LAWYER FILES MOTION TO **EXHUME NANCY EAGLESON** REMAINS MORE THAN 60 YEARS AFTER HER MURDER

Lawyer John DeMuth has filed a motion in Paulding County Probate Court to allow the body of Nancy Eagleson to be disinterred from the local cemetery where she was

buried nearly sixty-two years ago. A hearing is set for September 20th, in front of Judge Michael Wehrkamp.

Fourteen-year-old Nancy Eagleson and her five-yearold sister, Sheryl, were walking home from a movie in downtown Paulding, Ohio, around seven p.m. on Novem-



I have a twenty-year old Chevy that looks like a baby Jeep-like vehicle that some call a "Barbie Jeep". It is truly the runt of the family of American off-road vehicles. I had some underbody rust protection work done on this vehicle by Rufus whose shop is on Antwerp Road in Grabill, Indiana. We talked over the work to be done, pricing, etc., and with a shake of the hand and by word of mouth, Rufus did a great job as we

Living overseas has taught me that business happens in a different way there than in small-town Indiana often times. For an apartment I had bought all the furniture we needed directly from the factory that made it in order to save money. It was not assanded, stained. I knew I could handle that job myself. I had completed different pieces of

furniture when I realized I just didn't have the space anymore to complete the table and hutch. I found a local business to sand and paint those last pieces who offered me a fair market price, but not cheap. I agreed and hired a truck to move the furniture to the business and met the owner that was to sand and paint them. After I said hello" to the owner and mentioned the work and the price we agreed upon, he replied, "the price is now 25% more as we didn't make the previous agreement in writing." Knowing I would be in between a rock and a hard place, he had waited to inform me after the moving truck pulled away. He knew I would lose money to hire the truck back to pick up the unfinished furniture and leave if I didn't agree to his new price. I had no negotiating leverage (nor ability in the new language and culture), so reluctantly I went ahead with the overpriced work.

I still have a bitter taste in my mouth about how that furniture owner did business and took advantage of me. I have learned to be a little bit more wary when doing business transactions, and a lot more thankful for the people I can do transactions with by just a handshake and spoken

Penny For Your Thoughts By: Nancy Whitaker

I grew up many years ago and oh how things have changed. We lived in the country, out in the boonies and the most entertainment we ever had was going to church and Sunday dinners after church.



Something we had that my kids would not know about is a crank telephone and we knew everyone's ring. When the phones rang everyone would pick up the receiver and quietly listen in. Found out a lot of news that way. Our ring was 2 longs and a short. I still remember that detail.

We did have a radio and would listen to the Grand Old Opry on Sat night following our baths we took once a werk in a big round tub of hot wa-

My good church and school clothes were clean but either a hand me down or homemade. (Also in the winter I had a snow suit which I hated. It had this heavy wool coat and a pair of heavy wooly pants. When we went to school or church we took our good clothes off as soon as we got home and put on our play clothes. Or if it was night when we got home from church we put on our pretty homemade nighties.

Eating out at a restaurant was every now and then sometimes after church. We had no fast food restaurants, but eating a popsicle made of frozen koolaid was a treat on a hot day.

We did have Penny candy and sometimes, maybe once a month, we got to go to town to look around. And oh what

At that time our uptown was full of stores, bright lights, and oh I loved the 5 and 10 cents stores. If I saved up, 25 cents might buy me a few chocolate drops or a bag of warm peanuts.

When I was home, I liked

dolls either cut or punched out from a book. I built houses for them made of old boxes or pieces of paper. I loved dressing them and they all had names.

In the summer I remember lying in a clover field, looking up at the fluffy white clouds and wondering how the sky was going to hold all the people who were going to go to

We all ate dinner at the table. Grandma cooked wonderful meals of country fried ham, mashed potatoes, red eye gravy and fresh green beans. We always prayed before each meal sometimes holding hands as we thanked God for our food.

When we got company or my cousins came over, we would play games like Statute, Mother May I? and a game called Tennessee. (That game was a dandy one) Another game we played

was Red Rover. I always got called over because I was little and could never steal a person from the other team.

There was no bottled water; we drank from a pump and a well which had an old tin cup hanging from it. Yes, we all drank from the same cup and never heard tell of Covid. We ran around in the yard until dark and came in when mom hollered for us.

When it was bed time we slept in a big bedroom which was hot in the summer and sooo cold in the winter. Sometimes snow would come in around the windows and you could feel and hear the wind blowing the curtains. But it was toasty warm under those heavy comforters.

When I got to about age 14, I became interested in Elvis and the old time rock and roll. I got a little transistor radio and went upstairs to listen to a great radio station that played all the hits. The DJ's name was Paul Hershey.

My family frowned on dancing and one day I was stepping one off and got too close to a heat register which went through the upstairs floor and through the downstairs ceilings.

As I danced, stomping my feet, I felt the register give way and my legs and feet went through the ceiling downstairs. I was just hanging

Oh my! Grandma's doctor was there and I was in trouble. Grandma said, "Nancy Sue were you dancing to that old rock and roll stuff?"

I said, "Oh no, Grandma I was just exercising."

ber 13, 1960 when a driver stopped beside them and asked for directions. In a flash, the man grabbed Nancy and forced her into the car in full view of several homes and sped away, leaving Sheryl behind. Sheryl was able to run to a neighbor's house and give a description of the car.

