosophy (PhD) degree. After continuing his PhD research for three more years at MIT, he joined the research staff and the faculty at the University of Texas at Austin in 1975. He served on the faculty in

the Department of Electrical and Computer Engineering at UT Austin for 27 years. He authored or co-authored over 150 papers, book chapters, book reviews, and technical reports spanning topics in the business of the electric power industry, including electric power transmission planning, the economics of electricity supply and demand, electric power generating technologies, issues in electric utility finance, regulation and deregulation, and electric power system modeling. In 1979 he co-authored a book on electricity supply planning entitled "Electric Power in the United States: Models and Policy Analysis." From 1984 to 1986 he was selected to chair a National Research Council Committee that investigated the relationships between Electricity and Economic Growth in the U.S. He has served as an expert witness in several legal proceedings on matters being adjudicated in the electric power industry. In 2002 he retired from teaching at UT Austin and became a full-time con-

Dr. Baughman is currently a Professor Emeritus at UT Austin and a transmission consultant to businesses developing utility scale electric power generation projects that use renewable energy resources. He attributes any success he has had in his life's endeavors, in part, to the education and work ethic he learned while a student at

He and his wife Yvonne currently reside in Austin, Texas. He has two sons, Steven and James, and four granddaughters.

Greg Ordway - Class of

Gregory A. Ordway graduated from Paulding High School in 1974. He received a B.S. in Pharmacy and a Ph.D. in Pharmacology from the Ohio State University, after which he completed a 3-year fellowship at the University of Pennsylvania in neuropsychopharmacology. Dr. Ordway's first academic appointment was at Case Western Reserve University where he began his research on the biology of depression and suicide. In 1993, Dr. Ordway moved to the University of Mississippi Medical Center (UMC) where he served as

Director of the Division of Neurobiology and Behavior Research. In 2002, he founded

the federally funded Center for Psychiatric Neuroscience at UMC, a center devoted to facilitating the psychiatry research careers of young faculty. He later assumed the role of Assistant Vice Chancellor for Research at UMC. At UMC, he received the Bronze, Gold and Platinum Awards for excellence in research and was named a Billy S. Guyton Distinguished Professor.

In 2005, Dr. Ordway as-

sumed leadership of the Department of Pharmacology at the Quillen College of Medicine at East Tennessee State University (ETSU). In 2012, he was administratively responsible for merging 5 basic science departments at the medical school to one department, of which he served as interim chair until 2014. During this time, he was the Principal Investigator of a federal grant that provided the renovation of the primary research facility at ETSU. At ETSU, he received the University President's Distinguished Faculty Award for Research, as well as the Jack L. Beal Postbaccalaureate Award from The Ohio State University College of Pharmacy (for outstanding contributions made to the pharmaceutical sciences), and two Distinguished Investigator Awards for suicide research from the American Foundation for Suicide Prevention. Dr. Ordway provides pro-

fessional review service for grant applications to federal and private agencies, and for numerous scientific journals. He has published over 85 articles and one book on the biology of mental illness. Over the course of his academic career, Dr. Ordway has garnered over \$25 million in grants from National Institutes of Health, national foundations and the pharmaceutical industry to support biomedical research. The goal of his own research has been to study the human brain pathology of depressive disorders and suicide as means to identify novel biological targets for the development of more effective drug treatments. His most recent research has identified a potentially novel class of drugs for treatment-resistant depression.

Dr. Ordway currently serves as Senior Advisor to the Dean for Research, and Professor in the Departments of Biomedical Sciences and Psychiatry & Behavioral Sciences at the Quillen College of Medicine at ETSU. He has two sons (Benjamin and Adam) and lives in eastern Tennessee where he enjoys mountain biking, hiking and kayaking in the southern Appalachian Mountains.



PAULDING COUNTY 1st GRADERS RECEIVE FREE TREE SEEDLINGS

In honor of Arbor Day & Earth Day, first graders at Paulding, Oakwood, Grover Hill, Payne, and Antwerp Elementary Schools along with Divine Mercy Catholic School learned about why it is critical

that we protect a valuable resource, trees! As part of this annual program, each student received a Colorado Blue Spruce seedling proudly donated by the Paulding Soil & Water Conservation District and packaged with assistance from high school students in the Ag Education program at Wayne Trace High School.

Students learned that trees are extremely valuable to our environment and that they require sufficient amounts of food, water, and nutrients in order to grow. Energy for trees to make food is obtained from the sun which starts the process of photosynthesis. This process takes light energy from the sun combined with carbon dioxide from the air to make food that allows the plant to carry out several processes needed to survive.

As a result of photosynthesis, oxygen is released for us to breathe. Students learned that just like they do, plants need water in order to carry out many other functions. Where do trees get this water? From the soil of course! Water helps carry much needed nutrients such as nitrogen or phosphorus taken up by plant roots to various parts of the plant where they are needed. Nutrients such as nitrogen or phosphorus provide additional energy to plants and help them carry out various functions such as producing leaves, seeds, and fruit among many other functions.

Students also learned some basic tree parts and some facts about each part. The trunk of a tree or the stem, gives the tree support and shape. Trunks contain a network of cells which carry food and water throughout the tree. Roots are very important to giving the tree support and will grow straight down to become established when the tree is young.

After learning all about trees, students took part in an activity called "Every Tree for Themselves! The results from each of these rounds was compared with the first round in which all requirements are available to show the difficulties that trees face in the environment when they are trying to get all the requirements they need to survive! Along with their free tree seedlings, students were given instructions on how to care for and plant their young seedlings. The Paulding Soil & Water Conservation District is proud to promote the importance of conservation and tree planting through our next generation by donating tree seedlings to all 1st grade students in Paulding County!


