

MILITARY HISTORY IN PAULDING COUNTY



Oliver Raymond Bissell was born in Antwerp, October 22, 1894 he was the son of Oliver Peter, born August of 1860 in New York and Clara C. (Cluts) Bissell born in 1866 in Ohio. They were married September 14, 1884 in Paul-

By 1900, Oliver and Clara were raising four children, William E. born July 9, 1886, Clara A. born January 30, 1890, Oliver R. October 22, 1894, and Harry N. born August 6, 1900. This family was living in Crane Township on a farm. By 1910, this family added a daughter, Blanche, born August 12, 1906.

The Bissell family was living on River Road on a farm. I believe this road to be road #192 outside Antwerp. Oliver had quit school after the eighth grade. He was not living with his parents at his time. Oliver was living with Ervin and Elizabeth Edward in Emerald working as a farm laborer. By 1915, or so, Oliver had been working for the Hicksville Township in Defiance County as a farmer, County farm land? Oliver was living outside Antwerp, Route 3, when on June 5, 1917 at Crane Precinct in Pauling County, Oliver registered for the draft.

Listed as 5'10", medium

weight, blue eyes and brown hair. He became a "doughboy" in the army July 22, 1918. He was sent to serve 158th Depot Brigade for training. He served until August 14, 1918. September 3, 1918, he was shipped out from Brooklyn, New York on the ship, "Vasari" to go to France. Then sent to Company A., 325 Machine Gun Battalion, serving until November 1, 1918. Serving in Company B., 112 Machine Gun Battalion until he was Honorably Discharged June 2,

By 1920, after coming home, he lived with his parents. He met a gal named Jessie Leona Gorman, born October 30, 1904. They married February 25, 1925 in Coldwater, Branch County, Michigan. The couple moved to Antwerp.

By 1930, Oliver was making furniture as an upholsterer in Antwerp. The couple lived at 307 West Washington Street, Antwerp. By 1940, Oliver and Jessie were still at 307 West Washington Street, Oliver was a carpenter. In 1942, Oliver, at the age of 47, had to register for the World War Two draft. He was not chosen to serve. By 1950, Oliver and Jessie were living at the same address. Oliver had his own construction busi-

Not sure what happened to his health, but on December 20, 1952, Oliver passed away. He was buried at Maumee Cemetery. His wife, Jessie, applied for Oliver's Military tombstone. The stone was shipped to the Cottrell- Boylan American Legion in Antwerp. Jessie filed for Social Security death benefits, January 31, 1953. Jessie never remarried and passed away, April 5, 1988 in Paulding, at the Hospital. Oliver and Jessie never had children. She was buried alongside Oliver in Maumee Cemetery.

OHIO LAKE ERIE COMMISSION REQUESTS PUBLIC COMMENTS ABOUT **MAUMEE AREA**

The Ohio Lake Erie Commission and Ohio EPA are accepting comments through May 22, 2023, on the proposed removal of the "Degradation of Aesthetics" beneficial use impairment within the Maumee Area of Concern (AOC).

Beneficial use impairments (BUIs) identify specific problems that can prevent a waterbody from meeting its full water quality potential. The Ohio Lake Erie Commission and Ohio EPA recommend removing the Degradation of Aesthetics BUI because the conditions now meet the restoration target. To meet the target, there cannot be persistent sludge deposits, oil sheens, or other materials within the Maumee AOC that may produce a nuisance.

A summary of the proposed recommendation is available on Ohio EPA's website.

The director of the Ohio EPA serves as the Commission's chairperson. Additional members include directors of the state departments of Transportation,

Health, Development, Agriculture, Natural Resources and five additional members appointed by the Governor.

Ohio EPA was created in 1972 to consolidate efforts to protect and improve air quality, water quality and waste management in Ohio. Since then, air pollutants dropped by as much as 90 percent, large rivers meeting standards improved from 21 percent to 89 percent, and hundreds of polluting, open dumps were replaced with engineered landfills and an increased emphasis on waste reduction and recycling.



VISIT GRABILL!

I grew up on a farm 2 miles south of Grabill and remember the glory days when the small towns where the hub of the community. The quick trip to town, when a bolt broke on the disc. Once a week to grind feed for the cows, pigs, and chickens. In those days there were two grist mills in town.

Every Saturday night meant a shopping trip to Grabill. The bandwagon was rolled out in the middle of Main Street, and a local group preformed, or perhaps Nancy Lee and the Hilltoppers, or Redbirds. A stop for candy at the General Store and a soda at the drugstore. At the end of the evening there was a free drawing sponsored by the merchants. Grabill began in 1902 when the Wabash Railroad came through and made a water stop on the Joe Grabill farm. When the train stopped passengers could board, therefore a station was built. Harlan and Leo, just 2 mi away were settled 70 years earlier and were thriving towns. But Grabill took off like a rocket. The railroad drew many people to town, and businesses sprung up quickly.

