TESTING FOR WEST NILE VIRUS IN PAULDING COUNTY



Each summer, mosquitoes are a familiar biting pest in our backyards, parks and campgrounds. In Ohio, mosquito borne illnesses are most often transmitted during the warmest months of the year. The Ohio Department of Health (ODH) Zoonotic Disease Program, in partnership with the Paulding County Health Department (PCHD), is conducting county wide mosquito testing. ODH is collaborating with PCHD to trap mosquitoes throughout Paulding County and test them for the West Nile Virus. The Paulding County Health Department looks forward to working with the Ohio Department of Health on this joint effort.

If any mosquito samples test positive for West Nile Virus, the Paulding County Health Department will promptly provide that information to the public.

The most effective way to prevent mosquito borne diseases is to prevent being bitten by the mosquitos. The best suggested way to avoid the West Nile Virus is to apply repellents and remove or treat standing water on your property.

Remember the Raisin

I remember getting those little red boxes of raisins as special treats when going on road trips. I would have much rather gotten M&Ms or some other candy, but raisins were better than nothing, I guess.

When we moved overseas, I learned that dried fruit had a more prominent role in many recipes than I felt comfortable with. We had been invited to a family's home for a special formal meal, and she was making her family favorite dish. I tried my best to disguise my "scared, surprised" face with a "pleasantly surprised" face as the hostess lifted the cover on the hot main serving platter – it was prune chicken.

One dish my sons would never swallow were pocket sandwich that they were served that were filled with fish and raisins. In traveling around America when back, I have learned that people now add dried fruit to tossed salads, but bacon bits do taste much better.

While traveling towards Indiana when back in the States and looking for a stop, we saw a National Historic Site in Monroe, MI. It was the site of the River Raisin Massacre. It was a terrible battle that happened in the muchforgotten War of 1812. Four hundred and ten people were killed, nearly 100 wounded and 547 captured in the worst battle for the Americans of that war. A war cry to mobilize and motivate the American troops was, "Remember the Raisin!" The War of 1812 was just

four years before Indiana was founded. One important politician and soldier who died at River Raisin was John Allen. Three states (Michigan, Ohio and Indiana) decided to honor him by naming a county after him.

For those living in "John Allen's County" and who largely have no idea where the name Allen came from, "Remember the Raisin," just don't mix them in recipes, and eat M&Ms and bacon bits if you have that option.

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WHY IS MONA LISA SMILING?

I have never considered myself photogenic. I always find fault with my own picture and I sometimes wonder, "Oh my! Do I really look like that?" I recall when I was about 4 years old, my grandpa took me up to a photography shop and I got my picture taken. For some odd reason, my Mama and grandparents thought it was cute that I sat with my little legs and arms crossed. Wow!

Yes, I still have a copy of that picture today and let me say this, "My smile was more of a mischievous one and I looked very skeptical of the whole process." I have never ever posed for a painting or even a sketch of myself. I cannot imagine sitting still for that long or even smiling for that long of a time.

I did learn how to take a "selfie" though. However, it may take 50 tries before I get one that even looks like me. This got me thinking

about a painting which features a smile on a lady that has beguiled art lovers for over 600 years. There have been movies made about her and Nat King Cole recorded a song about her in 1950. The lady, of course, was Mona Lisa and her painting became probably the most famous work of art in the world. The smile on this subjects face has puzzled people for years and the art world has speculated on why she has this somewhat mystic

The painter of course was Leonardo Da Vinci and it is said that it took four years to complete this work. The work was requested by subject's husband. Lisa was from a well-known family known through Tuscany and Florence and married to Francesco Del Giocondo, who was a very wealthy silk merchant. The painting of his wife was to celebrate their home's completion, as well as a celebration of the birth of their second son.

Now if you have ever seen duplicate of this famous painting, look at Mona Lisa's smile. Was she being coy? Was she keeping a secret? Was she just bored sitting there posing?

Reports now tell us that Mona was not being coy or suffering from Bells Palsy. A new treatment using focused ultrasound waves is helping patients in northeast Indiana by reducing involuntary tremors that impact their daily functioning.

Parkview Health is the only health system in northern Indiana offering focused ultrasound to patients afflicted by essential tremors. The treatment first became available in January through the Parkview Neurosciences Movement Disorders team.

