



The 2021 election has proved to be quite the choice for Antwerp residents as nine people have filed paperwork to fill four open seats on the Antwerp village council. Bryce Steiner is, of course, a resident and business owner, serving the village and surrounding counties. His expe-

Bryce moved to Antwerp in 2005 with his wife, Angel, and his four young children. They moved to Leinard Mobile Home Park. They started the West Bend Printing and Publishing Inc. business along with partners Steve and Sue Knapp. They are a part of the church in the Antwerp community called Riverside Christian Church at the Maumee River. Bryce is an active Chamber member, and

"There are a few things that desperately need changed



in the village, and one of those is to make sure that passing ordinances as an emergency is used specifically and only when there are emergencies and not because of poor planning, or used as a tool to eliminate public comment, as has been used." stated Bryce Steiner as he recalled a recent pay increase of \$10 per hour for a village contractor, as an emergency. "I believe all residents should be able to give input, which is exactly why the state mandates a three reading process for ordinances." There are times when emergencies are required, such as the passing of Mayor DeLong, but not unless there really are emergencies such as loss of life or property. This is why the local government must be more transparent. All meeting agendas must be made public before meetings. "I would like to see meetings posted online and live streamed, if possible."

Bryce has also stated publicly that he would like to see people treated the same, using the same rules. A recent disappointment in the council was not protecting local entrepreneurs when the food truck issue came about. What that means is if a business is operating and required to take income taxes at a brick and mortar location, then the same should apply to business

In light of recent events concerning supply chain issues, and going back further, when Antwerp sadly lost our grocery store, residents need to have the right and incentives to grow their own food. This could be chickens, goats and other small farm animals and promoting gardening. Barking dogs are allowed in the village, but a compost pile is not. Why? Our zoning needs updated for the times. People need empowered to be able to supplement their diets with natural, home-grown food, if they choose. Does that mean there would be factory farms in the village? Absolutely not, but it does mean that you could have a couple of fresh eggs each morning

and know exactly where it

came from.

If you believe that freedom is what we want, then Bryce Steiner could be your choice for Antwerp Village Council.

#### **MILITARY HISTORY IN PAULDING COUNTY**

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Homer F. Price was a self taught authority on such scientific studies of birds, butter-



flies, eggs, moths, and insects. He had one of the largest, if not the largest, collections in the country. Parts of his collection were on display in colleges and universities across Ohio. Homer began collecting bird eggs when he was 10 years old, sometimes wading waist deep in marshes in order to wait for a rare bird to appear or for an unusual insect to stop buzzing around.

Homer was born September 20, 1895 to William and Estella (Craig) Price, in a framed house buivlt by his late father. He was one of five children in the family. He attended Center School in Benton Township, then graduated from Payne High School and went on to teach school at



Center School.

Homer signed up with the National Guard out of Paulding, June 3, 1917, and registered for the draft in 1918. He had brown hair, gray eyes, light complexion and was 5'-6" tall. Homer served in France with Machine gun Company, 145th Infantry and slightly wounded on November 9, 1918. He was honorably discharged on April 22, 1919.

After returning home, Homer found a girl named Gladys M. Landrum, the daughter of John and Pearl G. (Baker) Landrum. They were married in Paulding, Ohio, May 4, 1920, and lived in Benton Township. They became the proud parents of Dorothy Mae, born March 19, 1921, Theresa June, born November 23, 1922, and William Dean,

born August 13, 1925. Farming was his livelihood, but Homer was elected to serve as Benton Township clerk for over 25 years. As the children grew moved out on their own, Homer continued to collect his bird eggs and bugs. As Homer grew older, he found it hard to collect by himself, so his granddaughter come along and help.

Homer passed away peacefully on June 30, 1987, in Paulding, Ohio. His wife, Gladys, passed away March 23, 1991 at the Van Wert County Hospital. They both are buried in Lehman Cemetery, Payne, Ohio.