We moved to town nearly a half decade ago, never intending to stay living in town. The town seemed to go downhill for years. The grocery went out and for years we had no



grocery store. Some years ago businessman, brought Save-A-Lot to town, and build a bulk grocery store.

He bought and remodeled the old Souder Furniture building, remodeled the Elias Ruff building for a coffee shop, and build a 6 unit apartment house on "The Slab." 17 years ago a businessman had planned on building a store on the main intersection and had poured a huge slab. This stood as an eyesore, until the Amish guy planned how it could be

The most unique store is H. Souder and Sons General Store. The proprietors, Beth and Sasha, are direct descendants of Henry Souder.

Beth started working in the original General Store when she was 8 years old. Her displays are beautiful. The store is quite rustic and quite

Each time my grandkids visit, it means a trip to the Candy Store. Over the years we have many memories.

Pick a beautiful day, bring your appetite, and spend a few hours exploring or just hanging out. I haven't mentioned many of the businesses, like the completely remodeled Old Barn Restaurant. If it is a beautiful summer day, you'll probably find me at the Candy Store, with a Mexican Coke and a bag of licorice.

SPECIAL FISHING **REGULATIONS SET AT LAKE** LA SU AN WILDLIFE AREA

Ohio Department of Natural Resources (ODNR) Division of Wildlife fisheries biologists have set the 2023 special fishing regulations at Lake La Su An Wildlife Area in Williams County. The area is open to fishing from May 5 to September 4, 2023.

Fishing is permitted on Mondays, Fridays, Saturdays, and Sundays from sunrise to sunset during the open season. Lake La Su An Wildlife Area is closed to fishing at all other times. Visitors are reminded that reservations are not needed to fish at the lakes on Lake La Su An Wildlife Area, but all vehicles are required to park in a designated parking space.

The sunfish daily limit is 15, with no more than five sunfish of 8 inches or larger. Largemouth bass have an 18inch minimum length requirement and a five-fish

daily limit. Channel catfish have a two-fish daily limit. Daily limits are posted on site and are in effect area wide. Anglers may only catch up to one daily limit regardless of how many lakes are fished. All other statewide fishing regulations apply to the area's lakes. Anglers are also reminded that no fish may be used as bait on the area.

These regulations are designed by Division of Wildlife fisheries biologists to continue the tradition of quality bluegill fishing on the Lake La Su An Wildlife Area lakes. The Division of Wildlife maintains healthy fish populations at Lake La Su An by limiting the number of days the lakes are open to fishing and the number of sunfish taken home each day.

INVESTIGATION LEADS TO 116-COUNT FELONY INDICTMENT FOLLOWING CONVEYANCE AT NUMEROUS PRISONS



COLUMBUS - Three suspects have been indicted in the Franklin County Court of Common Pleas on a combined 116 counts of conveyance-related charges after an investigation by troopers from the

Ohio State Highway Patrol's Office of Investigative Services and investigators from the Ohio Department of Rehabilitation & Correction's Chief Inspector's Office.

The investigation began on

May 28, 2021, when a drone containing contraband was located inside the perimeter fence of the Toledo Correctional Institution. Through the several months-long investigation, troopers and investigators identified three suspects, Robert A. Faulkner, 33, Columbus; Cory A. Sutphin, 28, Grove City; and Charles Gibbs, 33, Sandusky, who were utilizing drones to convey illegal drugs, phones and other contraband onto the grounds of the Toledo, Mansfield, Richland, and Ross correctional institutions, and the North Central Correctional Complex. As part of the investigation,

a search warrant was executed at Faulkner's Columbus residence on November 16, 2021, where a total of \$319,820 worth of illegal drugs, weapons, cell phones and contraband were located and seized. Troopers and investigators believe the contraband was suspected to be used in future conveyance operations at correctional institutions across

On April 7, 2023, Faulkner (60 felony counts), Sutphin (26 felony counts) and Gibbs (30 felony counts) were indicted. The indictment included engaging in a pattern of corrupt activity, trafficking and possession of cocaine and a fentanylrelated compound, possession of criminal tools, aggravated possession of drugs, and having weapons under disability.

If convicted, Faulkner could face a maximum of 142 years in prison; Sutphin could face a maximum of 69 years in prison; and Gibbs could face a maximum of 83 years and six months in prison.