Just six hours later, raccoon hunters found Nancy's body in a clearing about a hundred feet off of a rural road outside of town.

Unfortunately, all physical evidence from the case was lost before the advent of DNA and genetic genealogy. The family's last hope is that some piece of evidence can still be found by re-examining Nancy's remains. DNA labs used for genetic genealogy have recently been successful in pulling data from a sample as small as four human cells.

Some of the funding for the exhumation and new DNA testing has already been raised by Nancy's family. The rest will be funded by The Porchlight Project, a nonprofit that raises funds for DNA testing and genetic genealogy for Ohio cold cases.

Jeanne Windsor, an advocate for the Eagleson family was integral in helping De-Muth complete the paperwork for the motion at court. And the online cold case data-

base, Uncovered.com, helps to maintain reports and research related to Nancy's unsolved murder. Both Jolynn Rice and Rachael Rosselet at Uncovered have personally helped the Eagleson family connect with media and law enforce-

"This exhumation means so much to our family," says Nancy's surviving sisters, Sheryl Garza and Merrill Miller. "We have been waiting 62 years for some closure and justice for Nancy. In 1985 we found out Nancys physical evidence was lost or misplaced or discarded so this exhumation may provide the DNA we need to solve her case."

"14-year-old Nancy Eagleson was abducted from a quiet country road in 1960 and killed short thereafter," says Nic Edwards, spokesperson for The Porchlight Project. "Her family and the community of Paulding have been searching for answers ever since. This exhumation may be the last chance we have to get those answers and get justice for a little girl."

Nancy's family will host a public concert fundraiser Sunday, September 18 at 2 p.m. at the Branch Christian Fellowship, featuring former Pauling High School football star, Paul J. Miles, an awardwinning songwriter, who will perform a tribute song about

The 58,000 ton Leviathon was the largest ship in the world at the time. Hoboken, now became famous as a port of departure for European war. The slogan, "Heaven, Hell or Hoboken," was taken to Europe by the "Dough Boys". The first convoy carrying American troops to war left Hoboken on June 14, 1917, some being Paulding County boys. Fourteen transport ships, carrying 11,991 officers, enlisted men, and civilians departed the city. A total of 936 voyages to France and England were made from Hoboken during the war.

Approximately two million servicemen passed through Hoboken between the spring of 1917 and the fall of 1918. The first troops to return to America arrived in Hoboken on December 2, 1918. After the war, Hoboken made the rough transito peacetime felt throughout the country. The, "Leviathan", was turned over to an American shipping company and commercial life returned to the docks. May 23, 1921, 5112

coffins arrived in the port of Hoboken, containing the bodies of American soldiers, sailors, marines and nurses who had died fighting in Europe during World War 1. President Warren G. Harding was there to mark the occasion and noted, "We shall not forget, no matter whether they lie amid the sweetness and the bloom of the homeland or sleep in the soil they crimsoned. Our mindfulness, our gratitude, our reverence shall be in the preserved Republic and maintained liberties and the supreme justice for which they died." Now you know the rest of the story.

Parents must complete a Free/Reduced priced Breakfast/Lunch Application form in order for school officials to verify your household income status for qualification of either a free or reduced price for breakfast and/or lunch during the 2022-2023 school year. Applications will be placed in elementary student packets and may be picked up at Open House August 23rd or they will be sent home with elementary students their first day of school. MS/HS students will have an application attached to their class schedules.

Note that students who qualify for free breakfast/lunch may also qualify for waivers of workbook fees or P-EBT cards. Letters are being sent to families who are pre-qualified for the program. how the Black Swamp was created during the age of glaciers, how it impeded travel and settlement, the heroic efforts of early settlers to clear trees and drain the swamp, and the transformation of the land into productive and modern farms. Much of the story is told through old photographs of pioneer days, selected from museums and collections throughout region. Sharp-eyed viewers will recognize several of the images as originating in Paulding County.

By: Ron Burt Kody Swanson won the pole and led all 100 laps of the Hemelgarn Racing/Super Fitness Rollie Beale Classic for USAC Silver Crown cars at Toledo Speedway, last Saturday. It was the fourth victory in a row and sixth so far in his career at Toledo Speedway. The driver from Kingsburg, California, going into this race was tied with the driver this event is named in memory of, Rollie Beale. Swanson is now the all-time winner of USAC races at Toledo Speedway. He has led 655 laps out of the 1,000 laps ever run in this series at the Toledo half-mile

Kody Swanson has won the last three USAC Silver Crown races. Six races remain on the 2022 Silver Crown schedule. Swanson leads the point standings with 384 points to Logan Seavey's 366 and C.I. Leary's 346 as he seeks an unprecedented seventh series championship. He is already the winningest driver in series history. Saturday night's victory was number 36. With this pole he became the series' first driver to have at least six pole positions at two different tracks. In addition to Toledo Motor Speedway, he has excelled at Indianapolis Raceway Park. Next up for the USAC Silver Crown Series will be from World Wide Technology Raceway in Madison, Ill., on Aug. 19. Most Silver Crown races are streamed live on Flo Racing.