To me, this story continues. In 2013, I had the opportunity to meet that granddaughter. I was wanting to display some of Homer's collection, (which was on display at the Historical Society Museum), and bring it to the Nature Center. Carol Overmyer,

Afterwards we spoke on numerous occasions, as she donated funds for me to build a display case to house his collection. She said Homer would not have liked a store bought piece of furniture. In the end, Carol was elated that her grandfather's memory is permanently marked. Marked by the memory of a dear woman who lived to see Homer Price. I was marked for the opportunity and honored to have known such a gracious, understanding, nature loving person, who by the way, was the nurse who helped deliver my first child! Overmyer peacefully passed away on September 14, 2014 at home. I guess she waded across the marsh to the other side. God's speed! Until Next Time

dents and staff have settled into daily routines and procedures associated with attending school and advancing learning opportunities. With the daily routines established, it is an appropriate time to share some of the demographics associated with our school. There are currently 734 students in grades PK-12. Our largest grade is the twelfth grade with 70 students. Our smallest grade is the fifth grade with 37 students. There are 50 Antwerp Juniors and Seniors attending Vantage Career Center in Van Wert, Ohio. We have 5 students attending the Opportunity Center in Paulding, Ohio and 2 students attending the Autism Center in Bryan, Ohio. Our school bus fleet transports an average of 333 students to school and home each day logging an average of 606 miles per day. Our cafeteria staff serves an average of 140 breakfasts and 281 lunches per day. Approximately 32% of our students are designated as Free/Reduced Meal recipients, however, all students receive free meals this school year as part of the national meal program. On the academic side, 17% of our students receive special education services.

Construction on the Innovation and Aquaponics Center is progressing toward an anticipated completion by the end of April, 2022. The facility will feature two large labs, an audio/visual center, a workroom, student lounge, an aqua/hydroponics greenhouse, and outdoor classroom Students planning to take an AP Exam in May

The day has been designated an Inservice Day in order that our staff can receive additional professional development training with enhancing academic and behavioral interventions for students and



**OHIO DEPARTMENT OF AG-ING AWARDS \$5.3 MILLION** IN RELIEF FUNDS TO SUP-**PORT NUTRITION PRO-GRAMS AT SENIOR CEN-**TERS AND ADULT DAY **SERVICES PROVIDERS** 

The Ohio Department of Aging this week awarded more than \$5.3 million in Coronavirus Relief Funds to 53 senior centers and 22 adult day services providers to support nutrition services, including home-delivered and congregate meals. The funds are intended to assist with the safe re-opening and operation of meal programs, including costs associated with COVID-19 cleaning and sanitation supplies, personal protective equipment, emergency preparedness procedures and protocols, preparation supplies, technology solutions, and other expenses.

"At the same time that the pandemic caused booming demand for nutrition services for older adults, providers found their capacity to provide them decreased and the cost of services increased," said Ursel J. McElroy, director of the department. "Yet, many senior centers and adult day services providers persevered to meet the needs of older adults in their communities. We thank them for their dedication, and we continue to seek ways to support these vital services and providers."

The department solicited applications for coronavirus relief funding during September. The funds were awarded to the State of Ohio as federal financial assistance. All adult day services providers and senior centers were eligible to apply. The 75 awardees serve older adults in 42 Ohio coun-

The Ohio Office of Budget and Management will begin making the relief payments to approved providers this month. The funding is a continuation of state efforts to support Ohio's aging services by offsetting some of the costs related to safely providing services while following current CDC and Ohio Department of Health COVID-19 guidelines and protocols.



#### **FIELD REPORTS FROM OHIO DIVISION OF WILDLIFE OFFICERS**

Central Ohio - Wildlife District One

During the fall, State Wildlife Officer Adam Smith, assigned to Logan County, received a call from a concerned landowner regarding large amounts of deer parts that were dumped from a bridge into a creek near the Logan and Auglaize county line. This was the second year that animal parts had been documented being dumped at the bridge crossing. Officer Smith conducted surveillance and determined a suspect with the help of State Wildlife Officer Marcus Schemmel, assigned to Auglaize County. It was discovered that a taxidermy business was responsible for dumping the deer parts. One subject was cited for stream litter and paid \$610 in fines and court costs.

In July, State Wildlife Officers Brian Motsinger and Adam Smith, assigned to Union and Logan counties, respectively, assisted the Ohio Trout Unlimited Madmen Chapter and Ohio Women on the Fly with a litter cleanup. Eighteen different bridge locations along the Mad River near Urbana were rid of litter. The officers helped haul the trash to a large dumpster. Wildlife Officer Nathan Cass,

assigned to Crawford County, received a call about a young Canada goose that was tangled in fishing line at a local reservoir. Officer Cass responded and searched for the entangled goose. He found a flock of geese near the water's edge. Officer Cass then spotted a gosling with a fishing hook embedded in its body. The fishing line attached to the hook was tangled in vegetation which prevented the goose from swimming away. Officer Cass grabbed the goose and removed the hook without injuring the bird. Once freed from the fishing hook, the gosling vigorously swam back to the rest of its flock unharmed. It is important that anglers and all wildlife enthusiasts remember to pick up their trash to prevent any negative impacts on wildlife.

