

This structure pictured above is known as the Masonic building. It was purchased 2 weeks ago by the board of the Paulding CIC in an effort to boost downtown revitalization.

The building was purchased from Laron Hodgin after he had spent many hours of construction remodeling to save the building. It is surprising how large some of these old buildings are! Even on the third floor, the ceiling is estimated to be 14 feet.

Greg White, president of the CIC, along with George Carter, Dave Burtch, Jerry Zielke, and others visited at least five other communities to see what worked and what didn't to ensure that the purchase of this building would be a success for this community. They have worked in cooperation with the State Bank and Trust to secure the loan of \$96,000 with 20% down on a 15 year loan.

Jerry Zielke said they would be applying for grants up to a 1/2 million dollars to help with the remodeling, but in order to do so Paulding must be declared a special energy district in the Toledo Port District. That means the loans will eventually be paid for through tax dollars of the owner. As the CIC is looking at new and exciting things to do with this building, they are encouraging members of the community to join, and skills are greatly needed to help with this project.

Dave Burtch stated that it was important to recognize this as a community based ef-

"We love Paulding," said Pastor Greg Cramer. "Every opportunity we get to be a part of something in town, we want to take advantage of it. This is our second annual block party and we hope to make this a tradition everyone looks forward to.

No party would be complete without food. This one is no different. Goodies at a freewill offering hog roast will fill hungry tummies. The menu includes pulled pork, hot dogs, baked beans, coleslaw, potato salad, chips, lemonade and water. Pop will be sold separately.

Lots of fun activities are on the day's agenda and should appeal to a wide range of people. ### **GETTING TO KNOW JESUS**

### BOARD OF SCHOOL TRUSTEES RECOGNIZE EACS SPECIAL OLYMPIANS



The East Allen County Schools Board of School Trustees recognized the EACS Special Olympians for The Indiana Summer Games are held each June on the campuses of Indiana State University and Rose-Hulman Institute of Technology. Nearly 3,000 athletes and unified partners from across the state compete in a variety of Olympic-type sports, including Bowling, Cycling, Horseshoes, Powerlifting, Swimming, Volleyball and Track & Field!

Thursday evening was what they considered the beginning of the sixth day of their week. This meal was eaten, therefore, in the early part of the sixth day of their week, the day before the Sabbath. It would be hours later, after daylight on that same day, that Jesus would die as the sacrifice for our sins. The sacrifice of the Old Testament Passover lamb typified Christ dying for us. Christ fulfilled the type in every way. As Paul wrote, "Christ our Passover is sacrificed for us" (I Corinthians 5:7).

The gospel writers devote several chapters to these events, especially the things Jesus said to the apostles. All of this is important and it is profitable to read all four accounts in Matthew, Mark, Luke and John. Two very significant events during this period have been covered in previous lessons. One was the Lord's comforting promise of heaven found in John 14: 1-6 (Lesson 14). The other was his prayer in John 17, which we studied in the lesson on "The Praying Christ" (Lesson

10). In this lesson we will consider some of the other highlights of that fateful night.

### Is my water safe?

We are pleased to present this year's Annual Water Quality Report (Consumer Confidence Report) as required by the Safe Drinking Water Act (SDWA). This report is designed to provide details about where your water comes from, what it contains, and how it compares to standards set by regulatory agencies. This report is a snapshot of last year's water quality. We are committed to providing you with information because informed customers are our best allies

Do I need to take special precautions?

Some people may be more vulnerable to con-taminants in drinking water than the general population. Immuno-compromised persons such as persons with cancer undergoing chemotherapy, persons who have undergone organ transplants, people with HIV/AIDS or other immune system disorders, some elderly, and infants can be par-ticularly at risk from infections. These people should seek advice about drinking water from their health care providers. EPA/Centers for Disease Control (CDC) guidelines on appropriate means to lessen the risk of infection by Cryptosporidium and other microbial contaminants are available from the Safe Water Drinking Hotline (800-426-4791).

### Where does my water come from?

The Village of Antwerp receives its drinking water from wells. The Village has three (3) wells in operation. They are located on the southeast side of the village by the water treatment plant. Well water required minimal treatment. In case of a power outage the Village of Antwerp has a generator that can properly supply the village with power to pump and treat water. The Village aquifer (water-rich zone) that supplies water to Antwerp has a low susceptibility to contamination. This determination is based on the following: The presence of a thick protective layer of low permeable material overlying the aquifer, significant depth (34-56 feet below the ground surface) of the aquifer, no evidence to suggest that ground water has been impacted by any significant levels of chemical contaminants from human activities

Source water assessment and its availability

The sources of drinking water both tap water and bottled water include rivers, lakes, streams, ponds, reservoirs, springs, and wells. As water travels over the surface of the land or through the ground, it dissolves naturally-occurring min-erals and, in some cases, radioactive material, and can pick up substances resulting from the presence of animals or from human activity. Contaminants that may be present in source

as of June 17, according to a U.S. Department of Agriculture report. Typically by now, Ohio's corn acres have been entirely planted and nearly all of the state's soybean acres have been planted.

"We want to plant. That's what we do as farmers," Brown said. "So it's a ridiculously hard decision not to plant."

If a farmer decides not to plant corn or soybeans this season, he or she will be ineligible to receive federal aid through the Market Facilitation Program (MFP). The program is aimed at helping offset farmers' losses as a result of the recent overseas tariffs on U.S. goods, including corn and soybeans.

But farmers who plant a crop such as soybeans as a

cover crop and don't harvest it might still be able to collect a minimal MFP payment, Brown said. However, there's a stipulation: The soybean cover crop has to be grown on land that had been intended to grow corn.

While there's still time in the growing season to plant soybeans, how many acres will be planted in Ohio and across the Midwest is uncertain. Much of that hinges on the weather. Above-average rainfall is predicted for the rest of the month, and national predictions call for July and August to be wetter than normal across much of the country.

Growers who opt not to plant corn or soybeans this year because of consistently wet fields would be best off not leaving those fields bare, according to an expert at The Ohio State University.

A bare field is a vulnerable field, subject to losing its valuable, nutrient-rich layer of topsoil because wind can blow the topsoil away and rain can wash it away, said Sarah Noggle, an educator with Ohio State University Extension, the outreach arm of Ohio State's College of Food, Agricultural, and Environmental Sciences (CFAES). And a field without a crop is an open invitation for weeds to take over, making it harder to prevent weeds the next time a crop is planted there, Noggle said.

Some Ohio farmers who typically plant corn, soybeans, or both could choose not to plant either and instead, file insurance claims so that they can gain some earnings rather than risk planting in mud.


