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

He shared a convenient, false excuse he likely heard from someone else because he didn't even know where it was found. He said something like, they made some round basin and gave the diameter and circumference, but it wasn't PI square (ratio of the circumference of a circle to the diameter

- 3.14159). I suggested he must be referring to the molten sea in I Kings 7:23 which was ten cubits in diameter and thirty cubits in circumference - "And he made a molten sea, ten cubits from the one brim to the other: it was round all about, and his height was five cubits: and a line of thirty cubits did compass it round about." It was speaking in whole cubit measurements. The Bible was exact in cubits given.

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my house to my church I would say six miles - not six miles, twenty-seven feet plus 2

"Serving overseas as a small-town boy from America is intense, stressful and humorous! Enjoy a lighthearted story with me from our last 20 years overseas!"



In order to move overseas, it often requires much paperwork and waiting. Our paperwork process took 8 months, so I took a job as a substitute teacher at a rough Fort Wayne, Indiana elementary school until we left. Severely cutting himself in a chainsaw accident, the gym teacher took early retirement, and I took his job till the end of the school year. Each class was an adventure of taking kids to the nurse's or principal's office because of injury to themselves, others or even to me the teacher. When the time came for the Presidential Physical Fitness Test, most kids were less than excited. I tested the entire school of kids for a week. At the end of the week, only one student in the entire school met the standard for his age. The one passing student's name was read aloud, and he was congratulated over the school's PA. Then the students, teachers, and parents started coming to me. How could only one student pass? Did I conduct the tests incorrectly? Had the standards been raised too high that year? I called the recuperating and newly retired teacher at his home to get his input. He replied, "I forgot to tell you to 'adjust the numbers' so a few kids pass in each grade. I have been doing it that way my

whole career." When we moved overseas,

I learned many people preferred twisted truth too. I took a language class to be able to communicate in our new country. During the course, for some reason or another, I was unable to complete an assignment on time. When the teacher began collecting the assignment in front of the class, I told her, "I am sorry, I have not completed the assignment." 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MILITARY HISTORY IN PAULDING COUNTY



Sgt. Daniel Alexander Kanipe was not a Paulding County boy, but has the making of a good read. Daniel has the fame of being the only survivor of the famed Company C, 7th Cavalry under Lt. Colonel George Armstrong Custer.

Daniel was born April 15, 1853, in Marion, McDowell County, North Carolina. The son of Jacob and Rebecca Isabella (Mosteller) Kanipe. By 1870, Daniel was a farm laborer living at home with his five siblings and two house guests, in Marion, North Carolina.

August 7, 1872, Daniel left home and went to Lincolnton, North Carolina and enlisted into the United States Cavalry. He was assigned to Company C. of the 7th Cavalry commanded by Captain Thomas Custer, George's brother. Daniel was engaged in the 1873 Yellowstone campaign, the 1874 Black Hills campaign, and the 1876 Sioux campaign.On June 26, 1876, as Custer's men were heavily engaged, Sgt. Daniel Kanipe was sent back with a message to Captain Thomas McDougall, commander of the pack train, to bring up ammo

Sgt. Kanipe was able to avoid the fate that was to come to the men of Custer's column. All on all, out of over 700 men, the 7th Cavalry losses were 268 killed and 55 wounded. On April 12, 1877, Sgt. Daniel Kanipe married a widow named, Missouri Ann Wycoff Bobo. They had ten children, but the interesting thing is that Missouri's first husband, Sgt.

Edwin Lemuel Bobo, was a friend of Daniel Kanipe. Sgt. Bobo was killed at the Battle of Little Big Horn. Sgt. Bobo was a member of Company C. Sgt. Bobo's body was found near the remains of Captain Miles Keough of Company I, Was Sgt. Bobo delievering a message to Keough? Company I. and C. were the right wing of the 7th Cavalry. It is said, that Daniel identified the body of his friend, Edwin Bobo.

Daniel raised the two children that Edwin and Missouri had together. On April 14, 1879, Bobo's widow, Missouri, received a survivors pension. By 1880, Sgt. Daiel Kanipe was still in the military serving at Ft. Meade, Lawerence County, Dakota Territory.



By eary 1900, Daniel had retired from the military and joined the United States Revenue Service. He served this post for twenty years. By 1910, Daniel was living with his wife and six children in Marion, North Carolina. During World War 1, Daniel served as Captain in the 19th North Carolina Militia.

By 1920, Daniel, Missouri and two children were still living in North Carolina in Marion on Main Street. Daniel began engaged in farming. Sgt. Daniel Kanipe passed away, July 18, 1926 in Marion, North Carolina. He died from Apoplexy, high blood presure and arteriosclerosis. On August 10, 1926, his wife, Missouri, filed for his pension. Missouri Ann Kanipe passed away May 25, 1934. They are both buried in Oak Grove Cemetery, Marion, North Carolina.



VAN WERT POST INVESTIGATES SERIOUS INJURY MOTORCYCLE

The Van Wert Post of the Ohio State Highway Patrol is currently investigating a very serious injury crash that occurred on US 224 near Convoy Road on September 17, 2022 at approximately 8:15

Jeremy Demoss, age 48, of Payne, Ohio, was operating a black 2001 Harley Davidson motorcycle eastbound on US 224 and failed to negotiate a curve. Mr. Demoss traveled off the right side of the roadway, through a ditch, entering a corn field, overturning the motorcycle. Mr. Demoss was not wearing a helmet and was severely injured. He was transported by Van Wert EMS to Van Wert Health where he was then transported by Lutheran Air ambulance to St. Rita's Hospital

Every rail crossing in Ohio is required to post the U.S. Department of Transportation number associated with the crossing and the emergency contact number for the railroad. If your vehicle stalls or gets stuck on the tracks, get out immediately and move away from the tracks at a 45 degree angle towards any oncoming train. Once it is safe to do so, the emergency number, visibly located near the crossing on the light poles or cross bucks, should be the first number you call if your vehicle is stuck or if warning devices aren't properly functioning. The railroad has the ability to stop the flow of train traffic heading towards the crossing. If it is an emergency, next call 9-1-1 or the local

With 36 freight railroads approximately 5,300 miles of track and over 5,600 public grade crossings, Ohio is the fifth leading state in terms of goods transported by rail. The PUCO, in conjunction with the Ohio Rail Development Commission, is responsible for ensuring the safety of motorists at highway-rail grade crossings in Ohio. PUCO rail inspectors inspect the warning devices that are essential for motorist safety.

In 2021, there were 53 train-vehicle collisions at public railroad crossings in Ohio, including 4 fatalities. Find more Ohio rail crossing statistics at the PUCO web-