In May, State Wildlife Officer Craig Barr, assigned to Allen County, was dispatched to a Turn-In-A-Poacher (TIP) call at Williams Reservoir in Lima. Officer Barr observed an angler and contacted him to check his fishing license. Officer Barr observed two black bass in his bucket, and four more were discovered in his cooler for a total of six. The daily bag limit for black bass is five statewide in Ohio. The angler was issued a summons for overbagging and paid \$155 in fines and court costs in Lima Municipal Court. #### Northeast Ohio - Wildlife District Three

State Wildlife Officer Supervisor Scott Denamen and State Wildlife Officer Zach Hillman, assigned to Cuyahoga County, were on patrol

in Cuyahoga County when they received a tip about individuals who had dropped off several undersized walleye to a fish cleaner. The officers arrived at the fish cleaning facility in Lorain County and waited for the individuals to return. Seven of their 16 fish were found to be under the 15-inch minimum size limit for walleye in Ohio waters of Lake Erie. One individual was charged with possession of undersized walleye in the Lake Erie sport fish district and paid \$155 in fines and court costs.

Responding to a complaint from a concerned citizen, State Wildlife Officer Jeremy Carter, assigned to Holmes County, investigated a report of a deer being taken illegally with a firearm in Holmes County. During this investigation, Officer Carter deployed his K-9 partner, Finn, to assist in locating the spent ammunition casing from the suspect. During this investigation, a suspect was identified and charged with the violation in Holmes County Municipal Court.

#### Southeast Ohio - Wildlife District Four

In December 2020, State Wildlife Officer Jared Abele, assigned to Vinton County, was contacted by Florida Fish and Game Officer Cole Delano. Officer Delano explained he observed an untagged deer rack at a taxidermy shop in Florida and had reason to believe the deer was killed in southern Ohio during the fall of 2020. Officer Abele and Officer Delano investigated the case in their areas of assignment. The officers determined a husband and wife from Florida traveled to Ohio. The couple rented a cabin in Vinton County and hunted deer in Gallia County. The husband killed a buck and transported the rack back to Florida. Neither individual

Southwest Ohio - Wildlife District Five

September, Wildlife Officer Brad Turner heard multiple gunshots which sounded like people dove hunting. He located the dove hunters off the road in an old pasture. Two men were hunting doves, and both had guns capable of holding more than three shells, which is a violation. One man had 15 doves the other had 14 doves. After further investigation Officer Turner discovered shelled corn spread around the pasture for baiting the doves, which is another violation. One of the men admitted to spreading the corn in the field. Officer Turner seized the men's doves as evidence. Officer Turner cited the men for hunting doves with guns capable of holding more than three shells, and for hunting doves over a baited area. The men pleaded guilty in the Eaton Municipal Court. One man was ordered to pay \$1,161 in fines and restitution, and the other paid \$1,111 in fines and restitution.

#### COVER CROPS PAY DIVI-DENDS

Farmers had several state and national opportunities to receive payments or premiums from planting cover crops. Some deadlines are past, others have been extended. Farmers may want to review some of these programs and look at the current benefits from planting cover crops yet this fall.

Ohio H20 Program: Due to a late harvest and adverse weather conditions, the Ohio Department of Agriculture (ODA) extended the 2021 H2Ohio Program deadline for planting overwintering cover crops to November 1st, 2021. Theses cover crops include small grains and manure incorporation. H2Ohio producers enrolled in any of the 24county Ohio area will have until November 1, 2021 to plant their overwintering cover crops and complete all manure incorporation requirements. ODA recommends to adjust seeding rates to reduce to the risk of planting failure. According to the Natural Resource Conservation Service (NRCS) Appendix A, seeding rates should be increased by 20% when planting cover crops this late in the

For manure incorporation, all H2Ohio practices must be met. Additionally, requirements established in the nutrient management standard (NRCS 590) must be followed. Producers are required to reduce application rates of manure to reflect soil moisture conditions, per NRCS 590, due to the potential increase for runoff on wet soils.

Crop Insurance: Farmers also had the opportunity this year to get a \$5 premium off their crop insurance if they planted any type of cover crop last year. The deadline to file was June 21st, so it's too late to file this year, but it may be a possibility again next year. The Pandemic Cover Crop Program (PCCP), offered nationally by USDA's Risk Management Agency (RMA), helps farmers maintain their cover crop systems, despite the financial challenges posed by the pandemic.

