Seeing Sea Mammals Have you ever worn fishing waders? My favorite class for my Wildlife Science

degree at Purdue University was ichthyology, the study of fish. I liked the class for the field labs. All the students would wear chest high waders and had long nets in hand as we stood in rivers and creeks in Indiana. One student wore a battery pack on his back that had a long metal rod to it. He would touch the metal rod to the water and send a short burst of electricity into the water and the fish would be stunned for a moment while we'd feverishly collect and identify the species. The waders that the students wore insulated us from the electricity, but the lab waders were pretty old. Sometimes a student would have a small leak in his waders. We'd hear a yell as that student got a shock, ZAP!, and jumped out of the water as quickly as possible. We were inadvertently shocking a water mammal! When surveying a place

we would serve in overseas, we took a large ferry boat to visit the location. I had never been on the open ocean or a boat of that kind before. I went to the front of the boat to watch the sea mammals (dolphins) that were jumping nearby. However, within a few moments my stomach was jumping. I was sea sick and there was no way to reverse it until we finally arrived at the port. I spent the rest of that trip hunched over a plastic bag.

A couple decades later, I was walking along the shore of a fjord with my family when one of my sons said he spotted something out in the water. I told him that I thought it was a seal with its flippers popping out of the water. Another son guessed it was a small shark thrashing as it ate fish caught in a net. When water spurted out of a blow hole, my wife guessed it was a porpoise or dolphin. As we got a better look, we saw that the water was blowing out from a white tube. It was a sea mammal called a diver.

In life, things often come around full circle. Just like in small-town America, and everywhere else in the world, people are the most interesting sea mammals to watch jumping around in

MILITARY HISTORY IN PAULDING COUNTY

Herman W. Coats was born in Grover Hill, Ohio, August 2, 1892. The son of Luther Elliot and Melissa C. (Harris) Coats. Luther was born January 3, 1861 in Indiana. Melissa was born July 31, 1864 in Indiana. Luther and Melissa were married, January 3, 1884 in Randolph, Indiana on Melissa's birthday!



The Coats' moved to Grover Hill, Latty Township before 1892, this is the year Herman was born. They had a daughter, Hazel who was born in Indiana in 1890. By 1900, the Coats family consisted of three daughters and three sons, Herman was the fifth child.

Luther made a living as a farmer, as all six children were in school. By 1910, Luther, Melissa and the two youngest children, Herman and sister Velma were living in Texas. Luther and Herman were engaged in farming. Herman had quit school to help his fa-

By 1917, Herman had moved to Lockenburg, Arkansas. On June 5, 1917, Herman registered for the draft. He was listed as medium height and build, blue eyes, and brown hair. He was working as an automobile mechanic in his own garage.

Herman enlisted in the regular army, September 12, 1917 in Texarkana, Arkansas. He was sent to Fort Riley, Kansas for training. While he was living in Lockenburg, he met a gal by the name of, Addie Margaret Turner. She was born May 18, 1895 in Sevier County, Arkansas. They were married, December 12, 1917. 0n May 27, 1918, Herman W. Coats left New York and set sail for Europe on the ship, "Melta".

Herman was assigned as a wagoner with the Field Hospital Company #21, Sanitary Train, 4th Division. On October 1, 1918, while aiding wounded soldiers, Herman W. Coats was killed. He was buried north of Cuisy, France. His burial location is unknown to this day. A memorial stone was placed in his honor in Park Cemetery, Fairmount, Grant County, Indiana, in Plot 6A.

This sad story continues as Melissa gave birth to a daughter, Herman Eluerna Coats, January 18, 1919, never knowing who her father was. Herman's parents, both passed away in 1939. Luther on September 26, and Melissa December 11. They both are buried in Whiteriver Cemetery, Winchester, Indiana.

Herman's wife, Addie, never remarried. She passed away, November 23, 1991 and is buried in Rest Haven Memorial Gardens, Arkadelphia, Arkansas. The daughter, Herman Elyerna, married three times. First to a Reed Wilson, second to Milton Green, and finally to Robert L. Lawrence. He passed away September 12, 1975 in Pulaski, Arkansas. She passed away, July 19, 2012. They both are buried in Rest Haven Memorial Gardens, with her mother Addie. She never had children.

