HAVILAND - Ayersville landed at the Palace last Friday evening and after a very competitive first half the Raiders turned it up a notch to soundly defeat the Pilots 53-37. With the 16 point win the Raiders sent the visitors home with their seventh consecutive loss and also keeping them winless in the Green Meadows Conference. After the contest the Raiders improve to 14-4 overall and 5-1 in the GMC. For the Plilots, they fall to 3-13 overall and 0-6 in league play.

The Raiders trailed after eight minutes of play 17-15 and was still on the short end of the score at intermission 28-27. The game took a quick turn-a-round after the break with the Raiders turning up

the defensive pressure. After scoring 28 points in the first half, the Pilots were grounded in the second half with the Raiders holding them to just nine points. Trailing throughout the first half, the Raiders managed to edge past Ayersville in the early going of the third period and led 40-34 heading into the final frame. In the closing period Wayne Trace duplicated their third quarter output with 13 points while clamping down defensively and holding the Pilots to just three points.

Wayne Trace placed three players in double digits led by the play of Josiah Linder. The senior competed a double-double on the night with 16 points and 14 rebounds. Nate Gerber, a junior, totaled 12 points along with

OHIO EMA NOW ACCEPTING SAFE ROOM APPLICATIONS

The Ohio Safe Room Rebate Program is once again accepting applications. The program provides a rebate for the purchase and construction/installation of tornado safe rooms for Ohio homeowners selected for the program.

The entire state of Ohio is at risk of an EF5 tornado, which produces 250 mile per hour winds capable of destroying most structures, said

Steve Ferryman, Ohio EMA mitigation branch chief. A safe room is built to withstand these winds and resulting airborne debris and provides near absolute protection for occupants.

A safe room treme-wind shelter or space that provides protection to people during a tornado. It can be constructed/installed in one of several places in the home: in the basement, beneath a concrete slab-ongrade foundation or garage floor, or in an interior room on the first floor. A safe room

NUTRITION LABELS

In 2016, the U.S. Food and Drug Administration announced the updated food nutrition label design. According to the FDA, the new design was part of an effort to reflect updated scientific findings to help consumers make better-informed decisions about food choices and maintaining healthy diets.

While the new labels are already on about 10 percent of food packages currently being sold, the FDA is requiring food manufacturers with \$10 million or more in annual food sales to have the labels on all of their products by next year. Manufacturers with less than \$10 million in annual food sales will have until 2021 to put the new labels on all of their food products, the FDA said.

'The new label reflects updated scientific information, including our greater understanding of the links between diet and chronic disease," the FDA said in a written statement. "It is also more realistic about how people eat today."

Another change you'll see on the labels is more realistic serving sizes, with some

packages listing nutrition information per serving as well as per package. For example, the FDA said that on a pint of ice cream, you will see calories and nutrients listed for one serving and for the whole container. (This provides more accurate information for those who, um, may have been known to maybe consume the entire pint in one session.)

The labels will also list added sugars, which are either added during the processing of foods or are packaged as such; free sugars, mono-sugars, and disaccharides; sugars from syrups and honey; and sugars from concentrated fruit or vegetable juices.

Vitamin D and potassium will also be added to the list of nutrients required on the labels, whereas Vitamins A and C are no longer required to be listed. However, manufacturers can still list Vitamins A and C if they wish.

The information on daily values for nutrients such as sodium, dietary fiber, and Vitamin D have been updated and are used to calculate the percentage of Daily Value (DV) that are on the labels. The percentage of DV provides nutrition information in the context of a daily diet based on 2,000 calories per

WHAT YOU NEED TO KNOW ABOUT CHOLESTEROL

(NAPSI)—New cholesterol guidelines from the American Heart Association emphasize a personalized approach to preventing and treating high cholesterol and cardiovascular disease.

What Cholesterol Is

Cholesterol is a waxy substance that your body makes to build cells. Too much can pose a problem. Extra cholesterol comes from foods including meat, poultry, dairy and tropical oils.