Soybean Cyst Nematode (SCN): Farmers who experienced problems with SCN or sudden death may want to consider planting cereal rye yet this fall. Soybean cysts can be fooled into emerging when soil temperatures are above 500 Fahrenheit. Studies on cereal rve show that up to 80% reductions in SCN may be obtained. Cereal rye is not a host to SCN, but the SCN can not distinguish between soybeans and cereal rye when they first emerge. Once the SCN comes out of its cyst, it does not have time to find a suitable host or mature, so it dies out. Due to a warm fall, this could be a good strategy to reduce high soil SCN popu-

Slugs and voles: While cover crops and no-till tend to attract slugs and voles (field mice), farmers can use several strategies to reduce their numbers. Slugs and voles like wet soil conditions and lush vegetation. Planting cover crops this late in the season, reduces crop growth and reduces the insulation factor going into winter. Many predators including birds (owls, hawks, eagles, falcons, etc.) and mammals (fox, coyote, etc.) eat both slugs and voles. About 6% of a starling's diet is

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slugs. To increase predation, farmers should mow cover crops down to 6-8 inches if they are extremely tall and thick.

Farmers can also push steel fence posts 10 feet tall with a 12" inch cross bar into the soil to help bird predators control vole colonies. Paint the steel post a bright color because it makes them easier to find if deer rub up against them and knock them over. With moist soil, posts can be moved periodically to improve pest control. Another option, is to get a good rat terroir or small dog. Rat Terriers were bred to hunt rats and mice, so they can reduce vole populations this fall, winter, and next spring.

Wildlife Benefits: hunters and wildlife enthusiast, cover crops make a great place to either see or hunt for wildlife. Deer love browsing on cover crops including radish, kale, and rape which can have up to 25% crude protein. Hunters will find that deer tend to browse and stay around the edges of a cover crop field. To increase habitat and the edge effect, mow irregular paths with some curves. Leave some areas taller and shorter to increase patchiness. Wildlife including deer, quail, pheasant, turkeys, rabbits, and predators travel and live along these paths.

Environmental Effects: Let's not forget the great environmental effects that cover crops provide. Keeping the soil covered in the winter reduces soil erosion and nutrient runoff, which improves water quality. Live roots soak up excess nitrogen and phosphorus and keep many micronutrients recycling in the soil while keeping the soil in place. Cover crops also improve drainage, soil structure, and overall soil health.

Robert Casper of Oakwood and Carey Nance of Melrose went on a special trip this past weekend to New York City, with a stop along the way at a park in Pennsylvania. The trip was a wish granted

to Casper by The Angel Foundation in Van Wert, a nonprofit organization that fulfills similar wishes for terminally ill adults throughout Ohio.

Nance knew of The Angel Foundation because mother, the late Patricia Nance of Latty, received a wish from the organization back in 2009.

"The Angel Foundation flew my sister home from Texas when my mother was sick," Nance said. "It meant so much to us all to have our family back together before she passed."

When Casper was diagnosed with metastatic lung cancer this fall, Nance - his lifelong friend - drove him to Van Wert to complete a wish application.

When he walked in and met Angel Foundation wish coordinator, Deb Buechner, Nance was surprised to learn that she remembered him from his mother's wish 12-

Casper traveled throughout the country as a construction laborer. His travels included jobs in New York City after the 9-11-2001 attack on the World Trade Center.

"I lost a niece in the attack and I passed by the site when I was there, but never got to stop," Casper said. "I want to pay my respects to her and evthat tragedy."

Both Casper and Nance enjoy fishing, so their trip included a stop at Rickett's Glen State Park in Pennsylvania.

The Angel Foundation provided them money for gas, tolls, food, fishing licenses, and souvenirs. They also made plans to see the sites in New York, including Times Square and Central Park.

"I wanted to send him as soon as possible," Buechner said. "The biggest obstacle we face is that people wait too long to contact us and they're too sick to do anything. We wanted him to go now, while he's feeling good, so this wish came together quickly."

Casper is taking chemotherapy at the Radiation Oncology Center in Bryan. His doctor signed off on his ability to travel at this time. Casper said he looked for-

ward to the trip being "an escape from life for a little while." They left early Saturday morning and returned on Tuesday. "Knowing that people care

means more than anything," he said, "especially with the way the world is now."
