
OHIO TOTAL SOLAR ECLIPSE **MEETING IN PAULDING**



The Paulding County Emergency Management Agency hosted last Tuesday, the Ohio EMA's presentation on the 2024 Total Solar Eclipse. Mr. Collin Campbell and Ms. Christen Swayer-Cunningham of the Planning Branch of Ohio EMA discussed the importance of planning now for the Total Solar Eclipse occurring on April 8th, 2024. Paulding County's Solar Eclipse Committee was joined by Defiance County government leaders.

The presentation discussed many facets of the anticipated event. Paulding County is one of 55 counties in the state of Ohio, to be in the path of the Total Solar Eclipse. The last recorded total solar eclipse that was observed in Ohio was back in 1809 and the next one will not be until 2444. The state of Ohio is the site of the most

By: Dr. James Bachman Dear Parson, Does the Bible ever permit divorce?


PARSON TO PERSON

The Pharisees Matthew 19:3 wanted Christ to list the causes for divorce. Jesus responded in verses four through six, "And he answered and said unto them, Have ye not read, that he which made them at the beginning made them male and female. And said, For this cause shall a man leave his father and mother, and shall cleave to his wife: and they twain shall be one flesh? Wherefore they are no more twain, but one flesh. What therefore God hath joined together, let not man put asunder." Matthew 19:3-9 makes it clear there should be no divorce.

They asked why Moses permitted divorce Deuteronomy 24. Christ said it was because of the hardness of their hearts. The context of Deuteronomy 24 was if a man should take a wife who declared, or her father declared her to be a virgin, and it was discovered she was not; he could divorce her for her fraud. Though that was permissible, it was better to forgive her and go on, but the hard, unforgiving hearts of man usually would remain bitter. Matthew 19:9 says, "And I say unto you, Whosoever shall put away his wife, except it be for fornication, and shall marry another, committeth adultery: and whosoever marrieth her which is put away doth commit adultery." I Corinthians 7:10-11 states: "And unto the married I command, yet not I, but the Lord, Let not the wife depart from her husband: But and if she depart, let her remain unmarried, or be reconciled to her husband: and let not the husband put away (divorce) his







KLOPFENSTEIN VOTES IN FAVOR OF HISTORIC TRANSPORTATION BUDGET

The Ohio House of Representatives yesterday passed House Bill 23, the historic state transportation budget for fiscal 2024-25, announced State Rep. Roy Klopfenstein (R-Haviland).

One of the biggest wins was an amendment to raise the statutory limits on force accounts, which creates significant financial challenges for maintaining local roads

"Over the past decade, the costs of construction, labor, material, and equipment have greatly increased, but force account limits stay the same," Klopfenstein said. "Combine this issue with rising inflation costs, and the amount of work counties can perform to upkeep their infrastructure drastically decreases. It was vital for the limits on force accounts to be raised in this budget."

Other key components of the bill include:

• Investing \$2.2 billion for pavement, \$717 million for bridges, \$360 million for dedicated safety upgrades, and \$1.5 billion for large, capacity adding projects like those that are reconfiguring our urban interstates.

• Committing \$15 million to establish the Ohio Workforce Mobility Partnership Program, which allows one or more regional transit authorities (RTA) to work together to provide service for the workforce between the territories and support

Q. So what exactly happens in the show?

A. The first half of the show is a glamorous awards show, hosted by our hilarious emcee extraordinaire. Four master thespians take turns coming to the stage and drawing song titles from the bowl. They take those titles and turn them into fullblown improvised songs, fighting tooth and nail against each other to win the grand prize of the evening -the Phony Award. It's like the Tony Award but, you know,

Q. Where does the musical come in?

A. After we do four songs, there's a vote, and the winning song gets turned into a full-on made-up musical in the second half.

Q. Can I bring my chil-

A. Yes! Our show is 100% family-friendly. No cursing and nothing foul. There may be fowl, but no guarantees. It's 90 minutes of laughter.

Q. You're just kidding about not knowing the titles. You surely look through them first or have something prepared. Are you for real?

A. We really, truly, might pick your title. And if we don't, we might pick your friend's. Or your husband's. Or your kid's. Or a goodlooking stranger's. We don't see those song titles until we are pulling them out in front of you onstage. Risky, right? We promise every single word is made up on the spot right before your very eyes! If you come see us more than once, we guarantee you'll never hear the same song twice.