Essential tremors are a movement disorder characterized by involuntary shaking. Tremors can present as rhythmic shaking or twitching that typically starts in the fingers or hands. The tremors can grow in intensity over time and spread to other parts of the body, including the head, torso or feet. Tremors can create challenges in completing everyday activities, such as grasping and lifting, and can even impact speech.

Parkview's focused ultrasound treatment uses sound waves directed by MRI to precisely target a portion the thalamus, a central hub in the brain and the area responsible for causing essential tremors. The minimally invasive treatment can help immediately reduce tremors and lead to continuing improvement with minimal side effects. Ultrasound treatments require no anesthesia, incisions, ionization or radiation and can be completed as an outpatient procedure.

In order for the procedure to be successful, patients must complete a thorough pre-surgery evaluation with Kimbason, Parkview Physicians Group (PPG) - Neurology, who is fellowship-trained in movement disorders. If a patient meets the criteria, their procedure is performed utilizing the coordinated efforts of Dr. Kimbason and William Young, MD, PPG - Neurosurgery, who has received specialized surgical training

Jay Russell Deerwaster was born October of 1897, the son of Westley, born in Ohio January of 1877, and Inez L. (Nelson) Deerwaster born January of 1879 in Indiana. This couple was married in July 29, 1896 in Paulding.

By 1900, this couple was living in Harrison Township. Like many folks, they were farmers and they had a son, Jay, who was two years old.

By 1910, the Deerwaster family had moved to Benton Township on Townline Street in Payne. Westley became a barber, owning his own shop. Jay had two brothers and two sisters. Floyd born in 1900; Mildred M. 1903; Irene D. 1906; and Kenneth L. 1908. Jay was well as Floyd and Mildred were in school.

On October 13, 1914, Jay married a gal named Flossie Evelyn Fell in Paulding. She was born February of 1899 in New Jersey, the daughter of Lewis F. and Louiza Fell. A son, Westley Russell Deerwaster was born March 6, 1918. A daughter Eline was born in February of 1916. Another daughter, Evelyne was born in 1917.

On September 12, 1918, Jay's father, Westley, registered for the World War draft. Medium height and weight, blue eyes, light hair, but at the age of 41, he was not selected. Jay signed up at Barracks Columbus, Ohio June 29. 1918. He was listed as 5'5",

brown eyes, brown hair, complexion, and ruddy listed as a barber. He served with Company M., 10th Infantry. He was Honorably Discharged January 17, 1919. By 1923, the Deerwaster

family, Jay, Flossie, Evelyne and Westley Russell moved to Toledo, Ohio. They were living at 22008 Ashland Avenue. Jay was working as a mechanic and the children were in school.

On May 1, 1926, Jay passed away. Unclear of what ĥappened. His body was brought to Payne, where he was buried in Wiltsie Cemetery, section 3, lot 153, grave 3. After Jay died, the children moved to Payne and lived with the grandparents, Westley and Inez. By 1928, Flossie remained in Toledo. She is living at, 019 Evesham Avenue.

By 1930 she moved to 527 Oliver Street in Toledo. She never remarried and passed away in Toledo July 16, 1936, burial site unknown. Westley Russell Deerwaster went on to serve in the Navy during World War Two. He was listed as 5'10", 158 pounds, ruddy complexion, brown hair, blue eyes. Enlisted into service December 31, 1941, mustered into service September 30, 1942. Discharged November 26, 1945. He passed away June 15, 1978 and was buried in Wiltsie Cemetery. Records are not clear as to what happened to Evelyne or Eline.

In order to effectively carry out a successful school year with respect to health and wellness, we need parents to assist us with educating your child on the importance of maintaining safety routines and exhibiting healthy behaviors. School personnel will likewise continually emphasize and reinforce student responsibility for safe and heathy behaviors that protect them and those around them. School personnel will also clean, disinfect, and sanitize our school facility, playgrounds, and buses on a routine basis.

Speaking of student wellness, we are excited to share with you that our school has received a \$50,000 Stronger Connections Grant from the Ohio Department of Education to help support student wellness. The grant funds will be utilized to provide mental health programs and positive behavior support initiatives for our student body.