Notes taken below are from Wilhelm's program:

Opening comment by Mr. Wilhelm: "Local author, Randall Buchman has written more about Indians that anyone East of the Missiissippi

Indians in the area: Pontiac was on Mission Island; Wauseon; Little Turtle; Blue Jacket; Turkey Foot; Black Hoof; Tecumseh; Tecumseh's sister; Johnny Logan; Darrel (Little Turtle's grandson), 3 groups of Shawnee, Marie Andrew; and more. Ottawas were on the Auglaize on a reserva-

The NW Territory was almost totally surrounded by water. The Roche de Bouf was at "Waterwille. The Maumee River and it's tributaries has more water than any other river. It was called the "River of the Ottawa".

It was good land for planting corn and food crops and the Auglaize and Maumee Rivers and other tributaries met there. They had trade fairs for furs, blankets, clothes, beads, firearms, Indian war materials. The English paid for scalps and even paid for baby scalps. Pontiac was the first local Ot-

Simon Girty was captured as a child and became a translator for the Senacas. Girty's Island on the Maumee River was owned and ran by Simon's brother. The Battle of the Wabash was 1791. It was the 2nd great defeat for Little Turtle. Better than Tecumseh's. It was the greatest defeat of US troops in NW Indian wars. 656 were killed and 277 wounded. Mad Anthony Wayne built Ft. Recovery and then there was the Battle of Fallen Timbers.

Tecumseh's father was Cherokee. He was in the south during the Battle of Tippecanoe. The dream of a confederation was gone. Tecumseh was killed at the Battle of Thames.

The nephew of Tecumseh, Johnny Logan, was a personal body guard to Wm. Henry Harrison. His body was found and he is buried in Defiance, Ohio on the Fort grounds. All Indian removal was probably completed by 1838 from the NW Ohio area.



In addition, this project is estimated to generate \$37,461 in operations and maintenance costsavings annually.

where leadership must be strategic to stretch a limited budget, these savings mean more available funds to be allocated to what matters most providing students with a quality education. Furthermore, because the project will be self-funded through cost savings, Northwest State's capital budgets will be unaffected, making this a sound financial decision for the College.

Beyond the significant cost-savings, this investment of resources demonstrates the college's commitment to advancing green initiatives, enhancing learning conditions for students, and improving operational performance. A 1 megawatt ground-mounted solar array system will be installed, without reducing green space, in a paved area on the northwest side of campus. In addition to generating power for the facilities, this array, containing over 2,500 solar

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panels, will serve as a tool for STEM students to engage in hands-on curriculum related to renewable energy sources.

The project scope also includes upgrades to more efficient LED lighting systems, including the replacement of lamps, ballasts, and more than 2700 existing fixtures. Over 400 emergency light fixtures will also be converted to LED. NSCC is thrilled as they have already started noticing positive results. As shown in the following graph, a significant portion of the LED lighting installation was completed on March 10. In the following week, NSCC's utility monitoring dashboard revealed a noticeable dip in their energy consumption.

HVAC upgrades will also take place to improve efficiency and enhance the comfort of students and staff. These upgrades include rebuilding an existing air handling unit with a new variable frequency drive, as well as replacing outdated equipment such as a chiller, air handling unit, and boiler with more efficient models. In addition, Veregy is conducting a retro-commissioning study of the existing building automation system to uncover other opportunities to fine-tune and optimize the performance of the campus facilities. NSCC will also benefit from Veregy's Digital Services offerings, including ongoing monitoring-based commissioning through Facility Conductor and automated utility data and analytics through Energy Master.

Northwest State and Veregy are committed to supporting the community by partnering with local vendors and subcontractors. All of the mechanical and electrical work will be completed by firms in Northwest Ohio and its surrounding areas, and the solar panels will be manufactured by a firm headquartered just a few miles from the College. Kevin Gerken, NSCC Di-

rector of Plant Operations, Construction, and Renovation, commented on the project, "After many years of keeping NSCC as efficient as possible, the next step to save the college money was to turn to a renewable energy source, and solar was the best option. We have taken part in many rebate programs and have been inspected by numerous energy ciency companies. The findings of the audits revealed that we were running at near peak efficiency. Another selling point in the installation of the solar array is that the learners will be able to view how the array is working and how much electricity it will be producing at any given time. We really can't wait to see the future savings through the next phases of the construction."

