I slammed the long, heavy door shut with my right hand, but had left my left hand on the edge of the door frame, slamming my pinkie in the door. I didn't even know I had even done it until I felt a jerk on my arm as I began walking to the store -

the nerve was pinched. I started to panic. It didn't hurt, but I was stuck in the parking lot. It must have been quite a sight! I was grateful to finally see a woman coming out of the store. When I explained what happened, she went hysterical. I managed to calm her down and send her in search of my mom. Mom arrived and opened the car door, bringing feeling back to the pinched and mangled finger -Oooouch! Mom got me to a

nearby doctor and Grandma met us there. My grandma tried to smile and tell me everything was alright as the doctor tried to reconnect everything, but she accidentally looked at my pinkie and immediately threw up. It didn't help reassure me, but through good medical care, it recovered almost completely.

A couple decades later, I was overseas at the car dealership getting our vehicle serviced. I managed to lock myself out of the car. I wasn't happy, but not upset either, as nothing is as bad as getting locked TO a car. I asked the technician to open the car, and he surprised me by saying that he couldn't open it, as he didn't have the key code. He went to his computer to see what window was the cheapest to break and replace. He proceeded to hit that window a dozen times before he managed to break it and get out the key.

I now hide a key in a little magnetic box under our vehicle. I also am extra careful before closing car doors. Home side mishaps have helped me to avoid greater ones overseas, where it is more complicated to get resolved.

Dear Parson, I was trying to help a friend with a sin problem and he said the Bible says, "Judge not." Does that mean I should not try to help them?

That verse of Scripture in Matthew 7:1 has been misused by many people. The word "judge" here is "krini" in the Greek, which means to condemn or damn. In other words, we are not to act as a judge who passes the sentence. That is God's part.

However, we are commanded to do the following:

- Discern wrongdoing: "Try the spirits whether they are of God." – I John 4:1
- Warn the wicked to save his life: "When I say unto the wicked, Thou shalt surely die; and thou givest him not warning, nor speaketh to warn the wicked from his wicked way, to save his life; the same wicked man shall die in his iniquity; but his blood will I require at thine hand." – Ezekiel
- Reprove and rebuke: "If thy brother trespass against thee, rebuke him." - Luke 17:3; "And have no fellowship with the unfruitful works of darkness, but rather reprove them." - Ephesians 5:11; "Preach the word...reprove, rebuke, exhort with all longsuffering and doctrine." – II Timothy 4:2; "Wherefore re-buke them sharply, that they

may be sound in the faith." Titus 1:13; "These things speak, and exhort, and rebuke with all authority." – Titus 2:15. There are two important

keys to handling these matters. First, your purpose must be restoration! Galatians 6:1 says, "Brethern, if a man be overtaken in a fault...restore such an one..." Secondly, your spirit must be right! The rest of Galatians 6:1 says we are to restore "...in the spirit of meekness." II Corinthians 2:4 shows how Paul reproved with tears and love. I believe one of the greatest passages in the Bible on this subject is II Timothy 2:24-26, "And the servant of the Lord must not strive; but be gentle unto all men, apt to teach, patient, In meekness instructing those that oppose themselves; if God peradventure will give them repentance to the acknowledging of the truth; And that they may recover themselves out of the snare of the devil, who are taken captive by him at his

MILITARY HISTORY IN **PAULDING COUNTY**

Don Carlos Jaquette was born April 7, 1894 in Washington Township, Paulding County, Ohio. The son of Charles H. born August 28, 1861 in Uniontown, Pennsylvania and Mary Jeannette (Hickerson) Jaquette, born April 16, 1862 in McComb,



It was thought that Don was born in the house on the farm where the family lived. That location was in the northeast corner of Section 31 of Washington Township. The Jaquette family consisted of 3 boys and 1 girl. A farming family that still had the children in school.