On the academic front, our staff will continue to receive professional development opportunities during this school year in order to increase their abilities and improve their skill set to provide instruction and engage student acquisition with respect to the state academic content standards. The district will also continue to provide training for staff with respect to an inclusionary/coteaching model of instruction. We are also pleased to share with you two important updates. Due to growth in the number of preschool age children, we have created another pre-school unit. For the first time in several years, we will have a certified foreign language teacher instructing our students. Mrs. Lola Cortes has been hired by the Board of Education to fill the vacancy. Lola, her husband, and 21-month -old child came to us from Spain as part of the Ohio Department of Education's efforts to arrange foreign language teachers for Ohio districts who are having difficulty filling positions. Lola and her family will be residing in our school district. Please welcome to Antwerp Local Mrs. Lola Cortes.

Recently, plans for the construction of our wellness and recreation center (referred to as "The Range") were completed and put forth for the construction bidding process. The facility will be located on the west side of the baseball/softball complex. We anticipate construction starting in late August or early September. The Range will feature a large recreational space, multi-purpose classroom, restrooms, concession/kitchen and patio area, and elevated press box. The project will be partially funded with ARP/ESSER federal relief funds.

During the past month, a new roof has been installed over the two gymnasiums. History of Amending the Ohio State Constitution

The original Ohio State Constitution was written in 1802-1803 at the time that Ohio was admitted to the Union as the 17th state. Voters elected delegates to draft that first Constitution, which was approved by Congress in February of 1803.

The Constitution was rewritten at the first of five Constitutional Conventions in

1851. The last of these five Constitutional Conventions was held in 1912. The Constitution, written in 1851, is generally considered the fundamental law of Ohio. However, some consider the substantial changes adopted at the 1912 Constitutional Convention to be a new Constitution (the 3rd Constitution of the State of Ohio).

Amendments- The 1851 Constitution has been amended 172 times including changes made at all 4 of the succeeding Constitutional Conventions as well as those introduced by the legislature and citizen-initiated amendments. The citizen-initiated amendment was one of 37 amendments adopted by the voters following the 1912 Constitutional Convention.

Between 1990 and 2022 there were 49 Constitutional amendments proposed for voter consideration. Of the proposed amendments, 26 were proposed by the legislature and 23 were proposed by Citizen Initiative- almost half and half. However, the amendments that passed were overwhelmingly proposed by the legislature. 81% of the legislator proposed amendments passed with over 60% of the voters voting in favor. While only 39% of the Citizen Initiated amendments passed with over 60% of the votes.

In my opinion, we need to treat constitutional amendments differently from laws. Constitutional amendments become a permanent part of our Constitution, should be more difficult to adapt, require a vote of the citizens,

and should have broad support to be adopted. Legislation can be adopted by a simple majority and should be more easily amended when conditions change, or the legislation did not work as hoped. I urge you to get out and vote by August 8 and I urge you to vote YES on Issue One, the only item on the ballot. Protect our Constitution!!

There is a special election on August 8th to change the percentage required to pass an initiative amendment to the Ohio Constitution from a simple majority to 60%. Only 18 states now allow this process and of those, 9 require a 55-66% threshold including such states as Illinois, Colorado, Arizona and New Hampshire.

Our 1851 Ohio Constitution has been amended 172 times and is very bloated with detailed issues. A Constitution is designed to be a basic framework not a code of laws. Our U.S. Constitution has only had 27 amendments in our 242 years partly because it requires a 67% vote of Congress or 75% vote of the state legislatures.

All amendments deserve a definitive decision, but the pro-abortion amendment in November especially requires very careful consideration since it involves the right to life, protection of our mothers, and parental rights. PROGRAM ALUMNI ADDED TO 2023 COLLEGE **EXPERIENCE AT PURDUE FORT WAYNE**



A summer program designed to help young African American males take what may be their first major steps toward a college education is returning to Purdue University Fort Wayne for the third consecutive year. Participants are scheduled to begin arriving on campus this after-

The three-day, two-night opportunity is called the Purdue University Fort Wayne College Experience. It's a collaboration between the university's Office of Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion and the Bloom Project, a nonprofit organization helping young men of color in Indianapolis and Fort Wayne with career and college readiness.

The 2023 experience will host nearly 40 students entering grades 8-12 from five Indiana cities and as far away as Waldorf, Maryland. The program is made possible through a grant from the Foellinger Foundation.