Q. What about the piano player? Does he play from stock melodies? A. Nope again. The piano

player is also making everything up. Crazy, right? Piano Player Gary served as the musical director for Broadway's Avenue Q for its entire six-and-a-half-year Other NYC conducting credits include The Radio City Christmas Spectacular, Kinky Boots, The Fantasticks, and Next to Normal. MILITARY HISTORY IN PAULDING COUNTY



Guy Fleming Heazlet was born November 30, 1890 in Omaha, Nebraska. Son of Perry, born March of 1851 in Ohio and Mary Eliza (White) Heazlet, born 1856 in Ohio. This couple was married October 25, 1881 in Cuyahoga County, Ohio. The Heazlet family moved to Paulding County in 1892.

By 1900, the Heazlet couple, plus children, Edith J., Guy F. and Elsie M. were living in Crane Township. Perry was engaged in farming. On June 11,1908, daughter Edith married a fella named William J. Gordan in Pauld-

Born in 1909. By 1910, the Heazlet family, Perry, Mary and Elsie were still living in Crane Township. Guy had moved on his own, but unclear of where he went, but he was working for his father.

By 1917, war was looming in Europe. On June 5, 1917, Guy registered for the draft at the Crane Township precinct. He was single, short in height, medium build, gray eyes and sandy hair. He joined the National army out of Paulding,

On April 28, 1918 he was assigned to 11th Company, 3rd Training Battalion, 158th Depot Brigade and served until May 3, 1918. Then he was assigned to Company F., 329th Infantry, 83rd Division and shipped out to France June 12, 1918. The ship's name was the "Anchises". Shipped out from Hoboken, New Jersey. He was assigned to Company L., 101st Infantry and served as a Private seeing action at St. Mihiel, and Muese-Argonne defensive sector, and was wounded in action, October 24, 1918.

He served until December 9, 1918. He was Honorably Discharged January 27, 1919 with a claim of 20% disability.

Guy met and married a gal named, Eva J. Stuart July 26, 1919 in Paulding. By 1920, Guy and Eva J.

were living in Crane Township and engaged in farming and Guy became a school teacher. On May 22, 1921 a daugh-

ter, Edith Celestia, was born. A son, Robert F., was born July 10, 1923, (he served in World War Two). A daughter, Ruby, was born November 27,

This household employed housekeeper, Mytle F. Miller. By 1930, the Heazlet family was living in Crane Township. Guy was working as a farmer. By 1940, the Heazlet family had moved to Main Street in Cecil, Ohio. Guy still teaching at school. In 1942, Guy, at the age of 51, had to register for the World War Two draft.

By 1950, Guy and Eva were empty nesters and still living on Main Street, Cecil. Guy was a Junior High teacher at Paulding High School. In 1951, Guy discovered that he had cancer. And in February of 1952, Guy went to the Veterans Administration Hospital in Ft. Wayne and on March 28, 1952, at the age of 62 he passed away from Lymphatic Leukemia.

Guy taught school for more than 40 years. Funeral services were held at the Presbyterian Church in Cecil and burial in Rochester Cemetery in Section 3, Row 4. His wife passed away in 1986 and was buried alongside Guy.

People from all walks of life watch racing and participate in the sport. It seems natural that a mechanical engineer would take interest in racing and car designs, and, think of ways to make a car go faster but when you have two brothers, both in the same field of work, you have double the ideas. It sounds like a great formula for speed. If you follow my Facebook blog, Ohio Sports Blitz, you've seen a couple of posts from Zitzka Racing. I've reposted pictures of their new Supermodified that they will share driving duties in this season.

Kenvon and Rvan Zitzka both raced Three-Quarter (TQ) Midgets from 2000 to 2006 near their home at Lancaster Speedway Kenyon has recently returned to the TQs racing in 20021 and 2002. During the off-season the brothers purchased the former McVetta #29 Rocket Chassis Supermodified. Mike McVetta built it around 2014 or 2015 and he had made some iterative improvements over the years. The engine is a 467 CI big block Chevy that was originally built by Brad Malcuit. Once Kenyon and Ryan get the Supermodified finished they intend to run the ISMA/MSS series plus a couple of Oswego non-wing races this year. They grew up

attending races at Oswego and now they will be racing their own car at this famous racing shrine. Racing fans know this one of the top asphalt tracks in the country. The series will also bring them near us at Lorain and Sandusky Speedways this summer.

They both have open

wheel experience, but a Super is a lot different than a TQ Midget. These cars are more arrow dynamic and set low to the track like Indy cars. Some events they can run wings to hold the car down for better grip and other races will be nonwing. Fans have a big misconception about wings on Supermodifieds. When the cars run the top wing people think the driver controls the wing angle. Some don't realize it's all automatic with the air pressure in the pneumatic cylinders. These two enjoy designing and building cars. Their goal is to build a Supermodified of their own design in the coming years. I like their enthusiasm and after they get some track time the sky will be the limit. I will check in on them this season and next fall see what personal

goals they reached in 2023.




