

In the Crestview verses Wyne Trace match-up last Friday at Raider Field the Raiders put forth a gallant effort but a closing drive stalled on the 10yard line and the Knights managed to leave the field with a hard fought 22-15 nonconference win. The loss leaves the Raiders searching for their first win as they fall to 0-3 on the season.

The Raiders used a sixyard pass play from quarter-back Cooper Wenzlick to receiver Tucker Antoine on the first play of the fourth quarter to trail 15-14. Wenzlick connected on the all-important point-after to knot the score at 15 a piece with 11:50 remaining in th3 final period.

The Crestview Knights didn't panic and responded with a 67-yard scoring drive on 11-plays. The drive ate up 5 1/2 minutes when quarterback JJ Ward paved his way into the end zone on a twoyard scamper for what would be the winning score. 