A new aspect of this summer's PFW College Experience will be the involvement of five program alumni who are set to return on Wednesday to lead sessions focused on college preparation, networking, public speaking, and

time management. The main objective of the full experience is to offer an immersive glimpse of college life including tours, time in the classroom, social activities, and a campus fair. Participants will also stay in Student Housing to help them feel what it is like to be a college student.

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\$2.5 MILLION TO IMPROVE NUTRITION & PHYSICAL ACTIVITY The Ohio State University College of Food, Agricultural, and Environmental Sciences

(CFAES) has received a \$2.5 million award from the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) to fund a project that will focus on improving nutrition and physical activity, and will address health disparities related to poor nutrition, physical activity, and obesity. The grant will fund the

Obesity Program (HOP), which, in Ohio, will be led by Ohio State University Extension, the outreach arm of CFAES. The five-year program will focus on rural communities, where 40% or more of adults have obesity, said Carol Smathers, a CFAES associate professor and field specialist in youth nutrition and wellness for OSU Exten-

"The issue is significant considering that obesity in Ohio affects 37.7% of adults, and 16 of Ohio's 88 counties have adult obesity prevalence over 40%," said Smathers, who has increased to 12.4% of adults, and despite Ohio's agricultural abundance, nearly 1 in 8 Ohioans are food insecure. "Additionally, Ohio ranks

Jimmy came to school one day, excited that his uncle Lonzo had come to visit from Cherry Valley, Arkansas. Their town was in Western Tennessee. Lonzo Green, was a well known country singer, and word spread throughout the town. Jimmy's friend wanted to meet him, but the friend was not allowed in their house. He was from the wrong side of the tracks. He was white trash.

Jimmy's friend had gotten an old guitar and wanted to learn how to play, but did not know how to tune it. Could he come over and have Lonzo tune his guitar. Lonzo would meet him, and they would stay outside, so it was arranged that afternoon.

The shy 15-year-old showed up that afternoon, with his old battered guitar over his shoulder, held with a piece of binder twine. Lonzo had also tasted poverty, so he went out to meet the lad and told him he would tune his guitar. As he tuned the guitar he began to sing and play for the boy. A small crowd began to gather. One hour stretched into two, cars went by unnoticed, shadows began to get long and it would soon be suppertime.

Lonzo sang all afternoon. Then he taught the lad how to play a few chords and taught him how to sing a couple songs. As he sang he began to gain confidence. Jimmy's friend bid Lonzo goodbye,

and left. Lonzo never saw the boy in person again. The boy would never be shut out of any ones house again. He would appear in 33 movies, and thousands of records. The boys name was Elvis Presley. We could talk about Lonzo

Green. You probably know him as ALonzo and Oscar, and the song, "The Green-Horned Farmer." Lonzo died last year at the age of 94. Elvis died tragically many years ago. I would like to talk about the other side of the tracks. The Bible makes it plain that under God, all men and women, and all races are equal. It seems like in the last few years things have gotten worse in our country.

People tend to associate with those of their kind. We have Italian neighborhoods, generally well to do live in one neighborhood, and poor in another. We Methodists generally associate with other Methodists, but that doesn't mean we can't be accepting of each other. That doesn't mean necessarily that we need more diversity.

Many years ago a savior came. He was rejected by his own people. He went to the extreme of sacrificing his own life, and still is rejected by many people. He is loving and patient and willing to accept anyone who will come to him. Time has a way of speeding by and the time to make a decision is now. Today is the day of salvation.

Of these 53 counties, 24 of them have met the minimum number of poll workers needed to conduct the election and 35 counties have met or exceeded their goal for committed number of poll

While Ohio has passed the minimum number of poll workers needed to conduct the election, Ohio Secretary of State Frank LaRose set a goal of 31,811 poll workers, which is 115% of the minimum, to ensure a sufficient number of poll workers is available in case of an emergency.

Ohioans looking to serve as a poll worker may sign up VoteOhio.gov/Defend-Democracy. Poll workers are financially compensated for their time on Election Day.

The county breakdown can be seen on Ohio's Poll Worker Tracker. The tracker, which was started in 2020 by Secretary LaRose, continues to give Ohioans, counties, and partner organizations clear goals for poll worker recruitment for the August 8 Special Elec-
