Dr. Winfield Christopher Meek passed away the morning of March 16th, 2023, at his home in Mansfield, Ohio.

He is survived by his wife of 52 years, Jayne Dysinger Meek; his daughter Erin (Anthony) Gill of Falls Church, VA; his daughter Angela (Robert) Becker of McCall, ID; his son Christopher Meek of Lexington, OH; Grandchildren Nathaniel, Henry, and Edward "Teddy" Gill of Falls Church, VA and Samuel and Paisley Becker of McCall, ID; and Sister Paula Meek of Hicksville, OH.

Winfield was preceded in death by his infant brother Myles Cooper Meek and parents Wendell Cooper Meek and Carma Hootman Meek. the Cherry Blossom Competition, when he marched with his Drill Team in a parade for President John F. Kennedy. Winfield was also a singing member of the ROTC Skytones, a member of Novice G. Fawcett's Committee of 88, and president of the Smith Resident Hall.

Following his graduation from OSU School of Dentistry, Winfield served in the dental office with the 780th Air Force Radar Station outside Fortuna, North Dakota and the 779th Air Force Radar Station in Opheim, Montana. In December of 1967, Winfield volunteered to join the United States Air Force in Vietnam and in February of 1968, he was assigned to the 6217 Combat Support Group at Ching Chang Kung AB in Taichang, Taiwan.

After completing two years of service, Winfield separated from active duty at McCord Air Force Base in Tacoma, Washington and pursued a graduate program in Periodontics at OSU College of Dentistry, graduating from the post-doctoral program in 1972. Winfield served as a clinical instructor in periodontics and oral diagnosis at OSU from 1969-1977.

While in graduate school, Winfield met a wonderful coed by the name of Jayne Elizabeth Dysinger, a young lady in the College of Education. They were married in Tipp City, Ohio in 1972, after which they relocated to Mansfield, Ohio, where Winfield began his 40-year career in Periodontics. He firmly believed that his greatest value to his patients was helping them to learn how to prevent the deterioration of and the preservation of natural dentin. He would often say "God made one original part, dentist only repair."

Winfield was a leader in both profession and his his community. Notably, he was an active member of the Mansfield Rotary Club for over 47 years, serving in many different roles over the course of his Winfield was membership. passionate about locating and collecting unused medical, dental, and hospital supplies and equipment to be redistributed to third world countries where their impact would be greatest. He worked with the Rotary District 6600 MESA program to deliver these supplies where they were needed most, including making trips to Honduras and Guatemala. Winfield served as President of both the Mansfield Dental Society and the Ohio Academy of Periodontics and was a lifetime member of the American Dental Society and the American Academy of Periodontology. He was a member of Westbrook Country Club and enjoyed the time spent with friends on the course. Winfield was also a member in the Mansfield Hermits Club.

I have many memories of growing up and watching the fireworks for the Fourth of July while straining my neck upwards while sitting on a blanket in the grass. It always seemed like the pyrotechnics crew each year knew how to lead us to believe it was over, to then put on yet another grand finale. I remember years when it was uncertain if the fireworks could even go off with rain or thunder showers forecast to arrive at the wrong time.

When you live overseas, you want to celebrate those important patriotic days with others who can appreciate their importance. In our first location overseas, it was with no small amount of excitement that we discovered the city had an American Club. The Club would be celebrating the Fourth of July, and we were excited to attend their event.

We arrived to a large restaurant which had an expansive patio area that was to be the place of the celebration. As we began to talk with people, we realized that none of

the attendees had any recognizable American accents not southerners, West Coast, East coast, etc. None of them were Americans. MILITARY HISTORY IN PAULDING COUNTY

Mathias Coplin was born in Antwerp, Ohio, January 15, 1891. The son of James L. Jr. born January 20, 1868 in Ohio, and Anna M. (Yenser) Coplin, born August 22, 1875 in Sandusky, Ohio. This couple was married July 13, 1890 in Paulding, Ohio. Three children were born into this marriage. Mathias 1891, Ralph Quick 1896, and Paul 1898.

By 1900, the Coplin family was living in Harrison Township, Paulding County. James was farming and Mathias was in school. Two daughters were born into this family, Ester Rachael February 11, 1901 and Martha A. April 25, 1903.

By 1910 the Coplin family was still farming in Harrison Township and Mathias was finishing high school as well as working on the farm.

On June 5, 1917, at the Payne north precinct, Mathias registered for the draft. He was working as a Railroad clerk for the New York Central and St. Louis Railroad system in Payne. He was listed as 5'6"tall, blue eyes, light hair, fair complexion and single. Also his brothers, Ralph and Paul registered for the draft. They were not chosen to serve.

On May 25, 1918, Mathias was selected to join the National Army out of Paulding. He was assigned to serve with Company H., 153rd Infantry at Camp Beauregard Louisiana until July 18, 1918. Mathias was sent to Newport News, Virginia, where he boarded the ship, "Huron", August 6, 1918.

He was assigned to Headquarters Company 153rd Infantry, November 7, 1918. Then was sent to Headquarters Company 164th Infantry until December 31, 1918. Finishing his tour of service with 3rd Company, 1st Replacement Department Labor Battalion. He was promoted to Private 1st Class, February 11, 1919. He served until July 18, 1919. Mathias was Honorably Discharged from service July 25, 1919.