You may request an application for an absentee ballot to be mailed to you by calling the office or printing off an absentee ballot application on the office website or the Ohio Secretary of State website. It seems that Americans are obsessed with true crime and cold cases. An example of a local very, very cold case is the Nancy Eagleson murder. HOOPS, RIEDEL **LEGISLATION HELPS BUSINESS OWNERS**

The Ohio House of Representatives voted in favor of legislation sponsored by State Representatives Jim Hoops (R-Napoleon) and Craig Riedel (R-Defiance) that will keep tax money in Ohio from the sale of a busi-

House Bill 515 will revise how the state's income tax applies to the sale of an ownership interest in a business.

Taxes collected from the sale of a business are broken into business or nonbusiness income. Currently, this is determined by statuary law, the Supreme Court and the Ohio Department of Taxation.

Furthermore, current law's treatment of income from the sale of a business as

of the business is a resident or nonresident of Ohio. Nonbusiness income for Ohio residents is not eligible for a business income deduction or a flat 3% tax on business income, while nonresidents would pay no Ohio tax on the sale of a business. Riedel believes this loop-

nonbusiness income de-

pends on whether the seller

hole in the tax laws give businesses owners an incentive to leave Ohio prior to the sale of a business.

"It's a common sense bill intended to keep and incentivize Ohioans to stay in Ohio after selling a business rather than leaving Ohio and moving to Florida or Texas before selling their business," said Riedel.

Hoops and Riedel want to simplify the tax laws by creating a standard for what is considered business income. House Bill 515 will codify into law that the sale of a business will be treated as a sale of assets for federal income tax purposes and if the seller actively participates in running the business during the taxable year of the sale or any of the five proceeding

"This simplification will make a clear distinction between what is and isn't business income," said Hoops. "The passage of this bill would mean that at tax time, Ohio-resident business owners will not face an unexpected increase in taxes."House Bill 515 will now head to the Ohio Senate for their consideration.

LAWN CARE FOR THE HOMEOWNER

Mowing

The grass is (or will be) growing shortly and we'd like to share with you a few guidelines on mowing. homeowners take mowing for granted not realizing how much impact it has on the health and appearance of the lawn. Each of the following tips plays an important part in your lawn's health and appear-

1. Sharpen your mower blades. Do this at least once a year or as frequently as needed to keep them sharp for the best cut. Sharp mower blades give a clean even cut to your lawn. Additionally they help prevent tearing and shredding the grass blades, which can give your grass an off-color appearance.

2. Adjust the cutting height of the mower throughout the season. For spring and fall, mower settings should be at medium-height. By doing this in early spring, mowing at a medium-height, this will remove the top brown-part of the blades and let more sunlight reach the grass plants to encourage early green-up. Avoid mowing too low which causes stress to the lawn. Mowing too low eliminates the leaf surface. Loosing leaf surface reduces the plants ability to perform photosynthesis. During summer or drought, higher adjustment settings should be used during the hotter months when the grass growth is slower. This also helps your lawn maintain better drought tolerance with hotter temperatures and less rain. Remember, the hotter and drier, the higher you

should set your mower. 3. Never cut off more than one-third of the grass height. Cutting off more than a third creates a physiological shock that can make it more susceptible to disease. Frequent mowing with a regular mower or using a mulching mower will avoid the necessity of bagging your lawn clippings; however, you may catch the clippings if you prefer. The important thing is not to let the grass get so high that mowing removes more than one-third of the grass blade. For best results, mow your lawn approximately every five days.

5. Alternate mowing direction. This aids in achieving a quality appearance. For in-

stance, if you mowed horizontally last time, mow diagonally next time. Cutting in different directions tends to keep the grass blades more erect and ensures a more even cut.

OHIO EPA ISSUES LATEST WATER QUALITY REPORT

Ohio EPA has released its latest statewide water quality report. The biennual document describes the general condition of Ohio's waters and includes a list of impaired waters that are not meeting their federal or state water quality goals, as well as waters that have improved to meet their goals.

Among the more significant items in this year's report:

- Ten new assessment units were added for the Ohio River mainstem.
- The central basin of Lake Erie remains in attainment for recreation use (based on algae assessments).

• Microcystin concentrations have declined in Lake Erie's Sandusky Bay since 2020. If this trend continues over the next two years, the Bay could be designated for attainment for recreation use (based on algae assessments).

The Agency hosted a virtual webinar earlier this year to provide the public more information about the draft list of the state's impaired waters. A copy of the final report, along with the Agency's response to public comments (located in Section D) are available for review on Ohio EPA's website.