By 1900, the family was still living on the family farm with the older sons helping dad with the farm. By 1910, all three sons were helping dad. Don finished high school and became a school teacher and he taught at the Robison School. I'm not sure of the schools location, guessing it was close to home. By 1915, Don, still single, had moved to 227 12th Street in Toledo, Ohio. He was working in a

bearing factory as a machin-

joined Company H. of the 6th Ohio National Infantry Guard. On June 5, 1917, at Toledo, Ohio, Don had registered for the draft. Draft records show Don as tall, slender build, blue eyes and light hair. Don served in the National Guard until August 17, 1917. He was taken in the draft and given the rank of Private, July 23, 1917, to serve with 166th Infantry, also known as the Rainbow Division. Don was shipped out with the 166th at Hoboken, New Jersey on the ship, "Pastores" October 18, 1917. Don was promoted to Private 1st Class, November 6, 1917, where he was with the Headquarters Company. His unit served in the Champagne-Marne, Aisne- Marne, St. Mihiel, Muese- Argonne, Defensive Sector.

On October 18, 1918, Don Carlos Jaquette was killed in action. In November 1918, Don's parents, Charles and Mary, who had moved to 335 East Hardin Street, Findlay, Ohio, received a telegram of the news that he had been killed. Don became the first Grover Hill boy to die in World War 1. Don Carlos Iaquette, was buried in the Muese-Argonne Cemetery in Romagne- sous- Montaucon, Muese, France in Block A., Row 43, Grave 14.

In 1929, the federal government paid for mothers to go to France to see the graves of their sons. It is unclear if she ever went. Records list her trip as "unknown". Charles and Mary lived out their days in Findlay. Charles passed away September 4, 1948 in Findlay. Mary passed away March 31, 1943 in Findlay. Both were buried in McComb Union Cemetery, McComb, Ohio. They had inscribed on the stone, "In Memory of Don

Carlos 1894-1918 Pvt 1" Class

Hdq. Co. 166th Inf. 42 Div."

ORDC APPROVES GRANT **FUNDING TO APACKAGING GROUP IN DEFIANCE**

On January 19, 2022, the Ohio Rail Development Commission (ORDC) approved a grant in the amount of \$100,000 to assist APackaging Group (APG) with the construction of rail infrastructure at its new 80,000 s.f. facility to be built in Defiance. APG plans to construct an approximately \$49 million facility located on the Napoleon Defiance & Western Railway. The company will create 135 jobs once the project is complete.

Based in California, APG currently has five distribution locations in the US and Canada. APG is a single source manufacturer of highend, standard and customized packaging products for the cosmetics, skincare, and personal care industries with over 2,000 stock and customizable solutions. Formed by Helga Arminak in 2019, APG offers a full line of cosmetics packaging, airless pump bottles and eco-friendly packaging. The new facility in Defi-

ance will be APG's first manufacturing facility in the US. The company will produce up to 500 million plastic dispensing pumps for the health and beauty industry when fully operational. The project will help meet additional demand from customers, specifically with increasing requirements to onshore production due to recent supply chain disrup-

"It is always our goal to assist businesses who are making investments in our state. This project is especially rewarding for ORDC because of the long-term partnership with the Napoleon Defiance & Western to upgrade the rail line which allows the company to utilize rail capabilities in order to move its product. This project is a win for everyone," said Matthew Dietrich,

Executive Director of the Ohio Rail Development Commission.

Will Nguyen, Director of Engineering for APG said "we greatly appreciate the ORDC's assistance with this project. We couldn't have done it without their assistance. We look forward to the growth this opportunity has given our busi-

Due to rising costs, especially with wholesale power costs and the COVID-19 pandemic, PPEC implemented a small increase to the service charge for residential members beginning on the January 2022 billing statement. This is the first increase PPEC has had since 2018 and represents only a 1.2% increase for the average residential member. The residential service charge is now \$35 per month, as compared to \$32.95.

The Outstanding Research Award honors a tenured, fulltime faculty member for outstanding performance in the area of research, scholarly activity, or creative endeavor. The honoree must have achieved an exceptional record of contributions to the body of knowledge or creative works in his or her discipline-and must also have had great success communicating that information to a wide audience.