Why Cholesterol Matters

Cholesterol can slowly build up in your arteries and form a thick, hard deposit that narrows them and makes them less flexible. If a blood clot blocks a narrowed artery, a heart attack or stroke can

What To Do

Ask your doctor such questions as:

Q. What do cholesterol numbers mean?

A. Studies suggest optimal cholesterol levels are about 150 mg/dL and about 100 mg/dL for low-density lipoprotein cholesterol (LDL-C). Levels in this range are linked to lower rates of heart disease and stroke.

There's no ideal target for LDL-C but "lower is better." Assessment with a risk calculator helps your doctor determine your personal risk and treatment options. A coronary artery calcium test may also help with your assessment.

Q. How can I lower my risk for heart disease?

A. A healthy lifestyle is critical. Also, while statins are still the first choice of medication for lowering cholesterol, new drugs are available for people who have had a heart attack or stroke and are at risk for another. Your doctor will monitor your progress.

Q. How do I know if my medicine is working?

"Finding the sweet spot for treatment is highly individualized," said Donald Lloyd-Jones, M.D., a member of the cholesterol guideline writing committee and chair of the Department of Preventive Medicine at Northwestern University in Chicago. "The latest guidelines strongly encourage patient and doctor to have detailed and personalized discussions about medication."

Ask your doctor about medicines, foods—such as grapefruit or pomegranate or supplements that may interact with your cholesterol-lowering medication.

Q. When and how often should I follow up?

A. Have a follow-up visit one to three months after starting cholesterol-lowering medication to check that it's working, that you're taking it properly, and to monitor for side effects.

During each one-hour visit, there were hands-on activities, demonstrations and presentations prepared especially for them.

Vantage Cosmetology students staged a fashion and style show for the 10th graders, while those visiting Welding got a chance to try out the virtual welder. Visitors to Auto Body used their artistic talent to create an airbrush painting and practiced using the virtual painter program. In Auto Technology, students learned how to use the tire balancer and the rim clamp and had a contest to see how quickly they could

Sophomores in Network Systems got to use some of the latest technology – Oculus 3D Rift Virtual Reality and Google Glass, while those visiting Interactive Media got to work with the 3D printer. The Genesis House is the first house north of Town Hall and it has a lot of history. I will tell you what I remember about it. It has been remodeled a

number of times from when I first remember it. Back in 1930 and a little later, a man lived there alone, his name was Frank Fleck. There is a picture of him in Mr. Ehrhart's book on page 52 in the A.F.D. picture in the back row, next to right end. By 1948 Mr. Fleck must

have passed away because Mr. & Mrs. Waldo Witt lived there. They also owned the little house across the street on the corner. That is where Pauline and

I lived when our son, Gale, was born in 1950.

Later on we moved to Wilcox Street and some time Earl

Peters and Marilyn moved in there and are still there, but back across the street, some how, at that time, it was called Waldo's Hill. Waldo lived to be almost 98, he passed away March of 1997. His wife Edna passed, in December of 1998, she was 95.

There has been a number of activities there, like having quarters to let.

In the last few years, a couple of endeavors of a coffee house. Now it is called The Genesis House. A friendly, hometown atmosphere, owned and operated by Tim and Cindy Yenser. At one time that place was

"Many of the Court's daily functions were inhibited by outdated technology. With this grant, we are becoming more efficient, improving our case management and making it easier for the public to interact with the Court."

Antwerp led 15-9 at the end of one quarter before the Warriors trimmed the deficit to 27-23 at the intermission.


However, the Archers scored 24 third quarter points while limiting Woodlan to 15 as Antwerp expanded the margin to 51-38 at the end of three quarters.



OVERLY BURDENSOME

Congressman Bob Latta (R-Bowling Green), Republican Leader of the Energy and Commerce Subcommittee on Communications and Technology, highlighted the importance of finding bipartisan consensus on the contentious net neutrality issue at a subcommittee hearing this morning. At the hearing, Latta announced that he had introduced net neutrality legislation that he believes could gain bipartisan support. It's based on legislation introduced by former Energy and Commerce Chairman Henry Waxman (D-CA) and does not use the Title II framework that can be overly burdensome and harm investment. Video of Congressman Latta's opening remarks is available here at 20:30.

Latta said about the bill, "Like most attempts over the years in Congress and the FCC alike, the bill focuses on the potential behaviors of concern, namely, blocking, throttling, and discriminatory practices. What it does not include is the drastic, outlier measure of reclassifying broadband into Title II, the part of statute meant to regulate the monopoly telephone carriers of the last century.