After coming home from the service he was living with his mother and sister, Martha at Pio Pike in Harrison Township. His mother and father had divorced before 1920. His father, James, passed away December 6, 1927 in Ft. Wayne, Indiana and was buried in Riverside Cemetery in Antwerp.

By 1920, Mathias was a farm laborer. By 1930, Mathias and his mother, Anna, had moved to North Laura Street, Payne. He was a house painter.

By 1940, Mathias and Anna were still living on Laura Street. In 1942, Mathias, at the age of 51, had to register for the World War Two draft, as well as his brothers, Ralph and Paul and of course, none of them were chosen.

By 1950, Mathias was still

living in Payne. His health began to fail, he was not working and had filed for Social Security. On April 5, 1950, Mathias Coplin passed away and was buried in Wiltsie Cemetery, Payne. He never married.

His mother, Anna, lived with her daughter Martha and her family in Indiana. She passed away, March 8, 1954. She was also buried in Wiltsie Cemetery.

I knew Mathias's nephew, and son of Ralph, Stan Coplin, such a wonderful spiritual man. He let me make a copy of this photo. I spoke with him this summer, while we both were getting ice cream. Stan passed away November 7, 2022, he too was buried in Wiltsie Cemetery.

LETTER TO THE EDITOR

Over Memorial Day weekend, we saw on TV the National Memorial Day Concert 2023, as well as, news coverage of numerous ceremonies across the country. Hmmm! Not once did any one of us see a splash pad, merry-goround, or any other raucous form of entertainment right beside any veterans memorial /monument. What we did see were veterans, many wearing military uniforms, many wearing hats or caps representing their military organizations or branch of service, vets in wheelchairs, vets missing limbs or wearing prosthetics, Gold Star families, and POWs. We observed signs of respect, solemnity, and tears, not only from vets, but from the many participants in the ceremonies, and from all civilians in attendance.

We wish to re-state that we are not opposed to a splash pad, but we are opposed to its location so close to our meaningful, beautiful memorial. Are you aware that the splash pad area will be only 29 feet from the memorial? Are you aware that the holding tank with two motors, one constantly running, will be directly behind the memorial? Are you aware that pool strength chlorine and muriatic acid added to the water will in time damage the entire memorial? Are you aware that the pad is approximately 250 to 300 feet from the restrooms with no connecting sidewalk? (Can someone tell us what the CDC and the Ohio Department of Health says about that?)

So now comes to mind Keith West's comments at the February 15, 2023 Antwerp, Ohio Village council meeting, "I've talked with many VFW members and vets about the memorial and the placement of the splash pad. One of the main comments I get from the people is, that we think it's an honor for us to have our names there while those young kids are gonna be able to be there playing. We like it. And that's the gist of what the vets are feeling. We felt so strongly about it that together the Legion and the VFW gave a total of \$15,000 to the splash pad..... The vets are in favor of this, and we like things

the way they are." (Curious: Before voting on the donation, were members told the exact proposed location, or were just the words "in the park" presented to them?)

It appears that there has been a lack of transparency about the precise location of the pad. "In the park" is the classic description. Why do we even mention that? After all, there is information on the splash pad committee's website. Tell us, does every household in the Antwerp School District (the geographic area from which the names are on the monument tablets) have a computer? Does every household have the internet? We think not. There are many older citizens and less affluent households that don't have a computer and the internet.

Is it possible to keep our Veterans Memorial as it is, a solemn place to browse, sit quietly, reflect, and show respect for the persons whose names are on the granite tablets? e-scams and fraudulent schemes, the safer you will feel. Another way to protect yourself is by going to the Federal Trade Commission's (FTC's) ⁴ website. Its function is to protect America's consumers by educating and taking consumer complaints on everything from identity theft to unwanted telemarketing solicitations by phone or by email. It runs the National Do Not Call Registry,⁵ which you should sign up for. Once you are on the do-notcall list for at least 31 days, the calls/emails should stop, and if they don't then you can file a complaint with the FTC.

You can register each phone number that you have, and your registration won't expire. You can check the FTC's website if your phone number is still registered.5 Remember, it's not OK for companies to leave recorded voicemails on your phone, so you can file a complaint if you receive unwanted telemarketing robocalls. Once you are registered on the do-not-call list, it's illegal for those telemarketers to continue to call

you. Use your common sense. If you don't recognize the area code or the phone number on your caller ID, chances are it's a telemarketing call. Don't answer it, or if you do, insist that they take you off

their call list. To keep up to date on current scams that are plaguing consumers, the FTC has an email alert system that you can sign up for.6

vestigation (FBI) has a list of 14 common fraud schemes on its "Scams and Safety"1 web page, including credit card theft. The thief makes small purchases with your stolen credit card number and sees if they go through, if they do, then they hit your account for bigger purchases. You should have an email, text message, or phone alert set up with your credit card company, so that the bank will contact you if there are any unusual spending items, if there are illegitimate charges, you must report to the bank as soon as possible so you won't be charged for those items. The bank will lock your account and send you a new card in the mail. This can be frustrating when you have set up monthly withdrawals to be charged against your card. You'll have to go to those companies' websites and change the card numbers you use for those charges.





Following the May 10 ceremony, members and families of both companies toured the rest of the garden, and their memorial wreath from the ceremony will be proudly displayed at the Flag Plaza.

The new Plaza, located at the entrance of the Garden in front of the Veterans Honor Wall. is a recent addition to the Garden, thanks to a generous gift from White River Valley Electric Cooperative as a part of the Plugged-In Grant Program for 2022.