Title II is from the era of this

antique that was used by my family before telephones even had rotary dials.

"And the phones weren't all that was heavy about Title II. Title II carries with it close to 1000 common carrier regulations, a nightmare of government micromanagement, both for the providers bringing the power of the Internet into our pockets on devices like these and for their customers alike. Reversing the consensus on classification made by Chairmen Powell, Martin, and Genachowski, the FCC dropped the anvil of Title II onto broadband providers in 2015. At the time, the FCC did forbear from applying over 700 of those regulations to broadband service, at least temporarily. But that just begs the question of why anyone still views Title II as a critical component to net neutrality legislation, instead of complete overkill."

Latta continued, "In fact, since the reversal of the 2015 Open Internet Order, the internet has continued to remain open and free. Americans have not been restricted from freely searching, posting, or streaming content. It's clear that Title II is not needed to protect consumer access

Elwood then moved into the championship round with a pin of Huntington North's Christian Graft at the 2:47 mark. In the finals, Central No-


ble's Levi Leffers picked up a pin at the 3:23 mark but Elwood had already clinched a berth in the state tournament. Elwood (37-3) will open

With 10.5 years of research, 768 pages and 1,300 names of men and women who served in the Great War, Holtsberry's book is a one stop shop for people interested in World War I and its effects on the people in Paulding County. Some named are people who were raised in Paulding County, others are people who moved to the county before or after the war, or people who were born in the county but moved away after the war. Much of his research was from draft lists as well as 6-7 other sources. In fact, most highlighted men and women

picture, registration card, and discharge paper as well as their personal story.

"The Great War was supposed to be the war to end all wars," said Holtsberry. "Teachers, doctors, farmers, mechanics, and more left their jobs and families behind to serve." He said some joined for the mere adventure and many who joined couldn't have even found the country they were going to on a map before leaving the states to serve oversees.

Although not a lot, some women did serve in the Great War with the American Red Cross. Something Holtsberry found unsettling was that many women were relieved of their duty rather than being discharged. This was the governments way of not paying them a proper pension. "I don't think that's right. If they served their county then they served their country, plain and simple," said Holtsberry. After returning from war many soldiers had PTSD or then known as "shell shock". They were shot at, gassed, or told to shot others and that caused a lot of mental issues for men and women in the Great War. Some thought talking about the war would help, others couldn't. Holtsberry's book really lets the reader in on the suffering the service men and women went

Most Great War veterans are buried in the county, but there are 14 buried in France, and 2 buried in Belgium from Paulding County. Mark was contacted by an office in Columbus, OH who let him know that Paulding County was the first county to document their veterans which is an extraordinary accomplishment. Mark thanks his uncle, Ray Keck for his support and love for history and heritage that inspired him to do the same. Kiwanis thanks Mark for his dedication to our county's history and look forward to reading his current book, and his next book in the works on the Spanish American War. OHIO TRAFFIC FATALITIES DECREASE IN 2018

The Ohio State Highway Patrol is reporting a nine percent decrease in traffic fatalities last year according to provisional statistics. In 2018, 1,071 people lost their lives on Ohio's roads as compared to 1,179 in 2017.

Unbelted traffic fatalities declined by 10 percent. In 2018, 419 people died in crashes when safety belts were available but not in use. Troopers issued more than 137,000 seat belt citations to increase awareness and compliance with Ohio's seat belt laws. The use of seatbelts saved 51 more lives in Ohio last year as compared

Impaired driving fatalities also decreased by seven

percent last year; however it was still a factor in 36 percent of all traffic fatalities. Troopers arrested 26,598 impaired drivers in 2018 with most arrests occurring in Franklin, Cuyahoga, Lucas, Lorain and Summit counties.

In total, state troopers made 617,796 enforcement stops, investigated 64,820 traffic crashes and provided assistance to 219,609 motor-

Troopers from the Defiance Post reported 11 fatalities. Of those fatalities, two were OVI-related and five occurred when seat belts

were available but not in use. The public is encouraged to call #677 to report impaired drivers, drug activity
